Shocking Events

Whilst enjoying our traditional family walk on Boxing Day towards Pengymill, we were concerned to see a group of men with guns standing beside the footpath shooting. To avoid them we kept to the bridleway, as we passed the lake we admired the wild fowl and a lone swan. The grandchildren were thrilled to watch the swan start it's take off flight. Our grandson Alfie shouted "DON'T GO THAT WAY MATE YOU MIGHT GET SHOT", then BANG the lovely majestic swan fell from the sky onto to the pit road. We were all shocked and very upset. Our daughter Joanna, ran to apprehend the shooters who had thrown the swan into the undergrowth where we recovered it from. Police responded quickly with three cars racing to the scene. The RSPCA took the dead bird away and will be

prosecuting the offending gun. His excuse was that he thought the bird was a goose and that the sun was shining in his eyes. He was told that he should identify his target before pulling the trigger, and you are not supposed to shoot geese either.

The group of approx. 8 shooters appeared to be an organized shoot and were properly attired and were of foreign decent.

Chignal Parish Council

UNCONFIRMED REPORT OF THE MEETING OF CHIGNAL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON MONDAY 12th JANUARY 2009 IN THE VILLAGE HALL

P.C. Alan Davey attended the meeting and reported that since October, there have been four road accidents, one road sign incident, two cases of criminal damage and one burglary in the Parish.

P.C. Davey was advised that there have been numer- ous incidents of beer cans being thrown from cars particularly between the pumping station and Mashbury and also in Chignal Smealey between Woodhall Farm and Greenfields.

PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

- a) Concerns were raised about the condition of road surfaces to Pengymill Lane and it was explained that Lafarge has recently undertaken remedial works in the area.
- b) It was explained that the Highways Department has agreed that there are problems with road edges and potholes throughout the Parish and remedial work will be carried out shortly.

A site visit is to be carried out on 13th January by a representative of the Highways Department to examine the damage to the drain and surrounding areas at the entrance to the Green.

- c) A statement was read out by the owner of the nursery clarifying issues reported at the last meeting.
- d) A parishioner reported that the fence/barrier to the bridleway to Pengymill has disappeared and it was agreed that relevant action be taken for the fence to be replaced.
- e) It was reported that the raising of the height of the current contours by Lafarge behind St. James' Church will need a full planning application.

SUB-COMMITTEE REPORTS

GRAVEL LIAISON – the next liaison meeting will be held at 3 p.m. on 27th January 2009 and problems reported by parishioners will be discussed at the meeting.

FOOTPATHS – a complaint has been received that the top bar of the stile near the Orangery is too high and a request was made for it to be removed.

It was reported that some of the brown signs erected in the Parish are incorrect and clarification is needed to explain the differences between bridleways and footpaths.

VDS – Another draft was submitted to the Borough Council before Christmas and it is expected that the next draft will be available for public consultation.

COUNTY AND BOROUGH COUNCILLORS REPORTS

It was explained that the Planning Committee will, from April, be held during the day rather than in the evenings as at present. The mobile information van will no longer be visiting Chignal but it was suggested that a presence at the Village Fete in June might be an appropriate time for a visit.

PLANNING

Gravel extraction and formation of a reservoir opposite the Village Hall – the Planning Officer has visited the site recently and is waiting for the Agricultural Report but it is hoped that the application will be submitted to the February Committee.

Blue House Cottage – extensions – a new application is to be submitted.

The Old Rectory – extensions – a decision is awaited from the Borough Council

Hillside Cottage – dormer window – the application has been approved.

Brittons Hall Farm Buildings – raising of barn roof – a decision is awaited.

HORSE/DEER SIGNS

A list of possible sitings for new horse and deer signs in the Parish will be forwarded to the Highways Department for appropriate action.

VILLAGE CLEAN-UP DAY

It was agreed that the Clean-Up Day be held on Saturday 21st, March 2009 commencing at 9 a.m. with starting points at the Village Hall and Woodhall Farm.

DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next meeting will be held in the Village Hall at 7.00 p.m. on Monday 9th March 2009 followed by the Annual Parish Meeting commencing at 8.00 p.m.
