The first wine was a sparkling Rose from Mas de Daumas Gassac and this was followed by two whites one from small producer in Picpoul de Pinet and one from Domaine de l'Hortus. The whites in particular were very well received. We then tasted two reds. The first from Domaine

du Meteore was unusual and had a mixed reception whilst the second from Chateau Ollieux Romanis made from the relatively rare Alicante Bouschet grape was considered excellent by all those present. We finished a most enjoyable evening with a lovely red dessert wine from Chateau de Jau.

**Salt gritting of Smallshoes Hill:** none of the roads within Mashbury are on the Essex Highways gritting schedule. However, as Smallshoes Hill is a significant hazard in ice and snow it was hoped that a local solution could be found in time for this winter. Regrettably this has not been possible as partnership with a neighbouring parish within the Salt Bag Scheme could not be arranged. Looking ahead to next winter, we are dependent on whether Essex Highways can continue to make the Salt Bag Scheme and/or the Salt Bin Scheme available. A salt bin on the hill would be the best option for us, but would depend on the parish finding the £350 payment required for entry into the scheme and either option would require local volunteers who are willing to spread grit in bad weather. A decision about what will be available is expected in early summer.

### **Neighbourhood Watch:**

We are now receiving outline information on recent crime in the area so that we can keep Mashbury residents alert to possible risks. To date, crimes notified have been theft of equipment left unattended. Janet Clarke was born in 1935 in Swiss Avenue Chelmsford to Elsie and Geoffrey Panel. She lived there until she was 4 years old at which point she moved to 2 Council Houses Chignal Smealey (now Ash Rise) where she lived with her Nan and Gramp until she married in 1954.

Raised by her grandparents she attended Chignal School and fast became friends with Eve Pitts (Nee Hawkes), a strong friendship which lasted the years. As the years went by, they attended Keep Fit together, and spent many memorable times with one another, having children at similar times.

Janet's first job was working as a Clerk for Brown Brothers, based in Chelmsford. She rode her bike daily into town from Chignal.

In 1954 she married Eric at St Nicholas Church and moved into the Nissan Hut at Beadles Hall. They remained there until late 1957 when they moved to Grays Lodge. They became proud parents in 1955 when Jacqueline was born. In 1957 they became parents for a second time with the birth of Philip.

Whilst working as a full time mother, she also worked potato picking for Tony Towns. As the children grew older, they would accompany her in the pram and would even help her, when they were old enough to.

She also worked at the village shop and delivered groceries to all in the Chignals, Mashbury and the Easters in her Ford Anglia.

In 1960 Stephen was born. Sadly when Jackie was 11/12 years old she became ill and in 1971 when she was 15 she passed away. The family pulled together to get through the difficult time.

In 1964 Eric and Janet had their fourth child Gary and in 1972 Janet and Eric became parents again when Carralyn was born. Finally in 1975 James was born.

Janet lived in Chignal Smealey all her life and raised her family there. Many grandchildren followed, totalling 10 and thereafter, 6 great grandchildren were born.

Eric sadly passed away in 2002 and although difficult for Janet, she fought on with the strength that we all came to know and love.

Janet suffered with illness for many years and her health deteriorated on Christmas Eve 2010. She was cared for by the Staff at Broomfield Hospital for two weeks, with her large family continually by her side. She passed away peacefully on the 9<sup>th</sup> January 2011.

Until her passing she was the oldest surviving resident of Chignal Smealey.

Janet's funeral took place on the 7<sup>th</sup> February 2011 at the Church where she married and an event which was attended by a vast number of people.

Janet was a fantastic and inspirational woman who will be sadly missed by all who knew her.

# DIGITAL TV SWITCHOVER IS COMING AND HELP IS AT HAND

For older and disabled viewers who may find making the switch difficult, the Switchover Help Scheme is at hand to provide practical help and assistance to turn one TV set to digital.

The Switchover Help Scheme can help you convert your TV to digital if you:

- Are aged 75 or over, or
- Have lived in a care home for six months or more, or
- Get (or could get)
  - Disability Living Allowance (DLA), or
  - o Attendance or Constant Attendance Allowance, or
  - Mobility Supplement, or
  - Are registered blind or partially sighted

Most people will be asked to pay £40 towards the standard option of help. This includes easy to use equipment to switch one TV, an approved installer, an aerial upgrade if needed and a 12 month aftercare service, including a free helpline. The service is free for people who are eligible and who also receive pension credit, income support, income-based jobseeker's allowance or income-related employment and support allowance.

If you are eligible, the Help Scheme will write to you directly and in plenty of time to ask if you want help. All you need to do is respond to our letter by sending back a completed reply form or to make things even easier you can call the Help Scheme free to respond.

Eligible people in our local area have been identified and should have received a letter to explain the switchover programme, and the people must respond to get help. There will be 2 further reminders. Many of the eligible people will be fortunate to have relatives, friends or neighbours to assist them with their response. However, some are not so fortunate, and the concern is that these people are amongst those least likely to understand the process.

# Essex County Council

Within the next few weeks we will all be hearing about the **2011 Census**. The Office for National Statistics (ONS) manages and runs the **Census** in England and Wales. The purpose of the national **Census** is to gain an accurate statistical picture of our community so that it will enable the county councils, local authorities and their partners in the public sector to design and provide services that meet the needs of all residents. Of course it is also important that accurate numbers of residents are recorded so that, for example, the **Essex County Council** and its partners receive the correct funding allocation from central government.

The actual **Census** will be conducted on Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> March and will count everybody who is resident in Essex on that day; the **Census** questionaire form will be delivered to every household between 7<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> March. For those who wish it, the return can also be made on-line. The **Census** questionaire will not only cover basic demographic questions, but also issues such as housing, health, occupations / employment, migration, ethnicity etc. However, it should be noted that the personal information provided by households will <u>not</u> be shared with the **County Council** or other organisations as it is protected by law and will be kept confidential for 100 years. The national **Census** is conducted every 10 years and each varies slightly to take into account changes in our society. This time the **Census** seeks to better account for population diversity and special attention is being paid to hard-to-count, under-represented groups, including the disabled and/or very elderly people, ethnic minority groups, non-English speaking people, unemployed people, students and other young adults and also gypsy / traveller and other groups where response has historically been low.

It should be added that completion of the **Census** questionaire is a legal requirement. Failure to complete the **Census** form could lead a prosecution and a fine of up to £1,000.

Free help and support to complete the Census will be available to all residents. From 5<sup>th</sup> March the **Census Help Line** will be **0300 0201101** or <u>www.census.gov.uk</u>

# OUR REACTION TO THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT SETTLEMENT

The Government has announced their funding for Local Government for the next two years. From next April, Chelmsford Borough Council will receive approximately £1.4 million less grant than in previous years which represents a 16.4% reduction in 2011/12. This is followed by a further 6% reduction in 2012/13.

The leader of the Council has stated "The Council has been preparing for this for some time and is able to balance its budget in 2011/12 through the identification of significant efficiency savings and through the prudent use of its balances. The Council has already reduced the number of Service Directors from 17 to 8 in line with government expectations. We will protect front line delivery of high quality local services to our residents".

These reductions in grant are the highest ever experienced by Local Government and had the Government kept to the previous way of calculating this grant, the actual reduction would have been only £26,000. Instead they have redirected over £1.4 million of grant that should be used to support Chelmsford's services to other Councils within the country. The Council will be making representations to the Government regarding the redirection of this grant.

### Mobile Customer Information Service –dates for 2011

Chelmsford Borough Council offers a free service to some of the more isolated or vulnerable communities within the borough to ensure that everyone has access to Council services. A schedule of visits for 2011 can be found on the Council's website at <u>www.chelmsford.gov.uk/mobileinfo</u>.

The mobile Customer information team currently visits ten rural communities around the borough or where public transport is perhaps less frequent, to ensure that residents with the greatest need for advice and support, such as the elderly, young families and those with mobility requirement, have access to information and advice about Council Services. This service offers advice on how to seek help with housing benefit, council tax, bus passes (for individuals aged 60 and over), environmental problems, leisure, tourism and re-cycling.

Some of these sessions are attended by the PCSOs from Essex Police for their beat surgeries and Essex Fire & Rescue Service to promote safety in the home.

REPORT OF THE MEETING OF CHIGNAL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON MONDAY 10<sup>th</sup> JANUARY 2011 IN THE VILLAGE HALL

## PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

A parishioner requested information on the storage of grit in the Parish and it was explained that Councillors had decided that there was no suitable place in the Chignals for storage.

Reservations were expressed on the continuation of the twice weekly bus service following the provision of a shopping bus direct from Good Easter to a local supermarket and investigations will be made to confirm that the bus through the Chignals will not be axed.

### BOROUGH COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Councillor Chambers explained that a Mobile Customer Information Service is available for isolated areas who will visit the Parish on a monthly basis if required.

Councillor Chambers agreed to provide information on the make-up of Special Expenses for Chignal before the figures are presented to Council on 16<sup>th</sup> February.

## SUB COMMITTEE REPORTS

NEWSLETTER INCL. WEBSITE - there have been no problems with distribution.

GRAVEL LIAISON – the next meeting will be held in April. It was reported that the Cemex Plant is in the process of being removed with the exception of the concrete block. There are no restoration plans at present because of delays through inclement weather. No complaints have been registered.

VILLAGE WATCH – no new co-ordinator has been appointed and it was explained that in future, information will be more e-mail based. Any Neighbourhood Action Panel information will be e-mailed by PCSO Gina Bennett.

HIGHWAYS – Problems with flooded ditches near Stevens Farm were reported and will be investigated. A burst pipe in Chignal Smealey has been repaired.

It was reported that the chevron near Ivy Cottage has not been repaired and the Highways Department will be reminded that the work is still outstanding.

FOOTPATHS /BRIDLEWAYS – Further walks were organised with the first taking place at 10 a.m. on Friday 11<sup>th</sup> February starting from the Green, Chignal St. James.

TELEPHONE KIOSK – it was proposed and agreed that a lock be purchased and fitted as soon as possible. PLANNING

The Bungalow – demolition and erection of new dwelling – application approved

Westleas – single storey rear extension – application approved.

Stevens Farm – conversion of cart lodge to garaging – approved.

Mineral Development – consultation 9 December 2010 - 17 February 2011. There have been no comments from Councillors and it was explained that the proposed extraction is from a site in Roxwell which should not effect the Chignals.

NOTICE BOARDS – It was reported that the date for delivery of the four boards will be mid February and the boards will then be varnished and posts purchased. Two boards will be resited, the board at present in the grounds of the Three Elms to land adjacent to the telephone kiosk at Chignal St. James and the board situated near Woodhall Farm will be repositioned to the car park of the Pig & Whistle Public House.

### REPORT FROM NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION PANEL

PCSO Gina Bennett had been unable to attend the meeting but it was agreed that any urgent information from Essex Police would be passed to Chris Philpot who will act as temporary co-ordinator until a new neighbourhood watch co-ordinator is found.

### LATE URGENT BUSINESS

The next Village Clean-Up Day was arranged for Saturday 26th March 2011.

Confirmation has been received that Village Agents will continue to serve the community for the foreseeable future.

DATE OF NEXT MEETING: The next meeting will be held in the Village Hall at 7.00 p.m. on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> March 2011 followed by the Annual Parish Meeting commencing at 8.00 p.m.


