One of our members, Rosina Bugg, who had worked in the House of Hartnell, the Royal couturier, gave us an interesting insight into the workings of a fashion house. In March one of our members, Anita Howard, took us back to the 1940s and 1950s in verse. Anita is a published poet who even has a poem on the National Curriculum and is the poetry representative for the National Society of Journalists. Anita presents her poems well due to her lively personality. The poems brought back a lot of happy childhood memories. In recent months three past members of the WI have died, Mrs. Joan Chapman who was landlady of 'The Pig and Whistle', Mrs. Queenie Bird and Miss Nora Hoy. Mrs. Chapman was a very talented artist and was able to do many crafts with perfection, Mrs. Bird was one of the team of early members who established this WI and the village will not be the same without her. Miss Hoy was an outstanding member of this WI, she joined the WI in the late 60s and became secretary in the early 70s. Presidents

came and went quite rapidly when Nora was secretary, but, Nora continued as secretary until she became President in 1981. Nora remained as President until 1991 when her illness made it impossible to continue. Nora was an excellent cook and one of her recipes was included in an Essex Federation Recipe Book, she had a great interest in local history and she wrote a brief account of the Chignals which was published in the Essex Federation Villages Book. Village Hall Chairman's Report 2007-2008 The committee held five official meetings during the past year. The year started with the biggest event held at the hall for a number of years, namely the official opening of the extensions to the hall. With the mayor of Chelmsford and over 100 residents and guests, the day went off extremely well. The comments from those attending were indirectly a big thank you to the committee for all the hard work they had put in. Continuing on the social side we held whist drives, a barn dance and a coffee morning which were all well attended. Across at Woodhall the fete was again a big success with the weather being kind to us to ensure a large turnout. Again thank you to Beryl and Norman Wasteney for the use of their garden.

I must also thank the local groups who continue to make good use of the hall, with increased memberships further to the hall's improvements. Work continues to improve the facilities and appearance of the hall; during the year we have seen the installation of new double glazed windows, curtains, fire doors, doors to the entrance hall and, outside, the new patio area. There has also been a considerable amount of decorating, both outside and in, carried out by the committee work party.

The finance report shows a reasonable balance, however we do need to resurface the car park, an expensive operation. We have been awarded £5,000 from Essex County Council's Community Initiatives Fund towards the cost and are now applying to the Lottery Fund's Awards for All for further financial assistance so, hopefully, the car park will be done this summer. The other major item outstanding is to tidy the grounds so there is a good area for use in the fine weather.

Mashbury Parish Meeting

A meeting of Mashbury residents was held on 31st March at the Salvation Army Hall which, as usual, was very well attended. Cllrs John Aldridge and Nicolette Chambers were also in attendance to support the discussion.

The condition of local roads continues to be a major concern for residents; in particular the stretch of Fox Road in the Bards Hall area, but also the general problem of deep potholes on several roads. These concerns will be raised again with the Highways Team, but Cllr Aldridge did encourage residents to log specific problems themselves, either via the County Council website or by phone.

Following this year's bad weather we have all noticed the effect on the surface of our roads. Damage has been sustained in the urban areas but is particularly noticeable on our narrower rural roads. The Highways Service in Mid Essex have been trying hard over recent weeks to remedy the worst of the road faults, whilst not delaying road improvement projects that have been in the pipeline for many months. The County's Highway Inspectors will try to log all road faults but if you have noted any serious road defect, whether it be a pot hole, broken kerbing, defective street light or damaged street sign, then please report it soonest so that appropriate remedial action can be taken - don't leave it to others. For Internet users click on the ECC website http://www.essex.gov.uk/ and follow the "Report a Highway Fault" box which will give you a reference number and confirmation that the fault has been registered. Alternatively, telephone 0845 603 7622.

The recent High Court decision rejecting the appeal against the further expansion of passenger numbers at Stansted Airport came as a bit of a blow to many campaigners. The County Council recognises the arguments made for the Airport expansion by BAA, from 24 million passengers per year to 35 million; although in the present climate it is hard to see how such numbers can be sustained. However, The County Council is wholly opposed to the construction of a second runway at Stansted. It is hoped that the ruling by the Competition Commission, to demand that BAA sell Stansted within two years, will end the wholesale expansion of the Airport into Essex's rural hinterland.

There were enough volunteers for the Village Litter Pick to ensure that all Parish roads are cleaned and we are all grateful to them for their hard work.

Among the queries raised by residents was clarification on the impact of proposed electoral boundary changes and it was confirmed that these will only impact on Parliamentary representation – County and Borough wards are unaffected. The Parish is indebted to the Salvation Army for allowing use of the Hall for this meeting.

Despite the difficulties of an ever increasing demand for Adult Social Care Services, Essex County Council was recently awarded the highest star rating (3 Stars) by the Commission for Social Care Inspectorate (CSCI). This is no mean achievement when budgets are so tight. As these Services have such a major impact on the quality of life, for so many of our residents, I can also advise that the number of adult social care users receiving "Personal Budgets" has increased tenfold to over 300 since the scheme was introduced by Essex last year. This has enabled our disabled and elderly residents to receive the financial support to meet their social care needs and retain their independence by remaining in their homes. Finally, the Broomfield & Writtle County Division currently lies within the Parliamentary Constituency of West Chelmsford. However, following the review by the independent Boundary Commission in 2005, the Division will become part of the Parliamentary Constituency of Saffron Walden - but only when the next General Election is called. The boundaries of all Essex County Divisions and Chelmsford Borough Wards will remain unaffected.
