## Chignal Wine Discovery Group

In February Dave and Gill presented 'Wines from Newspapers' whereby we sampled wines that had been recommended by various newspaper wine critics within the last 4 months. We tried a white and red in each of four caterogies; Supermarket own brand, £10, £10-£15 and £15-£20. All were purchased from a cross section of supermarkets. It was interesting to compare our views with those of the critic. The critic has to consider value for money as well as the papers audience, as opposed to us, who just need to decide whether we like it or not! Finding a critic who appeals to your own wine preference could be a worthwhile exercise but could also prove a long term project with many disappointments along the way. Of those tasted the 2010 Bellingham The Bernard Series Roussanne was regarded as the one members would likely buy again. A very relaxed and enjoyable evening was had by all with the moral of the evening being not to believe everything you read in the papers!


In March Charles Hardcastle from Joseph Barnes Wines Limited (www.josephbarneswines.com) returned to present 'There's more to Spain than Rioja..'. Joseph Barnes Wines is an independent wine merchant in Saffron Walden – they regularly hold wine tasting evenings and events within the shop (which has a delicatessen attached) and Charles is always welcomed at our Friday evening tastings. Yet again he brought a great selection of wine which he complimented with a very knowledgeable overview for each – in many cases Charles had visited the vineyard and was on first name terms with the owner - this in stark contrast to taking pot luck (in some cases) buying off the shelf from the supermarket. Each wine was of a very good quality, and, whilst they were not all to everyone's individual taste (we all loved numbers 3, 5 and 6 though) we could appreciate that by using an independent wine merchant you could more easily build a portfolio of wines to compliment and delight at any occasion.

April is ablaze with 3000 tulips and fritillaria. July shows 120+ varieties of agapanthus. Unusual trees, shrubs, rose borders, with 40yr plus old geraniums, Mediterranean and Southern Hemisphere planting in dry garden. Garden close to sea.

#### **April 2013 Orchard News**

The community orchard is a reality! This new addition to our community has been funded entirely by external sources of funding and support and has been made possible through the efforts of the Parish Council assisted by a band of energetic volunteers from the Chignals and Mashbury.

The Parish Council took over the lease of the orchard site at Howlett's Corner, (opposite the playing fields in Chignal St James) in the middle of March and our contractors started work at the beginning of April to secure the area with rabbit proof fencing augmented by 420 native fruiting hedgerow plants sourced from the Woodland Trust, such as wild rose, elder, blackthorn, crab apple and hazel.

Of course, one of the most important features of the community orchard is the selection and planting of the fruit trees. Most of the 66 trees that we have chosen are heritage varieties developed in Essex and Hertfordshire: apples such as Seabrook's Red, George Cave, Montfort, Pearl, Braintree Seedling, Dr Harvey and Chelmsford Wonder; pears include, Improved Fertility, Gansel's Bergamot and Johnny Mount Pear; Golden Transparent and Monarch plums; and, three different varieties of quince and a mulberry. Despite a damp and showery day, our first orchard event on 12<sup>th</sup> April was a huge success. Almost 50 adults and children getting down to planting the last of the trees and hedgerow plants, many meeting each other for the first time and enjoying the occasion. A big thank you to orchard supporters Cllr Nicolette Chambers from Chelmsford City Council, Dave Benfield from Lafarge-Tarmac and Sophie Blythe from Edible Essex who planted the first trees and to Dominic Field and Mark Stevens from Transscape who took the time to get involved with us all, and led the way with the planting. They have done a tremendous job in delivering our orchard on time.

There are now some finishing touches to add: sowing a wild flower meadow, erecting a storage shed, benches and a picnic table. We are planning an official orchard opening on **Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> May at 10.30** am with a variety of events to celebrate this new addition to the many good things about living in and visiting our villages and to acknowledge the role of our funders and supporters. Car parking will be at the village hall and from there it is only a short step to the orchard. We look forward to seeing you there! The Parish Council's orchard sub-committee has been meeting twice a month since January to get the orchard off the ground and the Orchard Friends group continues to grow as more residents of Mashbury and the Chignals have expressed interest in being involved in the project. ### **Chignal Parish Council Annual Meeting**

Unconfirmed report of the Chignal Annual Parish Meeting held on Monday 11<sup>th</sup> March 2013.

The meeting was well attended by Parish Councillors and 16 parishioners and was chaired by Mr. Chris Philpot. The Chairman thanked everyone for attending the meeting and thanked his fellow Councillors and the Clerk for their continuing support together with thanks to the two local councillors John Aldridge and Nicolette Chambers for their help and guidance. Steve Middleditch was welcomed as a new Councillor and Andy Jenkins as the new Hon, Rural Officer. Lyn Ballard was thanked for all her work for the Jubilee celebrations and the proposed new Village Orchard and the editor of the Village Newsletter was also thanked.

CHIGNAL & MASHBURY GARDENING CLUB – membership continues to grow and during the past year there have been interesting and varied speakers with Summer visits to local gardens and a wonderful evening visit to Beeleigh Abbey. The gardening club has been very supportive of the proposed village orchard and members will be involved with the tree and wild flower planting,.

BOWLS CLUB – the club continues to meet twice each week on Tuesday and Thursday evenings at 7.30 p.m. in the Village Hall. Apart from internal competitions the club has been well represented at the Essex Championships, open events and friendly matches against local teams. Social events have included a quiz night and meals at local hostelries. New members are always welcome.

WOMENS INSTITUTE AND ART GROUP— 2012 was the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Chignal W.I. which continues to thrive with five new members in the last year. Support has been given to disabled children in the Chernobyl region of the Ukraine by providing warm blankets and jumpers knitted by members. 2013 has started well with more new members and a new President – Janet Campen.

The Art Group now meets on the fourth Thursday of each month at St. Mary's Cottage.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH – although there is no longer a co-ordinator, all information is forwarded by the police to the Chairman who passes on the information to all Councillors.

CRICKET CLUB – 2012 was a fairly good year for both teams with the 1st eleven avoiding relegation from the premier league and the 2nd eleven finishing in 6<sup>th</sup> position in Division 9 following promotion. The first home game is on 4<sup>th</sup> May with the second eleven's first home match on 11<sup>th</sup> May.

WINE DISCOVERY GROUP – the membership has grown to 39 and in September will celebrate its 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The group meets on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Friday of each month except August with special events at

Christmas and a BBQ in the Summer. The annual membership fee is £15 with £7.50 for each tasting evening attended.

ST. NICHOLAS CHURCH – it was reported that after 11 years without a priest a new priest in charge was appointed in January 2013, the Reverend Caroline Bower, and her duties include the Parishes of Chignal with Mashbury, Great Waltham and Ford End. In the course of the year, in addition to Sunday Services there have been four baptisms, one wedding and two funerals. A concert was held in honour of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee with the church full to capacity. The church has been well maintained by a team of cleaners and floral arrangers and thanks were expressed to all who helped in these capacities.

CHIGNAL CHAPEL – Sunday worship is held at 10.45 a.m. each week and there are special services at Easter, Harvest and Christmas. Coffee mornings are held on 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday of each month from 10.30 – 12 noon and everyone is welcome. In April a total immersion water baptism service was held and in October there was a wedding in the Chapel. The village carol service will be held in the Chapel this year FINANCE – the accounts for 2011/12 were available for inspection.

VILLAGE CLEAN-UP DAY - The Clean-Up day will be held on Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> March commencing at 9 a.m. from either the Village Hall or Woodhall Farm. Volunteers would be much appreciated particularly from the Woodhall area of the Parish.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

It was suggested that a coffee morning be held on the first Wednesday of each month and encourage elderly parishioners to attend to highlight any problems they may have which your members of the community could help resolve. The Parish Council supported the idea and it was explained that money is available from various sources to help finance the proposal.

The Village Fete will be held on 1st June on the Village Hall Playing Fields.

A caravan rally will be held at the Village Hall in April. It was explained that information on the funding for faster Broadband will be included in the next edition of the Newsletter.

Reservations were expressed on the dangers on the narrow roads in Chignal for organised Charity cycle and walking groups.

DATE OF NEXT MEETING - The next Annual Parish meeting was arranged for 8 p.m. on Monday 10<sup>th</sup> March 2014 in the Village Hall.

## **Mashbury Parish Meeting**

#### Report on Mashbury Parish Meeting

A meeting of Mashbury Parish took place on 13<sup>th</sup> March 2013 at the Village Hall. Apologies were received from Cllr. John Aldridge but Cllr Nicolette Chambers was able to stay for a short while and give a brief report.

A number of concerns were raised by residents and have been taken up as appropriate. It is believed that a partially dismembered deer carcass was probably linked to poaching and has been reported to the Police. Damage of a footpath through use by horses can be taken up with the Rights of Way team if appropriate. Advice on responsibility for flooding ditches towards Winchmore Hill will be sought from Chelmsford City Council. Once again, there were concerns about lorries blocking the road when delivering at Pieces Cottage and this will be taken up with the Nursery owner.

The report on farming confirmed that planned hedge pruning work has been postponed until next winter because of poor weather. All farm work has been disrupted with land preparation and crop planting well behind schedule.

The meeting was reminded that updates from the Police on crimes in the Chelmsford area and on crime prevention are readily available by giving an e-mail contact to Moira. Moira also reported on the priorities identified at the last Neighbourhood Action Planning meeting when all present had agreed that top of the list must be a continued and appropriately mobile Police presence in the area.

The meeting was hugely supportive of the planned Jubilee Community Orchard and unanimously voted to support the scheme. An email information scheme is in place and anyone can be added to receive updates on working days, events and planned celebrations by contacting Moira.

Residents were reminded that the Village Fete will be on 1<sup>st</sup> June 2013 at the Village Hall and all were reminded of the appeal for plants to sell and volunteers to help out.

The Winter Salt Bag scheme had helped keep roads in the Parish passable and all volunteers were thanked for their work in distributing and spreading salt.

A number of residents volunteered to clear litter from roads in the Parish for which we are all grateful.

# **Chignal Parish Council**

UNCONFIRMED REPORT OF THE MEETING OF CHIGNAL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON MONDAY 11<sup>th</sup> MARCH 2013 IN THE VILLAGE HALL

The meeting was chaired by Mr. Chris. Philpot.

#### CITY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT -

Councillor Nicolette Chambers reported that there is to be an Old Persons Information Day in the Cathedral on 16<sup>th</sup> April. Various changes at Hylands House include an alternative area being created for dogs, a marquee on the side of the House for functions and a change to the junction to the grounds of the House. A café has been opened at Oaklands Park and work is to be undertaken to the A1060 to solve problems with flooding between Boyton Cross and the Writtle Roundabout. Councillor Chambers explained that the name change to a road in the Parish renamed 'Church Road' is being investigated.

#### REPRESENTATIVES REPORTS

PLAYING FIELDS – the use of the field for the Village Fete on 1<sup>st</sup> June and a 'private' event on 8<sup>th</sup> June were agreed.

VILLAGE HALL – the AGM was held on 25<sup>th</sup> February .

NEWSLETTER INCLUDING WEBSITE – the editor thanked all who contributed to the newsletter and asked for public opinion about having a 'kids zone'. Steve Middleditch has volunteered to become a distributor in place of Gordon Lee.

GRAVEL LIAISON – there has been no meeting since 24<sup>th</sup> November 2012 but if there are any problems they should be reported to Dave Benfield the site manager on 07803 953732 or a Parish Councillor who will pass on complaints .Lafarge proposes to hold an 'Open Day' in the Summer. The Parish Council was asked to contact Lafarge about litter following the recent high winds.

VILLAGE WATCH – it was reported the police regularly inform the Chairman of any incidents in the Parish who passes this information to the Councillors.

HIGHWAYS – some work has been carried out to fill potholes but there is still much work to be done. The lay-bye near the cricket ground is prone to flooding caused by a blocked gulley and other areas of the Parish are encountering similar problems and will be reported to the Highways Department. It was requested that the newly named 'Church Road' be renamed 'Chignal Road'.

FOOTPATHS/BRIDLEWAYS – The first footpath walk of the year took place on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> February, from the Green to Avon Road. It was found that some footpaths need clearing because of overgrown hedges and a number of marker posts are missing. Information on the areas of concern will be forwarded to ECC for action and a further walk will be arranged shortly.

TREE WARDEN – there has been no further action on the dangerous tree on the bend to Chignal St. James and the land owner concerned will be contacted.

VILLAGE ORCHARD – three sub-committee meetings have taken place since January and the agreement with the Derbyshire Trust has been signed. It is hoped the work by Transcape will commence shortly.

#### **PLANNING**

Land North West of Pieces Cottage – new agricultural building – the Parish Council has responded to the application but no decision has been made to date by the City Council.

Our dining habits soon extended to Tuesday where we would eat prior to propping up the bar as part of the guiz team the Barflies where we had limited success. Medical questions should have been easy with a retired doctor on the team, but failure to answer these questions correctly was often the case and Geoffrey was often heard to exclaim "Oh, I know that if only my brain was working." He was always generous to a fault supporting the current nominated charity of the guiz night and it was his decision to nominate St. Nicholas Church organ restoration fund for a quiz night donation. So it was quite fitting that his wake was held at the Pig and Whistle where Mark and Tina did him proud with some of his favourite dishes on the menu. Tina and Mark were always concerned for his welfare and would make sure that he got home safely and that if he didn't call in for his usual meal would check that everything was OK.

We are already missing Geoffrey's company, he was a GENTLEMAN in every sense of the word and never had a bad word to say about anybody.

Our condolences go to Sarah and Emma and their families. May he rest in peace.
