Hello everybody. I thought it time I gave you all a little reminder of what I do and why I am doing it, and a bit of an update of how the project is going. Village Agents are here to give advice and information to older and more vulnerable people in rural areas, or anyone that may need our help. We are all trained advisors, fully checked by the Criminal Records Bureau and carry photo identification and act independently of Social Care and other organisations. I can come and visit you in your own home, to support you and help you access the services you need in as uncomplicated a way as possible. In the last few weeks I have helped local people with everything from the life changing - including getting a housing transfer, installing emergency pendant alarm systems and adapting homes with grab rails, stair lifts and easy-access baths, to more commonplace but equally important activities, such as finding transport to doctor's appointments, obtaining free energy saving plugs and smoke alarms, helping people to stop smoking, and removing wasps nests. I have also been trying to attend local events to meet as many of you as possible.

Earlier this year the areas we covered were extended due to the project's success. I am now pleased to report that I cover Roxwell and Great and Little Waltham as well as my original areas of the Chignals, Mashbury, Pleshey and Good Easter. Between us, the 12 agents in Essex cover the vast majority of the rural areas in the districts of Chelmsford, Braintree and Maldon - to see the complete list please visit our website www.villageagentsessex.org.uk. UNCONFIRMED REPORT OF THE MEETING OF CHIGNAL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON MONDAY 12th JULY 2010 IN THE VILLAGE HALL

Jo Metson the Village Agent attended the meeting and reported that the service has exceeded all its targets and a decision will be made in October on whether it will continue after March 2011.

PCSO Bennett explained that she has now received speed gun training and will pass on her knowledge to resident volunteers to enable them to operate the speed guns.

There has been no further progress in purchasing the telephone box in Chignal St. James as the repairs to be carried out by British Telecom are still outstanding.

It has been agreed by the Borough Council that the grass cutting of the field near Howletts Corner is not the responsibility of Chignal and the Council Tax will be adjusted accordingly.

The electoral role will be amended to include 1 and 2 Waterhouse Cottages in the Parish of Chignal and not Great Waltham.

The Chair expressed concern that there will no longer be police personnel based at Melbourne Police Station as they have been redeployed to Moulsham Police Station. The Clerk has written to the officer in charge requesting assurances that there will be no changes to the police presence in Chignal.

The next meeting of the Neighbourhood Action Group will be in the Village Hall at 7 p.m. on 8th December 2010 and parishioners were invited to attend.

SUB COMMITTEE REPORTS

PLAYING FIELDS - it was reported that maintenance work has been carried out to the concrete boundary posts.

NEWSLETTER INCL. WEBSITE – contents for the next edition are being finalised and it was explained that, as the Newsletter is now much larger and because of added pictures, it is not always possible to e-mail the complete publication, but it can be downloaded in colour from the internet.

FOOTPATHS /BRIDLEWAYS – it was reported that diversion orders will be approved by Essex County Council shortly.

HIGHWAYS – thanks were expressed to Gordon Lee and Councillor John Aldridge for their persistence in requesting that resurfacing work be carried out to all roads in the Parish. The work is now almost complete with the exception of a small area near the church damaged by builders lorries which will be repaired shortly.

VDS – Congratulations were extended to all involved in the completion of the VDS copies of which have been distributed to all parishioners. Additional copies can be obtained from the Clerk at Parish Council Meetings.

COUNTY AND BOROUGH COUNCILLORS REPORTS

C. Cllr. Aldridge explained that there will be changes to police response times but any problems should be reported to him and he will take appropriate action. Councillor Chambers reported that there will be changes to the law from May 2011 which will be explained in the Autumn edition of 'Life'
