### Italian VDS Visit



A group of Italians visited the Chignals on a study tour to gain information on how to produce a Village Design Statement. An email from Michelle Gardiner from the Rural Community Council of Essex (RCCE) was sent to the Chignals VDS committee asking for volunteers to speak to the group.

This was responded to by Kate Middleditch Sandra Bailey Spencer Bridge and Ann Salmon.

Sarah Sapsford from the RCCE accompanied the Italians, who come from six little towns in the inland Abruzzo mountains (central Italy east of Rome) which have been affected by the 2009 earthquake.

They would like to use the VDS approach to involve the local community in re-designing the re-construction plans and share guidelines for rural development.

Following lunch in the Pig and Whistle a question and answer session took place and it is hoped that this will prove helpful for their purposes.

Writtle, White Colne, Wickham Bishops and Great Bardfield also helped them in the study organised by Michelle Gardiner and Sarah Sapsford of the RCCE.

# **Gardening Club**

We had another good turn-out for the last of our summer garden visits on 20<sup>th</sup> July. 19 of us braved the rain to explore Heather and Harry Brickwood's spectacular garden at "Orchard Cottage", Rayleigh. The breathtaking herbaceous beds, both at the front and back of the house were a riot of colour, dominated at this time of year by the powerful scent of 2500 lilies and David Austin roses. Other plants such as agapanthus, rudbeckias, heleniums and dahlias give colour well into October. The hanging baskets and containers around the house were stunning too.

We learnt from Harry that the secret to this successful flower filled garden is putting the right plant in the right place; feeding the soil annually with a thick layer of compost; watering and fertilising throughout the growing season; regular dead heading, (Harry spends 2 hours a day just on this task in the summer); pest control, (chemical warfare seemed to be the only way to combat the lily beetles); but most of all, we concluded that it's due largely to Harry and Heather's dedication, flair and jolly hard work. Harry is also secretary of the Essex Hardy Plants Society and won a Gold Medal at the Chelsea Flower Show in May for the Society's stand which he designed in the Grand Marquee.

We came well prepared for the drizzle and had a good look around the garden before the heavens really opened and we were ushered inside for very welcome tea and a range of delicious home made cakes.

We are delighted that Harry has agreed to talk to the gardening club at our meeting on 15<sup>th</sup> February 2012 on the subject of the 'Gardeners Year'. The talks programme from September 2011 – March 2012 has been posted on the Chignals website and printed copies have been put on all of the village notice boards. Our first talk of the winter season on 21<sup>st</sup> September, (all talks start at 7.30pm in Chignal St James Village Hall) will be on "Outdoor Vegetables through all Four Seasons" by an experienced organic gardener, Mrs Maike Windhorst. On 19<sup>th</sup> October, Mrs Suzanne Gaywood MBE, a designer of nine gold medal winning exhibits at the Chelsea Flower Show will be speaking to us about "The Tropical Flora and Gardens of Grenada". New members are always very welcome: you don't have to be knowledgeable about gardening to enjoy the talks, just turn up at the village hall on the evening.

Another note for your diaries: the Great Waltham Horticultural Society is holding its annual show on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> September. Entries are invited for a number of vegetable and flower categories. # From the County Council

#### **Part-Night Street Lighting**

I am sure many of you already know the part-night street lighting pilot that took place in Maldon and Uttlesford found that there were no significant changes in crime or road accident statistics as a result of the changes. The **County Council** will now initiate the roll out of modernising all **ECC** owned street lights so that they may be centrally controlled. The key benefits will be:

- A saving of £14 million over the next 13 years
   A reduction of 8,000 tonnes of CO<sub>2</sub> emissions per year
   More efficient maintenance and increased equipment life span
  - More responsive to local conditions and events (e.g. New Year's Eve festivities)

The modernisation of our street lighting will require the replacement of 130,000 photocells and ancillary equipment under a Central Management Service (CMS); this will enable the remote control of street lights in **Essex**. It will require an initial investment totaling £6.52 million over 3 years to deliver the £14 million savings.

Whilst Maldon and Uttlesford will be the first to have the new CMS starting in August this year, let me assure you that there will be full consultation with the Emergency Services, County, District, Borough and Parish Councils to verify the suitability of those areas that are proposed to move to part-night lighting. As you would expect, there will be a number of exceptions which would cover a variety of circumstances such as accident black spots; areas where the police can demonstrate the high incidence of crime; remote footpaths and alleys linking residential areas and places such as town centres where there would be large concentrations of people late at night.

Where the configuration of street lighting columns is considered excessive, consideration will be given to removing 1 in 2 lights with the remaining lights left on full night operation.

Recycling

In 2009 the **County Council** pledged to increase recycling of waste to over 50% by March 2012. It is pleasing to note that the **County Council**, working closely with District and Borough Councils, continues to expand kerbside recycling and composting services, making it even easier for householders to recycle and compost their waste. In fact residents are now recycling and composting over 50% of their waste, up almost 4% in just a year!

The record 2010/11 recycling performance of 50.05% marks the first time that **Essex** is recycling and composting more waste than it landfills so well done and thank you for your contribution to this achievement.

This work, however, does not end here as last year the **County Council** paid over £16 million in landfill tax for our non-recycled waste; money that could be much better spent on front-line services. It is essential, therefore, that we all continue to do everything we can to improve our recycling services and reduce the amount of waste we send to landfill to protect our environment for future generations.
