Our latest book was *Actress*, a novel by Anne Enright. Norah FitzMaurice sets out to write the biography of her mother Katherine O'Dell, charismatic star of stage and screen and grande dame of Dublin theatrical life. 'My mother was a great fake', says Norah. Katherine's life had been a brilliant performance, from the way she ate her toast at breakfast to her biggest deception of all, her complete recasting of herself from English to Irish. Who was Katherine really? And why did she shoot the film impresario Boyd O'Neill in the foot and then become insane?

Our opinions were divided about this book, for example one reader was deterred because she felt totally unable to engage with the characters while another praised the way it successfully evoked the theatrical world of a particular time and place. One thought the many time shifts were hard to follow but another felt that they were a good reflection of how memories randomly surface and come together. Twelve tips for Christmas and after



With Christmas rapidly approaching here are a few seasonal tips to help keep you safe at home, shopping, visiting, and after Christmas too:

- 1. If you need to store Christmas food and drink, presents and other goodies within garages and outbuildings, ensure what you are storing is out of sight and that the building is securely locked with good quality well fitted locks. Treat your shed to a shed alarm.
- 2. Avoid tempting window shopping burglars; don't leave presents and valuables on full view in front of a window. Having parcels delivered, may be out, make sure that you make suitable secure delivery arrangements to reduce the risk of theft.
- 3. Whenever leaving the house always ensure that your windows and doors are closed and locked (remember your face covering). Don't attract burglars to your home by leaving it in darkness; leave lights on timers, perhaps treat yourself to a TV simulator too.
- 4. Lock gates to keep unwanted visitors from getting to the rear of your home.
- 5. When you go to leave the house and find that your car is all iced up, don't leave it unattended with the engine running to de-ice it. It only takes a second to steal your car and it would invalidate any insurance claim.
- Park safely; look for a Parkmark accredited car park www.parkmark.co.uk/car-park-finder Check that your car is locked before you leave it and don't leave valuables and gifts on display in your car.
- 7. Whether an evening out or Christmas shopping keep your bags, handbags, wallets and mobile safe. Busy places make it easier for the sneak thief, so be alert at all times.
- A Christmas get together make sure that you have considered how you are getting home in advance and avoid using unlicensed taxi's. Ensure you drink responsible, social distance and are aware of your surroundings, whilst keeping your drink and belongings safe. www.suzylamplugh.org/Pages/FAQs/Category/personal-safety
- 9. Watch what you put on social media; check your settings to ensure that you are not broadcasting when you are not at home and the lovely gifts you may have received.
- 10. After Christmas don't advertise your nice gifts to the thieves by putting the empty boxes out for collection, disguise them, fold them up inside out or put them inside another non-descript box.
- 11. Record your new property free on <u>www.immobilise.com</u>, install tracking and security apps on relevant electrical and computer products.

I was an only child, without siblings to play with, and occupied my time discovering tiny creatures in the grass, watching the ants building their anthills, climbing trees, and listening to the sounds of the birds calling to each other. Throughout my life the interest continued, forever searching to discover the lifestyles of every creature imaginable, respecting their needs, never encroaching to close upon them, but learning all the time. It is an experience that I have been able to pass on to my children and grandchildren. When a child is involved outside with nature, all their senses get activated, they are immersed in something that is real, not as many focussed on one thing such as a computer screen. They are involved in seeing, touching, and when under supervision sometimes even tasting!

It would be ideal for children to be able to run loose and come back home muddy and happy at the end of the day, but in reality this is not likely to happen anymore. Safety is of course the utmost of importance so this means that parents need to get outside with them and explore with them. Even a walk to a local park can be a nature walk, collecting leaves, and pointing out the trees and bushes, and the creatures crawling along walls and fences. Many charitable organisations like the Wildlife Trust have a passion for outdoor learning, and try to make it easy for children to connect with the natural world and welcome thousands of schoolchildren to their nature reserves and centres every year.

Connecting with nature is a natural medicine, taking pleasure and immersing yourself and children in it gives a sense of happiness, relaxes you and feel at peace. In the past few months, nature has provided many of us with a vast amount of comfort.

## Gardening Notes for December/January

As we approach the festive season now is a good time, at the beginning of the month, to gather branches from shrubs and trees in your garden with berries before the birds eat them!

If you have access to Pyracantha (Finethorn), Orange Glow is an attractive variety. Also try Callicarpa (Beauty Bush) which has mauve berries or one of the many Ilex (holly species). Not only will these attract wild birds to your garden but in addition there will be abundant material for wreaths and table decorations. The above are just a small selection of available plants from most local garden centres.

Now is the time to reduce bush type roses by a third. This helps prevent 'wind rock' during bad weather.

My recommended plant of the month is Daphne Odora. This compact shrub provides superb perfume in the garden at this dull time of year and is ideal for a smaller plot.

Winter digging can be carried out over the next two months. The weeds have ceased growing for a while. Remember to turn the soil over and bury small weeds so they rot down before working the soil in spring. If you prefer not to dig then add a good layer of compost, home made or spent from containers, covering the ground to suppress any small annual weeds. The mulch will rot down over the winter ready to provide a tilth to work in the spring.

#### **CRESSING PARISH COUNCIL**

#### Minutes of the meeting of Cressing Parish Council held on 10th November 2021 at 7.00pm at St Barnabas, Claud Ince Avenue, Cressing

Present: Cllrs John Lawton - Chairman, colin Haines and Harvey Porrett

In attendance: Mrs Christine Marshall (Parish Clerk/RFO), County Councillor Paul Thorogood, District Councillor Bob Wright and two members of the public

#### 21/157 CHAIRMAN'S WELCOME AND REPORT

The Chairman welcomed attendees and reported as follows:

- Tommys The Chairman called for a vote of thanks to handyman Russell Drury and resident Keith Tatum for their work in overcoming the obstacles presented of differing size and shapes of posts for the erecting of tommy statues. A letter will be sent to Mr Tatum for his involvement. A member of the public asked if it would be possible to have a Tommy fixed to the wall of the Post Office near to the village crest. This will be investigated. Action: Clerk
- As Clerk of Bradwell with Pattiswick Parish Council, the Clerk attended a meeting arranged by that PC's County Cllr, with Cabinet Member for Essex Highways who advised speed limits around the county are being reviewed, especially near schools. Clerk queried re B1018 and Cressing School and this will be included in that review.
- CPC applied under a BDC scheme for trees and bulbs for planting in the Parish. 400 bulbs and 50 tree whips have been provided. The Handyman will plant the bulbs around the village and the positioning of the trees will be decided at the December meeting.
- Open Spaces Plan is being reviewed and the Clerk will ensure a wide coverage of projects can be included. Action: Clerk
- CPC contacted BDC concerning changes to the emerging Local Plan that had been made affecting Cressing Tye Green status without advising or discussing with CPC.
- Dust cart and litter pick will be held Saturday 20th November and Cllrs are asked for their assistance.
- It has been noticed that more trees have been removed from the Appletree site and this will be reported.

#### 21/158 APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

The Clerk advised that apologies had been received from Cllrs: Watts, Rowe, Simpson and Lapper, and District Cllr Abbott. Cllrs agreed to accept these apologies. **Proposed: Cllr Lawton seconded: Cllr Porrett.** 

#### **21/159 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST**

Members of the council are subject to the Local Authorities Code of Conduct Order 2007 (SI 2007/1159) (The Revised Code) with the additional, non-mandatory, section 12(2).

There were no pecuniary or non-pecuniary interests in relation to items on the agenda to be recorded.

#### 21/160 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

The Clerk confirmed that no requests to speak had been received within the required notice period. However, an email had been received prior to the meeting seeking clarification on several issues and this will be responded to by the Clerk in due course. **Action: Clerk** 

#### 21/161 REPORTS BY COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCILLORS

County Councillor Thorogood reported on the following:

- i. Applications to the Local Highways Panel have been submitted with Cllr Thorogood's support for consideration in budget 2022/23.
- ii. A new VAS/SID application process is now available online at Essex Highways and is also available on the Local Highway Panel website. This policy enables Parishes to buy signs to install

on the road network in places where speeding is perceived. The LHP will continue to install ones where a significant speeding issue occurs if a VAS is the most suitable measure. Those funded by Parish Councils must be:

- Sited 70 metres within the speed limit
- Speed limit must be in place for more than the previous 12 months
- The edge of the sign must be inset at least 450mm from edge of carriageway
- Not within 70 metres of another VAS or flashing equipment such as zebra crossing
- Full information will be forwarded to Councillors. Action: Clerk
- iii. Cllr Thorogood will follow up the request for the speed limit on Polecat Road to be reduced.
- iv. Details of outstanding pothole repairs to be forwarded to Cllr Thorogood to follow up. Action: Clerk
- v. The Local Plan Group will meet in December, but it remains unlikely that the Plan will be adopted until 2022.
- vi. Rivenhall Incinerator There have been several objections to the Condition 66 application. PAIN will be preparing a list of questions to be passed to Priti Patel MP to follow up. If Option 1 is progressed (building the incinerator prior to any other development on the site) there is concern that the other waste management options will not be undertaken. Indaver have stated they will install carbon filters, but if this is the intent, a higher stack will be required and subject to a new planning application.

District Councillor Wright reported:

- i. Whilst BDC have yet to set their budget for 2022/23, it is known that it will be "tight" affecting projects and work throughout the district.
- ii. Another two developments in the district totaling 600 dwellings have been agreed.

iii. A12 consultation now open online.

#### 21/162 MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING

The Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 13th October 2021 were confirmed as a true record. **Proposed: Cllr Haines, seconded Cllr Lawton.** The Chairman signed the Minutes.

#### 21/163 CO-OPTION OF A COUNCILLOR

The Chairman introduced prospective councillor, Sally Griffiths, who met all the criteria for being coopted, the application form having been sent to all Councillors previously, and requested Councillors present to vote on the co-option. The co-option was **proposed: Cllr Porrett, seconded: Cllr Haines** Having voted, with no dissentions, the Chairman declared the voting complete, and the applicant was duly co-opted as a member of Cressing Parish Council. The Chairman invited Cllr Griffiths to join the other Cllrs at the table.

The necessary forms for acceptance will be completed after the meeting and the Clerk will advise BDC Governance accordingly. Action: Clerk/Cllr Griffiths

#### **21/164 THREE PARISHES MEETING**

This has been re-scheduled for Tuesday  $30^{th}$  November at Rivenhall. The Clerk advised of the topics to be discussed, but a formal agenda will be issued in due course. Cllr Haines and the Clerk will attend.

#### 21/165 EMERGENCY PLAN

The Clerk provided the background of why Parishes need to have emergency procedures in place and how they would be implemented prior to the site of the emergency being managed by BDC Emergency Team and "blue light" services. Due to work arrangements, Cllr Lapper would not be able to continue as coordinator and it was agreed that Cllr Griffiths would now assume this role. The Clerk will work with Cllr Griffiths to progress the update. Action: Cllr. Griffiths/Clerk

#### 21/166 FINANCE

i. Progress against budget: The Clerk/RFO referred to the reports issued with the Agenda. There

were no queries, and the reports were accepted. Proposed: Cllr Porrett, seconded: Cllr Haines, all in favour

- ii. A motion to approve bank reconciliation at 31st October 2021: It was resolved that the bank reconciliation statement at 31st October be approved. Proposed: Cllr Haines, seconded: Cllr Porrett, all in favour
- iii. A motion to approve October 2021 Payments/Cheques: The list of payments made and cheques to be signed against October expenditure was presented. There were no queries, and it was resolved to approve the payments. Proposed: Cllr Porrett, seconded Cllr Haines, all in favour. Cllrs Lawton and Haines signed the cheques.

#### 21/167 GRANT APPLICATIONS

# Dog mess is the most unacceptable and offensive type of litter – and it's on the increase in Cressing Tye Green.

Dog fouling is not only deeply unpleasant, it is dangerous. Whilst rare, contact with dog excrement can cause toxocariasis – a nasty infection that can lead to dizziness, nausea, asthma and even blindness or seizures. Do you want to be responsible for this infection in children who play on the playing field – yes, there are some residents of Cressing who think it is acceptable for their dog to foul the playing field and then have children, adults and other animals step in it! **WELL, IT IS NOT ACCEPTABLE** 

It's no wonder dog fouling is such a problem – there are estimated to be more than 8 million dogs producing more than 1,000 tonnes of mess every day in the UK alone.

### Clean up after your dog

It is an offence not to clear up after your dog has fouled.

While most dog owners are caring, responsible individuals, there are still some people who do not clean up after their pets.

Anyone who fails to clear up after their dog can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice of up to  $\pounds 100$ . If the case goes to court this could cost the owner or person in charge of the animal up to  $\pounds 1,000$ .

The law states that being unaware a dog has fouled or not having a suitable bag is not a reasonable excuse.

There's no such thing as the dog poo fairy!





And as hard as it might try, a dog can't pick it up either!

If you are over the age of 18 and commit dog fouling, you may receive a £100 fixed penalty notice. if you don't pay the fine within the required timescale this may lead to court action.

If found guilty, you may get a fine of to £1000 plus costs.

If you are under the age of 18, you may receive a warning and a letter sent to your parents or guardians.

The absence of litter bins or dog waste bins is not a reasonable defence for not clearing up after a dog in your care.

There are dog waste bins where people most commonly exercise their dogs.

#### Cycle Security – New bike for Christmas?



Cycle security is always an issue with many being stolen from locations including the town centre, residential areas, and educational establishments. Commonly cycles are not secured properly, don't make it easy for thieves: - 1. Double lock it - using two locks slows thieves down and makes your bike less of a target. Use two quality locks, at least one of which is a D-lock. Thieves are less likely to carry multiple tools, so use two different types of lock if possible. 2. Lock the lot - lock the frame and both wheels to a secure cycle stand. 3. Secure it - secure your bike as close to the stand as possible to give any thieves little or no room to manoeuvre. 4. Take removable parts with you - Take parts that are easy to remove with you, such as wheels, lights, baskets, or the saddle. Or use locking skewers or nuts which can increase security by securing the bike's components to the frame permanently. 5. Park securely - Lock your bike at recognised secure cycle parking. It should be well lit, overlooked and covered by CCTV.

Where do they go? Number of places: - locally, in a container abroad, to another part of the country, stored in premises for later sale or sold as either a cycle or cycle parts via the internet, or third parties.

By taking some appropriate precautions and using good quality security products, and using them well, should help you to keep your property safe. Use the best security you can afford. Don't secure a £2,000 bicycle with a £10-£20 lock! As a guide look to spend 10-15% of the value of the item on its security. Look for a "Sold Secure" certified chain **and** padlock or "D – Lock" preferably gold rated but certainly not below silver.

Make a note of the frame number, security mark the cycle, there are a number of different methods available such as <u>www.datatag.co.uk</u>, <u>www.bikeregister.com</u>, (others are available and can be found on the Secured by Design website below) and you can register property including cycles free of charge at <u>www.immobilise.com</u>. Take a photograph of the cycle and any areas of damage or marks of identification, some insurance companies may require one with the owner in the picture with it.

Don't forget at home: 1) don't leave garage doors open for long periods showing your expensive cycle and other property, 2) consider a "Ground anchor" or "Shed shackle" within your shed or garage to secure your cycle to, 3) look at your shed or garages security and ensure you have good locks and that the hinges are protected, 4) consider a shed alarm.

Check with your insurance company to see what security standards they require for your insurance cover to be valid.
