


## Junior craft cards


MOUSE PENCIL HOLDER

This helpful mouse will hold your pencils ready for action!


You need a piece of medium-weight card about 30.5cm (1') long, round adhesive labels in various colours for eyes and nose, strips of paper for whiskers, scissors and glue.



Using diagram as a guide, draw mouse shape on to card and cut it out.



- Make criss-cross cuts where pencils will slide in. Cut along the solid outline of the tail leaving it attached to the body along the dotted line.
  - Fold along the dotted lines; bend the tail back behind the mouse.
- Stick on eyes and nose.
- Glue on thin strips of paper to make the whiskers.
- **7** Keep your pencils in the holes in the mouse's back.

#### 2021 Summertime Home Security Advice

With the removal of most Covid19 restrictions and as we start to spread our wings a little don't get complacent with your home security, unfortunately there are those that will take advantage of this newfound freedom to seek opportunities to commit crime.

Even if you are at home, home working or enjoying a 'staycation' still consider your home security for as it gets warmer, we get to see a rise in the number of "Creeper Burglaries" where burglars take advantage of open gates, windows and doors. An open or insecure garden gate will provide the thief with access to the back of your home. **Before going out or turning in for the night don't forget to check all doors and windows**, someone may have closed it, but did they lock it?

A few tips for keeping your home secure:

- 1. Don't attract a thief with insecure pedal cycles or cars or gates on display.
- 2. Keep side or rear gates, sheds and garages shut and securely locked.
- 3. <u>Doors -</u> Leave any accessible external door open or insecure and an opportunist thief could pop in and anything lying around would be gone. You may have only popped out, or down the end of the garden or having a quick shower; it only takes a second for a thief to steal. Don't forget that with a PVCu multi-locking door you may have lifted the handle but until you turn the key (or on some doors a thumb turn on the inside) you have not locked all of the locking bolts in place.
- 4. Windows If you have unoccupied rooms that are accessible to others from outside or off flat roofs make sure the windows are closed, if you need ventilation in these rooms whilst at home at least lock the larger window and only have the small window open even during the daytime. If you only have bigger opening windows, consider a lockable window restrictor and a small alarm sensor on the window to detect entry. Before going out or 'turning in for the night' lift the blinds or open the curtains and check windows and patio doors are closed, the sun may have been on the TV when it was hot, and so the curtains were drawn whilst the window was open.
- 5. If you have an <u>intruder alarm</u> activate it when going out and activate the zone for any unoccupied areas whilst in.
- 6. <u>Car keys</u> **don't** take them to bed with you, where possible leave them in noisy drawer/location. Keep the keyless car fobs in a "Faraday" bag.
- 7. If you do hear a <u>suspicious noise</u> in the house that you are not happy with <u>dial 999</u> and make a noise, shout out, it could cause any intruder to flee, they may not have known you were home, remember your life is more important than your property. If safe to do so, get a good description of the person/s and if <u>possible</u> the car index number and direction of travel.
- 8. Make sure in case of fire that keys to windows and doors are readily accessible to occupants at all times but not in view of possible burglars.

## Thirst Quenching Summer Drinks

### **Apple Ale Punch**

1 pint (600ml) low calorie ginger ale Half pint (300m) chilled apple juice 3 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice 2 teaspoons clear honey

2 teaspoons clear none

2 lemons thinly slices



Combine all ingredients, except lemon slices, in punch or serving bowl and stir to mix, float lemon slices in punch and serve chilled. Place punch or serving bowl in a larger bowl lined with ice (punch will be chilled but not diluted).

## **Orange Tonic**

6 fl oz (180ml) low-calorie tonic water 2 tablespoons thawed frozen concentrated orange-juice Ice cubes (optional)

Chill a large tumbler. Combine tonic water and concentrated orange juice in blender or processor and blend until frothy. Pour into chilled glass and add ice cubes if liked. Serve immediately.

### Banana Flip

2 medium bananas1 pint (600ml) skimmed milk12 tablespoons single cream1 tablespoon lemon juice2 tablespoons caster sugar

Mash bananas and place in blender with milk, cream, lemon juice and sugar. Puree until smooth. Chill well and divide between 4 long stemmed wine glasses.

#### GARDENING NOTES FOR AUGUST & SEPTEMBER

We seem to have had an exceptionally wet summer this year, this has its benefits and a down side. The potato yield has been, at least with the earlies fantastic. On the other hand, my dahlias have suffered with a good deal of slug damage – well with gardening there are always ups and downs.

This month I thought I would mention house plants. A regular feed keeps these inside plants in good order and examples with a broad leaf benefit from having their leaves cleaned with a moist, damp cloth removing any dust and enabling the plant to photosynthesis more efficiently. Light and position are most important, house plants such as African Violets [Saintpaulia] need a window sill without draughts but not in the hot sun as do Oxalis the latter need to be dried off in the late winter taken out of the pot and the corms which look a little bit like a fir apple potato split and re potted in fresh compost where they will soon reshoot and the young plants will be ready for another season.

Keep picking sweet peas as they have a prolonged flowering season this year with the wet conditions, I noticed a well-known TV gardener/presenter advocates picking all blooms once a week a very useful tip and it certainly works.

Bulbs are now in the garden centres this is the time of year to browse and pick your favourite selection, do not be in too much of a hurry to plant daffodils, September, October is fine. Tulips can be left until November this seems to benefit the bulbs resistance to 'tulip fire'. If you have dug up and dried bulbs from last year do check them over for mould and remove any dried stalks before replanting. Remember if you have purchased prepared hyacinth bulbs for an indoor display plant them as soon as possible, follow instructions keeping them in the dark etc they should flower for Christmas!!

In the greenhouse or allotment keep taking the side shoots out of tomatoes and feed regularly. Garlic can be harvested as soon as the leaves turn brown. Pick runner beans regularly and keep an eye on courgettes which have a habit of turning into marrows if not inspected daily.



#### CRESSING PARISH COUNCIL

Two Councillors, the Parish Clerk, a District Councillor and one member of the public attended St Barnabas on 14<sup>th</sup> July for the Parish Council meeting. Unfortunately, that meeting was inquorate so had to be cancelled. Despite this, the business of the Parish Council must continue, so below is an update on some of the items that were to be reported at that meeting:

- The agreement for Cressing PC to cut verges has been re-instated and ECC will pay the Parish Council a fee towards this.
- ii. Speed monitoring equipment has been ordered and we await delivery.
- iii. The Clerk is chasing Bellways, BDC and Essex Highways to get the adoption by Highways of the footpath alongside Bulford Mill Lane, or at the very least the overgrown vegetation to be cleared. We are awaiting an update from Bellways.
- iv. The Parish Council received a suggestion for a gate to be installed at the end of PROW no. 20 (Mill Lane, opposite Jeffrey's Road) to stop walkers going straight into the road. Highways advise they will not install any barriers or gates to footpaths. We have asked them to investigate the widening of bridges along the PROWs (also a resident's suggestion to enable mobility scooters to use them). Essex Highways will look to see if this is feasible as any bridges require repair or replacement.
- v. A Local Highways Panel application has been submitted with the full support of our County and District Councillors to address the traffic issues in Bulford Mill Lane, particularly the sharp bends and flooding. This is a lengthy process, but the Parish Council will monitor progress of the application.
- vi. The Annual Governance and Annual Accounting Statements 2020/21 have been submitted to the external auditors. Copies of these documents are on the noticeboards and website, together with the Internal Auditor's report.
- vii. We have an issue with fixing the "Tommys" to the posts of the village signs as the posts are square and the fixings are round. The Clerk and Handyman are looking at alternative fixings.
- viii. Council has received three quotations for new seating on the playing field. Councillors will make a decision on this shortly.
- ix. The Clerk put forward the suggestion of installing a third defibrillator for Cressing, to be placed at the playing field and this is being considered.
- x. An Open Day for Cressing residents is being planned for 22nd September (3.00 til 8.00pm) at the playing field and Pavilion. So far, the Clerk and the Secretary of the Cressing Sports & Social Club Management Committee have been discussing the outline plan and aims for the day. This will include information about the Parish Council, the Social Club, the various community groups and activities available in the Parish as well as representatives and information about district services available to residents. Councillors will be in attendance throughout the day to answer any queries from residents.
- xi. There were many planning applications to be considered by Councillors at the meeting, including:

- a. 21/00175/FUL Erection of a two-storey 5 bed detached dwelling house with associated access road and landscaping on land adjoining and to the rear of 1 to 8 Leyfield Braintree Road Cressing Essex – the Council are raising objections to this application as it is a further residential access onto the busy B1018.
- b. 21/01908/FUL | Demolition of existing Frankie & Bennys Restaurant with permitted takeaway facility and erection of a single-storey building with 'Drive-Thru' to provide a coffee shop / restaurant selling food and drink for consumption on and off the premises (Sui-Generis Use). Frankie And Bennys Restaurant Galleys Corner Braintree Road Cressing Essex CM77 8GA the Council will be objecting to this application due to the additional traffic and congestion this will cause at the garden centre roundabout and Galleys Corner, not to mention additional litter!
- c. 21/02059/ADV | Signage to include -6 No. internally illuminated fascia signs, 3 No. internally illuminated & 2 No. externally illuminated directional signs, 2 No. internally illuminated menu boards and 1No. internally illuminated totem pole. | Starbucks Galleys Corner Braintree Road Cressing Essex CM77 8GA the Council will also object to this application due to the additional traffic and congestion this will cause at the garden centre roundabout and Galleys Corner, not to mention additional litter!
- d. 21/01940/OUT | Hybrid planning application encompassing: (i) Outline Planning Application for 2 x self-build and/or custom build bungalows with details of Access, Layout and Landscaping to be determined (Scale and Appearance to be Reserved Matters); (ii) Full Planning Application for 4 x 3 bed and 2 x 4 bed residential dwelling houses with associated roads, car parking and landscaping. | Land Adjacent to Leyfield Braintree Road Cressing Essex (22 July)
- xii. There were also two applications whilst not within Cressing parish, but in neighbouring parishes, could affect residents in the future. These are:
  - a. 21/01878/FUL | Construction and operation of a solar photovoltaic farm, with battery storage and other associated infrastructure, including inverters, security cameras, fencing, access tracks and landscaping. | Land East Of Periwinkle Hall Links Road Perry Green Bradwell Essex (19 July) sustainable energy is to be welcomed but at what cost? During this development numerous HGV vehicles will need to access the site and whilst the strategic route will be the A120. However, once they leave there it is likely they will travel via Long Green, Ashes Road, Lanham Green Road, Boars Tye Road and finally Links Road. There will also be roadworks scheduled to bury high voltage cables. Obviously, none of this is decided yet, but the Parish Council will raise yet again the cumulative effect of the residential development already approved and this one that will impact seriously on traffic movements in, around and through Cressing.
  - b. 21/01810/FUL | Erection of 126 homes with associated access, open space and infrastructure (following outline planning permission 15/00280/OUT and as a variation of reserved matters approval 18/01751/REM) | Land Off Western Road Silver End Essex this further

development proposed for Silver End does not touch the boundary with Cressing, but it will result in more vehicle movements and close the gap between the two parishes. The Parish Council will support Silver End Parish Council in its objection to this development.

i. Land to the east of Braintree Road, Tye Green – Rainier Developments Ltd – Councillors to consider whether to submit feedback on communication from Rainier Developments. This planning application has not been submitted formally yet, but residents did receive a leaflet about it. We hope you took the opportunity to comment on the feedback form to the developers.

The August meeting, scheduled for 7.00pm on Wednesday 11th August will include a discussion on Her Majesty The Queen's Platinum Jubilee and how Cressing can mark and celebrate this historic occasion, so if you have any suggestions, please let the Clerk know and these will be included in the discussions.S

The next two channel (street) sweep dates for Cressing are 24<sup>th</sup> September and 24<sup>th</sup> December. We know it is difficult to find somewhere else to park, but if you can it will be greatly appreciated by the workmen as they can't sweep under parked vehicles.

Recycling – if you find your recycling has not been collected, but has received a red sticker, this is because it is contaminated with items that cannot be recycled. These include: food, glass, nappies tissues and wipes, food and drink cartons, plastic bags and film, hard plastic, bubble wrap and polystyrene. PPE, clothing, wallpaper, sharps (knives, syringes) and snack packets that are foil lined (crisp and savoury biscuits). It is the householder's responsibility to remove these items and put the bags out for the next collection.

#### Quackers, Daniel and Tina's Girls

For over fifty years we have kept chickens, adding geese to our collection at a later date. We started off with a few chickens, adding rescued battery hens to our brood, and rehoming others that, for various reasons, their owners could no longer keep. Our two original geese soon bred and over the years we have seen many fluffy goslings grow and



join the flock, plus new additions we have also rehomed. Just like humans every one has a different character and over the years have been fun to watch, of course the fresh eggs every day are an added bonus. I realise now that a ducks brain works differently and soon discovered the only word they would respond to was 'food'. A bit like my family—that aways has always worked to get them indoors!

It has taken guite a time for the ducks to respond, but now it mostly works and they return to the compound each evening. However, we have recently had one amusing incident (certainly not amusing at the time). One of 'Tina's girls' was too busy ducking and diving in the pond to realise that the others had returned to the compound. Noticing they had gone, she did not think to get out of the pond on her own but decided to quack and quack and quack. Easy I thought, rattle the food pot at the edge of the pond and she will come out. No chance, she just swam round and round in circles, her quacking getting louder all the time. My first thought was to leave her, my second thought was the fox would come, and the third thought was she would quack so loud all night and we would get no sleep. Ducks tend to do that, many a time have I had to walk across the field in the middle of the night to chase off a wild mallard that has been left by its mates!

I reverted to technology—downloading a recording of quacking ducks from the internet onto my iPad, I hid in the long grass by the pond and turned the recording on, crawling back towards the compound chattering all the time as if I was with the other ducks. Nothing much seem to be happening, I retrieved my iPad and went back to the house wondering what to do next. Then a miracle happened. The recording on the iPad had still been playing when I crawled by the compound, it had set the other ducks and the geese off, all quacking very loudly—of course I realise now the recording I had made was of strange ducks and mine probably thought they were being invaded, I turned the iPad off and as I went through the gate to the house the abandoned duck jumped out of the pond running at full speed to the safety of the compound.

Surely my husband would be very impressed with my actions, but on my return I was greeted with "I cannot believe what I have just seen, no wonder the duck came running back, who in their right mind would crawl along a field talking and quacking like that". I think I did very well, at least we had a peaceful nights sleep. Would I do the same thing again—of course I would!

Fancy a project for the summer holidays? How about making a scare-crow?


#### This year our theme is Nursery Rhymes.
