Cressing Book Group



Our latest book was *A Beautiful Spy* by Rachel Hore, a novel based on the true story of Olga Gray, an MI5 agent in the 1930s. Rachel Hore's fictionalised version of Olga, Minnie Gray, is bored with her routine life in Edgbaston. Her mother persuades her to attend a garden party, an event which turns out to have life-changing consequences because it's here that an acquaintance recruits her to work for Maxwell Knight of MI5. Minnie moves to London and, under cover of her secretarial skills, she is given the job of gathering information about the Communist Party of Great Britain and in particular about its co-founder Percy Glading who is suspected of spying for the Soviet Union.

The cover blurb made claims of 'phenomenal' and 'a treat of a read' but our reaction was very different. The first couple of chapters seemed intriguing enough but after that it was unfortunately downhill all the way. Our verdict was that this book was dull, mundane and repetitive. The author frequently told us about the dangers of Minnie's work and sometimes the plot seemed to be leading to some dramatic climax but then nothing much happened. We found Minnie herself irritating, constantly milling over the same anxieties about her role and relationships, and we felt that the ending, when at last it came, was unlikely and unconvincing. Although we had fun discussing its flaws, this uneasy mix of fact and fiction was not one of our more successful choices.

Dear friends

Even if you have little knowledge of the Christian faith, you probably know why Christmas day is celebrated and maybe why Easter is celebrated, but what I do know is that these two major Christian celebrations are the time when the hospitality and retail businesses make most of their annual profits. It's easy to market the story of a cute baby born in a stable in some obscure town over two thousand years ago but marketing the cruel death is much more difficult.

That cute baby who grew up to be a man named Jesus, who died by crucifixion. Having been beaten and hung on a cross with nails through His hands and feet, a spear was thrust through His side, just to make sure He was dead.

Businesses have glossed over the bits they don't like and have succeeded by air brushing the pain and suffering and the reason for the death on the cross and have concentrated their marketing strategy on new life in the shape of Easter eggs. I often wonder why the third part of the story is ignored, when Jesus conquered death on that cross and, three days later, arose from His tomb. For this very important Christin celebration, cuddly toys and chocolate eggs don't cut the mustard!

The list of important days in the Christian faith does not end here, there is a fourth special day, Accession Day. You might find it difficult to plan your Easter break as Easter day is not on a static date like Christmas. Accession Day also moves dependent on when Easter falls, but it is always celebrated on the sixth Thursday or 39 days after Easter Sunday!

So, what is Accession Day? It is the day that Jesus finished His earthly mission and returned to His Father in Heaven. If Jesus did not return, then His mission on earth failed.

There's a story in the Bible that tells us about two of Jesus' disciples who were walking from Jerusalem to a town called Emmaus and as they walked together they spoke of their heartbreak at the death of Jesus. They talked all about their hopes and expectations of the Messiah. They thought Jesus was the one to rescue them from the oppression of the Roman Empire. As they walked and talked, a stranger came and walked beside them and asked what they were discussing. They told him about the events of the previous days. The stranger explained the Old Testament scriptures about Jesus, why He had to die on the

cross and rise from the grave, to fulfil what was said in the scriptures concerning Him.

Spring Garden Crime Prevention (Part 1)

Hopefully by the time that you read this Spring will be established with the weather improving, inviting us out into our gardens. It is a good time to take a look around; are your fences and gates in good condition do you have good quality locks on gates, will they keep the unwelcome intruder out? To the front of your property where possible keep fencing, planting, and hedges to about 1.2m in height so that an intruder is not hidden from view. Protect your rear garden with 1.8m strong fencing, close boarded wooden fencing, and gates are a good choice and this can be topped with trellis or a plastic spiky topping such as www.defendastrip.com/ (warning signs needed). Panels should not be able to be lifted out of the posts, and avoid your fencing becoming a ladder by ensuring that the horizontal cross battens are facing into your garden.

<u>Defensive planting:</u> Security does not have to be just about locks, bolts, and spiky fence toppings; nature provides some excellent plants to keep people away. There are a number of attractive, fragrant plants of a spiky nature such as climbing roses, pyracantha and berberis and other planting of a dense nature that can work quite well. Have a chat at your garden centre or with the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) for the right plant for the right location. We actively work with the RHS at Hyde Hall and there are a number of mature examples of defensive planting that can be viewed there, and some very knowledgeable people that can advise you.

New plants: Larger plants etc. can be secured to land or rootball anchors or plant through chicken wire covering the area with soil. Cement or bolt down containers to the ground. The RHS or your local garden centre or DIY store should be able to help.

Working in the garden: It is easy to get engrossed in what you are doing when working in the garden, if the house is empty it is wise to close and lock the door (don't forget the key though!). Remember when you stop for a break put your tools away, and at the end of the day as well as putting tools away put the wheelbarrow and wheelie bin away too. "It will add insult to injury" if your tools are used to break into your house, a neighbour's, nearby building such as a church, or provide a climbing aid or method of carrying things away.

New tools and lawn mowers: Be mindful of how you dispose of the packaging to your new purchases; don't advertise it to the thieves and burglars with your empty boxes on display outside for roadside collection. Fold boxes inside out or break them up and put them in bag for collection. If you are not using your lawn mower, jet washer or other put it away out of sight from prying eyes.

Property marking: It may deter a thief if your property or flower pots is visibly security marked with your house number and post code such as www.creproducts.co.uk or labelled if a forensic (hidden) property marking system is used such as www.smartwater.com or www.selectadna.co.uk. You can also record the serial numbers of any tools at www.immobilise.com/. If your property does get stolen with property marking and/or recording, there is a greater chance of you getting it back.

GARDENING NOTES FOR MAY

April certainly came in like a lion, what a surprise to see a covering of snow first thing in the morning. May on the other hand is when everything in the garden suddenly starts to grow and it's a case of what to do first!

This month's recommendation is Geum, a small hardy perennial with a number of colour variants from red to orange through to pale yellow. An ideal plant for the front of a border or rockery.

I have to say the flowering prunus [cherry] have been magnificent this year, now is the time to note down the name of a variant that appeals to you ready for purchasing in the autumn.

Agapanthus can also be divided this month, using a sharp spade as described in this column previously.

In the vegetable garden now is the time to harden off tomato plants for external planting and potting up same for the greenhouse, do not plant out though until the risk of frost is over. Potatoes should be earthed up to protect the crown and the developing 'spuds'. Runner bean canes can be erected, I tend to do this to avoid running out of room in the vegetable garden. Continue to sow radish, carrots, beetroot and a later sowing of broad beans.

Feed container grown shrubs and fruit trees with a granular feed, the former to sustain them during the summer months and the latter to improve fruiting yields.

Continue to move a hoe through the flower borders and vegetable rows, as I said earlier everything grows in May, especially the weeds!


Dahlia tubers can be planted out they should be sending up new shoots, pot them up if necessary and place them in a warm environment this will hasten the production of healthy stems.

Lawn mowing is a constant and the blades can be lowered on the mower, avoid scalping the grass as this encourages moss and bald patches.

Lastly, take the time to sit and admire your garden and the hard work you have put in this spring.

Minutes of the meeting of Cressing Parish Council held on 13th April 2022 at 7.00pm at St Barnabas, Claud Ince Avenue, Cressing

Present: Cllrs John Lawton - Chairman, Colin Haines, Alison Lapper and Steve Watts

In attendance: Mrs Christine Marshall (Parish Clerk/RFO), County Councillor Paul Thorogood and District Councillor James Abbott. No members of the public were in attendance

22/048 CHAIRMAN'S WELCOME AND REPORT

The Chairman welcomed attendees and reported as follows:

- Afternoon Tea hope all Councillors plus partners will attend. Need to reserve ticket via Christine
- The Willows the period for final comments to the Inspector has now closed and it is hoped there will be a decision in May (although there is a backlog of cases)

22/049 APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

The Clerk advised that apologies had been received from Cllrs: Porrett and Rowe. These apologies were accepted. **Proposed: Cllr Haines, seconded: Cllr Lapper.**

22/050 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Members of the council are subject to the Local Authorities Code of Conduct Order 2007 (SI 2007/1159) (The Revised Code) with the additional, non-mandatory, section 12(2). There were no pecuniary or non-pecuniary interests in relation to items on the agenda to be recorded.

22/051 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

No members of the public were in attendance and the Clerk confirmed no matters had been raised prior to the meeting.

22/052 REPORTS OF COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCILLORS

Cllr Paul Thorogood reported:

- i. Members' grants for 2022-23 have been reduced by 50%.
- ii. "Levelling Up" grants are being introduced and will be targeted at areas that have social issues.
- iii. National Highways continuing to survey all routes previously put forward for the new A120.
- iv. Rivenhall Liaison Committee have advised that Indaver (a Belgian/Irish company) have invited the Belgian Royal Family to visit the site. No further details available yet.
- Cllr James Abbott reported:
- i. Ukraine BDC have unanimously agreed to support DEC initiatives.
- ii. Local Plan No update yet, expected late June.
- iii. Planning Committee has now refused three large developments.
- iv. A second access into the IWMF is expected to be approved.
- v. Abnormal loads into the IWMF site through surrounding villages will cause concern, although Indaver believe they will be able to use the Baileybridge into the site as used by the quarry. Cllrs expressed serious reservations about this as well as the proposed routes through Cressing, Silver End and Rivenhall.
- vi. Cllr Abbott has been appointed to the panel that will decide on the next Chief Executive for BDC. vii. Re-wilding Braintree scheme available for application, but these need to be on BDC owned land. viii. An application has been submitted to the Local Highways Panel to replace directional signage at Boars Tye Road 'T' junction and repair historic metal sign. Request also made to restore the unused highways storage area to planting, improve sightlines at Farm lane junction and resurface and kerb the junction and delineate where private use can be and where it should not be. The Clerk suggested that as an application for development at Lanham Green Farm a suggestion could be made to the landowner for contribution towards undertaking this work.

 Action: Clerk

22/053 LOCAL HIGHWAYS PANEL

Cllr Thorogood and the Clerk brought the meeting up to date on applications submitted to the LHP, and in particular regarding Bulford Mill Lane. It was agreed that this will be raised as part of the Annual Parish Meeting on 11th May at 7.00pm when the meeting topic will be traffic in Cressing Parish. The Clerk confirmed that residents affected in Bulford Mill Lane will be attending the

22/056 FINANCE

- i. **Progress against budget:** The Clerk/RFO referred to the reports issued with the Agenda. These reports are to the financial year end of 31st March and are subject to Internal Audit. The Clerk will deliver the necessary documents to the IA to enable audit to be undertaken prior to preparation of the Annual Governance sand Audit Report. **It was resolved** to accept the reports. **Proposed: Clir Haines, seconded: Clir Lapper, all in favour**
- ii. A motion to approve bank reconciliation at 31st March 2022: It was resolved that the bank reconciliation statement at 31st March be approved. Proposed: Cllr Haines, seconded: Cllr Lapper, all in favour
- iii. A motion to approve March 2021 Payments/Cheques: The list of payments and cheques to be signed against March expenditure was presented. There were no queries, and it was resolved to approve the payments. Proposed: Clir Haines, seconded Clir Lapper, all in favour. Clirs Lawton and Haines signed the cheques.

THE VICAR'S LETTER

Welcome to May - I quickly learnt since coming here that the month of May marks the beginning of the wedding season – at least here in Coggeshall, where St Peter ad Vincula and to a lesser extent also the lovely chapel of St Nicholas – are popular wedding destinations. These stunning places of worship, along with All Saints Stisted, All Saints Cressing and Holy Trinity Bradwell, are testimony to generations of people putting their trust in a faithful God. And of course all weddings have been carefully planned: guests have been invited, reception venues booked, flowers and gowns have been chosen, and the music and bells are ready to mark the happy event.



It is a privilege to meet with each couple, to get to know them a little and to hear their story of how they met, and about that moment in time when they knew: "He is the one, she is the one!" For some this is immediate, for others this conviction grows over time as they get to know and appreciate each other. There is no right or wrong, what counts is that by the time they say 'I do' they understand enough about themselves and the other to take this leap of faith – because what else can it be? 

Mouthwatering Memories!

Looking after our granddaughters recently, we were reminiscing on things which were part of our lives as we grew up, things which todays children have very little knowledge of.



The only way I could explain it was to say that it was very creamy and warm, a bit slimy and it slipped straight down your throat! I really loved it, that was until a few years ago when we were on holiday in Italy, and much to my surprise it was on the dessert menu. I was so excited I had to try it. My face was a picture when it arrived and I tasted it - it looked the same, but was cold and very unappetising and could very easily have been frogspawn!

There were many relatives to tapioca in the milk pudding family - Macaroni, ground rice and sago were common for a while, but I think that rice pudding is the only one which really survived although is now not very common. Blancmange seems also to have disappeared. At most children's parties when I was young, both blancmange and jelly were served. Often being set in a fancy mould shaped like a rabbit.

Evening milky bedtime drinks seem to have disappeared. Ovaltine was my favourite one. Probably because of the 'Ovaltiney' programme broadcast on Radio Luxembourg. I used to sing along with the opening song every night whilst drinking my bedtime drink. I wonder how many of you remember it?

We are the Ovaltineys, little girls and boys Make your requests, we'll not refuse you We are here just to amuse you Would you like a song or story?
Will you share our joys?
At games and sports we're more than keen No merrier children could be seen Because we all drink Ovaltine We're happy girls and boys.

Memories of Sunday teas also come to mind, they were always a bit more special. A ham or tinned salmon salad and afterwards, tinned fruit, usually peaches or fruit salad with evaporated milk. In the summer time the ice cream van would come round and a treat of an ice-cream brick would be allowed.

There wasn't the huge variety of fruit and vegetables throughout the year, they were much more seasonal and to have an orange or a variety of nuts was

usually just a Christmas time treat.

Trying to explain to the youngsters that there was no such things as supermarkets when Grandpa and I were their age was received with a gasp of surprise and disbelief. Gasps were heard again when we explained that you had to go to separate shops for your groceries, vegetables and meat. That from the grocers biscuits were not in packets but were served loose from a tin and put into paper bags. Also you could buy a selection of broken biscuits which contained different varieties such as Fig Rolls, Ginger Snaps, Rich Tea, Digestives and Marie. Butter was cut from a block and cheese and bacon were sliced to order.

For many years now we have been able to buy a wide variety of foods from around the world. Recipes contain items that in the past we may never even have heard of. Certainly many of the items, especially the increase in the level of fruit and vegetables have given us a more healthier diet, However, whether it was a good thing for everything thing to be available as and when we want it is debatable. Those of a certain age, I believe, have the ability to improvise and if not go without. The latest shortage is apparently cooking oil -my daughter has just phoned to ask if I've stocked up on it! No I haven't, and no I won't. It won't stop me cooking, in fact it will be much healthier to steam, boil, and stew dishes in the same way and probably much cheaper!


