The Council for Disabled Children (CDC) at the National Children's Bureau has launched a new website to inform children and young people of their right to high quality healthcare from the NHS. Get your rights: everything you need to get the most out of the NHS

Minister outlines future education role for councils. The government has clarified the role it expects councils to play in shaping and monitoring local education services as the number of schools that convert to academy status increases. Schools minister Lord Nash said the government expected local authorities to retain responsibility for a range of school functions including sufficiency of places and admissions, special educational needs (SEN) and safeguarding. There are also plans to cut £600m from the education services grant (ESG) given to councils to support their school improvement and pupil support work. David Cameron said local authorities controlling schools was a "failed approach of the past". Roy Perry, chairman of the Local Government Association's children and young people board, said councils are well placed to intervene to improve education. "Councils should be regarded as education improvement partners and be allowed to intervene early and use their solid experience, integrity and desire to help improve the system," Read more here.

Transforming Mental Health and Wellbeing Services. The B&NES Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) Transformation Plan has now been assured by NHS England and an allocation of £333,000 per year can now be drawn down. The plan will be published in December on the NHS BaNES Clinical Commissioning Group and local authority websites. Within the funding that has been allocated a substantial amount has been ring-fenced for services who work on eating disorders.

Business and Funding

The Medlock Charitable Trust is based in Bath - priority is given to organisations in the City of Bath and the Borough of Boston, charitable organisation across the UK may apply for a grant. Trust that offers grants to charitable organisations active in the UK. Grants have previously been made to fund projects in the areas of:

- Education;
- Medicine:
- Research; and
- Social welfare services for the benefit of the local community.

The largest grants were awarded of £250,000 over 5 years to the University of Bath to help establish a department in Military Veteran Health and £250,000 over 5 years to the Holburne Museum for educational purposes. However, **most of the 176 grants awarded were for £15,000 or below** (158) and of the 18 grants over this figure £305,000 went to small grant making trusts such as Boshier-Hinton, Quartet and Somerset Masonic Charities. The application process is ongoing and interested applicants may apply at any time in writing. The Trust does not have a website. Further information, however, is available on the <u>Charity Commission website</u>.

Transforming Care for children and young people with learning disabilities and / or autism Grants Programme 2015-16. NHS England have launched a small grant programme with the following aims;

- to help children and young people with mental health problems or behaviour which challenges to be supported to stay with or close to their families in their local communities;
- to support children who live away from home or in learning disability and mental health hospitals, or;
- to improve the support for children through their transition into adulthood.

Training

Level 3 Diploma in Youth Work Practice - Venue in Central Bath, February 2016

The Regional Youth Work Unit at Learning South West is working with Bath and North East Somerset Youth Connect Service to offer the new ABC Awards Level 3 Diploma in Youth Work Practice. This course is nationally recognised as a qualification for Youth Support Workers and will suit you if you are currently working with young people in a youth work setting.

The course will be held in Bath starting in February2016 and will combine regular taught sessions with individual assessment and tutorials and practical experience in youth work.

To complete the course you will need to:

- Be working or volunteering in a youth work setting
- Attend regular taught sessions
- Complete course work that shows that you understand youth work concepts and approaches
- Be observed in your work with young people and provide a portfolio of evidence of your practical youth work skills
- Participate in 1-1 tutorials and assessment meetings.

You should be able to complete the course by Autumn 2016.

Bath & NE Somerset's Youth Connect Service is providing free places on the course for its staff. Other places are available to voluntary organisations working within Bath & North East Somerset at a cost of £600. What is Child Sexual Exploitation?

Child sexual exploitation is when children and young people receive something (such as food, accommodation, drugs, alcohol, cigarettes, affection, gifts, or money) as a result of performing, and/or others performing on them, sexual activities. Child sexual exploitation can occur through the use of the internet or on mobile phones. In all cases, those exploiting the child or young person have power over them because of their age, gender, intellect, physical strength and/or resources.
