National News and Information

NSPCC Urge Government to Close Loopholes in Sport & Beyond.

- Position of trust laws which protect 16 and 17 year olds should be extended to cover sports coaches and other roles. The NSPCC is concerned that whilst it's unlawful for certain professionals such as teachers and care workers to have sex with 16 and 17 year old children in their care, this does not apply to sports coaches or other youth workers
- All those that work with children should undergo the most stringent DBS check not just those working alone with children. Currently it is illegal to hire someone to work with children regularly* if they are barred from doing so – but only if that person would be working with children unsupervised.

Resources for Safer Internet. Children England is supporting <u>Safer Internet Day</u>. The campaign has lots of videos and educational resources to help adults and children discuss staying safe online, with materials aimed at ages 5-7, 7-11, 11-14 and 14-18. There's also a photo campaign for young people to explore the positive and negative impact of images online.

The Huge Role that Charities Play. ACEVO, the Charities Aid Foundation (CAF), the Institute of Fundraising and CharityComms have published 'Charity Today', a report aimed at giving people a better understanding of the contribution made to public life by charities as well as giving an insight into how they operate and how they are changing. The analysis highlights the huge role charities play in many aspects of our everyday lives. It finds that £1,500 is spent every second on charitable services in England and Wales. <u>Download the report here</u>

Review of the Social Value Act. Minister for civil society, Rob Wilson MP, has announced there is to be another review of the Social Value Act. **NCVO have suggested Recommended amendments to the Act** for it to fully realise its potential:

- The requirement that public bodies 'consider' social value in public sector contracts should be upgraded so that they must 'account for' social value. This would help provide the Act with the 'teeth' many believe it currently lacks.
- The requirement that public bodies 'consider' consulting when looking to include social value in a procurement should be strengthened so that they must 'account for' consultation. Consultation with service users and organisations that advocate on their behalf is vital for effective and efficient public services. Commissioning for social value is no different.
- The government should remove the EU procurement threshold clause. The removal of this clause would therefore send a clear signal that social value should apply to all contracts, not just those above a certain value.
- The Act should be extended beyond services to goods and works. Not only would this
 generate better outcomes and long term savings for the taxpayer, it would also make it
 easier for contracting authorities to implement social value strategies.

Data protection fines - take care of your laptops!

Recently, a care home in Northern Ireland was given a £15,000 fine when an unencrypted laptop was stolen from a staff member's home during a burglary. The fine was imposed because the care home did not have any policies in place regarding working from home, and neither was any advice given on encryption or computer security.

The Historical Society was also given a £500 fine in similar circumstances, where an unencrypted laptop was stolen from an employee's home. Again, no policies were in place, and the laptop contained sensitive personal data. In both cases, the fines reflected the financial circumstances of the organisations, and the ICO has made it clear that larger organisations could expect a much larger fine.

It is impossible to guard against theft, and data protection law does not prevent employees working from home. However, what is shocking in both of these cases is that no policies and procedures were in place to help protect sensitive data. We recommend that charities have policies in place whether or not they deal with sensitive data. The more sensitive the data, the more security is required. By May 2018, when all organisations have to be fully compliant with the General Data Protection Regulation, the maximum fine will increase to \in 20 million or 4% worldwide turnover – whichever is greater – and the onus is very much on organisations to prove that they are compliant, so having policies and procedures in place will be even more important. Child Sexual Exploitation – New Guidance. On the 16th February 2017 the Government published 'Child Sexual Exploitation: Definition and Guide for Practitioners' which replaces 'Safeguarding Children and Young People from Sexual Exploitation 2009'. It should be read alongside 'Working together to Safeguard Children' which continues to provide statutory guidance. <u>Click here</u> to view the guidance.

Working with Families Who Display Disguised Compliance. Disguised compliance, whereby parents and carers give the appearance of cooperating with agencies, is challenging for professionals and undermines efforts to safeguard children. This briefing explains what is meant by disguised compliance, looks at how it harms children, and ends with tips for practice when working with families who display disguised compliance. <u>Read more...</u>

The Road Ahead NCVO's annual analysis of the changing operating environment of the voluntary sector. It **identifies and explains forces and trends that are shaping the sector**, and that are likely to have an impact on the future of voluntary organisations. Trustees and managers would benefit from using the analysis to explore the implications of these issues for their organisations when planning for the medium term. As such, it may be worth sharing the document with your trustees and setting aside time in a board meeting for discussion around the headline topics. <u>The Road Ahead</u>

Personal information and fundraising guidance. The Fundraising Regulator has released its <u>Personal information and fundraising: Consent, purpose and transparency</u> guidance, it aims to help charities and their trustees better understand their responsibilities in relation to donor consent, data protection and legitimate interests. They have also published a <u>check list</u> to support the guidance.

A <u>key recommendation</u> is that charities should only contact people who have opted in to receive fundraising communications as it's the 'clearest' and 'safest' form of consent. The charity commission has its own guidance for <u>trustees on fundraising</u> more broadly. This **outlines six key areas of responsibility** and its worth ensuring that your whole board has had the opportunity to read this guidance.

New Try for Change Fund. England Rugby and Comic Relief launched <u>Try for Change fund on</u> Monday, 6 February. The fund will use rugby union and the rugby community to deliver social change in England and across the world. The first initiative launched under the Try for Change Fund is a small grants programme aimed at supporting smaller charities, community groups, and local rugby clubs in England. Organisations can apply for between £2,500 and £10,000, for up to 12 months. Applications that target the most vulnerable and marginalised groups, for example young people who are NEET (Not in Education, Employment, or Training), will be prioritised. Bringing together rugby's core values of teamwork, respect, enjoyment, discipline and sportsmanship, Try for Change will work to tackle a number of social challenges.

The Rise of the Contactless Charity Box. Eleven charities including Oxfam, the NSPCC, Barnados and the Royal British Legion began a four-month trial in September using 100 of the boxes. While they are shaped like traditional charity boxes to accept coins and notes, they are also fitted with contactless readers as well as featuring Chip & Pin terminals for higher-value payments. The results of the trial showed that donors who pay using contactless credit cards tend to give three times as much as the average cash donor.

The contactless points were pre-set to a £2 donation if people tapped their credit cards on them, although charities could connect to the boxes with a smartphone app if givers wanted to give more or less using their cards. The NSPCC said the average card donation during the trial had been £3.07, more than three times the £1 that punters give using cash on average.
