So with thanks to my predecessor Jayne and the unbelievable support of Caroline, I took the role on and have been overwhelmed by the joy that has come from being able to do my part.

For 40 years, yes 40 years, BAPP has supported an astonishing number of families within the Bath and North East Somerset area and every year it seems there are more families that have need of the range of services and support that they provide. The fact that Caroline has been involved in this much needed organisation for more than 30 of those years is even more astonishing and a testament to her personal commitment to BAPP and the families it supports.

Over this, my first year as Chair, the brilliant team at BAPP have obtained Ofsted Social Care registration for Residential Holidays for Disabled Children; we now have approval to enable an expansion of services, some restructuring within the office team and we have had more than 6,000 children and adults attend our summer playdays. Some of our team took on a hugely emotional journey to work with refugees in Calais and I and the other trustees applaud their work, knowing how much of an impact a project like that can have on both participants and providers. A massive thank you to everyone within the BAPP team for making my first year so insightful and thought provoking, and for doing what you do so well.

I look forward to seeing many of our staff and families at our birthday party.




BRINGING PLAY TO LIFE

Since 1979, we have strived to provide and facilitate positive opportunities for children to play, For 10+ years, we are using a Think Family approach; playdays in communities open to all children and families, family play support work and now this year, Family Sessions.

It takes a family and wider community to nurture and nourish children with play being an intrinsic part of children's innate development.

OVERVIEW OF 2019

This was a busy year with demand for services increasing, staff changes and lots to celebrate. Trustees took the decision to maintain the Hut Nursery & Pre-school at the end of the previous year when numbers fell after children's school entry. It has had a steady increase including dual placements with BOP, a refurbishment, new sandpit and won a Sudocrem Award! It is now a thriving setting with new children starting regularly and stable for now.

Our new contract for Short Breaks for disabled children began in April and we managed a significant change as some families were no longer eligible to use the service. This meant that numbers reduced for some services. We advocated for those 15+ to be able to continue as part of their transition. We started running Family Sessions which have brought new families to using our services. Huge acknowledgement for Sam Ward who has now become a Registered Manager for our Residential Holidays for Disabled Children, taking us through Ofsted Social Care Registration. We have now successfully run 2 overnight sleepovers!

Our Summer Play Programme reached over 6,000 children and families including new areas; High Littleton & Sydney Gardens. We have good feedback, particularly from parents in the more rural areas, grateful for us coming to their communities. This is a potential area for development.

The level of support for families is becoming more complex with our Family Play Support Workers seeing increasing issues with the Toxic trio and mental health issues for children. Demand for nurture groups in school has been met and we have been able to increase these by 30%.

Since the onset and during the Pandemic, I have been so impressed and proud of all of the BAPP Staff team; all of whom wanted to continue front line delivery as soon as we were allowed but also providing and delivering food parcels, play equipment and toys and play packs, helping children feel connected to the project.

As our services grow in response to demand, I am hugely grateful to our staff and trustees for their support and willingness to want the best for children and families. As a small organisation that I have had the pleasure of working with for 30 years, I have seen a lot of change. One thing that hasn't is the passion and drive of our amazing staff teams and volunteers who continue to work in a child-centred and inclusive way ensuring that children have access to positive play opportunities.

PARTNERSHIP WORKING / CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE'S NETWORK

Throughout the year, BAPP have continued to develop and build partnership and collaborative ways of working. The CYPN has enabled organisations to discuss potential collaborations, aligning skills and knowledge for the benefit of children and young people across B&NES.

- Our work with children and families is always in partnership; our staff spend time getting to know and understand families and work with them to agree goals and support them to make changes to improve wellbeing.
- We are signed up to working together with GLL and have access to sports
 facilities and services to support children's healthy lifestyles and also signed up
 to Compassionate Communities.
- We work in partnership with Southside to deliver the family support and play service, a vital preventative early help service working in a multi-agency context to enable families and children to build on their strengths using play as a catalyst.
- The Children & Young People's Network initiated a collaborative piece of work with 5 third sector organisations that were instrumental in bringing in funding from West of England Combined Authority for work with 14 to 16 year olds.
- We held our first SEND family information session for CYPN Member organisations working with children & Young People with disabilities and families in B&NES. 35 families attended together with representatives from the rainbow resource team, SEND partnership and DCT in B&NES. We had fantastic feedback from all who attended and are planning another SEND event in 2020.
- We held 5 next work meetings in 2019, with one joint CYPN & 3SG meeting at Bath City Football Club focusing on property negotiations and solutions.
 Speakers from Stone Kind solicitors and B&NES Council Property department we able to do a Q&A session for attendees. Of the 45 attendees 15 were exclusively CYPN members.
- We organised 2 FREE SEND training sessions (in partnership with the B&NES SEND Partnership Service) which was attended by 22 CYPN Members.
- We had 198 members at the end of Quarter 4 2019 (There are 203 as of February 2020)
- Engagement levels are Increasing with 10.8% increase in 2019. We now have 41
 groups actively engaging with the network on a regular basis.
- In 2019, BAPP Community Playdays were nominated for Best Family Days Out and with funding support from Parish and Town Councils, Curo and Trusts, were able to reach in excess of 7,000 children and their parents bringing together people in communities and providing inspirational and fun play opportunities for children of all ages.



SMALL INPUT, BIG IMPACT

BAPP staff work individually, with whole families and in groups using a strengths-based approach and working in playful partnership to effect change. All support is recorded and assessed in terms of progress. Some is huge and some is small but they all have a huge benefit for the child.

Fay is 12 years old and has an EHC Plan with medical conditions where she was home educated. Fay was returning to a part time timetable in school and attended the Nurture group as part of the timetable. Mum fedback:

Fay really has got a lot out of the nurture group. She talked to me about what she had done after each session, really enjoying being part of a small group. With her going to school part time due to her health reasons she has found it hard to make new friends as it is harder to develop these new relationships in a shorter time. She feels that because the group was smaller and everyone else attending had reasons for being there, she could relate to them and felt more at ease being around peers that seemed to be more understanding about her conditions. At the end of the term, Fay was able to stand up in front of the group and talk confidently. Her key worker said they felt proud of Fay's achievements and how far she has developed with gaining confidence and forming new and positive friendships with peers. She is now settled well back into school, confident and thriving.

- Playing beach french cricket, where 3 families were playing together who had never met before, who were very nervous to join in to begin with. The difference for the children and parents after was huge; it was like they had known each other for longer
- The play out wild day in Greyfield woods- BEST PLAYDAY EVER! We made a
 trail of sunflowers for people to follow from the entrance to be able to find us
 in a clearing which encouraged lots of new families that had never heard of
 us to come and play.
 - Saturday Club for disabled children aged 5+ parent had never left her disabled child before and didn't think she or they'd cope with her leaving, for the first time since the child was born. Settled well and Mum was so relieved and now able to have a break from caring & time for herself.
- Summer plays days, especially in more rural areas. "I think sometimes we are forgotten about out here, so thank you."
- Supporting a family to move house into more appropriate accommodation, they
 were struggling with communicating with Curo at the time.
- Supporting a Mum to get back into employment through supporting her through a tricky time in her life and helping her gain the confidence to go back to work.
- Helping a child to find strategies to de-escalate their anger.
 Providing nurture and sensory play opportunities for a child who missed those experiences in early childhood, to enable them to better process their emotions






FINANCE, GOVERNANCE AND QUALITY IMPROVEMENT

With Core funding from St. John's Foundation, we have continued to work towards accreditation, and now awarded the ISO9001:2015 Quality Management Award.

We have made significant changes with compliance, moving to an electronic system for records, have brought accounts in house and now using Quickbooks. This provides Trustees with better reporting and financial management. We have maintained all our Ofsted registrations; 3 for open-access/family groups, 1 for Three Ways on childcare register and 1 for the Hut on Early Years and Voluntary register. We are now registered with Ofsted on the Social Care register as one of only a handful of providers for Residential Holidays for Disabled Children with Sam Ward as our Registered Manager. This allows us to take disabled teenagers on overnight residentials

We are in lease negotiations with B&NES with both the Hut and Odd Down Community Centre and putting forward proposals for rent abatement against a combination of community services including youth club provision.

We have begun the process of reviewing our Business Plan and action planning processes and steps on this journey which will involve stakeholders, staff and trustees.
