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PARISH COUNCIL

Following well attended sessions during the Easter break, the popular Play in the Park will be back at the Village



Hall for three consecutive Tuesday mornings beginning on 31st. July. Each session lasts from 10am until 12 noon. They are primarily aimed at 6-11 year olds but younger children are very welcome if accompanied by an adult carer. Please remember to come prepared for sunshine, so wear a sun hat, slap on the sun cream and bring a bottle of water (sugary drinks tend to attract wasps).

Following complaints about dog excrement in Old Church Road and requests for an additional bin to receive it, East Hanningfield's thirteenth dog bin was installed, beside the Back Lane junction opposite the pumping station. That made it necessary to produce a new map to show where they all are. The map can be found on the back cover of this News. I have been told that the new bin is being well used. Remember, free dogs bags are available in the shop and in the Village Hall lobby.

At the Annual Electors' Meeting in May, retiring Parish Council Chairman Jim Howe presented

the Council's An-

nual Report 2017-2018. You can see this under *Publications* on the Parish Council's website and paper copies are available in the Village Hall lobby. The Annual Report contains the receipts and payments account for the year, with what looks like a very healthy end of year balance, but what you do not see is all the capital spending that has happened after the year end, that is in this financial year. PC paid for the path beside the Village Hall Chase, £6,285, the path beside the Hall, £5,400, the wider path across the grass by the School gate, £300 and the repairs to the post and rails along the Tye, £710 in April and in May, £370 for



Report from the Chairman Jim Howe



Another year has passed quickly and I find myself writing my final Chairman's report.

A new chairman will be appointed at the next Parish Council meeting in May.

We are fortunate to have had excellent backup from our Cheirnsford Borough Counciliors, Richard Poulter and Matthew

Parish Council meetings continue to be held upstairs in the village hall on the fourth Thursday of each month. The full schedule is posted on the village noticeboards and the council website

On 8** May, the City Council Planning Committee will preside over the planning application for land between Old Church Road and Back Lane. Over a year ago, we agreed a quantity of 20 dwellings for the site, however the developers have submitted an amendment to the plan which increases the quantity to 25 dwellings. The pairsh council will be represented by myself and will be making a case that the original quantity of 20 is adhered to.

Whilst I have been Chairman, there have been successes in improving the village oftrastructure and also of course maintaining and improving the existing facilities. The council continues to work alongside Hanna's Field Charity to complete outstanding and ongoing requirements.

The Financial Status of the Parish Council continues to remain stable. Further details and a statement of account for the financial year 2017/18 are included in this report. Thank you to the group of volunteers from all walks of life who have given their time to assist in various community events and projects this year. Close liaison between the Parish Council, Hanna's Field Charifty and The East Hanningfield Field Action Group

the installation and one year's emptying of the new dog bin. The City Council will not finance the emptying of any further dog bins so installing one means a permanent addition to the Parish Council's annual expenditure.

You might wonder why the Chairman was retiring. PC has a standing order that a Chairman may hold office for a maximum of four consecutive years. Jim Howe has reached the end of his four year term and so could not stand for election as Chairman at this year's Annual Meeting of the Parish Council, when posts and appointments were agreed. As this News has to go to the printer before the Annual Meeting, I am unable to announce who the new Chairman is.

In May 2019, there will be Parish Council elections, so anyone who thinks they might be able to serve the community as a parish councillor might like to talk to one of the present councillors or to me about what it involves. I am not trying to supplant any existing councillors but have been told by some that they do not intend to stand again at the next election. Publicity about the election and how to stand will start appearing early in 2019. As our elections are run by the City Council, their website will carry all the necessary information, including the important dates for submitting nomination papers etc.

Minutes of PC Meetings are posted on PC's website once they have been signed as accurate at the following Meeting www.essexinfo.net/ easthanningfieldparishcouncil/publications/minutes-2013-14/. They go back as far as the year 2004-5. Copies are also available on paper at the Meeting at which they are due to be signed. The Agenda are also available on the website at www.essexinfo.net/ easthanningfieldparishcouncil/publications/agenda-2013-14/

But in line with the PC's document retention policy only go back seven years. The Agenda are also displayed on PC's noticeboards and on the lobby window at the Village Hall. Additional notices posted at the moment are those concerning the publication of the unaudited accounts. These are a summary of the receipts and payments account that is prepared for the external auditor on a special form, which can also be seen on the website at www.essexinfo.net/easthanningfieldparishcouncil/publications/accounts-2012-13/.

PC Meetings are public meetings so you are welcome to attend, and if you are thinking of standing for election it might be a good idea to come

along and find out how it all works beforehand. Generally, they are held on the fourth Thursday of the month at 8pm, but the date and time is always posted on the noticeboards and website three clear days before, and the meeting schedule for the year is posted there as well.

If you have a matter that you would like to bring to the attention of the PC you can talk about it during Public Question Time at one of the monthly Meetings, or put it in writing and send it to me. If you think it is a serious matter that needs to be an Agenda item please make sure it reaches me a week before the Meeting to ensure it gets included in the list of items for business.

Finally, thank you to everyone who participated in the Village Tidy on a sunny 5 May. All your work really made a difference.

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CITY COUNCILLOR

I am pleased to say that at its planning meeting on 8th May, Chelmsford City Council rejected the recommendation of planning officers and by a majority refused the application to build 26 new houses on land between Back Lane and Old Church Road. The representations and debate took over an hour with local residents, East Hanningfield Action Group and the Parish Council speaking strongly against. The only speech in favour came from the applicant's agent.



The final decision is now deferred to the next planning meeting on 10th June for officers to draft the full refusal reasons. The two reasons voted on by the committee were inadequate provision of affordable housing and overdevelopment of the site. The planning officers advised that despite the application being contrary to policy, there were overriding material considerations that carried greater weight and also that national planning policy was in favour of building where the site is likely to be included within the emerging development plan for housing.

There is currently permission from 2016 for 20 houses on this site equally split between open market housing and affordable housing. Residents should expect either an appeal against the committee decision or a further application following the adoption of the new development plan, which is expected next Spring. I opposed this application and will oppose any appeal or further application similar to this one.

I am very willing to call on residents and local businesses to discuss local issues and problems. Just send me an e-mail or give me a ring to make arrangements.

ESSEX COUNTY COUNCILLOR

We have just recently held our Annual Council and elected a new Chairman for the next two years, Cllr John Jowers has succeeded Cllr John Aldridge. The other change effecting myself, is I am no longer Cabinet Member for Highways but have taken over the Chair of the Place and Economic Scrutiny Committee. The Leader of the Council in his address reminded us all of a few successes from last year which I believe are interesting and if I may share with you. Namely.....

94% of our schools are judged good or outstanding and over 2500 additional spaces have been made available.

We have the lowest rate of children that have been subject to abuse in residential care.

We have helped over 1300 young people not in education or training into employment or further education.

We have resurfaced over 400 miles of roads and filled over 5000 potholes!

Unlike some councils around the country, Essex has a balanced budget and sound financial controls. We do nevertheless have very challenging times ahead when in 2020 all Government support ceases. Despite all this we are finding a further £4m to help the pothole campaign and also support new initiatives to encourage Parish Councils to accept responsi-

bility for many of the smaller projects. It will be interesting to see how this works out and if there is an appetite to accept localism. I myself believe this to be a positive move on the grounds of knowledge, cost and using local contractors.

If anyone has a county problem please let me know.

Summer has now arrived with good spells of dry weather and lovely longer daylight days!

During the Easter School break we were able to press on with the task of providing a solid pathway behind the rail along the school fence which was erected to keep the children safe from cars on their way into the school grounds and to improve on the muddy grass walkway, which will be a great boon in wet and wintery weather in the future. We were also able to proceed with the replacement of the uneven and cracked concrete slabs around the hall with new tarmac surfaces being laid. Both funded by the Parish Council. Due to the poor weather this was a rather messy muddy job but the contractors did a sterling job to keep the areas around as clear as possible.

On Saturday 12th May we were finally able to install the new storage container on the field and get the old one taken away. They were there very early in the morning and the task was soon completed, and within a few hours the heavens opened, so we got it done just right! Many thanks to Mike Plumridge and David Bell for all their efforts firstly clearing the old container on the Friday and then putting things back into the new on the Saturday plus a trip to the local recycling centre to get rid of all the 'no longer required' items.

The new all-weather 'green' overflow car park extension is sched-

uled to be undertaken during the Whitsun holiday week at the end of May beginning of June, so again we hope the weather is kind to us.

The old container being lifted on to the flat bed to be taken away.

We have also now secured a contractor to undertake the external deco-

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ration of the hall cladding and this work is planned to start on Monday 30th July, and will smarten up the peeling façade greatly.

I hope you all agree we will have achieved a number of great improvements to our facilities this year! This work all comes at a substantial cost and it is only through our fund raising efforts and being successful in grant applications that can make this all happen!

We held the Charity's AGM on 25th April, which was well attended and I am pleased to say we now have a full complement of Executive Committee Members, along with our Trustee Members. I was appointed to the Chairperson role and we persuaded David Bell to take on the Vice Chairperson role joining Mike Plumridge our Treasurer and Wendy Thomas our Secretary.



Our next big fundraiser is the Village Fete, a joint event with All Saints Church, on Saturday 30th June 1.30pm to 5.00pm. As stated in the Spring Newsletter we are always looking for help, especially some strong young men to help us set up and clear away on the day (from 9.30am onwards) and for getting equipment down from our loft storage on the Friday afternoon. Crime Update. I start usual summary of incidents since last News, not so much in hope that anyone can help police solve these, but to make residents aware that crime is about us and need for vigilance and precautions (these are just the incidents NhW are aware of):

- -Lorry load of tyres tipped in Pan Lane (March).
- -Garage entered on Highfields Mead, intruder alarm activated waking occupants but garage door damaged (March).
- -Village shop burgled causing £1,750 of damage (March).
- -Two residents' garages broken into same night (Lawns-March).
- -About 10 tons of car-breaker's waste tipped in Back Lane (April).
- -Garden shed broken into, heavy garden equipment taken (May).
- -Garden shed broken into and ride-on-mower taken (May).
- -Children's bikes stolen (Catherine Close-May).

In the case of one of the two garden shed break-ins, the criminals drove a four by four vehicle across a field and cut through a boundary hedge to enter the property. This isn't the first time we have seen criminals drive across fields and through hedges/fences to gain rear access to an outbuilding.

Going away for a holiday – Intruder Alarm fitted?

Last summer a number of residents complained about the house alarms of people on holiday continually sounding, causing huge annoyance. As well as usual precautions (leave some lights on timers, cancel milk/papers, close windows, don't draw curtains, lock garage door and side gates etc) please leave your neighbour with key / instructions on how to disable a faulty intruder alarm.

Scams and Fraud ☆ HRMRC payment due?

HMRC and Action Fraud have warned that this kind of "phishing" is expected to continue in the coming months as genuine tax refunds are issued at the end of the tax year and criminals take advantage by sending out phishing emails and text messages. The emails and texts with links which take victims to fake websites where their personal and financial information can be stolen. HMRC only informs you about tax refunds through the post or through your pay via your employer

- ☆ Football fan? Beware Action Fraud say several rogue websites are offering 2018 FIFA World Cup tickets for sale at highly inflated prices.
- ☆ TV service provider update? The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) have noticed an increase in fraudsters cold-calling victims offering a discount on their tv service provider subscriptions, a service upgrade, or subscription renewal, in order to obtain personal and bank account details. Later, victims discover the fraudster has made transactions using the victim's bank account.

❖ Just say No to cold callers! Essex Police have noted an increase in Rogue Traders and offer the following advice: Rogue Traders will typically cold call and state you need Roof repairs, Lawn work; Driveways power washed / repaired; Fence repairs; Garden services, Tree lopping; and Waste clearance (we've even had rats infestation). They may claim to know your neighbours or to have done work for them. Often the work they offer didn't need doing or will poorly carried out or it will be vastly overpriced; and will have no guarantees. Too often they target vulnerable elderly people. If you think you've been taken in by a rogue trader call Essex Police on 101 (or use police web site reporting). You can use Trading Standards website via Citizens Advice and their Buy with Confidence number 08454 040506 or website URL:

https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/consumer/get-more-help/report-to-trading-standards/ to find approved bona fide traders.

about 110 residents receive NhW local email alerts. A new data protection regulation came into force from 25 May 2018 and we would like to reassure those in receipt of our local NhW email crime alerts/ information that we do not keep recipient's details, other than a person's email address, and our policy remains that we will never share this with any other organisation, including other NhW organisations.

CANON CHRISTINE -ALL SAINTS' CHURCH

Dear Friends,

As some of you may know I was a teacher of Religious Education in secondary school, before I took up work as a minister in the Church of England. One of the things we had to look at as part of the curriculum, was what a priest did.



Generally the students thought this was about prayer and worship and being in the church and did not see much outside of a lot of praying and things like that. When questioned they began so see it involved a lot more, and since I have been here at East Hanningfield I have very much experienced that in practice.

Some of the questions I asked the students were about sick people, lonely people, people who cannot get out of the house much, children in school and what they can learn about RE from a priest. There was also the sort of places a priest might visit, hospitals, community organisations, work places, those with addictions, those with disabilities, local councils, pre- schools, nurseries etc., etc. It soon became obvious that if a priest was to practise what s/he preached, then to love and care for people meant seeing them and helping them. All this was on top of seeing the church building was OK and the church yard kept up. Of course there are some people to help, Gil our Warden for one, but the minister is the hub from which all of this must emanate if it is to happen. I am fortunate as there is a small though good team of people at All Saints, always room for more of course. The Parish Council is also very supportive to the church yard.

Sometimes I feel that the community at large fails to give the church (meaning national church), the credit it deserves. Most churches have members as well as the minister, visiting all sorts of people, and trying to run clubs or activities to support them. Society does seem to be encouraging volunteering but things like visiting the sick, and the lonely or

reading to someone who has poor sight or helping with a bit of gardening or cleaning, seem to get forgotten. At the time of writing the media has announced that humanoid robots are being experimented with in a care home to offer interaction with elderly people. My feeling on that is, it is very, very, sad. I know care is expensive, it certainly shows the great need, for caring volunteers.

So please remember we do things, we do not just talk about them, and it can be a great privilege. I have learned so much from the people I have visited over the years and enjoyed listening to them.

It is certainly good to talk and to listen. Around the world at the moment there are many problems and to keep a dialogue going is important. Occasionally the unexpected happens for the good, and it is my belief that God works through people at all levels to bring healing and help, dissipate anger and calm the trouble brow with tea, flowers a hug or whatever it might be.



As Christians we do need to meet together for strength to support the things that need doing in the world, and for a bit of divine inspiration, prayer is important. We also need to learn from Biblical scripture what others did in the past to help solve their problems, in the local community and further afield. You find in the Bible people do not change much down the years and the things they get up to are much the same! It is good to meet together in church and to know things that are important to pass on down the generations. Unless we tell the stories and pass on the values we believe in who will? Our Christian culture depends on people to live it and pass it on. We need to show that it is something worth doing – that is a great responsibility.

Yes I do, but not so much that I am like the children thought at first. Be-




ing in the community and with the children is very important to me. I look forward to seeing you around and helping out where I can. See you at the fete on Saturday June 30th. Fundraising is important too!


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FROM THE CHURCHWARDEN

Church loo? An emotive subject but in recent years it appears to be considered a vital facility that many churches are being asked to provide for their visitors. We don't have a suitable place to site one inside, even if we wished to! Now we have an ideal place in our churchyard approved by the Diocese and have waited some months to get planning permission from Chelmsford City Council with the relevant mountain of paperwork.

Thanks to an award-winning innovative design by a Welsh company called Natsol, we are having an eco-composting toilet which is wheel-chair and disabled friendly. Other clients include Royal Parks, National Trust, Forestry Commission, Environment Agency, allotment sites and remote churches. However we believe we are the first church in Essex to have one like this!

It is very environmentally friendly as it is chemical free, waterless, does not need power or connection to any mains services. No smells, no noise, no risk of blocked or freezing pipes. It is low maintenance and has virtually no running costs. I have spoken to people who have had one for some years and they sing its praises!

So once all the necessary paperwork has been dealt with, hopefully in the next few weeks rather than months, we look forward to providing church visitors with FACILITIES! I finish with a poem penned by a Norfolk churchgoer which seemed very apt for our church too.

"There comes a time in all our lives, As everyone will know When the call of nature beckons You really have to go. But tell me someone if you will, Whatever do you do When the call of nature beckons And you cannot find a loo! So dig deep into your pockets And give a pound of two For one day that desperate person Could easily be you!



COMMUNITY LIVING—BETHEL CHURCH

As the day of the Village Fete draws closer, I have been blown away by the amount of work that goes on behind the scenes in order for it to take place. I have attended some of the fete planning meetings and what has impacted me most is the community spirit. I won't embarrass individuals, but the dedication of some of our village folk is truly commendable.

The village life dynamic has changed over the years, as more and more people are wanting to move away from the hustle and bustle of town and city living. The thing that defines a village is not necessarily the leafy lanes and the local pub, but the community itself. East Hanning-field is blessed with such lovely people, people who care for others and look out for each other.

It is apparent that community is not some peripheral Christian teaching but is central to the outworking of God's purpose in the world. God is glorified when He is properly reflected; by dwelling in unity, we rightly image our communal Maker.

We read in the Gospels that among Jesus' final words before the cross was a prayer for the unity of His people, a unity expressive of the unity found within the godhead (John 17:21-22). We know from the testimony of the early church that community was the natural result of the Spirit's influence upon the Church (Acts 2:42-47).

In being obedient to this calling, we at Bethel Church urge each member to be deeply involved in the lives of others, to "do life together." Unfortunately, we have not always done a great job of explaining exactly what this phrase means. But our hope for us is not that we would simply hang out with each other, but rather, that we would engage in a battle for deep and abiding relationships.

We find the following characteristics to be particularly indicative of biblical community:

Love—Love can be a rather ambiguous term. We love our spouses, our children, our dogs, our fish and chips, and our favourite football team. Surely, we do not mean the same thing in each use of the term? Five times in letter of 1st John, the apostle writes that believers are to love one another. However, he does not leave the command in ambiguity. Rather, he qualifies the command by showing that love is best represented by the sending of the Son to die for our sins and thus is inherently sacrificial (1 John 3:16-18). Let us love in truth and deed and not

merely in word. Love which is not sacrificial is really not love.

Consistency—The early church pictured in the book of Acts met daily to encourage each other and worship together. Hebrews 10 tells us to not neglect meeting together as some are in the habit of doing, while chapter 4 tells us to exhort one another daily. A clear Scriptural admonition exists toward long lasting relationships and deeply consistent presence in the lives of others.

Worship—The early church spent its time in engaging in celebration of the Lord and the remembrance of the gospel through the means of grace which were provided. We therefore find it essential for biblical community to be about the pursuit of the Lord through the Lord 's Supper, prayer, singing and the reading and teaching of the Scriptures.

Authenticity—Given the characteristics of community, what are the practical implications that makes it authentic? While the list could be quite extensive, a large number of the requirements could easily be seen by doing a thorough search of the dozens of "one another" passages especially within the New Testament. Such passages tell believers to:

Love one another (John 13:34, 15:12)
Outdo one another in showing honour (Romans 12:10)
Live in harmony with one another (Romans 12:16)
Comfort and agree with one another (2 Corinthians 13:11) Serve one another (John 13:1-20; Galatians 5:13)
Bear one another's burdens (Galatians 6:2)
Forgive one another (Ephesians 4:32)
Submit to one another (Ephesians 5:21)
Be honest with one another (Colossians 3:9)
Encourage one another (1 Thessalonians 5:11)
Confess to one another (James 5:16)
Pray for one another (James 5:16)

Bethel Church wants its members to live Christianly. We want to be distinct in the way in we work, speak, think, rest and play. We want to do those things which glorify our gracious Lord and Savior. To properly reflect His communal nature and to follow His communal commands, we must as a people engage in fellowship which is sacrificially loving, consistent, worshipful, and authentically transparent. In this way, we seek to "do life together."

Bethel Church will be flipping the burgers at the village fete this year. Come and say hello.




Christmas Cover Competition next term!


