EAST HANNINGFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

On Thursday 23rd April the Annual Parish Meeting will take place at 8.15 p.m. in the Village Hall. This is not a P.C. Meeting and, unlike P.C. Meetings, all parishioners are allowed to speak. The A.P.M. usually has reports from the Chairmen of P.C. and Hanna's Field Charity, but other parish groups are welcome to speak. If you have an item for discussion at the A.P.M., please let me know so that it can be included in the Agenda, and please do come along on 23rd April.

Parishioners who have taken an interest in any of the many planning applications sent to P.C. for consultation will know that planning applications have to comply with the Local Plan. The new Local Plan for Chelmsford Borough has now reached the consultation stage, and the Planning Department at Chelmsford Borough Council has offered to send an officer to explain and answer questions about it. This will take place on Thursday 26th March at 8.30 p.m. in the Village Hall and all parishioners are invited to attend.

In the last Newsletter, I wrote that P.C. was arranging to meet with other councils to organise a joint response to the County Council's plans for the new A130. Meetings have taken place. East Hanningfield, Rettendon and West Hanningfield P.C.s have jointly sent representations to the Department of Transport recognising the need for the new road, but objecting to its height and elevational treatment, the visual impact of the road, the lack of adequate noise attenuation, and the diversion of the footpath known as St Peter's Way. C.B.C. has raised similar objections to the planned road.

The bulk refuse vehicle will be visiting the Village Hall car park on the following Saturday mornings: 7th March, 4th April. There will be no visit in May. The vehicle arrives at about 8.15 a.m. and leaves when full or at 11.15 a.m. at the latest.

P.C. Meetings continue to take place on the 4th Thursday of each month at 8 p.m. in the Village Hall. Members of the public are invited to address the council during Public Question Time which takes place shortly after the opening of the meeting.

The Leisure Services Department at C.B.C. has offered to run an Easter Holiday Playscheme in East Hanningfield again this year. Sadly, it is for one day only this time as this provision has to be shared among several parishes. The date for the Play Day is Tuesday 14th April from 10 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. and from 1.30 p.m. to 4 p.m. It will take place in the Village Hall as usual and is for children between 5 and 11 years. Under 5's must be accompanied by an adult if they wish to attend.







PARISH MEETING

A great deal of routine business has been transacted during the past year, and I have sought to highlight only the more important aspects of PC's work during the period. The monthly meetings in the village hall have continued, with Public Question Time being a well-used feature. Several members of the Council and the Clerk have attended courses on local government and other topics. PC has maintained its outward-looking philosophy by communicating positively with other PC's, Chelmsford Borough and Essex County Councils, by being represented at the Association of Chelmsford District Parish Councils, Mid Essex Community Health Council and Chelmsford Borough Road Safety Advisory Panel, and is a member of Essex Association of Local Councils.

An increased range of activities has been provided for children. The highly successful annual summer playscheme was augmented by CBC's Easter holiday playscheme, picnic playday and Sportsmobile. The welcome initiative taken by a group of parishioners to establish a more widely equipped play area on the playing field has been grant-aided by PC, and it is pleasing to see this initiative moving forward successfully.

The parts of the village over which PC has jurisdiction, the Tye and the playing fields, are to be the subject of new byelaws for the control of dogs, and for the prohibition of golf practice, which is dangerous in a public open space, and from which injury has resulted. The work of mowing the playing fields and Tye is done by a contractor, whilst hand-finishing is carried out by the groundsman. New posts have been installed beside the Tye footpath, a manhole cover replaced near the PO, and additional grit bins installed.

As a consultee, PC has made representations on 16 planning applications and the ECC Minerals Subject Plan, and is presently formulating a response to the new Chelmsford Borough Plan consultation document. In response to ECC's plans for the new A130, PC lodged a joint objection with other Councils against certain design details, which have serious environmental implications for the parish. PC is calling for greater investment in the rail network, rather than placing a total reliance on road building for the country's transport needs. When PC put

this proposal to the AGM of the Essex Association of Local Councils, it was carried almost unanimously and is now going forward to the National Association. PC also plays a positive role in promoting the bus service, and lobbying hard to retain the Sunday service.

Due to parishioners' concern about crime in the village, the Police have been invited to attend the PC meeting on 28 May.

I conclude by thanking members for their commitment, willingly accepted elective responsibility and interest in the job, and madam clerk for her initiative, dedication and hard work.

In his report to the APM, the Chairman of the Trust reminded parishioners that 16 December 1992 would see the end of the first decade of the Trust. Advances made over that period are grounds for pride by the parish. In that brief period, the trust land has been transformed from an open space to an area providing indoor and outdoor leisure for the people of East Hanningfield, which are in use most days from dawn until dusk.

The past year has further consolidated the project as first set up. The finances are sound, particularly in a period of recession. Prices have been held without increase over the previous year, and this has been beneficial to both the people and the Trust. Increased use has resulted and more than off-set the increased costs of power, maintenance and cleaning. Letting for social functions has been restricted to villagers, with exceptions approved by the committee. This has eliminated nuisance and damage to the Hall.

The small hall, kitchen, changing and WC rooms have been painted. Additonal hot water is provided by an extra tank, eliminating complaints about lack of hot water. To meet the new Health and Safety laws, a double sink has been installed in the kitchen, thereby enabling the premises to pass inspection by the Borough Council.

The football pitch was temporarily moved to enable ridges to

be levelled and worn areas reseeded. This fairly minor improvement now gives the opportunity for the pitch to be rotated on a three yearly basis if necessary.

Sufficient funds have been raised by the parents' group, led by Scott Mathieson, to enable them to complete the extension of the play area for the children. A donation of £1000 from South Woodham Ferrers Lions Club helped them complete the project much earlier than had been anticipated. Arrangments are now in hand for suitable fencing to exclude dogs and enable byelaws against fouling to be invoked. Dog fouling of the field continues to be a problem, caused by only a few dogs with careless owners.

The accounts of the Trust have been audited.

PARISH COUNCIL

The scheme is aimed at 5-11 year olds, but younger children are welcome to attend if accompanied by an adult at all times. The playscheme is manned entirely by volunteers, and to comply with safety regulations, there must be a minimum of 3 adults on the premises, so will all parents of children attending the scheme please come along once or twice to help. Too few helpers will mean PLAYWEEK will have to be cancelled It is also hoped that there will be visits by the Sportsmobile and Playbus during the holiday. PC will subsidise attendance at Sportsmobile sessions, so that children will only pay £1 of the £2 charged for each child by the Borough Council.

The manned refuse vehicle will attend on 6 June, 11 July and 8 August, and will leave when full, or by 11.15 a.m. At other times, refuse can be taken to the Civic Amenity Site in Great Baddow. (entrance off the mini roundabout, opposite Beehive Lane).

In the next three months, services are as follows:-


1st Sunday in month: Family Service, followed by Holy Communion at approximately 11.40 am.

VILLAGE HISTORY

Have you walked down Old Church Road and wondered where the church was? All that's left of the original All Saints' Church are gravestones amidst a copse of trees near East Hanningfield Hall, and the memories of villagers who collected wild white violets there for Mothering Sunday. A footpath across the fields opposite Willis Farm leads you to the site.

A church was first built there in the 7th century by the Saxon Chief who lived where the Hall stands today, when he was converted to Christianity. The list of rectors goes back to 1263, starting with Jordan de Muckayne.

Early last century, it was described as being a building in the perpendicular style, consisting of a nave, chancel and tower containing four bells, mainly brick-built with the walls of the nave of pudding-stone and pebble-rubble. In 1844, the church underwent major restoration, which cost the parish £750 - a new roof, two bells recast and the wood from the box pews was used to panel the walls. A large heating stove of the latest pattern was placed in the North Aisle with a cast iron flue pipe. This was thought to be the cause of the fire which destroyed the medieval church after morning service on 30 December 1883. The Rev. Fowler, the new incumbent, had affirmed his acceptance of the Articles of Religion before the congregation that morning, and was due to be inducted four days later. In the event, he had to perform the customary rapping for admission on a non-existent door.

The fire took hold very quickly. Mrs Gardener of East Hanningfield Hall despatched her manservant on horseback to Chelmsford, to the residence of Mr W. S. Butler, the agent of the Essex and Suffolk Equitable Fire Office. The fire engine took three-quarters of and hour to travel the seven miles, but found there was little that could be done, as the fire had spread with astonishing speed. The villagers had managed to rescue some furnishings and books, including the Communion cloth and clerical garments, but the heat was so great that the bells melted and fell as a shower of molten metal in the west end of the church. Later the schoolchildren sorted and saved the bell metal. The stained glass east window, dating from 16th century, was rescued by a fireman named Freestone, though I've yet to discover its whereabouts.

A 12th century piscina (a perforated stone basin used for carrying away water used in rinsing chalice etc) is held in the Colchester and Essex Museum. The most important treasure in the church remained covered by 14 coats of whitewash until 1940. The fine medieval wall painting, c. 1300, and one of the few church mural paintings in the county, was removed to the Victoria and Albert Museum after its discovery — it depicts Adam and Eve with spade and spindle, and St Catherine with her wheel sitting crowned beneath a gabled canopy.

For some years after the fire, the chancel was used as a mortuary chapel, before being declared unsafe and demolished in 1960. Sadly, the brass on the chancel floor in memory of a Lincoln's Inn Bencher, Richard Brydges 1606, was stolen about this time.

I would like to make a record of the details on those ancient tombstones. Please contact me if you are interested in helping clear the brambles and finding the oldest legible headstone. You may even be able to unearth some family history!





The salvaged metal was used by Meirs & Stainbank London Bell Foundry to recast the bells they had made for the old church in 1843. The bells all have names and their weights carved on them. There's a story that the builder was instructed to make all the frames and roof trusses on site using approved timber, to ensure good workmanship. However, in the absence of the architect when the roof was due to be framed, Mr Wood thought he could get away with using below-standard roof arches to increase his profit. The architect returned unexpectedly and Mr Wood 'the cowboy' was found out. His foolishness nearly bankrupted him.

The parishioners did well with their findraising, since the church with 250 'sittings' cost £3500 and was consecrated by the Bishop of St Albans in June 1885, just 18 months after the fire. The Rev Canon James Fowler who had been inducted amid the blackened ruins of the old church was most instrumental in the speedy rebuilding.

PC has arranged for the manned refuse vehicle to continue its monthly visits to the village hall carpark during 1993, but, take note, starting in FEBRUARY most visits will be on the FIRST SATURDAY OF THE MONTH. There will be no visit in December 1992. The next visits will be on 16 January, 6 February and 6 March, from 8.15 am until 11.15 am.

Please note that after the Christmas and New Year holidays, the refuse collection will be three working days later than at present. Therefore Thursday collections during 1992 willbe on Tuesday in 1993. Flease have your bin ready for emptying by 7 am.

FC has decided that as the 4th Thursday in December is Christmas Eve and the 5th is New Year's Eve, there will be no meeting that month. Instead there will be an extra meeting on 7 January. Thereafter meetings will continue as usual on the 4th Thursday of each month.

There follows a copy of the proposed byelaws for the regulation of dogs, which will shortly be submitted to the Department of the Environment for approval. The byelaws are to cover the Tye, which is the village green from Old Church Rd to the Three Horseshoes, and Hanna's Field, which is the two playing fields and the village hall Chase. Please read the byelaws carefully, because once adopted they will be law.

BYELAWS FOR THE REGULATION OF DOGS

Byelaws made by the Parish Council of East Hanningfield under Section 154 of the Public Health Act 1875 with regard to public walks, pleasure grounds and open spaces.

EXTENT

and open spaces or parts thereof described in Schedule 1, hereafter referred to as the 'dog prohibited area'.

(2) Byelaws 4 and 5 apply to the public walks, pleasure grounds and open spaces or parts thereof described in Schedule 2, hereafter referred to as the 'canine faeces removal areas'.

(3) Notice of the effect of those byelaws shall be given by signs placed in conspicuous positions at the entrances to the dog prohibited area, and at the entrances or on the approaches to

the canine faeces removal areas.

INTERPRETATION

- (1) In these byelaws 'the Council' means the Parish Council of East Hanningfield.
- (2) For the purposes of these byelaws, the keeper of the dog shall be deemed in charge thereof, unless the dog had been placed in or taken into the charge of some other person at the time when an offence under these byelaws had been committed.

 (3) In paragraph (2) above 'the keeper' shall include the owner of the dog or any person who habitually has it in his possession.

DOGS PROHIBITED FROM THE GROUNDS

3. (1) No person (other than a registered blind person) in charge of a dog shall, without reasonable excuse, permit the dog to enter or remain in the dog prohibited area.

(2) An officer of the Council, or any constable, may require a person in charge of a dog which has entered the dog prohibited area to remove the dog therefrom.

REMOVAL OF CANINE FAECES

- 4. Every person (other than a registered blind person) in charge of a dog which is in any of the canine faeces removal areas who, without reasonable excuse, fails to remove forthwith from any such area any faeces deposited by the dog shall be guilty of an offence.
- 5. For the purpose of compliance with Byelaw 4 the following provisions shall apply:
- (a) it shall be a sufficient removal from the canine faeces removal area if the faeces are deposited in a receptacle in any such area which has been provided for that purpose by the Council;
- (b) without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing it shall not be a reasonable excuse that a person in charge of a dog did not have with him any means of removal of the faeces.

REMOVAL OF OFFENDERS

6. Any person offending against byelaws 3(1) or 4 may be removed from the ground by a constable or by an officer of the Council

PENALTY

7. Any person offending against any of these byelaws shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 2

on the standard scale





There's an oft-repeated story - true or false? - about the time Mr Clark owned the property. Having the only accessible well in the village, he sold water at a halfpenny a bucket. Then he had the idea of making a fortune out of his monopoly and began charging a penny a bucket. The villagers decided that this was too much and chosea site on the village green opposite the Mill to dig their own hole. They found water, installed a hand-crank pump and filled their buckets for free, right under the nose of the would-be millionaire, whose own supply ran dry. There's a moral in there somewhere!

In 1894 water was piped to the village from Danbury, although regulations only allowed water to be drawn from taps between 8 and 9 am and 4 and 5 pm. It makes the recent hosepipe ban seem rather insignificant!

Mr and Mrs Castle owned the property at one time. He is remembered for repairing radios and charging dynamos in the first black shed to the left of the Mill - an important service in pre-television days. Mrs Castle was the founder of East Hanningfield Women's

Institute, and they gave the land in trust for the WI Hall.





Use of the hall increased, with consequential financial benefit, but the outdoor sports courts were affected by the poor weather and income was down slightly. Equipment in the play area was considerably extended by a village parents' group who worked hard on the scheme, both physically and in fundraising. They collected about £2500, and received £1000 from South Woodham Ferrers Lions Club. The trust has erected a fence to protect the area from dogs, which continues to be a problem particularly for football teams.

The year was marked by three functions. An Open Day was held to mark the 10th anniversary of the trust and discover the needs of the village for further facilities, but was poorly attended and no useful indicators were obtained. The annual Craft Fair was one of the best held so far, and income from it exceeded previous fairs In conjunction with Mr & Mrs Peek, the East Hanningfield Art Exhibition was organised and was very successful, raising over £800 to be shared between the trust and Guide Dogs for the Blind. The 1993 exhibition will again be a joint venture. I would like to congratulate the Fund-Raising Sub-Committee for their efforts which raise about £1000 each year.

Hall cleaning has been a problem, but after advice from the County Education Office, the cleaning needs were identified and a second-hand Ranger 38 (which scrubs, buffs and polishes) obtained. This has enabled Mrs Harvey with the help of her husband to remove the marks from the floors (previously costing £125 each time) and improve their appearance. Mr and Mrs Harvey have continued to give sterling service in the halls, field and with bookings and keys.

Tenders were sought for painting the main hall and the trust is indebted to Mr Dennis Sheldrake of the Badminton Club who offered to do the work free. Eastern Electricity carried out a safety inspection and, on their recommendation, an additional contact breaker was fitted in the kitchen. The electrical heating system is nearing the end of its useful life and options for replacement are being followed up. The Environmental Health Officer inspected the halls and kitchen in August and gave them a clean bill of health. The Music and Dancing and the Lottery Licences have been renewed.

A second carpet for carpet bowls has been purchased with additional equipment, enabling the trust to hire out two alleys simultaneously. Eventually the Bowls Club will own half the equipment. The hall is now used twice weekly for this sport.

Concrete bollards were erected by the sleeping policemen in the chase, wooden bollards were erected across the field at the SE corner of the hall, and a low fence placed across the carpark to prevent vehicles driving onto the fields.

New arrangements have been brought into force whereby keyholder/issuer duties were paid for by a modest sum according to need. An ansaphone was purchased and installed on Mrs Harvey's telephone to help her with booking for the halls.

In accordance with the Charities Act, 1992, the registration number of our charity will appear on all correspondence, accounts and cheques. The present accounting system, together with the chairman's annual report, should meet our obligations until our gross income exceeds £25,000 p.a. (presently around £15,000 p.a.)

During the year we held a 'brainstorming' session to identify the way forward over the next 5, 10 and 15 years. With the help of Robert Hutson, Architects, from The Mill, several outlines have been drawn up with various options: these include doubling the size of the hall floor to provide an additional badminton court, a carpet bowls alley and two squash courts. Another option is a mezzanine floor to provide function rooms, committee room, bar and toilets with storage space. Costs range from £60,000 to £100,000 and toilets will take place. Funding for such projects is fixely to be a major problem, as our present reserves of about £15,000 are likely to be needed to deal with deterioration of the carpark, excavation of the ditches around the field, new floors for both halls, new heating and lighting systems.

New charges will come into effect from 1 February 1993; this will be the first increase since the halls opened 6 years ago and should net about £1,000 to £1,200 extra per year. This will enable the trust to keep its head above water, but provide little for general expansion. Finally, the thanks of the village should go to all members of the Committee for their voluntary efforts during the year

The Hanna's Field Charity which runs the Village Hall, Sports Fields and Hard Courts, is considering the need for a person to act as Supervisor to this healthy and vigorous project - the annual report of which appears in this magazine.

No decision has been taken to institute such a post yet, but to enable the Charity to expedite any action decided upon, they are seeking to compile a list of possible applicants for the post.

The work would involve the day to day administration of the facilities such as ensuring that Invoices are issued, hirer satisfaction, the condition and repair of the Hall etc., and generally maintaining standards. The ability to take minutes would be advantageous. The scope of the work involved can be gleaned from the annual report.

The post holder would report to the Chairman of the Charity in the first instance, but may be required to tackle tasks, the oversight of which lies with other elected members of the Charity Committee.

It is anticipated that the work will occupy about 8 - 10 hours per week on average. There will be no set hours since the facilities operate 7 days a week, 52 weeks of the year and normally between 9.00a.m. and 10.00p.m.

Remuneration would be by negotiation. Applicants who must be adult, responsible, numerate and have an abundance of commonsense and confidence, should submit a brief note of their name, address and telephone number in a sealed envelope to "The Secretary to Hanna's Field Charity", c/o 5, Scarles Croft, East Hanningfield. They will be contacted in due course.







With a 50% subsidy from PC, the cost will be £1.25 per child per session which makes it an economical entertainment. Play week begins on 23 August for 8-11 year olds, and 25 August for 5-11 year olds. Younger children may attend if accompanied by an adult. We need volunteers for 25, 26 and 27 August to ensure that there are at least 3 adult helpers per session. Information posters will be displayed around the village during August.

A new noticeboard will soon be installed on the Tye. It will be larger than the present one and will be shared by Hanna's Field Charity. It is hoped that this will lead to a wider interest in the facilities and clubs operating in the Village Hall.

The bulk refuse vehicle will be at the Village Hall Car Park on 5 June, 3 July and 7 August from 8.15 to 11.15 am. This facility is arranged by PC for residents to dispose of large household items or garden refuse. At other times rubbish can be taken to the civic amenity site in Baddow Road, opposite Beehive Lane. At the end of June PC became aware of a proposal by ECC's Gypsy Sites Group to establish a gypsy site at Barnards Farm, opposite the Plough & Sail on the A130. VILLAGE HISTORY

At the time of Edward the Confessor (1042), East Hanningfield belonged to Normannus and at the grand survey for the Domesday Book in 1086, it was held by Ralph Barnard, Lord of Dunmow. His grandson William forfeited the estate by siding with the Earl of Maine and others against Henry I (1100-1135), so the King gave it to Robert, a younger son of Richard Fitz-Gilbert, ancestor of the Earl of Clare and Baron Fitz-Walter.

Records then refer to Lordships of the three Hanningfields being united under the ownership of the Montchensy family. In the reign of Henry II (1154-1189), William de Montchensy held Hanenfeld as part of his barony, by the service of seven knights' fees (not seven nights' fees!). He married the daughter of the Earl of Arundel. Their elder son married the Earl of Pembroke's daughter and had two children; William who died young and Dionysia who married Hugh de Vere, the Earl of Oxford's second son. He obtained a licence in 1299 to enlarge his park at East Haningfield, within the bounds of the forest within eleven acres of land. Dionysia died in 1313 and ownership of the manors of the Hanningfields passed to her cousin Aymer de Valence and then to his sister Isabell, wife of John de Hastings, Baron of Bergavenny.

Edward III gave Isabell's grandson Laurence de Hastings the title Earl of Pembroke and on his death in 1348, his year old son John inherited the manor of East Hanningfield and the 'advowson' of the churches of East and West Hanningfield. He had a son, also John who married Philippa daughter of Edmund, Earl of March, but sadly he was killed at a tilting at Woodstock, aged 17, in 1389. His father then settled the estates on his nephew, William de Beauchamp, younger son of the Earl of Warwick. His son and heir, Richard, was created Earl of Worcester in 1419 when aged 14. It is recorded that he was a brave soldier, attended Henry V in his wars and was slain at the seige of Meaux in France in 1422. His body was brought back and buried in Tewkesbury Abbey.

The barony of Bergavenny continued to hold 'the three Haningfields of the King as one entire manor' for the next 200 years until Edward, Lord Nevill, Baron of Bergavenny married Rachel, daughter of John Leonard, of Knoll in Kent. They had 6 sons and 5 daughters The eldest son, Henry, Lord Abergavenny, finally sold the estates to Lord Petre, Baron of Writtle. He died in 1635, but the Chief Lordship of the parish was held by succeeding generations of the Petre family.



PARISH COUNCIL

P.C. is pleased to announce that the County Council Gypsy Sites Group has kept its word to abandon the plan to establish a gypsy site at Barnards Farm, following the successful appeal by residents of the gypsy site at Runwell against enforcement action by Chelmsford Borough Council. P.C. objected most strongly to the Barnards Farm site as inappropriate for a variety of reasons and thanks our MP Simon Burns and our County Councillor Paul White for their support and assistance in this matter and also the many parishioners who wrote letters of objection to the County Council and the Department of the Environment.

The Byelaws for the Control of Dogs are now in force. This means that it is now an offence to allow a dog into the Childrens Play Area on Hanna's Field or to fail to remove dog faeces from the Tye or Playing Fields. There are now seven dog waste bins installed around these areas. There have been problems with the emptying of the bins which is supposed to be done weekly by contractors employed by Chelmsford Borough Council. This service has not been carried out satisfactorily and P.C. has made formal complaints to C.B.C. about the problem. If you find that one of the bins is full please contact me or the Chairman, Alan Dixon 400684, so that we can get the contractors out to deal with it immediately.

Residents of the village will have received notes about the Best Kept Village Competition and the Village Tidy-Up on 7th. May. Thank you to everyone who turned out to help with the Tidy-Up and also to those who tidied their own patches. The judges pay us two visits; one at the end of May and a second in June, so we need to keep up the good work!

A great deal of concern has been expressed about the activities taking place on what used to be part of Highfields Farm and is now called High Water Farm. Residents at the North end of the village are regularly suffering considerable disturbance at weekends. It is important that these events be monitored as there are legal limits to the numbers of each type of event which can be held on the site, but accurate records must be kept. The Environmental Health and Planning Services Department at Chelmsford Borough Council is compiling a diary of the activities at the site but relies on witnesses to keep it informed.



EXTRACTS FROM THE CHAIRMAN'S REPORT TO THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

P.C. responded to 21 planning applications during the year 1993/94. The most significant was the application by E.C.C. for a permanent Gypsy site at Barnards Farm, which was finally withdrawn when the Gypsy Site at Runwell was allowed on appeal. Also of great significance were the publication of the Chelmsford Borough Plan Consultation Plan and the reopened A130 public inquiry, to both of which P.C. responded. Close monitoring of events and liaison with C.B.C. departments is taking place with regard to the activities at High Water Farm.

P.C. hopes that C.B.C. will implement traffic calming measures at the entrances to the village and along the Tye within this financial year, and continues to press for a footway to be constructed between Abbeyfields and the School. Through its membership of the National Association of Local Councils P.C. is promoting policies for a requirement for parish councils to be consulted on applications for H.G.V. operating centres, and for a policy on rail transport to be an integral part of public transport strategy. P.C. is also pressing for publication of an up-dated map of the public rights of way. All footpaths in the parish have been walked by councillors.

P.C. had been consulted on and responded to a proposal to reform the structure of the police; a review of parliamentary constituencies; the re-organisation of local government in Essex; fair rating for the rural parishes; Mental Health, Orthopaedic and Plastic Surgery & Burns services within the local health service; and possible measures to maintain the viability of village shops.

In April a representative from Eastern Electricity attended a P.C. Meeting to explain the structure of the electricity supply network to East Hanningfield and the reasons behind the series of power cuts experienced earlier in the

In the village dog waste bins were installed and dog control byclaws came into force at Hanna's Field and the Tye on 1st. April. The refurbished noticeboard was re-located at the Bicknacre Road junction. The appearance of the village at the time of the judging for the Best Kept Village Competition was a credit to the community. The village green and playing fields continue to be cut by a contractor whilst the groundsman carries out smaller maintenance works. P.C. continues to arrange for the monthly presence of the bulk refuse collection vehicle at the Village Hall.

New office equipment was purchased to enhance the facility readily available to the Clerk. These items were an answerphone and a photocopier.

This brief resumé of P.C. work does no more than scratch the surface of the work carried out by P.C. ,through its members and Clerk, during the year. An enormous amount of reading matter is circulated, and members attend seminars, committees, site meetings, public enquiries, conferences and meetings and A.G.M.s of bodies to which P.C. is affiliated. Additionally small numbers of councillors form workings parties in order to consider specific topics for later consideration by full council.

Thus the work load has been considerable and I am indeed proud to chair a team that accepts their wide ranging elective responsibilities willingly and acts dynamically. I must finally give my annual thanks to the Clerk, who not only passed the first year in her Local Government Administration course with flying colours, but also managed to provide this council with her un-diminished efficiency, commitment and loyal support.







VILLAGE HOUSES

Rough Hill House, The Tye: 'A complex house, with numerous pitfalls for the unwary. There is no evidence for survival of in-situ remains from the hall house and crosswings shown on the Walker map. The oldest surviving parts seem to indicate an L-shaped house of c.1780, with some re-used soot blackened timber, which one assumes came from the previous building, and suggest a mid to late 15th century date. A top plate scarf remains from the c.1780 building, and is halved and bladed. Most of the structure is now painted and rendered brick, with a large late 19th century extension at the rear. There is, however, a long 2 storey weatherboarded wing, which is a relatively modern alteration, incorporating part of the c.1780 plan, and with a fine early 18th century pedimented doorcase. There are some good 18th century fire surrounds, and one very fine c.1820 surround from elsewhere.' (Extracted from survey report held at Essex Record Office).

PARISH COUNCIL

P.C. has arranged for the manned refuse vehicle to continue its monthly visits to the Village Hall car park during 1995. The next three visits will be on 3rd. DECEMBER, 28th. JANUARY & 25th. FEBRUARY, arriving at 8 am and leaving when full or at 11 am at the latest. As a reminder, the yellow posters will appear on the P.C. noticeboards a few days before each visit.

I have received notice from C.B.C. that as from the first Monday in January there will be a permanent change to all refuse collection days. Bins will be emptied three working days later than before the Christmas holiday, which means those of us who now have bins emptied on a Friday will have them emptied on Wednesdays during 1995.

A review of the Mobile Library Service in Essex is under way and the County Librarian is proposing to change the times of the visits of the library from its present Monday afternoon to Friday morning, 9.30-9.45am at Abbeyfields and 9.50-10.20am at Bridon Close. If you wish to make comments or have any queries about this proposal please contact the local Operations Manager, Mrs. Wendy Williams at Billericay Library, High Street, Billericay CM12 9AB, Tel: 0277 624624. The consultation process is expected to have been completed by 31st. December and the new schedules are to be put into operation in the Spring.

Also scheduled to take place in the Spring is the next Parish Council election. If only the present councillors decide to stand for re-election we shall be one candidate short of a full Council, because one of our present councillors is ineligible to stand as he has moved out of the parish. Now, a few months before the election, would be a good time for anyone considering the possibility of standing for election to the P.C. to start finding out what serving on a local council involves. After the election the Essex Association of Local Councils will be organising training sessions for new councillors, so inexperience should not stand in anyone's way. Please contact me for more information if you are interested.

There is still some dog excrement being deposited on the playing field and remaining there. Please remember that in the eyes of the law having brought nothing with which to pick up your dog's facces is no excuse for leaving it on the ground in the byelaw area. Parents should be aware that some children are removing the bags of dog faeces from the bin on the playing field. These children are obviously putting themselves and other children at risk. If your children play unsupervised at Hanna's Field, please tell them about the dangers of tampering with the dog bins.


A complaint from a resident of Bicknacre Road about the number of accidents which have taken place near the Highfields Mead junction was passed to the Technical Service Department at C.B.C. An investigation is now taking place as to how the traffic can be slowed down at this point with a view to the possibility of installing a 'gateway'. 



PARISH COUNCIL

P.C. has arranged for the C.B.C. run holiday activities to take place at the Village Hall again this year. The first event will be the Playday, for 5 - 11 year olds taking place on 11th. April from 10 am until 12.30 and 1.30 until 4 pm. During the Summer holiday there will be a two day playscheme, a visit by the Playbus and the Youthbus and two visits by the Sportsmobile. P.C. has funding and equipment available if there is anyone or a group willing to organise a locally run playscheme during the holiday.

The date of the P.C. election is 4th. May, but a poll will only take place if there are more candidates than scats. The new councillors will come into office on 8th. May, and as there is a requirement for the first meeting to take place within 14 days of that date, the first meeting of the new P.C. will take place on Thursday, 18th. May, which is one week earlier than the usual fourth Thursday of the month.

Over recent months, councillors have had several lengthy documents to study and produced responses to many of them. P.C.'s response to the commissioners looking into the Future Local Govt. in Essex was to support the status quo, but with more responsibilities delegated to district councils from county level and from district to parish level where feasible. P.C. supported the retention of East Hanningfield in a Chelmsford constituency when the Boundary Commission was reorganising Essex parliamentary constituencies. The Boundary Commission finally decided to put us in Rayleigh constituency, which P.C. thinks is most unsatisfactory. Most recently P.C. has responded to E.C.C.'s Draft Strategy Waste Plan & Waste Recycling Topic Report and North Essex Health Authority's Annual Report. The National Health Service is changing rapidly, and Susan Chadwick has continued to attend Mid Essex Community Health Council meetings on behalf of P.C. and reported back to P.C. on what is happening in local health care.

Please note that the next three visits of the manned refuse vehicle to the Village Hall car park will take place on the following SATURDAYS from 8am until 10.45: 25th. MARCH, 22nd APRIL & 20th. MAY.

P.C. is awaiting news of possible policy changes by E.C.C. on the funding of traffic calming schemes. If the policy changes in favour of schemes which aim to reduce speed, as the proposed scheme for the Tye does, East Hanningfield should be in a better position to have its scheme reach fruition. I have been informed that the criteria for giving priority to footway schemes are also being amended and it is hoped that the scheme to build a footway from Carpenters Cottage to the School entrance will then have more chance of success. P.C. is not permitted to fund these schemes itself and therefore has to compete with other parishes for funding from the County Council.

P.C. has decided to enter East Hanningfield for the Best Kept Village Competition again this year. It has also been decided to hold a Village Tidy-Up again. The date is yet to be confirmed, but will probably be on Saturday, 22nd. April, to coincide with the visit of the manned refuse vehicle. Posters will be displayed on the noticeboards nearer the time. If you are unable to join in with P.C.'s Tidy-Up, perhaps you could pick up the litter in your street or take a carrier bag for litter next time you go for a walk. The B.K.V.C. is judged on community involvement not on the prettiness of the village. Of course, tidying-up would not be necessary if litter had not been dropped in the first place.

Apart from the Meeting in May, P.C. Meetings continue to be held on the fourth Thursday of each month at 8pm in the Village Hall. Residents may speak during Public Question Time which takes place shortly after the opening of each Meeting.



VILLAGE HISTORY

A few months ago, Nicola Lovegrove aged 12 was digging in her garden in Ashley Green for worms for a friendly toad when she found a flint arrowhead. Excited by her find and wanting to know more about it, she took it to Chelmsford Museum. It was examined by Nick Wickenden, who pronounced it to be a particularly fine example of a barbed and tanged arrowhead of Early Bronze Age, c. 2000 BC. They have a few on display at the museum. Often flint is brought in for identification, but most are natural fragments and complete arrowheads are unusual. The flint-knappers must have been very skilled to chip off such fine flakes to make the blades. However, Nicola's delight soon turned to sorrow, when she received a letter from Mr Wickenden to say that his briefcase, containing the arrowhead, had been stolen. To console Nicola, Mr Wickenden is arranging for her to visit the museum and be given a replica of the arrowhead she found.

If you are digging in your garden this spring, look carefully as Nicola did. In 1975 two gold Bronze Age bracelets were found in West Hanningfield, and other similar articles were found recently in Woodham Mortimer. These included a hoard of buried Saxon coins called Scattas, pronounced 'shatters' in which the British Museum is interested.



Under 8s are welcome to attend these play sessions if accompanied and supervised by an adult carer. The YOUTHBUS for 11 - 14 year olds will visit on TUESDAY, 22nd. AUGUST from 12.30pm until 4.30pm. The Youthbus had a very poor attendance last year which if repeated will mean that we will not be eligible for it to come to East Hanningfield in future years, so this is a case of "use it or lose it".

There have been a few cases reported to P.C. of horses being ridden on public footpaths and the Tye. Riders are asked to note that if a person rides (or leads) a horse over a footpath he or she commits trespass against the holder of the land over which the footpath runs. (Similarly, a cyclist who rides on a footpath commits the same offence.) The Tye byclaws forbid the bringing of any horse, donkey or pony on to the land other than an unshod pony on a leading rein. Offending against a byclaw is a crime and therefore liable to prosecution. The reason for this byelaw is because of the damage horses do to the turf, which has to be repaired at public expense, through parishioners' council tax.

P.C. thanks all those who joined in the Village Tidy-Up on 13th. May and asks them to keep up the good work, because the Best Kept Village Competition judges make a second inspection of the village this month.

1994 was P.C.'s Centenary and, in order to commemorate it, P.C. started making plans for a permanent reminder of the first hundred years. Stan Gordon has been in charge of the project which will shortly culminate in the installation of a parish footpaths map in a glass fronted oak noticeboard. 



I passed the information on to C.B.C. who treat this problem very seriously as when this happens the contractor is in breach of contract, and it is a service for which we are all paying through our community charge.

If you do not wish to wait for the monthly visits of the manned refuse vehicle, refuse can be taken to the new civic amenity site at Drovers Way, Springfield, off the A12 Boreham Interchange, where recycling facilities are also available for cans, glass & plastic bottles, sheet glass, car batteries, engine oil, hardcore, household appliances, metal, paper and textiles. The site in Baddow Road has now closed.

distributing information and timetables, by lobbying the County Council to provide late evening and Sunday subsidised services and by keeping the bus company informed about the needs of the residents of East Hanningfield when these were not being met by the service provided. Since finding out that there were to be serious changes to the bus timetable, on 7th. At P.C.'s September Meeting, Mrs. Chris Moore, Area Programme Manager of the Rural Housing Trust will talk about affordable housing. Should P.C. decide to become involved in the provision of low cost housing for local people, it will be necessary to carry out a survey of housing need. If a questionnaire lands on your door mat, please take the time to fill it in; as always, the more answers which come back the more accurate the survey. In the meantime, if you or members of your family are having difficulty finding local accommodation, do come along to hear what Mrs. Moore has to say at 7.30pm on Thursday, 28th. September in the Village Hall.

The County Council's Planning Department has asked all the parishes in Essex to help them to record the pillboxes and World War 11 defence sites which remain, so that they may be protected if threatened by development. It appears that neither the Ministry of Defence nor the County Council has a complete record of these sites. E.C.C. has asked P.C. to appoint an individual or group to act as WW2 Monument Representative who will carry out a local survey of WW2 monuments such as pillboxes, spigot mortar bases, anti-tank obstacles and airfield monuments. I am sure that this would be a fascinating exercise for anyone interested in military history. Please contact me if you would like to take part.

P.C. maintains the village green at public expense through the council tax. It is therefore in the interests of all residents that damage to the green by parking vehicles, which are illegal anyway, should be prevented. With this in mind, P.C. has arranged for oak posts to be installed near the North end of the Tye to prevent parking on the grass. In the past, small concrete bollards were sufficient to deter illegal parking, but some of today's motorists have proved single minded in their determination to park illegally. Bollards have been moved, and sometimes ended up in the road which is very dangerous, and one of the previous oak posts was sawn off at ground level. Needless to say, if P.C. had a witness to this piece of vandalism it would pursue the culprit for the cost of replacement. Why should we all have to pay for one motorist's selfishness?







PARISH COUNCIL

Please note that the next three visits of the manned refuse vehicle to the Village Hall car park will be on the following Saturday mornings: 2ND. DECEMBER; 27TH. JANUARY; 24TH. FEBRUARY. Please do not leave any refuse at the car park. Grass cuttings and garden prunings have been dumped there in recent months, which is selfish on the part of the people who did it because someone else had to clear it up and unnecessary because this kind of garden refuse can be composted or put in your wheelie bin. On the subject of refuse collection, those of us who have their bins emptied on Wednesdays this year will have them emptied on Mondays from 8th. January, but in the last week in December the collection day will be Friday, 29th. Collections will not take place on Bank Holidays.

Complaints by residents about dog fouling continue. There is a Chelmsford Borough-wide byelaw which prohibits the leaving of dog excrement on footways (pavements) and verges, but it should not be necessary to use the threat of prosecution to persuade dog owners to behave responsibly and with consideration for other users of public places. The tide of public opinion has turned; the majority of the population is aware of the dangers posed by dog faeces and no longer finds it acceptable to see it on the street where people walk or the park where children play.

The Parish Council has decided to organise a housing survey. This is the first step in the process of providing affordable village housing for local people, as this will establish whether there is a demand for such housing and the number required. Please take the time to complete the questionnaire when it comes through your door, because the more answers that come back, the more accurate the survey will be. The survey will be completely confidential and will be asking questions about your family such as, "Has anyone in your family moved away from the village because there was no suitable accommodation here?" and "Is there a member of your family presently looking for local low cost accommodation?". You will not be asked to commit yourself and it will be perfectly acceptable for your questionnaire to be returned anonymously.

Essex County Council is currently carrying out a survey of Public Rights of Way in Chelmsford Borough as a preliminary to producing an up-to-date definitive map. E.C.C. does not want to know if you want to alter the route of a public footpath, that is a procedure for which you would contact the Borough Council, but is looking for evidence of discrepancies between the routes of footpaths on the ground and their routes on the present definitive map. For more information see the Parish Council noticeboards.

Users of the Tye footway and St. Peter's Way footpath will have noticed the new noticeboard at the Cobb entrance and are probably wondering when something is going to appear inside it. Stan Gordon has produced a very attractive and informative map of parish walks, which has been submitted to the County Surveyor for approval. Approval will mean that E.C.C.'s Parish Paths Partnership will fund the production of the map and the noticeboard to 100%. It will also fund the production of walks leaflets, so, although we seem to have been waiting a long time for the map to appear, the wait will be worthwhile.

If anyone or a group is interested in organising a Summer or Easter holiday playscheme please let me know as soon as possible. P.C. has funds available to cover equipment costs and hire of the Village Hall.

For a variety of reasons, the next three P.C. Meetings will not be held on the usual fourth Thursday of the month. There will be no Meeting in December because of the Christmas and New Year holidays. The first Meeting in 1996 will take place on Thursday 4TH. JANUARY, followed by 1ST. FEBRUARY and 29TH. FEBRUARY. Notices will appear, as usual, on the noticeboards three clear days before each Meeting. Members of the public are welcome to attend P.C. Meetings and may speak during Public Question Time. Also, it is often possible to see recent planning applications at the Meetings.


