At the time of writing, there is no further news about the future of the subpost office in East Hanningfield. The results of the Housing Survey have now been collated and sent to the Rural Housing Trust. There was only a 39% response to the survey, and it must be assumed that the 61% who did not return their forms have no objection to a possible small housing scheme for local people. Of those who did respond, many gave expression to very strong views, both for and against a housing scheme, and because some of the points raised were due to a lack of understanding of what the Rural Housing Trust does, the Parish Council asked me to explain it in some detail.

Some respondents to the Survey suggested that the 'Council' estate provides all the low cost or rented accommodation that this community needs. Unfortunately, it is not available for just anyone who wants it and much of it is now privately owned. There were many comments about the architecture of the Coulde Dennis estate, none of them flattering, and I can confirm that if the Trust does build in East Hanningfield it will not be using those designs. The examples of its housing which I have seen are all very attractive, and obviously designed to fit in sympathetically with their surroundings.

P.C. has received complaints that public footpaths are being churned up by horses, so P.C. has asked me to remind all riders that they should not ride on footpaths.

Chelmsford Borough Council Leisure Services Department has agreed to organise a one day playscheme in the Village Hall during the Easter holidays again this year. Activities already arranged for the Summer holidays include visits from the Youth Bus and Playbus and two separate play days.

Unfortunately, the County Surveyor is still holding the map of parish walks, which is the reason it has not yet appeared inside the new noticeboard. The map is not just functional as it has an attractive border of illustrations of parish land marks drawn by local artist Richard Higgins. It is hoped that it will be on display soon.



PARISH COUNCIL

Thank you to everyone who took part in the annual Village Tidy-up on 11th. May. Let us hope that the judges of the Best Kept Village Competition, who are looking for community involvement rather than prettiness, were impressed when they visited East Hanningfield in late May.

At long last the County Surveyor has approved the parish footpaths map and a copy of it has now appeared in the Centenary Noticeboard which is situated just off the Tye beside the Cobb entrance. The successful appearance of the map is a tribute to the perseverance of parish councillor Stan Gordon who has been working on this project for 18 months and is now in the process of producing a leaflet of parish walks. If you have any footpath problems, please contact Graham Parker who is P.C.'s Footpaths Officer.

P.C. has arranged with Chelmsford Borough Council for a variety of activities to take place at the Village Hall during the school Summer break. The dates of the following activities have been confirmed:

PLAYSCHEMES for 8 - 11 year olds

Fridays 2nd & 16th August, 10-12.30 & 1.30-4pm.

PLAYBUS/Picnic Play for under 8s accompanied by an adult,

Thursday, 8th. August. 10am-2pm. YOUTHBUS for the over 11s. Thursday, 25th. July. 12noon-4pm.

There will also be two visits by the Sportsmobile which was thoroughly enjoyed by those who joined in last year, even though the weather was extremely hot. Again these activities will be free of charge. There will be a charge for the football and netball coaching sessions. These will have to be booked with the Borough Council in advance and will cost in the region of £12 per child for five 90 minute sessions. P.C. will publicise these events nearer the time. Please remember that numbers are limited for coaching courses, so it is advisable to book as early as possible.

The sub post office moved into the portable building beside the Village Hall in time to open on Tuesday, 9th. April. It should be recorded that the Chairman Alan Dixon and the Vice Chairman Dennis Jacklin put a considerable amount of time and effort into the post office project and it is due to them and the decisiveness of the P.C. as a whole that the office was able to continue with only a minimal break. Thanks should go to Roy and Clare Liddiard who allowed the post office to stay in their restaurant a week longer than originally anticipated and to Joe Crace who adjusted his schedule to make time to fit out the portable building, and I am sure everyone has been impressed by the excellent job he made of it. Space prevents me from naming everyone who played an active part in this project, but they can be certain that their efforts are appreciated by everyone in the parish as well as by those people from neighbouring villages who come to East Hanningfield because their post offices have closed. Please take as much business as you can to East Hanningfield sub post office so that it will continue as a viable business to serve the community; USE IT OR LOSE IT!

Some residents have expressed concern about the changes taking place in the field beyond the playing field which at times have given the appearance of being quite drastic. P.C. has been kept informed about the works which have been carried out in consultation with the County Council. In fact E.C.C. has provided a plan for landscape improvements at the property, which will provide long term benefits to wildlife once planting and other works have been completed. Although St. Peter's Way runs along the edge of the field there is no 'right to roam' on this private property, and the owners are concerned that parents should be aware that it is now dangerous for children to play there because of the depth of the pond which has been desilted.

From the number of complaints received by P.C. recently it would seem that dog fouling on the playing field is getting worse. The playing field is there for children to play on and for everyone to enjoy healthy exercise, but how can it be healthy when the ground is covered with excrement? If you are one of the people who leaves your dog's excrement on the grass, think about the potential misery you could be causing by spreading gastro enteritis and even blindness in children; PLEASE SCOOP THE POOP.

Following a complaint from a resident that one of the willows on the Tye was causing a nuisance P.C. has consulted the C.B.C. arboriculturist and has been given a plan for remedial pruning which should improve the trees' health and guarantee their survival for many years to come. The works will be carried out soon. If you have a tree or trees and would like advice about their management, please contact me for the name and address of the arboriculturist who can advise and supply the names of reputable tree surgeons.

Please note that the manned refuse vehicle will be visiting the Village Hall car park on the following Saturday mornings: 15TH. JUNE; 13TH. JULY; 10TH. AUGUST. Between times large items can be taken to the civic amenity site at Boreham or arrangements can be made for them to be collected by C.B.C. Although it was expected that a new civic amenity site would open at South Woodham by 1st. April, there has been a delay, and the event is now expected to take place in the Autumn.

For some months I have been posting a copy of the signed minutes of the P.C. Meetings in the Tye noticeboard. If you have been reading them and wondering why they always appear to be out of date, it is because until they have been confirmed as accurate at the following Meeting they are not an official record and might be subject to alteration, so the published Minutes are always one month old.

Parishioners are always welcome to speak during Public Question Time at the monthly Meetings or can contact me or one of the councillors if they want to bring a matter of concern to the notice of P.C. Meetings are held on the fourth Thursday of each month at 8pm in the Village Hall.



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

PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council has had some weighty consultation documents to wade through this year. In March a lengthy response was sent to the Department of the Environment's Rural England white paper. This was a very important document as it set out proposals for future government policies for rural areas and communities. In May P.C. responded to the D. of E.'s proposals for rate relief for village shops and post offices; in June to Chelmsford Borough Council's Housing Strategy; and in July to Essex County Council's Waste Plan, E.C.C. Social Services's proposals for charging for non-residential community care services, and C.B.C.'s Towards The Millenium policy document. All these documents have implications for the future quality of life in our village and councillors spent considerable time reading and assessing the contents of each.

P.C. has also been considering possible ways of marking the Millenium in the parish and would be pleased to hear from parishioners with ideas. If you would like your idea put to the Council please let me know what it is by 12th. October, so that I can compile a report of all the suggestions in time for the October P.C. Meeting.

I expect everyone has heard by now that East Hanningfield won its section of the Best Kept Village Competition this year. Our village won it before in 1961 and 1968. There are no records of the entrants in the 1961 B.K.V.C., but in 1968 there were 14; three in the Small Villages Class which we won. This year there were 110 entrants; the largest class, which E.H. won, having 37. Well done to everyone who made a special effort; it

The Village Tidy-up which took place before the B.K.V.C. led to some discussion with C.B.C. about road side litter, which has not yet been completely resolved. C.B.C. does not clear litter from road side ditches because they are the responsibility of the landowners for whom they act as boundaries. This is unfair because most of the litter has been thrown from passing cars, but that is the way the law stands, and P.C. has asked me to remind landowners of their responsibility to keep their ditches clear.

As it is some years since the Tye Conservation Area came into being, P.C. has asked me to remind residents about the legal restrictions which apply to work on trees. If you wish to fell, lop, top or uproot a tree in a conservation area you must give the local planning authority six weeks notice, unless the tree is less than 3" diameter at chest height. If you are in doubt or need advice about your trees, the arboriculturist at Chelmsford Borough Council is there to help you.

At the last Police/Parish Councils liaison meeting the police representatives reported how members of the public are unaware of how they should use the 999 telephone facility; some will only use it in life threatening situations and others use it for very trivial matters. I have been asked to tell you to dial 999 if you think a crime is being committed, or if a fast response is likely to catch the perpetrators. The police have also asked me to tell you that they are looking for recruits to become special constables; information is available from local police stations.

Please note that the manned refuse vehicle will be at the Village Hall car park on the following Saturday mornings: 7TH. SEPTEMBER; 5TH. OCTOBER; 2ND. NOVEMBER.

There are presently vacant allotments. Please contact me if you are interested in renting one. Also, please could the allotment holders who have not yet paid this year's rent let me know if they wish to continue.

I have now one year left of my Local Policy course and have been given the opportunity to do an independent study. I have decided to do a field name study and have started to do the historical research, but I am not only interested in the old names; I should be very interested to hear from landowners in the parish who use or know names for their fields. Some of the more intriguing names I have found used in the early seventeenth century include Bushey Leaze Hills, Wyseleaze and Long Hose. The names I collect from East Hanningfield will eventually go into a data base which is being compiled for the whole of Essex.



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



PARISH COUNCIL

In the last EH News I asked for ideas from parishioners for possible ways of marking the Millennium. The response was minimal, so, if anyone has any ideas, please let me know how you would like to see the Millennium observed in East Hanningfield. One idea which came from outside PC, but which PC had already been investigating, is for the overhead electricity and telephone lines along the Tye to be put underground. What do you think?

PC's project to take the initiative to build the footway between Abbeyfields and the school, after fruitless years of waiting for the Borough Council to do it, has reached completion. The Borough Council could only do the work if funding was forthcoming from the County Council, but the scheme never got to the top of the priority list. PC circumvented the problem by applying to the Secretary of State for special sanction for extra-statutory expenditure. This allowed PC to spend money on a project which, under normal circumstances, it has no power to do as parish councils are not highway authorities. In view of the danger to pedestrians near the school, PC felt that the footway was not something for which parishioners should have to wait indefinitely.

A closely associated topic is the Village Gateway Scheme which involves improved signage, most of which has already been installed, and 'gateways' at the Common, Tye and Bicknacre Road entrances to the village. Although this scheme by the Borough Council is not as comprehensive as the traffic calming scheme contemplated by PC, it is a step in the right direction. As always, availability of funding dominates the provision of such schemes. PC has asked that consideration be given to reducing the speed limit through the village from 40 mph to 30 mph, as this would have the greatest effect on road safety, and is trying to get safety improvements for pedestrians at the Common Z bend, where conditions for walkers have been worsened by the road widening scheme. Replies are awaited. Following complaints about the speed of some traffic in Ashley Green, PC is investigating the possibility of traffic calming measures there. As most vehicles must be local, we appeal for drivers to reduce their speed in Ashley Green!

The manned refuse vehicle will be at the Village Hall car park on SATURDAY 7 DECEMBER from 8 am until approximately 10.45 am. Dates for next year's visits are yet to be received.

PC meetings take place on the 4th Thursday of each month, the exception being December's meeting which will be held on 2 January 1997.

<u>Vandalism</u>: The hall and children's play area have again suffered mindless vandalism by some young people in our village. These facilities are owned by the village and managed by the charity through fund-raising and booking income. Having to repair such damage is unfair on hall users and means less money is available to improve facilities for the benefit of the village. If your children use the field or play area please help them understand that causing damage is a criminal act for which they may be prosecuted, and also an antisocial one against friends and neighbours.

<u>Dogs:</u> There have been complaints about dogs not being under proper control on the playing fields and at the field entrance to the school. Dog owners are subject to the bye-laws for Hanna's Field. Bye-law 8 specifically requires: A person shall not cause or suffer any dog belonging to him, or in his charge, to remain in the ground unless such a dog be, and continue to be, under proper control, and be effectually restrained: 1) from causing

annoyance to any person; 2) from worrying or disturbing any animal.' So, if you take a dog on to Hanna's Field, please do not leave it unattended at the school entrance, allow it to attack or worry other dogs or enter the fenced children's play area, and please clear up after it!

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PARISH COUNCIL

Many of you will be aware that there has been a marked increase in vandalism in the past few months, particularly to property belonging to P.C. and Hanna's Field Charity. Contrary to popular belief, insurance companies do not pay for the repairs, because of the high excess brought about by previous bouts of vandalism. Every time a pane of glass or a lamp is broken the cost of the repairs comes out of the Council's or the Charity's reserves, and this in turn prevents that money being spent on something new for the village. Here is food for thought: the concrete litter bin in the children's play area, which was destroyed recently, had approximately the same cost as one of the cheaper items in the BMX street course range. P.C. and the Police would be very interested to hear from anyone who can identify the culprits.

I have also been asked to write about another kind of damage, this time it is the damage done to public footpaths by horse hooves. Horses should not be ridden or even led on a footpath: by doing so the rider commits trespass. The churning of the ground by the horses' hooves make some paths very difficult to walk, and walking by human feet is what they are there for!

Some time ago I mentioned the Millenium, but the response to P.C.'s call for ideas to mark the end of a thousand years was minimal. P.C. has decided to follow up the one suggestion which came forward. This was that the overhead power and telephone lines which cross the Tye should be buried under ground. P.C. has been investigating this possibility for some time, in particular where the money is to come from, so it is not a new idea. If you can think of something better or have some comment to make about this project, please let me know.

The response to my short questionnaire about the possibility of having some BMX equipment in the village was also very disappointing. So far there have been only seven replies! If you do not wish to deface your copy of the Spring Newsletter or have already binned it, a signed note saying how many of your children would use the course or ramp, if provided, would be sufficient. It must be very disheartening for the young people who have raised this issue to know that the adults of the village have let them down.

It is about eighteen months since a good many of you responded to P.C.'s housing survey, and now some of you are going to be asked to participate in another survey. This time Fordham Research Services are surveying the whole of Chelmsford Borough for the Borough Council. Please take the trouble to contribute if you are asked, so that the results will be as accurate as possible and give a clear idea of the local housing needs.

- * Only use dishwashers and washing machines when they are fully loaded
- * Mulching is the best way to preserve moisture in soil.
- * Fast- growing weeds rob plants of moisture, so weed regularly.
- * Train children not to clean their teeth under a running tap.



PARISH COUNCIL

At last, after years of waiting we have, not one but, two recycling points in the village, at the Village Hall car park and the Windmill. It is hoped that the convenience of having the recycling bins so close to home will mean they will be well used, <u>BUT</u> they are here due to the good will of the Village Hall and Windmill managements. Please do not abuse that good will by leaving rubbish around the bins, including plastic bags, bottle tops and items which will not fit in the bins, because if the siting of the recycling points proves to be a nuisance we could well lose them.

You have probably noticed that the Best Kept Village sign has gone, because we did not repeat our success of last year. In fact, according to the judge's mark sheet, we did particularly badly. In the short time between the village tidy-up and the judging, litter had been left in the telephone kiosk and bus shelters. The judge was also critical of the signs of vandalism and the dog mess in the children's play area. Obviously, we have some very antisocial individuals in the village, who are spoiling the place for the majority who take a pride in living in well maintained and attractive surroundings.

With the help of a 50% grant from Chelmsford Borough Council, P.C. has had another street lamp installed at the Common. Over the years, every effort has been made to rid the village of dark spots so that pedestrians can walk safely after dark. If you think there are still areas which need extra lighting, please let me know.

Those of you who read the notices on the notice board on the Tye will have seen that several pages of accounts appeared there a few week ago. The new Accounting and Audit Regulations require P.C.'s accounts to be displayed in a public place for a period of 14 days following the audit. The Regulations also stipulate the format in which they are to be written, which many people are finding confusing. The original idea of the new Regulations was to make parish councils' finance more open and comprehensible to the public, but the result so far is that the accounts are more complicated, take longer to complete and cost more to be audited. Essex parish councils are not accepting this situation without a fight, and I shall be taking part in a county wide meeting this month which aims to produce alternative, more simple accounting requirements which it is hoped will replace the new Regulations.

P.C. has continued to respond to all planning applications submitted for consultation, and most of these have been fairly ordinary, but it was considered that the development of Hyde Hall could have far reaching implications for the village. This was because of the proposed traffic management scheme, which proposes to direct all traffic to and from the site via East Hanningfield Road, Rettendon. This would mean that a good proportion of that traffic would come through East Hanningfield. The development of the Garden as a tourist attraction has been accepted in the Local Plan, so P.C. is not able to object in principle, but has suggested alternative methods of traffic control which would decrease the volume of traffic from the site passing through nearby communities.

P.C. is also to be consulted on applications to remove hedges under the new Hedgerow Regulations. There has long been concern that, unlike trees, hedges have not been protected, so the Regulations have been welcomed. Our parish has some very old hedges, some of which have great significance for local history. so P.C. awaits details of the Regulations with interest.

P.C. was recently consulted on the draft County Structure Plan. This was the plan proposing an increase of 84,600 dwellings in the County before the year 2011, 52% of which are to be concentrated in the Chelmsford, Colchester, Maldon and Braintree districts in what has been labelled the Strategic Development Corridor, which is the area along the A12 between Chelmsford and Colchester. It is accepted that the road and rail network will not be able to cope with forecast traffic flows expected within the next 10 years, so such a large increase in housing in the one area can only bring forward the grid-lock. P.C., with several other councils in the county, objected to the Plan.

Recently, several residents expressed their alarm at the loss of the Victorian post box and would have liked to have seen it installed elsewhere in the village. Although it has been replaced by the Edwardian pillar box, also a rarity, it has not been lost to the village. Royal Mail has promised to keep it ready for installation when a suitable place becomes available.

All those who recently responded to the recent public consultation concerning Footpath 16 will be interested to know that the proposed diversion is to be reconsidered by the C.B.C. Environment Committee, due to the overwhelming response.

Ideas for marking the Millenium continue to trickle in. Thank you to everyone who has been in touch. There is still time to tell P.C. your ideas. Watch this space for the final decision in the new year!





PARISH COUNCIL

There have been some recent changes to P.C. In August, Richard Range resigned his seat on the Council when he moved away. He had first been co-opted on to P.C. on 25th. July, 1985 and in addition to the usual duties of a parish councillor had overseen the construction of the sports courts at Hanna's Field and had taken an interest in P.C. finance. I am sure everyone wishes him and his family well in their new home. Hopefully, his place will have been filled by co-option by the time this Newsletter reaches you, but if you are interested in taking a seat on the Council you have another chance. Dennis Jacklin, who joined P.C. on 28th. March, 1985, is also to move away shortly and so will leave another seat vacant. Dennis has also been a very active member of P.C., being presently the Vice Chairman and overseeing village maintenance. He has in the past been heavily involved with Hanna's Field Charity as has Sheila his wife: obviously they will be missed by many in the village when they go.

Another loss to P.C. is our representative to Mid Essex Community Health Council. After eight years, Susan Chadwick has decided it is time to let someone else take a turn. She has provided valuable reports to P.C. of the Community Health Council meetings through a time of tremendous upheaval in the health service, keeping councillors informed of events. I am speaking for the whole community when I thank Richard, Dennis and Susan for all their efforts on behalf of P.C. over the years.

Please let me know if you would like to become a councillor, P.C.'s representative to the Community Health Council, or even both, and please contact me if you would like more information about what is involved in either post.

As yet, there is no news from the Rural Housing Trust as to whether enough people have registered interest in the affordable housing scheme for it to go ahead. I must emphasise that the houses will only be built if the Trust is assured that there are more than enough families to fill them. Also, if you leave making your application until building starts, then there will be no house for you, because no houses are built 'on spec'. Application forms are still available from P.C., for rented and shared ownership housing, but you

must apply to the Trust very soon as a decision about the scheme must be made shortly.

The recycling bins at the Village Hall car park seem to be well used. Unfortunately, their arrival has coincided with a spate of bottle breaking around the Hall and sports courts. Whether the bottles for this latest village entertainment are taken from the bottle banks, brought to the playing field specially to be broken or are the remains of heavy drinking sessions *in situ* is presently a matter for conjecture! On the other hand, there is little doubt that the broken bottles which keep appearing on the footpath behind the Old Forge are evidence of clandestine boozing.

I have no news for you concerning the manned refuse vehicle, except that there will be no visit in December. Should Chelmsford Borough Council agree to continue providing the service next year, the dates will be posted on P.C.'s noticeboards.

A very positive meeting took place at the Village Hall on 12th. November, when Krysia Dodson of the Essex Youth Service came to meet local young people to find out what youth activities they would like in the village. To give everyone a better idea of what the Youth Service can provide it was agreed to organise a visit to Galleywood Youth Centre on Wednesday, 10th. December. This will be on an evening when the Centre is normally closed so that the East Hanningfield group will have the facilities all to themselves. Parents will be allowed to go along for the first half hour. Anyone who missed the meeting but is interested in the Galleywood trip should contact me, or David Cottey at Bethel Church, for a consent form (the Youth Service needs parental consent to take young people on visits, and needs to know the numbers going in order to book the coach). There is no cost involved.

The Autumn and Winter is traditionally a time for hedging, so it is appropriate for us all to take a look at the plants which overhang our boundaries to check that they are not hitting passers by in the face or getting in their way. Remember, not everyone who lives in the village can see well enough to avoid these leafy, or thorny, obstructions.

Please note that there will be no P.C. Meeting in December. The next Meeting will take place at 8 pm in the Village Hall on Thursday, 8th. January, 1998, and thereafter on the fourth Thursday of each month. Shortly after the opening of each Meeting an adjournment allows parishioners to speak to the Council during Public Question Time.



You are probably aware that you can pay your phone and electricity bills at the Post Office and save the price of a stamp, but did you know that if you bank with Lloyds or the Co-op you can cash cheques and pay in cash or cheques at East Hanningfield Post Office? T.S.B. customers will also have the same facility soon.

Those of you who like to walk the local footpaths will have had some difficulty on one particular path because it has been churned up by horses' hooves, and I am sure will join me in asking the guilty riders not to ride on paths, which are intended for human feet, when the ground is soft.

P.C. recently received the very good news from Eastern National that Service 33 is to be improved. Starting on 7th. March, the Service will continue to operate between Bishops Stortford and Southend, but most journeys will now serve East Hanningfield, Broomfield Hospital and Southend Airport. So we shall have our hourly bus service back! The new timetable leaflets should be available from Eastern National now.

By arrangement with C.B.C. Leisure Services Department, there will be a PLAYSCHEME at the Village Hall on TUESDAY, 7th. APRIL. The opening times will be 10am - 12.30pm and 1.30pm - 4pm and children aged 5 - 11 years are invited to attend. Younger children will be welcome if accompanied at all times by an adult carer.

The Essex Youth Service is now bussing 10 - 13 year olds to Galleywood Youth Centre on Wednesday evenings. The bus is free and children only have to pay their 50p admittance to the Youth Centre each time. I understand that the very popular music studio will be available for use each week! It is necessary for parents to complete a consent form before a child can be transported by the Youth Service, and there should be some spare forms available from me or from David Cottey at the Bethel Church.

Other age groups have not been forgotten! Young people from East Hanningfield are invited to attend any of the following sessions at the Galleywood Youth Centre, Watchhouse Road, Galleywood:

The vehicle should arrive by 8 am and will leave at approximately 10.45. Due to problems caused by children removing bottles from the recycling bins, our mini recycling centre is to be removed and replaced with bins of a different design. Hopefully, the change will result in a decrease in the amount of broken glass at the playing fields.

The Rural Housing Trust tells me that there is still a chance that your application for affordable housing will be considered if you send it in quickly. At the time of writing, I unable to say whether or not a housing scheme is going to go ahead, but I can say that there has been a good deal of interest expressed in the housing. 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

PARISH COUNCIL

The Rural Housing Trust's scheme for affordable housing in the village has moved one step further on because P.C. has now agreed to support in principle a scheme at the Highfields Farm site for five houses for village people in perpetuity. The next stage of the project is for architectural plans to be produced and a planning application to be submitted. This will be an opportunity for everyone to make their comments to Chelmsford Borough Council on the planning aspects of the proposal.

If you have been reading the Minutes on the P.C. noticeboards, you will already know that a Working Party has been formed from members of P.C. and Hanna's Field Charity to investigate the possibility of building an extension on to the Village Hall which could provide improved facilities including more secure accommodation for our Post Office and more space for shop goods. As an attempt is going to be made to secure Lottery funding, the project has become far from straightforward even at this early stage, but the Working Party it doing its utmost to get the project off the ground as quickly as possible due to the series of security problems which the Post Office has experienced in its present quarters.

Also of a persistent nature has been the series of vandal attacks on the P.C. noticeboard near the Bicknacre Road junction. Repeated repairs are being paid for out of the council tax, not from insurance payments, so it is in every local council tax payer's interest to bring the problem to an end. The P.C. would be very interested to know the name or names of those causing the damage.

On a happier note, the Village Tidy-up took place on a beautiful sunny morning. It was very pleasant to have an excuse to be out in the sunshine! Thank you to everyone who took part: you did an excellent job.

There has been some concern expressed that bicycle riding on pavements is not only on the increase but is taking place at high speed and with no regard for the safety of pedestrians. If you think you have the right to ride a bicycle on the pavement please refer to the Highway Code.

The vacancy on P.C. which arose due to the resignation of Dennis Jacklin was filled by Les Draper, so P.C. is now up to the full strength of seven members again. As yet, no-one has offered to fill Susan Chadwick's place as the P.C. representative to Mid Essex Community Health Council meetings. These take place four times a year and circulate between Chelmsford, Braintree, Maldon and Kelvedon and start at 7.30 pm. The two remaining meetings this year will take place on 17th. August at Maldon and 23rd. November at Kelvedon. The other meetings take place in February and May. Please let me know if you are interested in taking on this post.

The next three visits of the manned refuse vehicle to the Village Hall car park will take place on the following Saturday mornings: 13th. JUNE; 18th. JULY; 15th. AUGUST.

As in previous years, P.C. has arranged for the usual Summer holiday activities to take place at the Village Hall. There will be two visits by the Sportsmobile, two visits by the Playscheme, and one visit each by the Youthbus and the Playbus. All these activities will be free of charge. Posters will publicise the events from the beginning of the school holidays.

As required by the Accounts and Audit Regulations 1996, the accounts for the year ended 31st. March 1998 will soon be displayed on the P.C. noticeboards, following the audit. Those who read the Minutes will know that P.C. has successfully contested the very high fee occurring from last year's audit: District Audit has now admitted making a mistake with the audit and is to reduce the fee by more than half.

There have been numerous consultation documents for P.C. to consider recently. In addition to the Draft County Structure Plan, which is the document proposing a concentration of new house building in the central districts of Essex, there have been several documents coming from the Department of the Environment, Transport and the Regions proposing very wide ranging changes to local government. They have all required detailed study to establish what consequences they would have locally and some detailed responses have been sent by P.C.

I have been told that our bus service has been improved with additional evening services, but have no details as yet. Anyone using the bus in the evenings would be well advised to obtain a copy of the new timetable.

P.C. Meetings are held in the Village Hall on the fourth Thursday of each month, and usually begin at 8 pm, unless a long Agenda requires an earlier start. Meeting notices and Agenda are displayed on the P.C. noticeboards beforehand.

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
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

PARISH COUNCIL

P.C.'s Chairman Alan Dixon, in his report to the Annual Parish Meeting in May, recounted how P.C. had responded to 13 consultations during the previous 12 months, and commented that the year had been the busiest he could remember in 25 years. Since then, P.C. has dealt with a further nine consultations (3 from Chelmsford Borough Council, 3 from the Department of the Environment Transport and the Regions, & one each from the London and South East Regional Planning Conference, Essex County Council and North Essex Health Authority) and is aware of more to come, so the pressure continues.

One of the topics mentioned by the Chairman in his report was the poor condition of the water main along the Tye and P.C's repeated requests, usually coinciding with yet another burst, for the main to be replaced. P.C. has recently been informed that the main is now scheduled for replacement shortly.

The P.C. Hanna's Field Charity joint Working Party has been busy with the Village Hall project. An architect has now been appointed to carry out a feasibility study. The study will be advantageous when applying for grant aid and absolutely essential when applying for National Lottery funding. It will find out what the community wants from the Village Hall, so every household will be consulted. Please take the time to respond to the questionnaire that you will be receiving shortly: the more answers which are returned the more representative and the more valuable the study will be. This will be your opportunity to contribute to the future of the Hall and its facilities.

The Playschemes organized by the Borough Council and held in the Village Hall attracted far fewer children than in previous Summers. I should be interested to hear from anyone who can offer an explanation, such as weather too hot, wrong days of the week or anything else so that I can provide Chelmsford B.C. with feedback. On the other hand, attendance at the Youthbus was higher than usual and the Playbus and Sportsmobile were well attended.

Autumn is the appropriate time for hedging and tree pruning, and P.C. already has some work planned for the pyracantha and the willows on the Tye. If you have public paths to the front, side or rear of you property, please check that pedestrians are not having to step off the path to avoid your trees or shrubs, remembering that some residents have impaired vision and are not always aware of leafy or thorny obstructions.

The July Meeting was attended by representatives from Essex and Suffolk Water and County Emergency Planning, who talked about the storage of chlorine at the Hanningfield Treatment Works beside the reservoir and the plans which would be activated in the very unlikely event of a chlorine gas leak. You have probably heard the siren which is tested every Friday morning: if you hear it at any other time it will be warning of an emergency at the Works, which is intended for site staff and residents living in the immediate vicinity of the Works. Basically, the advice given to residents is, if they hear the siren, they should go indoors, close all doors and windows, go upstairs and tune in to the local radio station. If you are interested in the processes which take place at the Works, I have been provided with some leaflets and will be pleased to pass on copies on request.

I have been informed that the Rural Housing Trust is still accepting applications for the affordable housing scheme for local people, so there is still time to send your form in if you want to be considered.

Please note that the manned refuse vehicle will be at the Village Hall car park on the following Saturday mornings from 8 am until 10.45 am: 19TH. SEPTEMBER, 17TH. OCTOBER, & 14TH. NOVEMBER. There will be no visit in December. This facility is for household and garden refuse, but you are reminded that there is a composting scheme for garden waste at the civic amenity site in South Woodham. On a connected matter, residents are asked not to leave waste paper or any other rubbish by the bottle and can recycling bins at the Village Hall car park.

Sadly, I have to report a third resignation from P.C. in 10 months. Stan Gordon resigned his seat at the end of June. Stan joined P.C. in 1991 and was always an active member. The parish walks map, which he compiled, will be a lasting reminder of his time on P.C. (if you have not seen it, it is displayed just back from the Tye at the Cobb entrance). P.C. thanks Stan

for his considerable contribution to the Council's work and is pleased that he has offered to continue on the Village Hall project Working Party.

P.C. Meetings continue on the fourth Thursday of each month. They take place in the Village Hall at 8 pm. Shortly after the beginning of each Meeting, Public Question Time gives parishioners the opportunity to ask questions or to bring matters to the notice of the Council. If you decide to write to the Council, your letter will be considered during the Correspondence item of the Agenda.

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

PARISH COUNCIL

On a cold November morning, the Chairman and I took a Chelmsford Borough officer around the village to show him the traffic problems and to discuss possible traffic calming measures. There have been questions asked by a number of village residents recently as to how and why Howe Green has achieved a reduced speed limit of 30mph, and nothing has seemed to have happened here. The answer is that we are not going to get a lower speed limit on the main road through the village until there are some measures in place to reduce traffic speed physically. This means an inevitable delay while plans are drawn up and funds found, but P.C.'s willingness to contribute to the cost of traffic calming, which is now permissible under recent legislation, should help the process along.

By the time of publication, the Open Day at the Village Hall will have taken place, and the Hanna's Field Charity/P.C. joint Working Party will be preparing its final report concerning the future of the Hall. The response to the feasibility study questionnaire was well over 40%, which will stand us in good stead if or when an application is made for lottery funding.

You will be aware of the Royal Horticultural Society's garden at Hyde Hall, in the neighbouring parish of Rettendon, but you might not be aware of the Society's plans for its future. Hyde Hall is going to be developed into the Society's principal visitor centre in this region. P.C. is concerned that traffic to and from the site will increase substantially while Buckhatch Lane is used as the access, but also that the proposed new access via a new road joining East Hanningfield Road in Rettendon will direct traffic through the communities of East Hanningfield, Rettendon Common, Howe Green and Bicknacre. P.C. is therefore seeking the support of neighbouring parish councils to make a joint objection to the proposed new road, with a counter proposal that the access should be via the Shaws Farm roundabout at the farther end of Creephedge Lane.

Please note that there will be no manned refuse vehicle visit in December or January. The next visits will be on the following Saturday mornings: 13th FEBRUARY & 13th MARCH, in the Village Hall car park as usual from 8 until 10.45am. On an associated subject, those of us who have had domestic refuse collections on Tuesdays during 1998 will have the final collection of the year on Thursday, 31st. December and during 1999 collections on Fridays.

On 6th. May, 1999 there will be Borough and Parish Council elections. Although Borough scats are always contested, several parishes, East Hanningfield among them, do not always have enough candidates for a poll to take place. This means that candidates are returned unopposed, and sometimes people have to be co-opted to make

up the required number of councillors. Although not having a poll means that the parish would save the cost of about £500, there is a good deal of criticism that returning whole councils unopposed is undemocratic. Whatever you feel about the democratic process you might like to consider being nominated for election in good time before the final decision has to be made nearer to election day. Notices of Election will appear by 26th. March, and nominations will be accepted, at Chelmsford Borough Council, from that date until noon on 8th. April. If you want to vote on 6th. May but find you are going to be away from home, C.B.C. will be accepting applications for postal votes until 5pm on 20th. April.

You will remember that last year the County Youth Service began bussing young people to the Galleywood Youth Centre on Wednesday evenings. So far this term, numbers interested in taking part in this service have not been high enough for it to be started up again. If you are aged 10-13 years and are interested in this service which has no cost implications, even the sessions at the Youth Centre are now free of charge, please get in touch with me for a parental consent form. If you are aged 14 years or over, you are invited to attend the Monday and Friday evening sessions at the Youth Centre, but will have to make your own arrangements for transport. As well as the usual snooker, tabletennis and arts and crafts the Galleywood Youth Centre has a coffee bar with tuck shop, a music studio plus instruments including guitars and drums, video cameras and lots of space.

For about seven years, Clare Seymour has been editing this Newsletter with skill and dedication. She has now reached the decision that other responsibilities which she has will prevent her from doing justice to the post of Editor, so she has tendered her resignation. P.C. would like to thank her for all the work she has done on behalf of the Council and for the community as a whole, and wish her well in the future.

At the time of 'going to press' no-one has answered the call to take up the post of Editor. Please contact me if you are interested. Clare has provided me with a job description which will explain what is involved.

Please note that the December P.C. Meeting has been postponed until 7th. January. Thereafter Meetings will continue on the fourth Thursday of each month, at 8pm in the Village Hall.



PARISH COUNCIL

P.C. has continued to receive numbers of long consultation documents which have required in depth consideration and detailed responses. The Essex and Southend Waste Local Plan was controversial enough to reach the local press. P.C. was obviously not supportive of a major waste management site and possible incinerator upwind at Sandon, but also criticised the Plan for its lack of direction towards the three Rs, Reduction, Reuse and Recycling. The South East Regional Planning Conference's 'Sustainable Development Strategy for the South East' covered such issues as house building allocation across the region and 'sustainable transport'. Amongst many points raised, P.C. argued for a commitment to improve rail services; for public transport to be integrated; for housing to be fairly distributed across the region, including in the green belt; and against road tolling.

Also, recently P.C. has responded to North Essex Health Authority's 'Health Improvement Programme', the Essex and Southend Replacement Structure Plan, and two documents concerning the Replacement Chelmsford Borough Local Plan: 'Development Principles' and 'Urban Intensification Issues'. The Local Plan contains detailed local planning policies such as what can be built where, so it is important to follow its development at every stage.

P.C. has also been involved with the development of the Borough Crime and Disorder Strategy, and is currently preparing a response to Essex Police's Review of Rural Policing.

P.C. has been informed recently that funding is not immediately available for traffic calming in the village, and that until funding is available the plans will not be produced. P.C. is contesting this on two fronts: firstly, by arguing that we really do not need speed restraints to qualify for a reduced speed limit; and secondly, that if a costed plan could be produced, P.C. would be able to consider making a financial contribution towards the installation of physical speed restraints.

On the subject of the budget, many residents of the parish are probably unaware that P.C. is repaying loans for the purchase of the playing field and the construction of the Village Hall. Repayments this year will amount to £1,852.

At the moment there is nothing concrete to report on either the Rural Housing Trust project to build affordable housing for local people in the village, nor the Village Hall extension project. Both projects are going through necessary processes, but with nothing visible to show for it at the moment.

Those of you who read the Essex Chronicle Community News section or the P.C. Minutes on the noticeboards will be aware of a rat problem, and that two foxes had died from a disease associated with rats. The Environmental Health Department at C.B.C. is monitoring the rat problem, so if you see rats or find any dead wild animals please let them know.

Please note that the Manned Refuse Vehicle will visit the Village Hall car park on the following Saturday mornings from 8 until 10.45: 13TH. MARCH; 17TH. APRIL; 15TH. MAY.

P.C. has arranged for a Borough Council run EASTER PLAY SCHEME to take place at the Village Hall on THURSDAY, 1ST APRIL. Sessions will run from 10am to 12.30pm and 1.30pm to 4pm. Under 8s will be welcome but must be accompanied by an adult carer at all times.

P.C.'s Meetings continue on the fourth Thursday of each month, in the Village Hall at 8pm. The first Meeting after the election will be an exception, because it has to take place within a statutorily prescribed time, so will be on 20th. May.

If you are interested in standing for election for a seat on P.C., please let me know, as I have an information pack which you could borrow, which will give you a good idea of what being a councillor involves. Nomination papers will be available from C.B.C., and from me, and should be returned, completed, to the Returning Officer at C.B.C. by noon on 8th. April. The Borough Council will also have an information pack available for potential parish councillors, which can be obtained from the Returning Officer at Civic Centre, Chelmsford CM1 1JE or by phoning 606449.

Lastly, P.C. wishes to thank Daphne Sherry for stepping into the breach to take over the post of Editor. Although P.C. pays for the printing, the production and delivery of the News is a totally voluntary effort, and is a service which deserves appreciation from the whole community, so this would be an appropriate time to thank all the distributors, including those who have had to give up recently and those who have recently volunteered.

Correspondence intended for consideration by P.C. should be directed to the Clerk at 2 Clinton Close. Question Time, towards the beginning of the monthly Meetings, allows members of the public to bring to the notice of P.C. matters of concern, or, of course, to ask questions. Parishioners are welcome to attend the monthly Meetings to listen to the discussions which take place on a wide variety of matters which have a local impact.

YEWS FOR THE MILLENNIUM

Taxus baccata, the churchyard Yew has many links with Christmas, perhaps the most obvious being that it stands beside so many of our parish churches. Among the other common names for this tree is palm and palm tree, for its fronds have been in religious festivals up until recent times.

Many of these churchyard Yews are venerable specimens and research over the past 15 years have shown that a number of them predate not only the church but Christianity itself. Yes some of these trees were alive in our green and pleasant land while Christ lived out His life upon this earth.

This longevity and the fact that they could be cut again and again re-sprouting strong new shoots were the stuff of parables signifying resurrection and rebirth. Little wonder then that they were linked to many stories both true and untrue. Whether the cross on which Jesus died was made of Yew is still a matter of conjecture, however in olden times the traditional Yule log was yew, a timber slow to burn and so in great demand for legend has it that as long as the log still burned the servants could drink the master's best ale or cider or whatever was on offer.

Many of the most ancient wooden artifacts found in the peatbogs of Europe are made of yew. These range from implements belonging to the recently found ice man to wonderful drinking cups and objects of votive significance.

Of Saint Columba who founded a settlement on Iona (the Yew Isle) from which he set forth to evangelise the mainland, it is written. "though he feared death and hell the sound of the axe in the grove of Derry frightened him still more".

The Derry to which he referred is in Ireland where he had built an oratory of wood. facing not east but north toward Caer Arianshod and its Yew Trees.

Yews, there is no getting away from the fact that yews are very much tied up with Christianity, the Life of Christ and so with Christmas.

So as we approach the celebration of 2000 years since His Birth, the Conservation Foundation has taken cuttings from yew trees that we believe to be at least 2000 years old and they are on offer to all parishes who would like to celebrate the Bi-millennium of their faith by planting one in their churchyard or some other appropriate place.

Already 5000 parishes have reserved their tree including East Hanningfield. Each parish can have one free, but a 'limited edition' tree will be for sale to those who would like to celebrate the Millennium in private gardens, farms or private woodlands. The income raised will enable the Conservation Foundation to continue protecting and recording the country's ancient Yews and will also set up a fund to help churches unable to afford the proper care these ancient trees deserve, so safeguarding their unique place in history – a living link across 2000 years.



COVER ILLUSTRATION: The Pond, Old Church Road.

The Pond appears on the Walker map of the parish, drawn in 1615, which can be seen in the Essex Record Office.

The Pond is historically significant because of its association with the Park, which is known to have been existent in 1299, when Hugh de Vere had license from Edward I to enlarge his park at East Hanningfield. At this time parks were status symbols which were expensive to create and maintain. Their purpose was to provide hunting, which was a rich man's sport and a source of fresh meat in the Winter. Evidence for the location of the Park is provided by the Walker map and the local name Lodge Farm which denotes the hunting lodge. Park Corner was a field name still in use in the middle of the nineteenth century.

Fish was a necessary part of the diet during Lent and on fast days, so fish ponds were an important element of any park, therefore the Pond in East Hanningfield's Park was probably a fish pond.

You will no doubt have noticed that we had Parish and Borough elections on 6th. May. A poll was unnecessary for the Parish Council as there were seven candidates for the seven seats, so all were returned unopposed. All the candidates were council members prior to the election, so the new term will continue from the old with the minimum of disruption. In case you are unaware of the identity of your Parish Councillors, they are Peter Applegate, Alan Dixon, Les Draper, Mike Feehan, Graham Parker, Penny Waters and Ian Wigglesworth. Alan Dixon was re-elected as our Borough Councillor, so we have continuity at both of those levels of local government. Both Borough and Parish Councillors will serve for a term of four years.

In the last News I referred to the budget process and P.C.'s Precept of £15,238 for the 1999/2000 financial year. How P.C. is allowed to spend your money is very strictly controlled, and to make sure the rules are being followed, P.C.'s accounts are audited annually by the District Audit (Audit Commission). The books are with the auditors for a month, and are there now. Copies of the audited accounts will be available for purchase following completion of audit. P.C. has been building up its reserves over several years, although there was a noticeable drop when the footway between Abbeyfields and the School was built a few years ago! The reserves are there in case of emergency expenditure and in readiness for a major project which, if all goes according to plan, is going to be the Village Hall extension. They presently stand at £23,198, although £2,748 of that is earmarked for specific expenditure such as the £1,000 towards the games wall project being planned by Hanna's Field Charity.

Please note that the manned refuse vehicle will be at the Village Hall car park from 8 until 10.45 am on the following Saturday mornings: 12TH. JUNE; 17TH. JULY; & 14th. AUGUST. Please do not leave any rubbish at the car park if you miss the refuse vehicle. The recent Village Spring Clean left the Village Hall surrounds looking their cleanest for a long time, thank you to everyone who took part: you really did make a difference! With the co-operation of all the residents of the village we could keep it looking tidy.

Although I have no definite news about the affordable housing scheme for local people, at the time of going to press, I am assured that the project is about to move to its next stage, and more information should be available within the next week or so. I understand that the major hold-ups have been caused by the cost of clearing the site, and the concept of local allocation which the local housing authority have had trouble digesting as a prerequisite of the scheme. The Parish Council and the Rural Housing Trust have always maintained that the scheme is for local people only, and would not go ahead otherwise.

The Parish Council is presently giving consideration to the Report on the Village Hall Feasibility Study, and the Working Party has been asked to consider continuing with a view to producing a business plan for the Village Hall Project.

Consultation documents have continued to flood in from various levels of government. Most recently there have been "Integrated Transport in Essex" and the "Schedule of Proposed Variations" to the County Structure Plan from Essex County Council; the "Borough Local Plan Issues Report" from Chelmsford Borough Council; and "Rural England - A Discussion Document" jointly from the Department of the Environment, Transport and the Regions and the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. County and Local plans set the planning policies for several years into the future, and in particular, what can be built and where. P.C. considers it essential that there should be a local input when these plans are being formulated. Although P.C.'s will be one small voice amongst many in the response to the DOET/MAFF document, it is important to use this opportunity to tell central government about local issues and concerns, and about the problems associated with living in rural areas.

For the foresecable future, P.C. Meetings will continue on the fourth Thursday of each month, in the Village Hall, at 8 pm unless extra business requires an earlier start. Notices of Meeting appear on the P.C. notice boards by the Sunday previous to the Meeting. Members of the public are invited to attend the Meetings to listen to the proceedings and may ask questions during Public Question Time, which takes place shortly after the Meeting opens. 

These need careful consideration, because such plans as the closure of Creephedge Lane to motor traffic might cause residents of East Hanningfield more inconvenience than its benefits warrant. P.C continues to promote the provision of a 30 mph speed limit through the village centre Written support from residents to the Borough Council would add weight to P.C.'s case.

I have been informed by the Principal Emergency Planning Officer at the County Council that the Tidal Flood Sirens System will be tested on Thursday, 2nd. September, at 6.30 pm so there will be no need to worry when you hear the sirens.

P.C. Meetings continue on the fourth Thursday of each month, and take place in the Village Hall at 8 pm. A break shortly after the beginning of each Meeting allows members of the public to ask questions and bring issues of local concern to the notice of the Council Correspondence for consideration by the Council should be addressed to the Clerk, and arrive by the Friday before the Meeting in order to be included with the Agenda.



CARE AT CHRISTMAS

As the Christmas and New Year period fast approaches, having consulted with your local Neighbourhood Watch group, we felt that a few words on security may be appropriate.

At the moment all appears to relatively quiet on the crime front for all areas in our area, but we must not be complacent. Historically I have found that crime tends to increase in the weeks leading up to Christmas so we all need to be aware of the dangers and consider what all of us can do to remove the temptation from the criminal.

The obvious thing to do is have a light on in your house from dusk until bedtime or have a number of lights controlled by a timer coming on at different times of the evening. Let your neighbours know you are going away and leave a contact number with them or at South Woodham Police Station so we can contact you in emergencies.

If you are going away a give-away that the house is empty is there not being a car in the driveway. If your neighbour has more than one car consider asking them to park one in your drive.

If you are staying at home over Christmas don't put all your presents under the tree on Christmas or better still don't put them out until Christmas morning. The criminal knows there will be lots of things for him to steal at this time of year and he knows that most people will pile them up for him so its easier for him to steal.

Finally I emphasise that this area is a safe area to live and crime is relatively low. You can be assured that your local Police officers will be around and about the holiday period 24 hours a day.

PARISH COUNCIL

Traditionally, this time of year was used in rural areas for hedging and ditching, which is a good reason to remind those with trees and shrubs on their boundaries to go and check that they are not causing any kind of obstruction for people or vehicles passing by. On the subject of ditches, Chelmsford Borough Council has asked me to remind all property owners that it is their responsibility to ensure that the road side ditch in front of their property is clear. According to C.B.C.:

The last two winters have, due to high rainfall, seen a considerable increase in the number of flooding incidents along public roads and on private property within the Borough. Many of the problems have been as a result of the lack of maintenance e.g. cleaning, regrading etc. of the roadside ditches and drainage systems by the adjoining landowners who are responsible for such works. In many instances, the landowners are either not aware of their responsibilities or put the problems down to exceptional weather conditions. The Borough Council has limited funds for such work and also believes it only right that those that own the system should be responsible for it.

At the time of writing there was still no sign of the planning application for the affordable housing scheme for local people, but the reason for the delay is both sad and understandable because it has been caused by the recent death of the owner of the site. Obviously, the development process will be at a standstill for a while.

There is a little more to report on the Village Hall project. I understand that the officers at Chelmsford Borough Council's Planning Department are recommending that the planning application for the Hall extension be granted. The Working Party recently met officers from various departments at C.B.C. to discuss an application for grant aid for the project. It is now a matter of waiting to see if the application will be successful. The Working Party has also approached the Charity Commission, on behalf of Hanna's Field Charity, to confirm that the presence of the shop/post office complies with the criteria of the Charity Commission's Rural Regeneration Scheme, there is a good chance of obtaining lottery funding. Other sources of grant funding are being investigated including Essex Environment Trust and Essex County Council.

As part of the P.C. contribution to the project, P.C. has applied for loan sanction, this is the permission required for a local council to borrow money. P.C. has borrowed before: to purchase Hanna's Field and to contribute towards the construction of the Village Hall. The loan for the Field will be paid off shortly. The new loan, if needed, will be for a maximum of £40,000.

On a lighter note, Royal Mail has decided that the Victorian letter plate, which used to be on the front of the post box in the former Post Office, is unsuitable for postal use

and has donated it to P.C. It is intended that it should be put on display inside the new Village Hall extension.

I have been told informally that the arguments against the installation of a 30 mph speed limit in the village have been dropped at another level of local government. This means that East Hanningfield should now be on the list of sites waiting for the lower speed limit, but this does not mean that we will automatically get it, because the proposals will go through a consultation period and there might be some objections. I therefore suggest that supporters of the lower speed limit keep an eye on the back pages of the Essex Chronicle for the consultation notice, and write in support to the Borough Council when the notice appears. Thank you to everyone who has already written to the Parish and Borough Councils on this matter, because public support really does make a difference.

Still on the subject of speed, P.C. has contacted Essex Police's Traffic Section to request speed checks in the village and on the A130. You have been warned!

Those of you who use the Village Hall Chase after dark will have noticed that a new street lamp has been installed at the Main Road end. P.C. had it installed and obtained a 50% grant towards the cost from C.B.C. Please let me know if there are any other dark spots in the parish which need illuminating.

In response to requests for assistance, P.C. is presently helping the Rainbow Club and Preschool with financial support towards the rent they pay for use of the Village Hall.

At the time of writing, C.B.C. has confirmed that the manned refuse vehicle will continue its monthly visits to the Village Hall car park during 2000. Dates have yet to be announced but will be publicised by the usual posters.

Please note that although the December P.C. Meeting will take place on the fourth Thursday as usual, which will be 23rd, the following Meetings will take place on the third Thursday, which is 20th January. Thereafter, Meetings will return to the fourth Thursday of each month. If you have a matter which you wish P.C. to consider at one of the monthly Meetings, please ensure that I have it in writing at least five days before so that the information can be circulated to councillors with the Agenda papers. If you have questions for the Council you may attend one of the Meetings and speak during Public Question Time, but, obviously, if you think your question might need some research to answer, forewarning might be appropriate.

HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY - VILLAGE HALL

MOUNTAIN BIKE TRACK: By the time this newsletter is delivered the work to convert the spoil mound in the far corner of the south facing playing field to a mountain bike track should have been completed. The track layout was planned with help from youngsters in the village (thank you Chris Mills and others) and we hope they will see it as something they have a vest interest in and will look after. The reason for delays since the idea was first suggested has been the need to get planning permission and competitive tenders.

The track will NOT be ready to use until the fence around it has been removed by the Charity. This is to allow the track to consolidate and it may take as long as a month so if you have youngsters in your family eager to use it please ask them to be patient and not to go on it until the fence is removed. When it is ready we shall have a grand opening! The track is ONLY for use by children and teenagers from this village (not adults!) and using bikes (not Motor Bikes!). A wide tarmac path has been provided to allow cyclist to get to and from it without cutting across the grass, as this will damage the turf.

If you do have youngsters who want use the track please note that they do so at there own risk! The Charity cannot supervise it, or provide first aid so please visit the track yourself and make sure you are happy to allow your child to use it. It is your responsibility to make sure your child has the right bike, safety clothing, and bike skills to use the track safety.

HEDGES AND DITCHES: People who walk on the playing fields regularly will also have noticed that the Charity has taken the opportunity of the work of the mound to do some long delayed maintenance work along the field's hedge and ditches. This is in part has been necessary due to a history of flooding of both fields in late winter from the adjacent Buttercup field.

The work has been done by a Borough approved contractor and, although the cutting back may seem extreme, it is in fact necessary to promote the long-term health of the hedge. Experience shows it will soon recover and thicken out as a result.

FOOTBALL PITCH: The Football Club has not used the south facing field for football for a number of years because of surface undulations. The Contractor doing the present ditch and mound work will rotavate and re-level the pitch in the spring.

In the meantime a set of goal posts have been provided by the Charity and installed by the Football Club for youngsters to use on this field. A low bank of earth has been placed along the path adjacent to the Hall to deter youngsters from using this area for football. This is necessary because of damage to the Hall wall cladding and turf, but

also because of the annoyance it causes to Hall users. In the longer term the Charity is still looking at the possibility of providing a wall elsewhere on the field for this purpose.

CAR PARK AND CHASE: Some people have commented on the condition of the Chase and Car Park. The Charity has set aside funds to re-surface these, and mark out the car park again, however we wish to do this after work on the proposed hall extension because of the potential damage from heavy plant. In the meantime we will continue to patch holes as they appear.

SEPTEMBER FETE: The fete was both well attended, and we are happy to report, made an excellent profit, so thanks to everybody who attended and helped. The net profit was £1,603 divided equally between the Charity and All Saints Church. This was marginally down on the previous year but, as that was the best result for three years, still a very good result. Some figures of merit – The Grand Draw made £907 (a marvellous result!); Tombola £162; and surprisingly, the white elephant stall £67 (thank you to all the people who donated items this year).

H.F.C. MEETINGS AND A.G.M.: The Charity's next meeting will be on Wednesday the 15th. December, in the Village Hall. The next meeting after this will be the AGM at 7.30 pm on Wednesday 16 February 2000. The AGM is the point at which the new Management Committee is formed and there is also an opportunity for villagers to ask questions so if you are interested in the running of the Hall, playing fields and other facilities come to the AGM, and join us for a glass of wine at the end. Look out for posters in the Village Hall and on notice boards.

CHRISTMAS & NEW YEAR BOOKINGS: The Hall will be closed from 25th.-28th. December inclusive and on 31st. December and 1st and 2nd January, (apart from the party which is already booked) and will be open on the 29th, and 30th, for sports bookings, not parties. Normal opening will resume on Tuesday, 4th. January.

VILLAGE HISTORY.

To celebrate the Millennium, two thousand years since Jesus Christ was born, churches throughout the land, including All Saints, will be ringing their bells at 12:00 on January 1st. Here in East Hanningfield we have three bells. Their weights and inscriptions are as follows:

They were cast at Whitechapel Bell Foundry in London by Messrs Mears & Stainbank Provision was made for a fourth bell to be hung alongside the existing three.

The bells are hung in a metal frame in the belfry. They can swing in a complete circle, the rope passes over a very large wooden wheel which is grooved to guide the rope. When the bells are chimed, they are just swung until they sound, but when the bells are rung, they are pulled mouth upwards until they rest on a back stay, which prevents them going in a full circle. Each time a bell rope is pulled, the bell swings almost upright and then back to rest. This ringing position gives a much clearer tone.

The bell ropes have a coloured 'Sally' – this is wool which is woven into the rope to prevent the ringer's hands from being cut due to the friction. Our bell ringers are: Sally Scurrell, Philip Mitchell, Martin Harcourt-Williams and they are assisted at family services by young Lawrence Wright. We are grateful to them for the beautiful and traditional sound that we hear in the village on Sunday mornings and on special family occasions.





PARISH COUNCIL

During the warmest days of last Summer there were many complaints from residents that the smell from muck-spreading on nearby fields was preventing them from spending time in their gardens or having windows open. Also, there have been suggestions that the plagues of flies we have from time to time are a result of manure spread on local fields. P.C. has been involved in a dialogue with the Environmental Health Department at Chelmsford Borough Council about this problem and has invited an officer to come to the P.C. Meeting on 30th. March. (Please note that this is the Meeting originally scheduled for 23rd. March). As is customary when there is a guest speaker, the Meeting will begin earlier than usual at 7.30 pm. There will be an opportunity for members of the public to ask questions so, if you are interested, please come along.

There will be a one day Easter Play Scheme for children aged 5-11 years at the Village Hall on Thursday, 20th. April, manned by staff supplied by C.B.C. All the usual activities will be provided and admission is free of charge. Younger children will be welcome but they must be accompanied at all times by an adult carer. The sessions will run from 10am-12.30pm and 1.30-4pm. There will be no lunchtime supervision, so please make arrangements for your children to come home for the lunch break. The dates of the Summer holiday activities are yet to be arranged.

I have been asked to remind residents who use the post box on the Tye that if they visit it by car they should show some consideration. It seems drivers are reversing their vehicles at various points along the Chase behind the former Post Office and damaging property in the process. Obviously, they are displaying very poor manoeuvring skills and have probably not considered the solution to the problem of finding their cars facing the wrong direction after the mail has been posted. The very simple solution is to reverse into the Chase!

I am often asked after the progress of the Rural Housing Trust affordable housing scheme for local people. The most recent news is that, although several months have been lost due to the probate issue, the scheme is starting to move forward again and the Trust is hoping to submit a planning application soon. C.B.C. has a policy of notifying neighbours of sites which are subject to planning applications, and the application will be listed on the P.C. Agenda which will be posted on the P.C. notice boards, so it will be well publicised when it happens. I understand that the Trust is still accepting applications for the housing, although the waiting list is quite long now.

There is not much to report on the Village Hall Project. The Working Party is presently negotiating with the Charity Commission for acceptance of the inclusion of commercial premises within the Hall extension. If the Village Hall Project can comply

with the Commission's Rural Regeneration Programme funding should be relatively easy to achieve.

There can be no-one who has not noticed the mess on the Tye created by the contractors installing the new water main and embellished by the numerous BT engineers working there. All are being pursued for reinstatement P.C. intends that no council tax payers' money should be spent restoring the Tye to its former condition.

The manned refuse vehicle will be visiting the Village Hall car park on the following Saturday mornings from 8am until 10.45am: 11th. MARCH, 15th. APRIL, 13th, MAY. Between visits you can take bulky items of household waste to the civic amenity site/recycling centre at South Woodham Ferrers. Please do not leave any rubbish in the Village Hall car park.

You will be aware that construction work on the new A130 is scheduled to start before Easter. This will have some impact on local traffic movements. There are going to be temporary speed restrictions in numerous places near the construction work, so make sure you are aware of the changes. Also, from 25th. February, Hoe Lane, Rettendon, will be closed at a point just beyond the row of houses with traffic diverted along South Hanningfield Road; the Hawk Hill slip road off the A130 at Battlesbridge will be closed; and part of Hawk Hill will be one way only, so if you are travelling to Battlesbridge you will have to go via the access at the further end of the bypass. CountyRoute, the company appointed to design, build, fund and operate the new road has set up a telephone line so that they can be contacted about issues regarding the construction of the road. The number is 0845 3511 and calls will be charged at the local rate.

With the exception of the Meeting on 30th. March all P.C. Meeting during the rest of the year are scheduled for the fourth Thursday of the month and to begin at 8pm. All Meetings include Public Question Time when members of the public can raise issues with the Council. Alternatively, you can write to the Council by sending your letter to me.

ALL SAINTS CHURCH

Fourteen years ago, the world suffered its most dreadful nuclear accident yet. It was at Chernobyl in the northern Ukraine. Since then, people in the surrounding region – particularly in southern Belarus – have suffered from the effects of radiation which still today poisons their environment. They should not be farming the land. It is too badly contaminated. Yet they can not afford to import food, so simply have to cat poisoned food

The Chernobyl Children's Project is a national charity which exists to (a) give medical and other aid and (b) offer children holidays for recuperative purposes. Which is where we come in.

We are part of the mid – Essex area and will, together with others, be hosting about fourteen children from 14th July to 11th August. Apparently, one month's fresh air and clean food can boost a child's immune system sufficiently for them to improve their chances for the next two to three years of not suffering serious disease.





VILLAGE HISTORY

I am sure that many of you were aware of the recent OFSTED Inspection at our Village School. These days the teachers & the children are closely scrutinised to ensure that standards are satisfactory and all the various Government guidelines implemented. Schools today are still required to keep a Log Book, just as they were over a hundred years ago. Below I have selected some of the entries from the Log Book for our village school 1876 - 1884:

New girls admitted Emily Saffill, Mary & Susan Gibbs. Visit from Miss Smyth with freesias

Children away pea-picking, so attendance low.

Rev. Smyth called to hear children repeat tables.

August average 23.3, as some children harvesting.

New boys admitted John & Henry Saffill. Few days later, same two sent home to wash.

Miss Smyth visited with some lady friends.

Half holiday for funeral of rector's son.

Scarlet fever claimed the life of one of our little girls, Emily Spurgeon

Smaller attendance due to weather being wet

Summary of Inspector's Report: The results of the exam are not satisfactory, reading is unintelligent and the arithmetic of 2nd & 3rd standards is defective both in notation and working. Instruction generally seems to be too mechanical in its nature. Children should not be allowed to talk whilst at work. A classroom for the Infants is much to be desired & a map of the world is required. The issue of a certificate is deferred until a more satisfactory report is received.

Miss Julia Florence Tookey commences as Schoolmistress with her sister Miss Harriet as

Received 2 doz new slates, pen and box of pencils.

Attendance improving, average 57

Exams held, results better and papers cleaner.

Miss Whittingdon came to examine the knitting and later to give the Catechism lesson

The choir children went to the Festival in Chelmsford

School Managers gave prizes to those who had made 380 attendances in school year.

Still a lot absent for pea-picking

1881 - diphtheria is about in the village, Edith Brown died from it.

Many cases of measles and also whooping cough later in year.

Meeting of School Managers, agreed that weekly school fees be increased to two-pence for each child of Second Standard & upwards, children below that to be charged one penny.

Received map of Essex, also capital and small alphabet cards 1884 Foundation stone of new church being laid, a holiday was given. Rev & Mrs Fowler visited school to distribute frocks and hats to poor children who were to join in procession

Miss Georgina Baker took over as Headmistress and reported that she was 'somewhat pleased with behaviour of some of the children especially the boys, but others are very rude and bold'.



Please note the dates of the following Summer holiday activities for children: for children aged 5 to 11 years there will be playschemes at the Village Hall on Monday, 24th. July and Friday, 18th. August, from 10.30am to 12.30pm and 1.30pm to 3.30pm; for children aged 5 and under, who must be accompanied by an adult carer, there will be 'Picnic Play' at the playing field on Thursday, 10th. August from 10am until 2pm; and for children aged 6 and above there will be tennis coaching at the tennis courts on Friday, 11th. August from 1.30pm until 4pm. All these activities will be free of charge, Chelmsford Borough Council providing the staff and P.C. providing the premises.

In the last edition of the News I reported that P.C. was determined that the Tye should be returned to its former condition, but not at council tax payers' expense. The Chairman and I have had a long site meeting with representatives from the Water Company and they have agreed to reinstate the Tye to P.C.'s requirements and will send there own staff to maintain the areas which need special treatment while the seeded and turfed areas cannot be mown. Unfortunately, the work is not being carried out as quickly as P.C. would wish, so the Water Co. has been reminded of its obligations.

The manned refuse vehicle will be visiting the Village Hall car park on the following Saturday mornings from 8am until 10.45am: 10th JUNE; 15th JULY; and 12th AUGUST. If you miss the visits, please do not leave any rubbish in the Village Hall car park. Household and garden waste may be taken to the civic amenity site at South Woodham Ferrers.

Members of the Village Hall Project Working Party recently went to London for a meeting with the Charity Commission, and from that meeting have established the way to proceed with the Project. It has taken some time and a certain amount of determination to get definitive answers from the Commission, but now that has happened the Project can move forward.

Recently councillors and clerks from this and neighbouring parishes attended a meeting organised by *CountyRoute*, the company building the new A130, in order to keep us up to date on developments. The main problem seemed to be rain, which was causing our local clay to be too sticky and heavy to move, but it was not thought to be so much of a problem that the opening in November next year would have to be delayed. *CountyRoute*'s telephone number for issues regarding the construction of the new road is 0845 3511.

Still on the subject of the A130, residents are reminded that the Police are regularly monitoring speed long the new lengths of speed restricted road. Those of you who

read the notice-boards will have seen the notice about the consultation concerning the proposed 30mph speed limit in the village. Results of the consultation are awaited.

There have been complaints about dog fouling on the footway in Bicknacre Road. There can be no-one who is unaware of the dangers to the health and safety of the public caused by dog excrement in such places, and I believe the majority of dog owners are now being responsible by clearing up after their pets. P.C. is considering installing more dog bins, in the hope that this will encourage more responsible dog ownership amongst those who are continuing to be anti-social at present. So, it would be very helpful if the dog owners in the village could let me know where new bins could be most usefully sited. P.C. is considering the small area beside the Bicknacre Road junction where the white notice-board stands; the Highfields Mead sight splay, and the Abbeyfields sight splay. What do you think?

The planning application for the affordable housing scheme for local people is still awaited. Please contact me for an application form if you would like your name to be added to the waiting list.

Thank you to everyone who joined in the Village Tidy-up on Saturday, 6th. May, and to those who have been making a special effort to tidy their immediate surroundings in time for the Best Kept Village Competition. The judges' comments are awaited.

P.C. has had a considerable number of consultation documents to study recently. The introduction of *Best Value* at other levels of local government means that this level of consultation will continue. Although P.C. is expected to embrace the principles of *Best Value*, it does not have to produce its own strategy documents, but is still noticing an increased workload due to the documents, produced by other authorities, arriving for comment. One very important document currently under construction is Chelmsford Borough's new Local Plan. P.C. is taking an active interest in this document which will determine where housing and industrial development in the borough will be built. The question is not how many extra houses there will be, because the figure of 7,700 has been decided in regional and county plans, but where they can be best placed. Possible developments at Howe Green and South Woodham Ferrers would have an impact on East Hanningfield.

Please note that P.C. Meetings continue on the fourth Thursday of each month, and take place in the Village Hall at 8pm. Shortly after the beginning of each Meeting there is an adjournment so that members of the public can ask questions or raise matters of concern. If you are unable to attend the Meetings, but would like an issue to be considered by the Council, you can contact P.C. by writing to me.

How much do you know about Hanna's Field Charity?

The Charity was created under a trust deed by The Parish Council of East Hanningfield dated 16th December 1982. The purpose of the Charity was to look after the field known as Hanna's Field and the village hall that had built on it for the use and benefit of the inhabitants of the Parish of East Hanningfield. At that time the management committee was made up by twelve representative members and twelve elected members. The organisations to be represented were: All Saints Parochial Church Council, Bethel Evangelical Church Sunday School, Chelmsford Karate Kyokushinkai, East Hanningfield School PTA, East Hanningfield Football Club, East Hanningfield Playgroup Association, East Hanningfield Table Tennis Club, East Hanningfield Women's Institute, First East Hanningfield Brownie Guide Pack, First East Hanningfield Scout Group, Lisirikwai Judo Club (East Hanningfield).

Several of the above organisations are no longer in existence and new organisations have taken their place in the village; Neighbourhood Watch, Short mat bowls: Badminton; Netball, Line Dancing being some of the new users of the Hanna's Field Facilities.

I was elected Chairman of Hanna's Field Charity in February this year. Our first committee meeting of the year had to be postponed as insufficient committee members were able to attend. The Committee is currently in a state of change with several of the long serving stalwart members deciding that they needed a rest after many years of service to the Charity. If you are a user of the hall or village facilities have you considered coming along and helping run your village hall and sports facilities? If we do not get some more active committee members the Charity is in danger of being wound up and the facilities which you or your children might wish to use will cease to be available in the future.

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EAST HANNINGFIELD PRIMARY SCHOOL

Our school was inspected by OFSTED - the Office For Standards in Education - in January of this year and the report was published in March.

The inspectors found that the school successfully promoted very positive attitudes to learning and high standards of behaviour. They also noted that teaching standards were good, with a significant proportion described as very good. The report said 'The school provides an appropriately broad and balanced curriculum with a very good range of extracurricular opportunities.' The team described the teaching of English, mathematics and science as good and they were pleased with the teaching of children with special educational needs. Effective links with parents were also regarded as a strength of the school.

The main area identified for improvement was the teaching of Information and Communication Technology. However, in ICT we are working hard to improve standards and with the help of the PTA's fund-raising we have recently installed a new computer suite.

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/ILLAGE HISTORY

Thanks to the Walkers of Hanningfield we have a good idea what our village was like during Shakespeare's time! The Walkers in question are not those who walk the Essex Way the ramblers often seen in the village or those who recently to raised funds for the Chelmsford Hospice or School, but John Walker Senior, John Walker Junior & Samuel Walker, who were outstanding craftsmen in the years around 1600. They were commissioned by Essex county gentlemen to make maps & draw up written surveys of their estates In all 22 maps remain; the earliest is West Tilbury in 1584 & the last known is of Laindon in 1705, but the one of greatest interest to us is the detailed map of East Hanningfield made in 1615 by John Walker Sen. & John Walker Jun.

The shape of The Tye, many properties & fields are much the same today as on the 1615 map. Like most cartographers of their time, their maps are enhanced by small drawings of churches, manor houses, cottages, farm buildings etc., attractively coloured in reds & greens. However, the Walker maps are remarkable for their accurate surveying, excellent draughtsmanship & fine lettering. John the Senior was born around 1550, his father & elder brother were carpenters & its reasonable to suppose that John was engaged in building work too, as his drawings of timber-framed houses on the maps show accurate observation far beyond the crude or conventional drawings done by his contemporaries.

In some Surveys he calls himself John the Architector, sometimes the Architect & Surveyor. Its interesting to wonder how & where he obtained the technical training & artistic skills? Patronage may have helped, as it helped many an Elizabethan including Shakespeare. An early written Survey of the Hamingfields in 1592 was described as being "by John Walker, Architect, in the presence of & by the direction of Richard Cannon, gent. for the use & in the service of Edward Nevell, Lord of Bergevenny". The Lords Bergevenny would seem the likeliest persons to be Walker's patrons. The three Hamingfields were held as one entire manor by the Barony of Bergavenny.

The Walkers lived at Kents Farm, West Hanningfield. The son died in 1618, the father in 1626, both buried in West Hanningfield churchyard. Samuel Walker, believed to be a nephew of John the Senior, did a survey of East Hanningfield in 1628. This can be seen at the Essex Record Office; also a comprehensive book entitled 'The Walkers of Hanningfield Surveyors & Mapmakers Extraordinary' written by A.C Edwards & K.C. Newton.

By studying the map itself, one can discover the origins of some village names, the area of SCARLES CROFT is marked Scarles John Griggs. There was a house named COULDE DENNIS on the area now taken up by Ashley Green. This was in the ownership of one Thomas Pease in 1614 hence PEASE PLACE & in Samuel Walker's Survey of 1628. It was owned by Elizabeth Filliol, widow gentlewoman, hence FILLIOL CLOSE. According to the Tithe Award Map of 1840, the same area was owned by the Trustees of Ralph Nicholson, so NICHOLSON PLACE. More research needed to find out about Catherine, Bridon, Clinton & Payne - can you help?




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

After many years of lobbying by P.C. and residents of East Hanningfield, Chelmsford Borough Council's Environment Committee passed a resolution on 25th. July to introduce a 30 mph speed limit in the village. Surprisingly, there was a letter of objection from a resident of Bicknacre, but the letters of support carried the day. Keep an eye open for the new signs and remember that the Police always carry out speed checks in areas with new speed limits.

Also on the subject of speed, at the request of P.C. the Police recently carried out a speed check exercise on the Al30 near the Bennetts Avenue junction. They caught 42 breaking the limit in about three hours. They found speeding at that spot so bad that they have added the site to their list of regular speed check locations, so be warned!

P.C. is often asked about traffic calming for the village centre. P.C. has had an outline plan for traffic calming lodged with C.B.C. for some years. The problem is funding, or rather the lack of it. P.C. has offered to contribute towards a scheme, but C.B.C. will not work out the costings until they have the funding, so we are at a standstill. There is another possible source of a scheme, and that is the County Council's developing plan for traffic calming in the villages affected by the new A130. This should be published for consultation this Autumn. It is envisaged that the scheme will be phased, with priority given to areas most affected by the new road, and of course funding will be extremely tight.

Recently, P.C.'s Chairman came up with an amended plan for a Village Hall extension which would be a cheaper alternative to the previous extension plan and which, it is calculated, could be carried out with funds already available to the community. I have received some suggestions from dog walkers as to the best sites for new dog bins. If you have not contacted me yet and know of a site that really needs a bin, please let me know.

Most dog owners are responsible members of the community, but unfortunately there are a few who are still behaving as though they do not care about the consequences of their actions for other members of the community. There are still dog faeces to be seen on the playing field and on village streets and verges. Local and borough wide bylaws make it an offence to allow your dog's droppings to remain in these places, and bins have been provided strategically around the village for you to dispose of them. Canine faeces are a serious health hazard, so please use the bins provided. On a linked topic, the fence around the children's play area on Hanna's Field was installed to keep dogs out, so please remember to close the gate behind you and leave your dog outside.

Finally, still on the subject of animals and bylaws, horses and ponies should not be ridden on the playing field. This is obviously for reasons of safety, and to prevent damage to the turf.

The manned refuse vehicle will be visiting the Village Hall car park on three more occasions this year. The dates to note are 16th. September, 14th. October and 11th. November. In between times household and garden refuse may be taken to the civic amenity site at South Woodham.

The by-laws are enforceable by the Police who should be called when there is a problem.

A working party is currently working, in conjunction with The Parish Council, to investigate the possibility of enlarging the Village Hall to provide enlarged changing rooms, storage facilities and a space for the village shop and post office. At present we are seeking approval from the Charities Commission that the inclusion of the shop within our extension plans is not in breach of the rules governing the charitable activity of Hanna's Field Charity.

"How did it all go?" This is a question many of you have asked in relation to the recent Chernobyl Children's holiday. The answer is, I believe, very successfully.

Sixteen children, aged between 8 & 13 were collected at Gatwick on 14th July & on 11th August they were waved off. In between they had events organised for them including trips to Southend & Frinton (they come from a land locked country, so the sea-side was a real experience) parties in the gardens of two or three generous hosts (one of which was visited by a police helicopter!), weekly swimming & trampolining sessions, bowling, a trip to Blackwater Fun Pool & McDonalds, sailing, archery, wall-climbing & the zoo. They also went to the opticians & (just to cheer them up) the dentist. A lot was found to be wrong with their teeth due to malnutrition problems at home. But it was all skilfully corrected.

The children stayed in pairs with one host family per fortnight & were spoiled – but not too much. The main purpose was to give them fresh air & fresh food – something they don't enjoy at home in southern Belarus because of the continuing state of contamination after the Chernobyl nuclear disaster. Several people from the parish were involved & many others donated generously. We are very grateful, as indeed are the children & the two interpreters.

Why was the event a success? I suspect it is because there are so many generous people with warm hearts who are involved. People from the local churches & others with no church connection at all work together in an enthusiastic way, & have fun themselves as they make new friends among us locals as well as the Belarusian children.

For those in the churches it is a form of healing ministry as well as being an extension in other ways of what Christianity might all be about. & how rewarding it can be to see these youngsters benefiting from the simple things we have to offer.

It has been one of the most successful seasons for our school team.





Obviously, this is not a definitive guide to all the responsibilities of the three tiers of local government affecting this village, and it might get more complicated as regional government becomes a reality.

You have probably been wondering what has happened to the new speed limit. I have been informed that the date of implementation is 1st. December, so watch out for the new signs. We can expect to see the Police monitoring the speed of traffic travelling through the village in the coming months.

The amended plan for the Village Hall extension has received planning permission. Chelmsford Borough Council has promised a grant towards the project and Essex County Council are considering a grant application from P.C. at the moment. The bulk of the funding will come from borrowing by P.C. and P.C. reserves. Confirmation is still awaited from the Charity Commission as to whether they will support the presence of the Post Office in the Village Hall. Unfortunately, their agreement is necessary, so delay to the project is inevitable whilst their response is awaited. Meanwhile, certain aspects of the pre-building stage are progressing so that on receipt of a favourable answer the project can move ahead quickly.

Due to a variety of factors, there have been changes to the dates of forthcoming Meetings. There will be no Meeting in December. The next two Meetings will be on **Thursday**, 4th. **January** and **Thursday** 1st. **February**, 2001. Thereafter it is intended that the Meetings will revert to the **fourth** Thursday of each month.

I have requested CBC that the manned refuse vehicle continues to visit the Village Hall car park on a monthly basis during 2001, but have not received notification of dates as yet, so please keep an eye open for the posters. A list of all the dates for the year will go up on the P.C. noticeboard in the Village Hall.

There seems to have been some public confusion about P.C. noticeboards, so I shall explain briefly what happens. Notices of P.C. Meetings go up on the three noticeboards, (on the Tye, at the Bicknacre Road junction and inside the Village Hall) three clear days before a Meeting. If there is space, which is usually only on the two larger boards, the Agenda goes on the board as well. The Minutes are posted on the two larger boards after they have been signed as accurate, which happens at the following Meeting. There are times when this does not happen, for example when I went on holiday the day after a Meeting, and when I am required by law to display other notices, such as Audit notices. At the time of writing, P.C. was about to consider the replacement of the noticeboard at the Bicknacre Road junction, because of its poor condition. If P.C. decides to install a larger board there might be space for the Minutes to be on display there as well.



Isn't that why Luke paints the picture of the messengers (angels) singing "Peace on earth; goodwill to all"?

Lets take time out this Christmas to think on these things. A warm welcome awaits you at church. Look out for the carol services. Make a note of the Christmas-tide worship times. And . . . come, all ye faithful, be joyful and triumphant. Let the spirit of the Christmas story grab you and me as we celebrate together and spend time thinking about and singing about the core event this season.

The idea is to be able to provide a video link to an officer in another organisation. Our system allows you to communicate with the partners linked to SWF. The Benefits Agency is one of our first partners with others to follow. This is a valuable facility making it much easier for many local people to solve complicated queries. If, for instance, you need help filling in a benefits form, you will be able to call up the officer from the Benefits Agency using the telephone provided. He will then appear on the screen in front of you and you will be able to discuss your query. All the information will be shared between you. A scanner enables you to send him the form over the telephone line and you will be able to see your form in detail, and also watch the officer fill it in for you as he asks the appropriate questions. He will then scan the completed form back to you; all that's left for you to do is sign and post it. For us in South Woodham Ferrers, isolated from almost all the main public bodies and main council offices, it will save many journeys to Chelmsford, and in fact, bring those organisations to us in Woodham!

Another partner linked to our video conferencing unit is Answers Direct, Essex Libraries' call centre. This service aims to solve any query from the public. They answer questions on health, travel, legislation, genealogy, children's rights, to give some examples. Staff have a huge range of resources at their disposal to trace what you are looking for. They will be able to search CD roms and the internet when dealing with your queries and you will be able to watch them searching and discuss with them exactly what you do and do not want. Material can be printed out directly to you at South Woodham Ferrers. The Child Support Agency are coming on board very soon, and other agencies will follow.

We are sure video conferencing will provide a useful link for the people of South Woodham Ferrers, where as we all know, services are currently limited. It allows people to sort out complicated queries, save them time and money and will open the doors for many other organisations to become a part of our community.
