HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY

The AGM of the Charity was held on 7th February. All of the committee from last year were re-appointed with the same position as previously held.

We had planned to complete the works on the mound and field this autumn. However, as you will have noticed, East Hanningfield seems to have been under a permanent rain cloud and it has not been possible to take any equipment on to the field without causing damage. We will complete the work to the field and mound as soon as weather and ground conditions permit.

We have had notification from the Charities Commissioners that we can grant a lease to a shop/post office in an extended village hall, subject to complying with certain consultation procedures. We are working in conjunction with the Parish Council to agree the detail plans of the proposed extension and look forward to the next stage of the development.

The Charity always welcomes volunteers to assist in the running of the hall and its facilities. If you would like to help or find out more about the Charity please contact me.

PARISH COUNCIL

There will be visits by the manned refuse vehicle on the following Saturday mornings during 2001: 17th. March, 16th. June, 14th. July, 11th. August, 15th. September, 20th. October and 17th. November. The vehicle will be at the Village Hall car park on those dates from 8 am until about 10.45. Between times you can take bulky items of household and garden refuse to the civic amenity sites at Boreham or South Woodham Ferrers, where there are facilities to collect garden waste separately in order to turn it into compost.

Please note, also, the dates for the playschemes this year. The Easter Playscheme for 5-11 year olds will take place on Wednesday, 18th. April from 10.30am to 12.30pm and 1.45pm to 3.45pm. The Summer Playscheme will take place on Wednesday, 8th. August with times the same as the Easter playscheme. Picnic Play for the under 5s with their carers will take place on 9th. August from 10am to 2pm. All these activities take place at the Village Hall.

There are various pieces of news regarding the new A130. I have received a warning from County route that you might receive visits from rogue builders claiming to be from the construction firm Laing and having building materials surplus to requirements from the road construction. No-one from the project would ever do this and if you are approached you are asked to report it at once to Trading Standards on 01245 341888. By the time you receive this edition the consultation process will have begun for the traffic amelioration measures to be put in place in the communities near the new road. This is our chance to say what measures we want in place to support the new 30mph speed limit and to reduce traffic through the village, so it is worth having your say. There has been a minor environmental success following the consultation on the planting scheme along the new road, which has meant the extension of some proposed native hedge planting. Two parish councillors are attending liaison meetings with County route and Laing to discuss matters associated with the construction of the new road. Finally, the 40mph speed limit has been extended north of Rettendon village, so watch out for the new signs!

Recently, there have been some adverse comments about the amount of litter around the village. Of course you can blame those you think are responsible for picking it up, but what about the people who drop it in the first place? We would not need litter collections if all our residents put their litter in the bins provided or just took it home and put it in the wheelie bin. The Village Hall and playing fields are managed by volunteers who give their time for no recompense in order to provide us with a leisure facility: in addition to all the hard work they do, why should they have to clear up after people who are abusing the place by messing it up with rubbish?

Even more unpleasant is the dog mess, and this matter has taken a very serious turn. I have been informed that dog faeces containing worms have been seen on the playing field. So, there is a dog owner who cares nothing for the health of the human users of the playing field, and does not care about the health of the dog either, because a dog with worms is not a healthy dog! Users of the playing field therefore should be extra vigilant about hygiene, and please everyone, close the gate of the play area to keep dogs out; that is what the fence is for!

You have probably noticed that the Parish Council element of the council tax has increased substantially for the 2001/2 year. This is mainly due to the Village Hall extension project, and the associated temporary retention of the portacabin for the post office. PC will be using £11,500 of its reserves for the project and borrowing a further £40,000, for which repayments will begin during the financial year. In order that the reserves do not sink too low, PC has decided to make up from the 2001/2 council tax the amount taken from the reserves in the 2000/1 year to cover the unexpected costs of retaining the portacabin. Construction of the extension to the Village Hall should begin before the next edition of this newsletter.

At the time of writing the planning application for the affordable housing for local people and key workers at Highfields Mead was going through the consultation stage, and awaiting a decision from Chelansford Borough Council.

Parish Council Meetings have now returned to the **fourth Thursday** of each month. Correspondence which you wish to be considered at a Meeting should be addressed to the Clerk to the Council and arrive at least a week before the Meeting so that it can be included on the Agenda. Please note that correspondence arriving at my house that is addressed to the Chairman or councillors will be forwarded unopened. You may attend PC Meetings and ask questions during Public Question Time, but if you think your question might require some research, please give fair warning before the Meeting.

This initiative is an attempt to make our local Police Officers more accessible. The vehicle and the officers, part of the Rural Beat Team spend one hour, once a month, in the village. Their arrival will be advertised by posters around the village in plenty of time for you to plan to meet them.

The Officers are there for you to consult with, not to sit twiddling their thumbs for an hour when they could be doing something useful elsewhere and that is what will happen if we do not support this initiative.

We know that financial and other constraints do not allow the kind of policing that we would like for our village, but here is an attempt to make our Policemen visible and albeit for a limited period of time waiting to meet US.

If we do not take advantage of these opportunities I am certain that the initiative will be withdrawn and the chance to talk to our local Police face to face will be lost.

CHERNOBYL CHILDREN'S HOLIDAY


The mid-Essex group of the Chernobyl Children's Project is again organising a months recuperative holiday this summer for sixteen children, aged between 8 and 13, from southern Belarus. They live in a region still badly contaminated as the result of the explosion in 1986 of the nuclear power station in Chernobyl. Their health has been badly affected by radiation, and a months holiday here with fresh air and food can improve their immune systems to make them resistant to disease for a further two to three years.

It is a very worthwhile project, and last year some of our parishioners helped in a wonderful way towards such a holiday. This year we are well on the way towards planning something similar. We still need three host families for the first fortnight from Sunday 22nd July until Saturday 4th August, taking two children into their homes for this period. Events are being planned, such as outings to the sea-side and zoo and we shall need event leaders who will take care of our guests and their interpreters for a day.



PARISH COUNCIL

The weather was beautiful for the Village Tidy-up on Saturday, 12th. May. Thank you to all those who turned up on the day to help, and to everyone else who did their own independent litter-picking. It all goes to help make our village a more pleasant place in which to live.

Arrangements have been made for the manned refuse vehicle to visit the Village Hall car park on the following Saturday mornings: 16th. June, 14th. July and 11th. August. Please remember that it will be on site from approximately 8am until 10.45 and that waste should not be left at the car park at any other time. If you have household waste which you need to dispose of between the manned refuse vehicle visits it can be taken to the civic amenity sites at South Woodham Ferrers or Boreham, or arrangements can be made with Chelmsford Borough Council for a special collection. More information about refuse collection can be obtained by telephoning the Borough Council on 01245 606620. The variety of substances that can now be recycled is quite extensive. The civic amenity sites have separate disposal facilities for earth, green waste, plastic bottles and engine oil, to name but a few.

I am sure many of you will have visited the exhibition of Essex County Council's proposed A130 Post Bypass Traffic Management Measures, which took place in the Village Hall a few weeks ago. The County Council has informed me that the response to the proposed closure of the existing A130 was so overwhelming that that particular proposal has now been abandoned. The proposed closure of Creephedge Lane appears to be causing some debate. The Parish Council has supported the closure of the lane, because this is seen as the most likely means of ending the rat run through our village from South Woodham Ferrers to Chelmsford. There are likely to have been many objections from residents of SWF, so if you support the closure and have not yet informed the County Council, please send your comments as soon as possible. The County Council will also welcome alternative proposals for traffic management in the communities surrounding the A130, so if you have some good ideas please let the County Council know. The department at County Hall dealing with this matter is Transportation & Operational Services.

Sadly, the number of children taking part in the Easter Playscheme on 18th. April was quite low this year, but I understand that those who did turn up had an enjoyable time. So far, two events have been arranged for the Summer holidays. There will be a Playscheme for ages 5-11 on Wednesday, 8th. August, at the Village Hall. It will begin at 10.30 am and finish at 3.45 with a break for lunch from 12.30pm until 1.45. Younger children may attend if accompanied by an adult carer. For the under 5s, there will be Picnic Play on Thursday, 9th. August, from 10am until 2pm. If the weather is good this will take place on the playing field, and, as its title suggests, you should bring a picnic lunch. PC hopes to arrange some sports sessions for the holidays as well, and will publicise all events on the noticeboards nearer the time.

At the time of writing, there is still no news regarding the planning application for the affordable housing for local people and key workers at Highfields Mead.





ESSEX AMBULANCE SERVICE COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS

BE A VITAL LINK IN THE CHAIN OF SURVIVIAL

Life-threatening conditions are 'time critical' and the importance of early intervention is absolutely paramount if we are to improve the chances of survival for people who are in cardiac arrest.

More than 300,000 people have heart attacks and over 110,000 die of heart problems in England every year – 50,000 of these people are under the age of 75. In Essex, chest pain and other heart related conditions account for 10% of all 999 calls.

Sudden death from cardiac arrest is the single leading cause of death world-wide and the main reason that fewer than one in twenty victims survive is due to the fact that effective treatment does not arrive in time. With each precious minute that passes, survival rates decline by 10%. Research shows that early defibrillation (electric shock therapy to re-start a failing heart) is the most important factor affecting the survival of patients in cardiac arrest. The first few minutes of collapse are vital and early CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and defibrillation can greatly improve a patient's chance of survival. In 1997 Essex Ambulance Service pioneered a scheme to train volunteers in lifesaving resuscitation including the use of an automatic defibrillator. The scheme is known as 'Heartwatch' and the volunteers as 'Community First Responders'. First Responders are a vital link in the 'Chain of Survival'.

First Responders are taught how to administer emergency first aid to a number of potentially life-threatening conditions. It is well documented that the severity of conditions such as choking, uncontrolled bleeding, breathing difficulties and cardiac arrest can be alleviated with the correct intervention thus 'buying time' for patients whilst the ambulance is 'on the way'. This is not in place of an ambulance, First Responders act to support and enhance the level of response and care to their local community.

This Autumn, PC will be carrying out the annual budgeting process. I have been asked to put to you, the council tax payers of the parish, this proposal. PC is considering building a footway along the verge northwards from the Abbeyfields junction. The cost will be approximately £4,500, which would amount to a one off addition to the council tax next year of between nine and ten pounds for a D band property. This sounds a lot but is less than a pound a month. Please let PC know what you think.





PARISH COUNCIL

In the last News, I wrote about a project that PC was considering but was looking for feedback from the community. This was a proposal to build a footway northwards from the Abbeyfields junction. The respondents were overwhelmingly opposed to the proposal with only one letter in favour. PC therefore decided not to proceed with the project.

Thank you to those who registered interest in the Community First Responders Scheme. There has not been enough interest as yet to get it off the ground, so if anyone is still considering it please let me know. As a reminder, First Responders are volunteers who receive training to be the first on the scene of a heart attack or other life threatening medical emergency in the community, and who give assistance to the patient until the ambulance arrives.

PC has been represented at regular meetings with CountyRoute concerning the construction of the new A130. No-one will be surprised that the weather has caused some difficulties and that the opening of the northern section has been set back again, this time to late December 2001. You will probably have seen the traffic lights, which have been installed at the roundabouts at the A130/A12 interchange. These will be permanent, and the two roundabouts are to be turned into a 'dumb-bell island' in readiness for the road opening. You should notice that the side roads gradually being cleared of their temporary traffic management measures.

Traditionally, the late Autumn and Winter is a time for hedging and ditching, so please check that the shrubs and trees growing on your property are not causing a nuisance or danger to passers-by. Take a look and ask yourself whether a partially sighted person could walk into anything or could a pushchair get past on the footpath without going into the road. PC receives regular complaints about this problem, but it is the landowner's responsibility to keep a hedge cut back from the footpath. Also, roadside ditches are the responsibility of the landowner whose land they front, so please check that there are no obstructions in your ditches, because even on the top of a hill we can have floods after heavy rain if the ditches cannot carry away the water quickly enough.

At the PC Meeting in September, Station Officer Hodgkinson came to talk about the role of the County Fire and Rescue Service in the community. For those of you who did not attend the Meeting he has provided the most important points from his talk for inclusion in this Newsletter. A supply of leaflets on how to choose a smoke alarm is in the box below the Parish Council notice board in the Village Hall entrance.

The Village Hall Extension Project is moving on, although more slowly than had been hoped. Please read the notice on the subject from Hanna's Field Charity, which is elsewhere in this Newsletter.

At the time of writing the planning application for the Rural Housing Trust scheme at Highfields Farm was on the Agenda for the Planning Committee meeting at Chelmsford Borough Council on 19th. November, so the outcome will be known by publication date. The plans have been on display on one of the notice boards inside the Village Hall entrance.

CHANGES TO YOUR VILLAGE HALL

For some time Hanna's Field Charity has been working with the Parish Council on a project to extend the Village Hall. The purpose of the extension is to provide improved facilities for team game changing/showers, a disabled toilet, extra storage and a room which could be used as a shop/post office.

Hanna's Field Charity have sought advice from the Charity Commission as to whether it was permissible to have commercial premises on the Charity's premises. The Charity Commission said, amongst other things, that the rent from the commercial premises would have to be used in support of the Charity's charitable aims, and that the beneficiaries of the charity would have to be consulted.

The beneficiaries of Hanna's Field Charity are the residents of the parish of East Hanningfield. So, the readers of this newsletter, who are residents of the parish, are being asked to give their views to the Charity about the lease of part of the as yet unbuilt extension to someone to run a shop.

The reasoning behind the need to consult you is that while the part of the property is leased on a commercial basis it cannot be used by the Charity towards its charitable aims and therefore technically and legally will have been 'disposed of' even though only on a temporary basis.





PARISH COUNCIL

The Easter Activity Playday for children aged 5-11 years will take place at the Village Hall on Wednesday, 3rd. April. The sessions will run from 10.30am until 12.30pm and 1.45pm until 3.45pm. This is an event run by Chelmsford Borough Council and supported by PC. Please remember that children will not be supervised or be allowed on the premises during the lunch break.

The manned refuse visits to the Village Hall car park have been greatly reduced to only four this year. The first has already taken place and the remaining three will be on the following Saturday mornings: 13th. July; 26th. October and 7th. December. In between times, refuse can be taken to the civic amenity sites at South Woodham Ferrers or Boreham. Please remember to separate re-cyclables as there are individual bins at the amenity sites.

On a related topic, PC was recently contacted by the Chelmsford Environment Partnership who are looking to encourage community recycling programmes in the parishes around Chelmsford. You will probably be aware that some of the nearby urban areas already have separate kerbside collections for recycling, but due to costs, the Borough Council will not be extending that programme to the rural areas for some considerable time. The Partnership's idea is that groups can get together in the rural areas to organise their own solutions. If you have a project in mind the Partnership would be interested to hear from you and will be able to offer useful advice. They can be contacted on 01245 493964. One idea from the partnership involves reducing waste (which is at the top of the waste hierarchy), and that is by stopping junk mail. It seems that by contacting the Mailing Preference Service you can have your name put on a list of people who do not wish to receive unsolicited mail, and after a few months the junk mail stops. You can register with them online at www.mpsonline.org.uk or write to them at Mailing Preference Service, Freepost 22, London W1E 7EZ.

Recently PC was contacted by the Emergency Planning Officer at Chelmsford Borough Council about storing sandbags in the parish. As PC did not have anywhere to keep them the offer was declined, but PC thought it would be worthwhile to let everyone know where sandbags can be obtained in an emergency. If your house is in danger of being flooded you can request sandbags from C.B.C.'s Emergency Centre by email on emergencycentre@chelmsfordbc.gov.uk or on 606909. C.B.C. suggests that black bin bags filled with soil can be used as a substitute. There is more information about what to do in flooding emergencies on C.B.C.'s website at www.chelmsfordbc.gov.uk.

PC recently wrote to the bus company following a series of complaints about the time keeping of the Diamond Service. The worst incidents were probably when the bus left about 7 minutes early, so potential passengers did not realise they had missed it, and when it missed the village altogether and rerouted down the A130 in order to make up for lost time. PC would like to continue to keep a close eye on the performance of the service, so if

you suffer any problems with the bus please let me know the date, scheduled time and what went wrong, so that a log can be kept.

Although there has been some disruption to the Meeting cycle in order to progress the Village Hall extension project, the intention is that Meetings will continue to take place on the fourth Thursday of each month, in the Village Hall, and usually at 8pm unless weight of business requires an earlier start. Notices of the Meetings appear on the PC noticeboards three clear days before, along with the Agenda so that members of the public can have a clear idea of matters to be covered. Copies of the minutes of Meetings appear on the PC noticeboards in the Village Hall and on the Tye (opposite the Windmill) once they have been agreed as accurate and signed at the following meeting. This is the reason they appear to be 'old'. If you have matters that you would like to bring to PC's attention please write to me, or you could attend one of the monthly Meetings and speak during Public Question Time, which takes place shortly after the beginning of each Meeting.

We are trying again this year to bring over from Southern Belarus, sixteen children (aged 9 - 13) for a recuperative holiday, away from the dangerous conditions in which they have to live after the nuclear disaster which contaminated their homeland sixteen years ago.

A month of fresh air and fresh food can help stimulate their immune systems and give them two to three years resistance back home to many of the nasty diseases related to radioactivity.

So we ask for host families to take a couple of these children for a fortnight (either July 20th - August 2nd or August 5th - 16th), to feed them and accommodate them. Special events and outings will be organised for them about three to four times a week.

If you feel you would like to help I can assure you, you will find it a lot of fun. You will meet all sorts of new friends and interesting people and you will find it very fulfilling, taking part is such a worthwhile activity.

Why does the church involve itself in this? Perhaps we've no need to answer - except to sat that we feel we want to be involved in bringing fullness of life and healing to those whose lives are blighted by the conditions in which they have to live. PARISH COUNCIL

The following Summer Holiday Activities for Children have been arranged with Chelmsford Borough Council: Play in the Park for children aged 5-11 years on Thursday, 22nd. August 10.30am-12.30 & 1.45pm-3.45; and Picnic Play for children aged under five on Tuesday, 13th. August 10am-2pm. Play in the Park will take place in the Village Hall with sports outside, and the Picnic Play will be on the playing field unless the weather drives everyone inside.

There will be a visit by the manned refuse vehicle to the Village Hall car park on Saturday, 13th. JULY. If you miss this opportunity to dispose of your bulkier household refuse, then the next visit will be in October! The civic amenity sites at South Woodham Ferrers and Boreham will be open every day, and have extensive recycling facilities.

The project to extend the Village Hall continues to move more slowly than anticipated. At the time of writing PC had received builders' quotations, had just received the report on the quotations' compliance and was about to meet to make decisions about moving on to the next stage of the project. Meanwhile, the post office in the portacabin remains open for business, so please support it.

I am often asked what is happening about the Rural Housing Trust's plans to build affordable housing for local people at Highfields Farm. This appears to be another project that is taking a lot longer than expected to reach a conclusion. I have been told, although not by the Trust, that the Trust is negotiating the purchase of the land with the landowner. Please note that Mrs. Chris Moor has now left the Trust, and contact should be made through the office on 01371 874738.

You might have seen a notice in the Public Notices section of the Essex Chronicle on 17th. May that PC has adopted a new Code of Conduct and established a Register of Members' Interests. This is something that all parish councils have been required to do by the Local Government Act 2000, and brings them into line with borough and county councils. The Code provides rules as to the behaviour of councillors and guidance as to when they should declare interests at meetings, and also when an interest is prejudicial and requires a councillor to leave a meeting. The Register of Interests is a list of councillors' interests which is kept by PC and the Monitoring Officer at Chelmsford Borough Council. The Code and the Register of Interests will be available for public inspection at PC Meetings. Complaints by the public or councillors about breaches of the Code should be made to the Standards Board for England. (It is a requirement of the Code that councillors aware of breaches of the Code by other councillors should report them.)

PC has recently been given notice by the Audit Commission that its audit arrangements have changed. The system has always been that after the end of the financial year, all the books and records have been delivered to the appointed auditor and then audited. The Audit Commission has had increasing difficulty in finding auditors willing to undertake the audit

work for parish councils, because it is not particularly remunerative, although it is relatively expensive for the councils. The new system involves PC appointing an 'independent internal auditor' who will monitor the accounting systems and follow the audit trail on sample expenditure ensuring that correct procedures have been followed. Following this process, only the statement of accounts and the 'independent internal auditor's' verification will go to the auditor. The Audit Commission has said that PC needs to find a 'competent person' to fill the post of 'independent internal auditor'. This person must also be completely independent of the council (no family members or friends), so if there is anyone out there who has a grounding in local council law, understands local council accounts and would be interested in this appointment please get in touch.

Parish Council Meetings are held in public and continue on the fourth Thursday of each month, in the Village Hall at 8pm unless volume of business dictates an earlier start. Correspondence for consideration by the Council at one of its Meetings should reach me a week before, to ensure it is included on the Agenda. The Agenda appears on the Parish Council noticeboards at least three clear days before the Meeting (on Sunday at the latest for a Thursday Meeting). If you would like to bring a matter of concern to the notice of the Council in person, you may speak during Public Question Time, which takes place shortly after the opening of each monthly Meeting. Please remember to address letters for the attention of the Council to me, the Clerk, as letters addressed to the Chairman or individual members are passed on unopened.

YOU COULD BECOME A FOSTER CARER

Essex County Council Foster Carers launched this year's foster carer recruitment campaign at County Hall in Chelmsford on Friday 12th. April. The campaign 'You could foster a child' is aimed at dispelling myths about the types of people that can become foster carers.

Foster carers come from a variety of backgrounds, married or unmarried, working or not working, with or without children. There are around 500 foster families caring for children looked after by Essex County Council. The most successful carers really enjoy being around children and feel a sense of satisfaction helping to make what can be a very difficult time for a child that bit easier.

Essex County Council are looking for more carers in your area to be able to offer a local service to local children, to increase their chances of returning home and enabling them to maintain links with friends, family and school.

Foster carers look after children of all ages from babies to teenagers. There is a particular need for carers who can look after children aged 8 years and above, children who need long-term placements, children with disabilities, and for brothers and sisters who may need to stay together. Foster carers provide a variety of care ranging from a few days each month, to a few weeks or months and sometimes longer.

Councillor Mrs. Iris Pummell, cabinet member for children's services and schools said: "Our foster carers tell us that fostering is one of the most rewarding and challenging things you can ever do. Many say that the best rewards are often the simplest things like a child's smile or chatting with them about what they did at school."

Essex County Council offers support and training to foster carers and there are also fee paid schemes with very competitive rates and training opportunities. All carers receive an allowance that meets the costs of looking after a child. You can find out all about becoming a foster carer by calling the freephone number on 0800 801 530.

It is important that this network is kept intact and not allowed to disintegrate as happened in Danbury and Little Baddow. It then became necessary because of rising crime figures to rebuild the Neighbourhood Watch network in these two locations.

Because of changes in peoples circumstances new co-ordinators are sometimes needed and there is a need at the moment for new ones in :

Highfields Mead 1 or 2
Payne Place 1
Catherine Close 1

It should be noted however that the funds for the replacement of the playground have been allocated to the village hall extension so replacement is not likely during the current year.

The big hall is available on Thursday Nights for a regular booking and most weekends during the day. The small hall is available every evening with the exception of Mondays. The Sports Courts are available on Mondays, Fridays and most Weekends. Please make use of the facilities which are available at a discounted rate to villagers.

PARISH COUNCIL

Although in my report this time last year I anticipated that the construction works to build the extension to the Village Hall would begin shortly, various setbacks prevented that happening. Now, the situation is that we have a satisfactory quotation from a builder and the promise of a grant of £25,000 from the Countryside Agency, so, this time, it really looks as though construction will start very soon.

As building sites have the appearance of being adventure playgrounds they are very attractive to children, so please tell your youngsters that, although the building site will be on the playing field, it really is out of bounds. Obviously every effort will be made to keep unauthorised individuals off the site, but as we have had children climbing over the fence into the tennis courts and on to the post office roof at various times some of the local young people see fences more as a challenge than a warning.

Again, on the subject of the Post Office, you will probably be aware that although Jake Singh has put a great deal of thought and energy into improving the business at the portacabin, he is not intending to stay, so we are going to need a new Post Master or Post Mistress. It has been a very good year for hedge growth, believe me I know, and as always this has been accompanied by complaints to the Parish Council of hedges overgrowing or obstructing footways. As Autumn and Winter are the traditional hedging seasons, now is the time to make a start on cutting back that overgrowth, because it will grow even more next Spring. If there is any kind of right of way beside one of your boundaries please make sure that there is no obstruction caused by plant growth from your property.

Those of you who drive through the village will have noticed pairs of wires stretched across the road at various points and times. The first instance was associated with a study of traffic numbers and speed following the opening of the new A130. The result was that traffic numbers had dropped by 3%! A figure the Parish Council found very disappointing but not really surprising. Unfortunately, speed had risen slightly. It is hoped that these figures will hasten the introduction of speed and traffic reduction measures. The more recent appearance of the wires was an exercise by the Police who will be using the resulting statistics to help them decide whether the village should be targeted for speed enforcement. So, you have been warned!

Please note that there will be only one more visit to the Village Hall car park by the manned refuse vehicle this year, on Saturday, 26th. October. Please do not leave any refuse in the car park on that day or at any other time. Also, please do not leave bags of cans or bottles next to the recycling bins if the bins are full.

Parish Council Meetings continue on the fourth Thursday of each month at 8pm in the Village Hall. Parishioners are invited to speak to the Council during Public Question Time, which takes place shortly after the beginning of each Meeting. EAST HANNINGFIELD CRICKET CLUB





Discussions have been held with the builder in order to minimise the impact of the construction work on Village Hall users, but inevitably there will be congestion in the car park and probably some mud about. Please be patient; it will not last for long.

In the Summer News I said that the Rural Housing Trust was still negotiating the purchase of the land at Highfields Farm with the landowner. Those negotiations fell through, but the Trust is still aiming to build affordable homes for local people somewhere else in the village. I have application forms for registration on the Trust's housing list, if you have not already done so. Please note that you will be required to register on Chelmsford Borough Council's housing list in order to be eligible for the Trust's housing list. The Trust can be contacted on 01371 874738.

The term of office of this Council will come to an end in May, 2003, when there will be elections for the next Council. If you are interested in standing for office please keep an eye out for the posters calling for nominations, which will appear on local noticeboards in late March. I am usually supplied with nominations papers to distribute locally but they will also be available from the Returning Officer at Chelmsford Borough Council. There are seven seats on the Parish Council. If there are more than seven candidates there will be a poll, but if there are seven or less they will be elected unopposed. Polling day is 1st. May, and this is also the date for Chelmsford Borough Council elections. New electoral arrangements will mean that East Hanningfield will be part of a two-councillor ward for the first time.

The last visit of the manned refuse vehicle to the Village Hall car park will take place on Saturday, 7th. December. It will arrive at 8am and leave by 10.45am.

Please note that there will be no Parish Council Meeting in December. The next two Meetings will be held on 2nd, and 30th. January 2003. Thereafter Meetings will be on the fourth Thursday of the month. At the moment it is not envisaged that the building work will prevent the Meetings taking place in the Village Hall. Meetings begin at 8 pm unless there is a visiting speaker when they begin half an hour earlier. Public Question Time takes place shortly after 8 pm, whatever the start time of the Meeting.



CHELMSFORD COMMUNITY TRANSPORT

Chelmsford Community Transport runs three different schemes:

SOCIAL CAR SCHEME

This is a door-to-door service for anyone who cannot access public transport, including the elderly and disabled. The drivers are volunteers and users of the scheme are required to make a contribution to the expenses (dependent on mileage). Subject to availability, the scheme operates all week long, within the Chelmsford Borough, but 48 hours notice is usually required.

CHELMSFORD DIAL-A-RIDE

This is a scheme part funded by the Countryside Agency and Chelmsford Borough Council. Chelmsford Community Transport have 3 fully accessible minibuses (2 owned by themselves, 1 owned by Social Services) which can be hired by anyone who is unable to access public transport. There are 25 drivers available, so groups do not have to provide their own driver. However, a contribution to expenses is required. Subject to availability, the scheme operates all week long, within the Chelmsford Borough, but 48 hours notice is usually required.

MINIBUS BROKERAGE

The scheme is available to voluntary groups who are based within the Chelmsford Borough. Chelmsford Community Transport operates 7 minibuses (2 owned, 5 managed for other groups) that are available for hire. A driver can be provided if needed, and the cost is just £30 per day (+fuel). Subject to availability, the scheme operates all week long, but 1 day's notice is usually required.

PARISH COUNCIL

As mentioned in the last Newsletter the term of office of this Council comes to an end at the beginning of May with the election of a new Council. I have now received notice of the important dates relating to the elections. If you want to stand for election to either the Parish Council or Borough Council you must deliver your completed nomination papers to Alan Battley at Chelmsford Borough Council between 25th. March and noon on 1st. April. Nomination papers require two signatures, for parish council elections they must be of people on the parish electoral roll and for borough council elections they must be signatures of two people on the ward electoral register. Nomination papers for the parish council election are available from me; alternatively they can be obtained from Chelmsford Borough Council.

If you want to make arrangements for a postal vote for this election you must do so at Chelmsford Borough Council by 5pm on 23rd. April. Leaflets are available in the Village Hall entrance.

Two councillors who have been members of the Parish Council for some time have announced that they will not be standing for election again. Graham Parker, who has recently moved away from the village, has been on the Council since 1983, and Ian Wigglesworth has been a member since 1995. I am sure that all members of the community would like to join me thanking them for their years of service and hard work for the parish.

It has been brought to the notice of the Council that horses are being ridden on public footpaths. If a person leads or rides a horse over a footpath that is a trespass against the landowner. The act is not just a theoretical offence, it causes damage to the surface of the path which makes it extremely difficult for walkers to use and means that the landowner has to repair it. Riders are asked to think carefully about where they are riding and what damage they might be doing.

Since the last Newsletter, the Village Hall extension has progressed rapidly. The original completion date of the end of January has been extended because of some delays caused by bad weather and also because of some extra work that has been done to develop the upper room into a usable meeting room. There are some very stringent rules about the areas of buildings which are open to the public, and there have had to be some additional fire safety measures and disabled access arrangements added to bring the upper floor up to standard. These have included a wider staircase able to take a chair lift and extra fire check arrangements. These extras have not caused any delay to the progress of the shop side of the building. At the time of writing the expectation was that the shop would be opening in early March.

Remember you can do your banking and pay your bills at the post office!

There has been some considerable interest in broadband lately, particularly as it is not available locally. Broadband is the very fast access to the internet which allows instant downloading of large amounts of data. PC was contacted by the East of England Development Agency which had organised a competition whereby the winning community would achieve a grant for the connection of broadband. PC decided that it did not wish to participate in the competition, but there is still something residents can do to encourage BT to upgrade the local exchange for broadband connection, and that is to register for broadband. It will cost you nothing and there is no commitment to join once the connection is established. You can register on www.demandbroadband.com and this website will also give you more information such as where broadband is and is not available. The more local registrations there are the more likely we are to get connected.

Please note that the Annual Parish Meeting, which is the meeting at which local electors have their say, is scheduled for 8pm on 24th. April in the Village Hall. If you would like an item put on the Agenda please let me know, otherwise just turn up on the night.

Parish Council Meetings continue on the fourth Thursday of the month, usually at 8pm, also in the Village Hall. Public Question Time which takes place shortly after the opening of each meeting gives members of the public the opportunity to raise matters with the Council and ask questions. Please note that if you wish the Council to discuss and reach a decision on a matter it must appear on the Agenda as an item of correspondence and so you will need to send it me in writing a week before the Meeting.



ALL SAINTS EAST HANNINGFIELD, A HISTORY

I lived with my parents in East Hanningfield for most of my life, I found this extract from a book called, ESSEX, Off The Beaten Track, which interested me along with a picture I found on the internet. I found it interesting. If anyone else has anymore info' on the Church and the Well along with its whereabouts I would love to hear more.




What satisfaction there must be in digging for water and eventually finding it. The idea of having water on your land was just a dream to most villagers in the 18th century. Even the Parson at East Hanningfield did not have this useful perquisite until he set the work in hand himself—and what an arduous task it turned out to be. A reader, writing to The Gentleman's Magazine on the 8th July 1791 reported: 'It was begun June 21st, 1790, and water, when the workmen, from such tedious labour, were at the moment of despair, was found May 7, 1791. Thirty-nine thousand five hundred bricks were used, without cement, in lining this well, the soil of which ... was fine, light brown, imperfect marl ... [which] continued to 450 feet, where it was consolidated into so rocky a substance as to require the being broken with a mattock. A bore then, of 3 inches diameter and 15 feet in length, was tried, which soon, through a soft soil, slipped from the workman's hands and fell up the handle. Water instantly appeared, and rose within the first hour 150 feet, and, after a very gradual rise, now stands at 347 feet, extremely soft and well flavoured ...'

The parson had dug the well for the benefit of his parishioners, 'for use it is always open' he declared. They benefited from water — but suffered by fire; the church was burnt down on 5th January 1884. That fire brought to light under coats of lime wash some exquisite wall paintings done around AD 1300. The vicar tried to protect them behind closed doors, but vandals broke them. In 1933 one portion of these paintings was successfully peeled from the wall for preservation in the Victoria and Albert Museum.

The Church we now see was built in record time; started on the 16th of July 1884, it was

On 1st. May, we had the first contested Parish Council election since 1987. Your new councillors are Stewart Amos, Peter Applegate, Les Draper, Michael Harris, Danny Palmer, Shirley Tilby and Ted Williamson. They have elected Les Draper as their Chairman with Peter Applegate serving as Vice Chairman. The new Council has decided to continue to hold Meetings on the FOURTH Thursday of each month in the new first floor meeting room at the Village Hall.

You are probably aware that a scheme of affordable housing for local people at Highfields Farm failed to reach completion. Another scheme at another site is at a very early stage. I have been asked to find out how much interest there is for such a scheme now, as the original housing survey took place about six years ago. If you think that you are eligible to apply for affordable housing because you live locally, work locally or have family living locally and would wish to apply, please let me have your name and address, so that I can collate the numbers still interested. This information will be kept solely for the purpose of the housing scheme, and so that you can be contacted direct at a later stage. Please do not give me any other personal information at this time.

Chelmsford Borough Council has asked me to bring to the attention of our senior parishioners their **Information Day for Senior Residents** on **Monday 16th. June**, in Chelmsford. We have been very busy during the last three months and the hard work of the Charity Management Committee is now starting to bear fruit. As always if you would like to join the committee we are always looking for new members with new ideas.

The work on the playing field has been completed and we are hopeful that the improvements to the playing surface will enable us to bring the original football pitch in to use from this September. We have had a number of water logging problems on the current pitch due to the ditches at the edge of the field not being cleared. It would be helpful if the owners of houses whose gardens back on to the field would make an effort this summer to clear the ditches for which they are responsible of any obstructions that might be impeding drainage.

There are local bye laws which restrict the activities on the playing field. In particular riding motor cycles, playing golf, and riding horses. It has been noted that these bye laws are being ignored by certain individuals. Please note that offenders may be prosecuted by the police.

The charity is keen to support the recycling initiatives and does so by having the bottle and can recycling bins located in the car park. Unfortunately a number of users are dumping their bottles, cans and sometimes clothing outside the bins. Any bottles or cans must be placed in the bins. If the bins are full you should take your bottles and cans away with you There are no facilities for any other form of recycling.

There has been an increase in the level of vandalism against the hall. Last year over £700.00 was spent in repairing the damage caused which would otherwise have been spent on improving the hall and field facilities for the benefit of all villagers. On 13th and 14th May ground floor windows were broken in the hall. If you know who did it we would be pleased if you would let us know. We will prosecute those who vandalise the hall and field You may recall in January a car driver took it upon himself to joyride around the field causing considerable damage to the football pitch. I am pleased to report that the car owner has, following the threat of prosecution, paid for the damage caused.

BE SOMEONE WHO CARES

Essex County Council launched this year's foster carer recruitment campaign during Foster Care Fortnight (12-23 May). The Campaign 'Be someone who cares' is aimed at dispelling myths about the types of people that can become foster carers.

Many people who would make excellent foster carers sometimes don't come forward because they think they will be turned down. Fostering is not just for couples with children of their own. Single people, those without children and people whose children have grown up and left home are also needed. Carers can be working full time or not at all. There is no upper age limit to becoming a foster carer as long as you are in good health.

Essex County Council are looking for more carers to be able to offer a local service to local children, to increase their chances of returning home and enabling them to maintain links with friends, family and school.

Foster carers look after children of all ages from babies to teenagers. There is a particular need for carers who can look after children aged 8 years and above, children who need long-term placements, children with disabilities, and for brothers and sisters who may need to stay together. Foster carers provide a variety of care ranging from a few days each month, to a few weeks or months and sometimes longer.

Essex County Council offers support and training to foster carers and there are also fee paid schemes with very competitive rates and training opportunities. All carers receive an allowance that meets the costs of looking after a child. You can find out all about becoming a foster carer by calling the freephone number on **0800 801 530**.

PARISH COUNCIL

The Borough Council's Health Policy Officer has asked me to draw to your attention the free electric blanket testing which will take place at the Cramphorn Theatre Foyer on Tuesday, 23rd. September and Wednesday, 24th. September from 9.30 am until noon and 1pm until 3.30pm both days.

The new scheme for affordable housing for local people is moving ahead slowly. I have already had several registrations of interest in the housing. If you would like to register for the new scheme please let me have your name and contact address. The Rural Housing Trust is not involved in this scheme. If you registered with the RHT you need to register again, because the housing trust participating in the new scheme does not have access to the previous list of names.

Since the last News the Village Hall extension and Shop/Post Office really has opened, (photographs of the opening ceremony are on display in the Hall corridor) and the portacabin has finally been taken away. There continue to be minor 'snaggings' that need PC's attention, so there is still work being done although the building gives the appearance of being finished. Benches, coat hooks and so on are still to be fitted in the shower rooms, and it has been found necessary to improve ventilation in the shop. People have been using the track of the stair lift as a hand rail, which has been the cause of spreading greasy hand prints, so a proper hand rail is being fitted above the track. Also the earth that was excavated from the site for the foundations and was dumped near the bike mounds, has recently been contoured to improve the bike course.

PC has agreed to install two additional litterbins in the area of the Village Hall car park, and these will go in when the portacabin area has been reinstated. The recent increase in litter around the shop and playing fields makes the area look scruffy, and of course is a health hazard. Also it gives out the message that local people don't care about their local facilities because they treat them with such little respect.

We have two more visits to the Village Hall car park from the Manned Refuse Vehicle this year. They will be on 11th October and 22nd: November. Both are Saturdays, as usual, and the vehicle will arrive at 8am and leave at about 10.45.

Recent PC Meetings, where officers from Chelmsford Borough Council and Essex County Council have been present to explain the proposed traffic-calming scheme for the village, have been very well attended by residents. The officers were responsive to the comments that they received to the consultation on the scheme and came back with several changes. 






The intention of this information is to give you some insight into how **Jesters Kids Club** operates. Many of you may not have experienced a kids club and therefore may be a little unsure of what we are here for. Predominantly Kids Clubs are here to provide a range of creative play and learning activities in a comfortable and safe environment. We are a member of Kids Clubs Network, a national organisation dedicated to the provision of care for children aged between 4-15yrs, we are also inspected and registered with **Ofsted**.

leeding your needs

- Our after school clubs in Bicknacre and Danbury run from 3.15pm, when we collect children from school to 6.15pm
- We also provide a breakfast club from 7.30am 8.45am, at which point we take the children to school at St John's school in Danbury
- To compliment this service we offer a full days holiday club from 8.00am 6.00pm every day of the holidays with the exception of bank holidays at Bicknacre
- Prices range from £4.50 for a breakfast session, £8.00 for an after school session and £20.00 holiday. There are concessionary rates for more than one child. For all three services the children are supplied with nutritious snacks prepared on site.
- We are registered for 26 children, our staff ratios are 1:8 (under eights) and on outings 1:5.



The approach of our club is centred on the children, who have choices in what they do and balances free play with structured activities. Puzzles, reading, construction, dressing up and colouring are examples of the things that will always be available for the children to play with.

Structured activities follow chosen themes from term to term and generally involve, arts and crafts projects, team games, quizzes, music, sports, gardening and simple cookery. Some of our after school themes have included the Aztecs, Inuit's, Textiles and Woodcraft.

In the holidays we have previously got ourselves involved in fossil hunting, making instruments, making costumes, producing radio and televisions shows, aboriginal artwork on fabric and face painting, pottery, painting large garden murals, team games, sports, visits and lots more!

ANYONE FOR BROADBAND?

Do you use the internet to find information on the web & send/receive email? When you connect is the connection noisy, hence slow & prone to dropping? If the answer is YES to any or all of these questions what you want is broadband. Can you have broadband in East Hanningfield? NO!

Internet over a standard phone line does have its good points: relatively cheap, no extra kit & it works adequately most of the time. Broadband, or ADSL, requires extra hardware: a broadband modem & a different wall socket, so is more expensive. But it is blindingly quick at around 500K/sec compared to up to 56K/sec. A 10Mb download takes a few seconds compared with the best part of an hour or more over a 56K dial up connection.

How do you get broadband? In East Hanningfield from everyone's favourite telecoms company of course: BT. 
EAST HANNINGFIELD CRICKET CLUB





PARISH COUNCIL

The Saturday morning manned refuse vehicle visits to the Village Hall car park for 2004 have been confirmed as 21st. February, 26th. June, 9th. October and 20th. November. The vehicle will arrive at 8.30am and leave at about 10.45. Please don't leave any refuse in the car park. On a related topic, Chelmsford Borough Council will be temporarily ceasing the brown bin collection for the months of December, January and February, and from 1st. December the black bins will be emptied every week. The paper-sacks and green boxes will continue to be emptied fortnightly.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to complete the Housing Survey form and return it. The replies have shown without a doubt that there is a need for affordable housing for local people in East Hanningfield. At the time of writing there have been 27 registrations of need. There has been some concern expressed about the proposed development, and questions raised as to whether the housing would be 'open market' or 'key worker'. I can confirm that it will be neither of these. It will be a mix of shared ownership and rented housing with no right to buy, so it will remain available for local people in perpetuity. PC has expressed support in principle and awaits production of the design details. The site for the proposed development is in Old Church Road between Oaklands and the pumping station.

There having been a flurry of activity concerning the consultation about the proposed traffic claming for the main road through the village, you might be wondering why the installation is being carried out piecemeal. Much of the signage has been installed but is covered by sacking. The reason for this is that the new traffic priorities must have illuminated signage and street lighting to be safe, and it is the connection to the electricity that we are awaiting. The Borough Council cannot do this work and must wait for the contractor to do it. The Parish Council was pleased with the attention paid by the Borough Council officers to the consultation process and is assured that all views expressed were considered, and the final design was the best compromise that could be reached.

Borough Cllr. Ron Saunders has provided me with information about Christmas shopping arrangements in Chelmsford. From 1st. December the market will be open seven days a week, on Saturdays from 8.30am to 5pm and on every other day from 8.30am until 4pm. For Thursday late night shopping there will be free parking in the Borough Council car parks, and Sunday parking will be £1 for the whole day. To pre-book a scooter from the Meadows Shopmobility service please call, during normal working hours, 01245 357097. To entice you into the town, Chelmsford Borough Council is installing new Christmas lights in the town centre from Quadrant to Shire Hall and in part of Springfield Road, transforming it "into a twinkling winter wonderland".

There has been much concern expressed at Parish Council meetings recently by councillors and members of the public about the anti-social behaviour of a few youths. Demanding money with menaces and causing criminal damage are obviously criminal offences. Do you

know where your teenagers go in the evenings and at weekends? And do you know the company they are keeping? It is going to come as a nasty shock to a few parents when the inevitable happens and the Police pay a home visit. Now would be a good time to have a chat with the younger members of your family to find out what has been going on, how deeply involved they are, and also whether they are being intimidated to keep quiet.

Please note that during December and January, the PC Meetings will not be taking place on the usual fourth Thursday of the month. There will be no Meeting in December. In January there will be Meetings on 8th. and 29th. both of which are Thursdays. Members of the public are very welcome to attend PC Meetings and are given an opportunity to speak, but if there is an important matter which requires a council decision it must appear on the Agenda. If you have such an issue please send me the details in writing so that I receive it a week before the Meeting.

Toni, 7 & Page, 5 are half sisters who need to stay together. Toni is a bright, friendly and outgoing child who is eager to please. She enjoys reading and physical activities. Page is an affectionate child who loves playing with her dolls. She enjoys painting, drawing and watching TV. They would be ideally placed with experienced parents or a couple who have a lot of contact with children.

These children are among 60 in Essex waiting for adoptive families.

The 'wishing for a family' campaign aims to raise awareness of the type of children who need adopting including older children, brothers and sisters and ethnic minority children. The campaign also hopes to dispel some of the myths surrounding adoption. Many people who would make excellent adopters rule themselves out for the wrong reasons. Single

people as well as couples can adopt. There is no upper age limit for adoptive parents, though it is important to be fit enough to care for a child for the rest of their childhood. The only real criteria are that people are over 21 and in good health.

'Adoption is a lifelong commitment and can be incredibly challenging but it's also one of the most rewarding things you can do. The difference the security of having a permanent family makes to a child's life is amazing', said Essex adopters Mr & Mrs Smartt who adopted four children aged six, four and a half, three and a half and two.



Its seems a long time ago now, but this summer's Fete on the Playing Field was another great success. People using the playing fields will probably have noticed various improvements. As part of this work the Parish Council paid for the spoil mound from the hall extension foundations to be used to extend the Mountain Bike Track. The reinstatement of the south field football pitch has finally been completed allowing us to bring both football pitches into use next year. On that subject, dog fouling is still a problem on the fields and the Football Club's appeal to dog owners to stop their dogs fouling these areas. The Charity also reminds owners that dogs are not allowed into the Children's play area, and users please close the gate.

Hopefully, people will also have noticed how much cleaner the field and hall environs are thanks to the efforts of John Cousins who is doing a weekly litter pick. 

If you missed the manned refuse vehicle on 21st. February, I am sorry to have to say that you have a long wait until the next visit on 26th. June. In the meantime, don't forget that you can take your bulky refuse to the civic amenity sites at South Woodham Ferrers or Boreham.

Parish Council Meetings continue on the fourth Thursday of each month, usually starting at 8pm. If you haven't been to a Meeting recently I think you will be surprised at how much more comfortable the first floor meeting room is and how much easier it is to hear what is being said! Matters for consideration by the Council should reach me in writing a week before the Meeting takes place so that it can be included in the Agenda. PC is forbidden by law to make a decision on a matter that is not specified on the Agenda, so please come and speak during Public Question Time but do not expect a decision there and then.

Lastly, some people are put off by my answer-phone. Please leave a message. Quite often am there, but in another room or waiting to see if it's a double-glazing salesman! (or any other kind of tele-sales person).







The Charity Officers are required by the Charities Commission to comply with the original objectives of the Charity and to file annual returns and accounts with the Commissioners. The Charity is self funding and charges users of the facilities to cover the costs of maintaining and improving them.

The Parish Council is selected by the electorate in public elections and are responsible for the day to day decision making on all aspects of life in the village. Further details on the work of the Parish Council can be obtained from the Parish Council Chairman or the Parish Clerk.

Vandalisn

At the start of the Easter holidays the village hall was subjected to a concentrated sustained attack. During a one week period windows were broken at the rear of the hall on every night. One window in particular was found to be broken at 7:30 a.m. It was repaired during the day and broken again at about 6:30 on the same evening. It was repaired again and then broken again on the following day. These broken windows were not accidents. The windows were first weakened by the use of air gun pellets and then broken by kicking a football at them. We were forced to board up the windows until we could replace the glass with toughened glass. This one week attack cost the charity in excess of £600.00 in glass replacement. We also lost income as we were unable to hire out a boarded up hall. These costs are not covered by insurance and the money comes directly out of the charitable funds that we have raised during the year at our art show or annual fete. If we did not have to waste our funds on this vandalism we would be able to improve the facilities that we have. If you know who was responsible we would be pleased if you would let us






FROM THE EDITOR

PARISH COUNCIL

Since I wrote for the last Newsletter, the matter of the gypsy site planning application has moved on. Most of you will know that the applicant, Smart Planning, withdrew the application for the nine pitch site on the day of the Planning Committee meeting at Chelmsford Borough Council. Shortly after that they submitted a new application for a three pitch site and another application on the same site for twelve affordable houses. Both these applications and the application by Colne Housing for affordable housing will be considered by the Planning Committee at its meeting on 14th. September.

The applications by Smart Planning have had a considerable impact on Parish Council's resources in terms of time and money. The employment of a planning consultant has enabled Parish Council to produce detailed planning documents to support its case against the gypsy site applications, and also has given PC the material on which to base the information leaflets which have been distributed to residents.

Inevitably, there will have to be some painful decisions made when it comes to preparing the budget for the next financial year. Will the very deep hole eaten into the reserves be made up by an increase in Council Tax or reduced spending, or both? The repercussions of these speculative planning applications on our parish could be long standing and wide ranging even if the developments never take place, because of the resulting inability of the Parish Council to spend proactively on projects for the community.

What is particularly worrying is that we have no idea how many more planning applications we are going to have to deal with for the same site.

activities, but please could they put their used condoms in one of the many bins PC has provided around the Village Hall.

PC and the Charity have been talking about the possibility of providing a youth shelter or benches as suitable places for young people to meet and chat. There have been some ideas about siting, such as around the football pitch so that match supporters could also use them. There have also been some ideas about where they should not go as well, in the children's play area for example. If you have any thoughts on this please let me know. It would be particularly useful to hear from the young people of the village on this topic.

As mentioned earlier. The Colne Housing planning application is to be determined by the Planning Committee at its meeting on 14th. September. This is much later than expected and will prevent the previously anticipated start of construction by mid September. People with local connections are continuing to come forward to register for the housing. Although I am required to protect the confidentiality of the applications, I can say that there does not seem to be any typical applicant; they come in all ages and family sizes. If you are considering applying for this housing, please ensure that you are on the Borough Council's Housing Register.

At the time of writing the Traffic Calming is almost finished! I have been asked if we can have a permanent road closure at weekends, because the experience was so peaceful, but I think that might not go down well with our village pubs! (and I don't know how we'd arrange it). There seems to be some positive feedback about some aspects of the project. The lack of white lining and the Bicknacre Road pinch point seem to be slowing down through traffic, but there are some late changes to signage which have taken everyone by surprise and have not been visually beneficial, and these, we are told, are due to changed regulations.

Please note that the manned refuse vehicle will be visiting the Village Hall car park on Saturday 9th. October and Saturday 20th November from 8am to about 10.45. Please do not leave any rubbish at the car park, and if you are using the recycling banks please do not leave your bags and boxes at the site.

Parish Council's monthly Meetings continue on the fourth Thursday, except in December, and the date for that meeting has yet to be arranged. Please ensure that matters for consideration by the Council reach me in writing a week before the Meeting so that they can be included in the Agenda.





PARISH COUNCIL

Since publication of the Autumn Newsletter, there has been considerable planning activity. Smart Planning's applications for a three pitch gypsy site and for twelve units of affordable housing on the site between Back Lane and Old Church Road were refused by Chelmsford Borough Council's Planning Committee. Smart Planning has appealed to the Planning Inspectorate against the refusal of permission for the affordable housing.

Residents in Old Barn Lane and Tileworks Lane will have been following the course of the planning applications for the caravan sites at 'Valley Park View' just over the parish boundary in Rettendon. The application for plots 2, 3, 4 and 6 was refused and has gone to appeal. In brief, the reasons for refusal were that the sites are inappropriate development in the Metropolitan Greenbelt and subject to noise levels that create an unacceptable living environment. The applications for plots 5 and 7 are yet to be determined.

It is expected that the Planning Committee will consider the Hyde Hall planning application at its meeting on Tuesday, 7th. December. South Woodham Ferrers Town Council, Woodham Ferrers and Bicknacre Parish Council and this Council are objecting to the proposed access off Creephedge Lane and the associated upgrading of Creephedge Lane which can only encourage more drivers from SWF to use it and our village as a short cut to the A12 and Chelmsford. Thanks to all those who rallied round at short notice to send comments to the Planning Department.

The scheme of affordable housing for local people is proceeding. Planning permission was granted and work on site should start very soon. The only delay is the drawing up of a

legal agreement between Colne Housing and the Borough Council, and that is moving on swiftly. I am still receiving applications for the housing at regular intervals, and they have yet to be allocated.

Thank you to those who responded to my call for comments on the siting of new equipment for young people on the playing field. All comments will be taken into account, and the need for siting to be away from houses has been noted. I did receive one letter concerning my request for used condoms to be disposed of in the litters bins. The writer was concerned that the Council was condoning indecency in a public place. The Council has never debated this issue and therefore has no corporate policy on it, but has discussed many times and does have a policies on the disposal of litter, hence my request.

It was recently said to me that East Hanningfield seems to have the most numerous provision of dog waste bins in the area. This being the case it is unfortunate that some dog owners still find it too much of an effort to pick up their dog's excrement and place it in a bin. I understand that when confronted with their failure to clear up they excuse themselves by saying that they have no bag with them. I thought that you might like to know that having nothing to pick it up with is no excuse in the eyes of the law. The legal requirement to clear it up whether or not you have a receptacle to hand will probably not appear harsh to those of us who are offended by the mess that is left around our village.

Still on the subject of dogs, the fence around the play area was installed in order to keep dogs out. Please close the gates behind you.
