

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The problem with Neighbourhood Watch, as a concept, is that it is largely a matter of knowing and helping your immediate neighbours. We have a committee (and we seriously need more committed volunteers on it), but then it is important to know why we are there. It is all too easy to say 'do as we say' and offer a catalogue of security do's and don'ts. Most of us find that rather boring, whatever may be the importance of keeping a checklist. It becomes rather like those notices lit up by the side of the road, when you are driving. You expect to find some important piece of information about the road in front and as you get closer and it becomes legible, it tells you to drink, don't think or words to that effect.

So, at the risk of being boring, do look again at Geoff Dickman's notes in the Winter 2009 EH News (no 130), and the card that came with it. These notes provide a summary on how to maintain security at home, and how best to contact the police and NHW as necessary. For those who would like to mark items of furniture and garden equipment etc., remember that I (MHW) have custody of the marking kit, made available by the Police.

Apart from talking about security matters, the way we now feel that we can be of most regular value to our community, is to ask for villagers to provide NHW with their e-mail, on the understanding that we will communicate news, only, as appears desirable. Generally, there is a flow of information from the police, for security reasons, not always quite specific, but enough to tell us what is going on, and what to look out for. From time to time a pattern of crime emerges, and householders should then beware of the particular risk that has developed. This kinc of news we should be able to forward, and if done by e-mail, it saves a great deal of shoe leather on the part of scarce street co-ordinating resources.

Risk of the moment – We are going through a period of rising oil prices, and so, for those of us who heat their home by oil, it is important to make sure that the tank is secure. It should not be possible to syphon out contents. As a crime, this is not uncommon.

Hanna's Field suffered damage again recently to one of the goal posts, the turf on the football pitch and the fencing by the car park. We need to be observant if we are to pick up the perpetrators and bring them to book. The sad thing about such activity is that it costs the charity money that would otherwise be available to improve our village hall facilities.

I called the District Council and when the forms arrived I helped to fill them in and gather supporting documents ready for her to take to the Council offices.

FROM REVEREND PAM

Do you know what happened to the egg who was tickled too much? He cracked up. I suspect this made rather a lot of mess. Unless he was a chocolate Easter egg, in which case he would have disappeared rather quickly after cracking up, at least in our house! This year I am ordering some Easter eggs which explain the real meaning of Easter on the box. One of the meanings of the Easter egg, they say, is that it is like the tomb in which Jesus was put after he died. In this case it is most appropriate to crack open the egg!

Easter has many meanings but at the heart of it, it touches upon our deepest needs and, possibly, fears. The real meaning of Easter forces us to look death in the face. No wonder we prefer the chocolate and the bunnies. However, Easter is also about overcoming fears, relieving heavy burdens and hope in a time of darkness - things we may not often think about. Easter time is a journey which takes us through darkness into light and from death to life.

Our Lent course gives us a chance to pause to think about some of the meanings of Easter. It is a chance to think and reflect in a way which our busy lives often don't allow but which can bring support and encouragement. At the end of this time we will share meals together in our houses and the next day reflect upon the events of Good Friday. Finally we celebrate the mo-

mentous event of Easter Day which not only assures us that there life after death but also gives our lives a special meaning and purpose in the here and now. Then we crack open the Easter eggs!

...AND FROM THE CHURCHWARDENS

Connection to the sewer – all the formalities have now been concluded (after 15 months' of keeping up the pressure, let it be said!), and we are waiting to hear when the contractor can come to do the work – putting in a manhole on our side of the hedge, and connecting it to The Old Police House manhole on the other side, giving the church access to the main sewer for the first time in its history. We are extremely grateful to our neighbours for so generously offering us this low-cost connection, which puts us in a much stronger starting position as we now move on to...

An architect's feasibility study – the basic aim of this will be to show us how we may best incorporate the desired additional facilities into our Victorian building, harmoniously but effectively. There are numerous constraints in such a building as you may imagine.

But as well as lack of hospitality facilities like a toilet and a kitchen point, we are very aware of a lack of space in certain key areas within the building, and there is no adequate meeting room or space which can be separately heated. So we will be asking for all of these matters to be taken into account in the feasibility study at the same time. If there is anything which you observe as a lack or a real problem when you come to church for Sunday services, children's activities, weddings, funerals or any other occasions, please do let us know. This is the beginning of a wider consultation to ensure that we get things as right as we can, within the constraints referred to – some quite obvious, others more hidden, like our church's bats!

Children's Corner – Because of the length of time which all of the above is going to take, including the necessary fund raising, it has been agreed to press on with this low-cost upgrade to provide better facilities for children during services without further delay. Diocesan permission has been received, and we are now seeking a date for the work to be commenced. The target is "Ready by Easter"!

Church Spring Clean – Saturday 19th March from 10am to 12 noon including tea/coffee breaks. It may be hard work but there is usually a relaxed atmosphere and all are very welcome. If you are no good with a duster or vacuum cleaner, we can offer some gardening work in and around the churchyard as an alternative.

Annual General Meeting - Tuesday 12th April at 8.00pm in the Village Hall Meeting Room, and as usual, will include elections for the Church Council (PCC), and also this year, for Deanery Synod, which includes ex-officio membership of the PCC. VILLAGE HALL & PLAYING FIELDS

First the bad news — The police are investigating two incidents of vandalism and damage to the Village Hall playing field, car park and play areas in January/February. Apart from the question of why anyone should find pleasure in doing this and the disruption and extra work it caused, the bill will be approaching £500, money which the Charity would prefer to put into providing new field facilities rather than having to repair them. So if you know who did this damage please call Crime Stoppers anonymously on 0800-500-111 and quote the Chelmsford police Incident Number 340 30/01/2011.

Secondly the four football teams using our playing fields every weekend have again complained about another form of antisocial behaviour – dog fouling. Although the majority of dog owners are responsible and put dog poo in the bins provided around the playing field, there are still a few who believe the playing field byelaws don't apply to them. Apart from the toxicaris health risk, it's a pain to have to clear up the mess every weekend before any games can be played so all dog owners please do the right thing and pick it afterwards.

Now the good news – Starting 21st February (half term), the Charity will be replacing the flooring in the Hall entrance lobby and kitchen to match the new maple wood effect flooring completed in 2010 in the large hall and small halls. There will be a couple of days of disruption but the overall effect once complete will be to considerably smarten up the Hall for all users.

A major event in the Charity's calendar is the Annual General Meeting, but this year particularly so as it is the 25 anniversary of the building of the Village Hall. The AGM will be in the Hall Meeting Room on the evening of Wednesday 13th April.

This is a public meeting in that anyone living in the parish is entitled to come along and listen to how Charity has managed over the past year and have a say about its future. At this meeting and in accordance with the Charity's Trust Deed, local residents can become a trustee for a year and get involved with the running of Hanna's Field and its facilities. So if you interested in local affairs or would just like to know more about the Charity why not come along to this special Silver Jubilee AGM-refreshments provided!

There is a list of Hall activities on the Hall entrance windows. - the very latest is art classes which are running in the Hall meeting room twice a week. The hall hire rates are on the Charity notice board in the Hall and on the Parish Council Web Site (Village Hall) and there are reduced rates if you are a resident of the parish. 
Our days are like suitcases, all the same size - but some can pack more into them than others. 'A person who chases fantasies has no sense.' (Proverbs 12:11)


We are keen to encourage children's understanding of how people live in other parts of Britain and beyond, and to this end we have made links with a school overseas and a school in an urban area.



CORRECTION

The Editor has been asked to correct a statement on this page in the previous edition of the News regarding the initiation of the appeal for a community building. The full text of the written request can be found on page 13.

The Editor clearly confused the order of events, apologies for rewriting history and the distress that this has caused.

The Playgroup's need for accommodation following its removal from the old Rectory to the WI Hall happened some years after the creation of the Community Centre Appeal Committee.

The Playgroup's donation of £2,500 to Hanna's Field Charity came at about the time of building completion in early 1986. It is believed, but open to correction, that Playgroup was the only village group, other than the Parish Council and Hanna's Field Charity, that contributed financially to the village hall so deserves some recognition for this.

PARISH COUNCIL

The term of office of the Parish Council elected in 2007 came to end in May. All but one of the councillors have decided to continue, and I should like to thank Penny Waters for her contribution to the work of the Council during her time as a councillor and wish her well for the future. Her botanic knowledge and her representation of residents living outside the village centre was greatly valued by PC.

PC's Annual Report for the year 2010-11 was presented at the Annual Assembly. If you would like to read it you can find it on the website, but paper copies are available on application to me. The Annual Report contains PC's receipts and payments account for the financial year that ended on 31st. March, 2011 and an overview of the year by the Chairman.

If you walk along the path across the playing field, or visit the play area you will have noticed the arrival of a large green frog and a chocolate brown bear (see front cover). These are new bins to encourage users of the play area to dispose of their litter properly, and the plan appears to be working as they do fill up. Not so conspicuous are the new safety surfaces and the benches for parfaces and the benches for parfaces to rest on while their children

are playing. All the items including the safety surfaces are made with recycled materials. PC's relatively small financial contribution of £750 to the Hanna's Field Charity project encouraged the Community Initiatives Fund and Essex Community Foundation to contribute much larger sums so that the scheme with a total cost of just over £8,000 could be completed. PC has found over many years that this "pump priming" is a proven way of making a little money go a

long way by attracting more funds into the parish. Well done to HFC for seeking out and winning the grant funding!

Further to the subject of field improvements, some of the excavated soil from the play area project was added to the area of the bike mounds at the corner of the playing field to create more jumps and obstacles, but there wasn't enough. The Charity has been offered a lorry load of earth by David Chennells, but a lorry is needed to transport it from the farm to the playing field. If anyone can oblige, please let me know.

As mentioned in the last news, this year is the 25th. Anniversary of the construction of the Village Hall. In recognition of this there will be a dance on **Saturday, 1st. October**. A band called the Kings of Wah, which comes highly recommended, has been booked for the occasion. Put the date in your diary, on your calendar or where ever you keep important aide-mémoire because this is going to be an event not to be missed!



John Allenby who is the parish's representative at the

County Council's public transport meetings, has asked me to mention two new services. The first is the Broomfield Hopper which circulates clockwise around the Broomfield Hospital site every twenty minutes taking in Farleigh Hospice and the Crystal and Linden Centres. It runs from 8.30am to 6pm Monday to Friday, is free and will drop you off at any point on the loop on request. The second is a bus to Hylands House from Market Road, Chelmsford, outside County Hall. It runs every second Monday of the months April to September at 10am, 12noon and 2pm returning at 1, 3 and 5pm. I have also received a call from another bus user to remind residents to support the bus service, because low use will make the County Council reconsider its subsidy, and unprofitable running will lead to the loss of contractors willing to undertake the routes.

Please note that there are new timetables in the bus shelters and some of the times are different, so if you are not a frequent bus user you might not be aware of the changes.

There was a plan to include a contacts list in this issue of the News and a request was issued in the last edition for groups to let me know the name and contact details of the member they wished to nominate as their contact. There was no response to that call. I'm sure that local groups do want to be contacted by potential members, so please let me have the contact details of the person who deals with enquiries, so that we can compile a list which will benefit the groups who want new members and local people looking for new interests and activities.

Thanks to all those who helped with the Village Spring Clean on 7th. May. Everyone commented that there was much less litter than usual. Nevertheless, an Autumn Clean is planned for Saturday 22nd. October, so please make a note of the date and join us for some fresh air and light exercise.

An extra summer play day has been added to the dates in the last News. The Tuesdays to remember are **9th**, **16th & 23rd August 10am-12 noon**. The two Easter play days achieved attendances of 60 and 45 children, so clearly met a need.



Please note that the PC meeting in July is earlier in the month than the usual fourth Thursday, being on 14th. PC Meetings are open to the public and give residents the opportunity to speak during Public Question Time which takes place shortly after the opening of each meeting. We are now using an overhead projector which means that everyone can see the plans and papers being discussed.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

With reference to the article on the inside front cover of edition No 135 of East Hanningfield News, this contains a statement which is factually incorrect in regard to the involvement of 'the Playgroup' with the village hall project.

At the annual parish meeting in 1972, which was attended by a very large number of the general public, the Parish Council was asked what plans it had to provide the village with a playing field and a village hall, given the absence of any public hall facility other than the Women's Institute building in which the meeting was being held, coupled with the impending loss of the rented playing field, which was to become the site for a new District Council housing scheme.

In response, Parish Council advised that it had no plan to rectify these deficiencies, but resultant upon the representations made to it at this meeting, it agreed to the establishment of a sub committee to the Council, - to be named East Hanningfield Community Centre Appeal Committee, whose specific brief would be to raise money for the purchase of land and to provide a village hall.

I was Secretary to the East Hanningfield Playgroup Association at the time, - latterly its Chairman, and I can state quite categorically that the Association did not initiate or have any involvement whatsoever in the appeal for a community building as state in your article, neither did it have any involvement in raising funds for the project nor with the fund raising sub-committee of East Hanningfield Parish Council.

I would be most grateful therefore, if you will include a correction to this effect in the next edition of East Hanningfield News, please, in the interest of historical accuracy.

Burglary - Crime Pays?

A house on The Tye was burgled in March and valuables and a laptop taken as well as some damage being done. The valuables were family heirlooms and the laptop had personal details on it so it was a double blow for the family involved. Sadly it's not the first burglary on The Tye. NhW statistics show that since the start of 2007 seven houses on The Tye have received unwelcome visitors (with no arrests or goods recovered!). How can you avoid becoming a victim?

Don't be complacent – some parts of the parish are more at risk than others but the statistics show it can happen to any of us. Get into the habit of taking simple precautions.

Receive <u>local</u> NhW emailed alerts - by receiving these you will be part of a growing local network of people who are aware of what's going on, receive police updates on local crimes etc, and if you see or know something it's easy to let NhW know.

Look on the East Hanningfield NhW website. It gives simple tips on how to reduce the risk of being burgled but also provides updates on scams, rogue callers, and NhW and police phone numbers etc.

Do this and together we may stop crime paying for some people at least!

Next NhW Meeting: Wednesday 15th June, 8pm – Village Hall Meeting Room: Local residents are welcome. It's usually attended by a police officer. If you have an issue or want to know more about East Hanningfield NhW or you have ideas about how to reduce local crime come along!







BOROUGH COUNCILLOR'S MESSAGE

It is, I know, inconvenient to have so many road-works in the village, however, I do hope that the outcome will be that many of the repairs that have been requested for many years actually occur. I certainly share the frustrations of those who have fought for so long to get them done.

We must not let that happen here in East Hanningfield, indeed to build a community suite into the village hall when much towards this has already been laid out in plans and ideas, would be a great and motivating challenge for young people of all ages to work on, to enjoy now and to leave as a tangible piece of heritage for those who will follow us. Please let me know if you could help. We don't need people sitting in committees for hours, simply to bring talent, experience and enthusiasm to achieve a wonderful outcome.

HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY

Our annual Art Exhibition on 8th and 9th July was once again an enjoyable and successful fund raising event! Many helped with this but our special thanks go to Wendy Thomas for all her hard work – everything from liaising with the artists before hand to putting up the advertising boards and then greeting people on the day! But, without the help of all the volunteers involved and those people who came along and bought paintings it wouldn't have been the success it was, so - thank you!

The next planned fundraising activity is the Fete which is covered elsewhere in this News. Watch out also in future for signs for Book Sales that take place every 3 months, which are held in our Hall upstairs Meeting Room.

Hanna's Field Committee (the trustees of the Charity which day to day manages the Village Hall and Playing Fields) organises fund raising events to help us to maintain the Village Hall and Sports Fields for residents of the Parish to enjoy – last year the Art Exhibition and the Village Fete proceeds allowed us to purchase 100 new chairs and contribute towards new flooring throughout the ground floor rooms and corridors.

We not only maintain the existing facilities but also always looking at ways to improve them for the future. The Charity works hard not only to raise funds itself but also source grants (which often require match funding from us). As a result of recent grants of £5,978 from Essex County Council, £1,320 from the Essex Community Foundation Grassroots and £750 from Parish Council and our own fundraising efforts, we are very pleased to report the recent installation of two new rubbish bins (the Frog and Bear), bench seats, and new safety surfaces around the Slide and T-Bar swing in the children's play area.

Recently the Charity has begun discussing with our postmaster Ash, and the Parish Council, the feasibility of extending the post office/

shop and how this might be funded.

In October this year the Village Hall will be 25 years old, something to celebrate! But time brings with it upkeep and maintenance headaches to manage. We are having to investigate at present the condition of the main roof because of leaks, and it looks like the panels have reached the end of their life – this is obviously going to be a major expense for the Charity.

Ideas and help from residents are always welcome and we would love to have new faces at our fund raising events and meetings. For people moving into the village, the Charity is an excellent way of meeting people, making new friends and becoming part of the wider community. The committee meets alternate months to make decisions about the Hall and Playing Field and pursue ideas for improving the facilities for the benefit of all parish residents.

There are lots of activities that take place in the Hall and its worth periodically repeating what they are, ranging from Pre-School and Hanna's Tots, Carpet Bowls, Ballroom & Latin Dancing, Yoga, Badminton, Dog Training, Art Classes, starting this month, Zumba-Aerobics, and of course Football on the playing fields. Details for these activities can be seen at the Hall. There is a lot already happening in the Hall but there is always scope for more. The Hall facilities are available for hire – privately and commercially. There are reduced rates if you are a local resident. The Hall meeting room is also available and is a very comfortable well furnished room with separate facilities for making refreshments. It has the advantage of wireless Broadband access, white board, flip chart and projector screen, so it's ideal for meetings and training events.

FROM REVEREND PAM

While I have been writing this I have been listening to the news after the looting and riots in London and other cities. People are now trying to work out what has gone wrong for such a thing to happen and all sorts of suggestions are now being made. Reasons suggested for the rioting have ranged from lack of parenting skills, breakdown of the family unit, lack of opportunities for young people, education in schools not up to scratch, to such things as cultural influence, government policies, government cuts in expenditure, policing strategies, response to perceived injustice and pure criminality. It is beginning to sound like the lyrics of the comical song 'Gee, Officer Krupke' from the musical 'West Side Story' where the youths' problems were blamed in turn on their families, their psychology, their society, and their disposition.

In response to the events of the rioting it has to be said that some good things have happened in the aftermath. Victims have been gracious to others, communities have pulled together, people have shown their pride in their country and neighbourhood. But, apart from a vigil, I have yet to hear of the place of spirituality (or lack of it) as an antidote or help in these circumstances.

I have a friend who is a black pastor working in London. He visits schools to talk to black youths and encourage them to have the confidence to participate in their school education and so have the chance of employment or a career later. This pastor uses his belief in the love of God for everyone as a way of motivating youngsters to believe that they have a sense of value because of God's love for them. This sense of value, combined with the ethical values of the Christian faith, can help to give the youths the confidence they lack in themselves and enable them to succeed and play their part in society.

Having a spiritual dimension to life does not solve all our problems in a simplistic way but it does give the offer of strength from God, a sense of belonging, standards to aim for and a deep knowledge of

being accepted, forgiven and loved. This is the message which Christ came to bring and our lives are indeed impoverished without it.






EAST HANNINGFIELD W.I.






CHRISTMAS COVER 2011

PARISH COUNCIL

Thank you to those, who at the Village Fete, registered their interest in participating in a Village Design group. Unfortunately, there were not enough of you to make a viable group, so PC is still looking for a few more people who would like to take part. Please get in touch if you are interested.

The dance to celebrate the Village Hall's 25th. Anniversary, mentioned in the last News, was a success although we could have squeezed a few more in easily. The band proved to be entertaining with a varied repertoire.

If you voted in the County Council by-election you probably already know that our new County Councillor is Ian Grundy. You can contact him in writing at cllr.ian.grundy@essex.gov.uk or at Glenwood, 5 Thornton Place, Stock CM4 9NQ.

For one of the Play in the Park sessions during August, PC booked a cycling coach to attend, the intention being that the children would have some fun riding their bikes under supervision. It turned out to be a very wet day, so the coach decided to have a session indoors showing the children how to maintain their bikes. This turned out to be a lucky turn of events, because some of the bikes were in a dangerous condition. It seems that some bikes nowadays are bought in kit form and have to be put together, and it is possible to put them together incorrectly. As we are coming up to Christmas when children often receive a new bike, it is a good time to warn parents that bikes that come "flat packed" must be built exactly according to the instructions and not by guesswork, because your child's life could depend upon it.

I am often asked what is happening about the Fairlawns and Three Horseshoes sites, as they seem to have been under development for such a long time. The developer at Fairlawns recently made an application to renew the planning permission for 3 detached houses and 2 double garages granted in 2008 but then withdrew

it because the existing permission lasts until 2013. We are likely to see something happening at this site soon. Development of the site will result in a "planning obligation" for PC of about £3,000 to spend on the Village Hall or playing fields. A further £6,000 will go to the County Council to spend on "ongoing traffic calming initiatives in East Hanningfield". At the Horseshoes permission was granted in August to remove the decking in order to create extra parking provision and to build a single storey extension on the back, and you will probably have noticed that the decking has already gone.

At the time of writing it looks as though PC will soon achieve a full set of 7 councillors again, there having been a vacancy since the election in May. Watch this space for more news on this.

Parish Council Meetings are public meetings, which means anyone is permitted to attend. This PC takes this further and invites residents to attend and bring to the Council's notice matters of local concern. This can be done be speaking during Public Question Time, or by writing to me a letter for inclusion on the next Agenda. The Agenda is published three clear days before each Meeting and can be found on the noticeboards at the Bicknacre Road junction, beside the post-box on the Tye and in the window of the Village Hall entrance lobby. It is also published on the website, where you can also find Minutes, Annual Reports and Audited Accounts going back to 2005/6. There are also copies of East Hanningfield News going back to Autumn 2004, plus the first five editions starting with Summer 1974.

Meetings generally take place on the **FOURTH** Thursday of each month, except December, and begin at 8pm. You can find them in the first floor Meeting room at the Village Hall. Please use the side entrance door, because the connecting door to the main Hall will be locked.

The service is provided primarily for shoppers so the driver is willing to stop, if safe to do so, at points along the route, either to pick up or drop off.

Recognising reputable traders: There have been regular warnings from NhW about bogus callers, but how do we recognise reputable traders? You can find out on the East Hanningfield NhW website. The indicators of how to recognise a reputable trader are: they present a valid personal identification and identify who they represent—they make it clear from the outset if they are selling something—they provide written information on cooling off periods and cancellation rights—they do not use pressure to sell goods or services- they do not expect an on-the-spot decision—they leave as soon as they are asked to do so. If you have any concerns about a Company and its product you can contact Consumer Di-

Lights On! With the dark evenings, it's time to think about not leaving "tell tale" signs that your home is empty and vulnerable. The art of illusion is to make it look as though someone is home. Provide that first impression to the opportunist burglar that this house is occupied! For the illusion use table lamps on timers (don't use energy saving bulbs with digital timers: it shortens the life of the bulb) or use a "dusk till dawn" sensor (bulbs are available with a built in sensor), a radio on a talking programme, it all helps. You can even buy a device now called "Fake TV" that mimics the light from a TV. And as we approach Christmas, NhW will again receive police reports of burglaries where the family presents, often conveniently left on display around the Christmas tree, have been stolen. Please keep them safe and out of sight.

How to Report Incidents or Suspicious Activity to the Police. Call 999 if a crime is in progress or a vehicle or person is acting suspiciously (you won't be wasting Police time). For non urgent incidents dial the new short code 101 (this replaces the old Essex Police 0300 333 44444 number). You can give information anonymously to Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

BOROUGH COUNCILLOR'S MESSAGE

At a recent, very informative meeting at Hylands House a planning group of consultants engaged by Chelmsford, Maldon and Brentwood Councils were looking at the future for this whole area and made some points which I would like to share. Firstly that the number of people living in the average house is dropping and this pattern continues. Thinking back to the numbers who lived in houses in this village this is true and many longer serving residents will confirm this. At the same time average ages are rising. The dual effect is that if there is no more development in the region then the population will fall the number of school places will fall and the number of school children are estimated and 3000 more older people. Also some 150,000 people move from London Boroughs to Essex every year.

To have schools, shops and post offices villages must be viable and the cost of pre school and school is measured per pupil. In primary schools with 95 to 105 pupils viability will fall far behind schools with say 130 pupils and this effects funding. Shops and post offices need both numbers of residents and their support. I won't draw a conclu-



sion from this but I think that it will trigger much thought and debate in rural communities like ours and lead to opportunities. What do you think? We need to produce a 'Village Design Statement' to follow our 'Parish Plan'. Please get involved!

We are very aware that as we add facilities the on-going maintenance of those facilities becomes a considerable burden on the Charity. These projects can only proceed if the funds are available. We rely upon grants from a number of different sources to fund each project. These sources include both local and national funders from the Parish Council to the







COVER PHOTOGRAPHS

The top pair of photos are of a female comma butterfly. You can see the white comma on the under-wing. Commas like to lay their eggs on hops, but where they are missing will use nettles instead. The lower photos are of a female gatekeeper otherwise known as a hedge brown. Gatekeepers lay their eggs in long grass, so both these butterflies rely on "untidy" areas to survive.

You should be able to see them in this parish during the summer months.

PARISH COUNCIL

Slipped into the centre pages of this edition of the News you should have found a housing survey. PC has arranged for this survey to be carried out by the Rural Community Council of Essex in order to find out whether there is a need for more affordable housing for local people, and if there is a need, to find out how many homes are required. If you have not received a survey form with its reply paid envelope, please contact the Rural Housing Enabler, Moira Groborz on 01376 574330 or by e-mail at moira.groborz@essexrcc.org.uk and she will provide you with one, or more if you have more than one household living at your address.

Please note that PC has not identified a site where affordable housing for local people might be built.

Enough volunteers have now put themselves forward to comprise a viable Village Design Statement group, and they will be starting the project soon. A VDS looks at the locality in planning terms, and examines what local features enhance the area and should be retained, and, conversely, what are eyesores, and what styles should be used in future development. If you would like to participate in the process, please get in touch, preferably by email if you have that facility, but with your telephone number and address if you do not.

From Monday 2nd July 2012 some Monday to Friday Service 3 journeys will be re-routed between Rettendon Common and East Hanningfield to operate along Buckhatch Lane and Creephedge Lane. All Saturday services will operate along the new section of route and will be retimed. The new section of route will be hail and ride meaning buses will stop where it is safe to do so. In addition Essex County Council and RHS Hyde Hall are working together to provide some new bus stop infrastructure on Buckhatch Lane adjacent to Hyde Hall and it is hoped some of this will be in place for the start of the revised service. There are four variations of the Number 3 service & they are as follows: No.3 serves all stops between Chelms-

ney Green; No. 3a is the same as No. 3 but will not serve Hyde Hall; No 3b will not serve Great Baddow, East Hanningfield or Hyde Hall; and No 3c is the same as No. 3 but will not serve Great Baddow. There will also be some improvements to the vehicles which are currently used on the service including repainting in Regal's new colours, installation of electronic destination blinds, refurbishment of seats and improvement of interior signs. Regal Busways hope all these changes will have a positive impact on the service and increase ridership to secure its future. The new timetable will be displayed in the bus shelters, but if you have the facility it is always best to check the County Council's website for the most recent timetable information at www.cartogold.co.uk/Essex Public Transport/. For information about Summer Day Trips from the village please go to www.regalexplorer.co.uk or look on the noticeboards.



Thinking ahead to when your central heating will go back on, you might be interested in an Oil Buying Scheme being set up by the Rural Community Council of Essex. RCCE is a long established charity

that works with rural communities in Essex. Membership of the scheme for households will be £20 a year and for this RCCE will negotiate with suppliers for the lowest price. Deliveries to members in an area will be on the same day, thus reducing diesel usage and delivery traffic. If you would like to know more I can forward you an email with the explanatory leaflets or you can find the information on RCCE's website www.essexrcc.org.uk. The administrator of the scheme is Sara Ward who can be contacted on 01376 574340 & oil@essexrcc.org.uk. The RCCE is looking for a local volunteer to co-ordinate orders who will, in return, receive free membership of the scheme.

Thank you to everyone who turned up on a damp Saturday morning at the end of April to participate in the Village Tidy-up, and also to those who chose to do their bit at another time when it wasn't quite so inclement. Our village and surrounding lanes continue to be used

as a dumping ground by those who can't be bothered to deposit their rubbish in the appropriate place, so the Tidy-up continues to be necessary and markedly improves the appearance and safety of our surroundings.

The two Play in the Park sessions during the Easter break went very well, with over 50 children attending the first and about 20 the second. There are to be three more during the summer break for ages 0.11 years all on Tuesday mornings 10-12

I have received notice from the County Council Highways Department that they have scheduled several road closures within an 18 month period beginning 4th. June. Roads listed in this and neighbouring parishes are Back Lane; Bicknacre, Priory Road; Danbury, Bicknacre Road; Sandon, Butts Green Road, Hulls Lane, Southend Road; South Hanningfield, Church Road, Ramsden Heath School Road, Downham; West Hanningfield, Ship Road/Holiday Hill. Residents will receive notice by letter at least 14 days in advance of the dates their roads will be closed. Everyone else will have to look out for the warning signs!

Chelmsford Borough Council's Overview and Scrutiny Committee recently approved an Equipped Play Area—Draft Development Plan, which it is proposed should go to Cabinet for approval in July. With

regard to East Hanningfield the Plan states, "All play areas are located within 100m of each other with good footpath access. East Hanningfield Parish Council neighbourhood play area provides excellent play value, diversity and is accessible for all parts of the village. It is proposed to remove both small local play areas (Payne Place and Catherines Close) as they represent over provision and do not add any significant play value in this area". The areas would be left as green space. Please let me know if you have a comment on this



Cold callers - Since the last News a number of elderly residents have experienced attempts by cold callers to steal or defraud them of money. Some neighbourly advice on this from NhW:



It's OK to give the "cold shoulder" to cold callers You owe them nothing!

Remember these simple rules:

Never let a stranger in to your home – Always check ID Beware of the hard sell – They only want your money!

Never feel pressured in to making a hurried decision Make an appointment for a more convenient time – You're in control If in doubt always ask a trusted neighbour for support If you're a soft touch the news will get round – expect further visits

Prowlers - Secondly, there have been two recent reports of night time prowlers entering residents back gardens etc. Keep garden gates and rear doors locked and secure at night. Don't make it easy for criminals. Let us know if you have had problems and call 999 if you think someone is on your property that shouldn't be.

Using an Outdoor Key Safe? A timely warning! - A resident had their outside key safe broken into and house key stolen very recently. There are a number of Key Safes on the market, but the only one approved by the Police is Supra C500 Key Safe which has the highest level of security awarded to any key safe. Police approval was achieved through the 'Secured by Design' initiative.

New NhW logo - Lastly, East Hanningfield NhW have adopted an alternative NhW logo for use on signs etc. It replaces the previous logo (showing people with a Policeman). These social creatures

have captured the popular imagination because they maintain vigilance against predators and look out for other members of their group. We feel this at the heart of what NhW is about and better symbolises the message we want to convey.





You can find the dates of our meetings in the magazines calendar section. Do come along you will be most welcome and I look forward to meeting you soon.





The Housing Enabler's report concludes, "Fifteen forms were received indicating a need for affordable housing. Following general planning guidance this would lead to a recommendation of seven units. At this stage it is recommended that three one bedroom units, two two bedroom units and two three bedroom units be considered. There is some indication that income and savings levels could support shared ownership tenure in one or two units but the majority be report.

In the last News I made reference to the City Council's Equipped Play Review, which included the proposal to close the play areas at

Catherine Close and Payne Place. I received some very useful information from residents about their use of the play areas and how much they are valued, and I was able to forward this information to the relevant councillors and officers. City Cllr. Richard Poulter was present at the PC meeting when the matter was discussed and residents attended to express their views, and he undertook to support the opposition against the plans for the East Hanningfield play areas. Some parents were able to organise a petition prior to the Review being debated at the City Council, which I am sure made a facity Council officer who will be looking at the future of equipped play in the village, and you can be assured that I will be able to convey to him the views of local parents.

PC has decided not to attempt to hold an Autumn Village Tidy, but suggested there might be a few more people who would like to adot parts of the village to keep tidy, so if that it you, please let me know and I'll provide you with a litter picker, and some sacks.

The East Hanningfield Village Design Statement Association has now been formed and has appointed its officers: Chairman, Cliff Foster; Secretary, David Lewis; Treasurer, Martin Harcourt Williams. You will be hearing from them shortly as they consult on various aspects of planning in the parish. If you are interested in becoming involved, they would be very pleased to hear from you. Please keep an eye open for posters announcing their meetings. The next is due to take place at the end of this month. You will be able to follow their activities on their dedicated website, which is linked from PC's website.

In the meantime you might like to give some thought to what you think enhances the appearance of the village and parish and what detracts from it. For example, some Essex villages are now having three storey houses built, would that be appropriate for us? Would the village have the same character if several householders decided to install brick walls and wrought iron electric gates?

PC Meetings continue of the FOURTH Thursday of the month. The Agenda appears on the noticeboards three days beforehand. The Meetings are open to members of the public, so you can come along and listen, and ask a question, if you have one, or make a statement during Public Question Time. If you have a matter which you think requires consideration by the Council please get it to me in writing a week before the meeting so that it can go on the Agenda as an item of correspondence.



The caller tells you to type the URL of a seemingly legitimate website but this will allow the scammers to take over control of your computer. Some scammers even claim to be from Microsoft or other providers. Not true, these companies do not phone you with this type of problem unless you contact them first. If you are unsure or cannot verify if a cold call is legitimate then just HANG UP- it

email purportedly from someone you know who has found themselves in a difficult situation, usually abroad, and is in need of money? It is almost certain to be a scam. A similar scam doing the rounds is



where the email appears to be from a trusted source, but has the subject headings and an attachment also called "Private Message". 

BETHEL CHURCH—RUN THE GOOD RACE

What can be said that hasn't already been said about our fantastic medal haul at the London 2012 Olympic games? I'm sure like me, you've been yelling at the TV screen, willing our athletes over the line.

I also loved hearing the stories behind many of the Olympians who overcame great difficulties even to compete, let alone stand on the podium.

One of my fond Olympic memories was several years ago during the Barcelona Olympics, the world saw one of the greatest moments in Olympic history. Derek Redmond, a young man from Britain, had dreamed all his life of winning a gold medal in the 400 meter race. He had worked hard to get to the Olympics and his dream was within his reach. He was in the semi-finals and was running the race of his life. He could see the finish line just ahead as he rounded the final turn. Suddenly, he felt a sharp pain in the back of his leg and he fell to the track with a torn muscle in his right leg.

As the medical attendants ran toward him, Derek struggled to his feet. He started to hop toward the finish line on one foot in an attempt to finish the race. Suddenly, a large man came out of the stands, pushed aside a security guard and ran to Derek's side. It was Jim Redmond, Derek's father. "You don't have to do this," he told his son. "Yes, I do," said Derek. "Well, then," said his father, "we're going to finish this together."

And they did. They stayed in Derek's lane all the way to the end. At first, the crowd watched in silence. Then they rose to their feet and cheered, and wept.

Derek Redmond didn't win the gold medal, but he walked away with the incredible memory of a loving father who, when he saw his son in pain, left his seat in the stands to help him finish the race.

The Christian life is often referred to as a race. The Christian race begins when we receive Jesus as our Saviour. It continues as we daily put our trust in him and step out to be his person and to do his will. We live day by day on the basis of his amazing grace. The Christian life is enabled and empowered by the indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit. But the Spirit doesn't do it for us - we are the ones who have to step out with confidence, trusting him as we run the race. There is effort in the Christian life. We depend on what God has done for us in Christ our Saviour.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame. Hebrews 12:1-2

The Bible teaches us that life is like a race that has been set before us. We may struggle and face many obstacles, but we have a great crowd of witnesses who encourage us on. We have a Heavenly Father who loves us and will help us when the pain is too great. We have a Saviour, who left his place in heaven and came to earth to show us how to run the race. If we will keep our eyes on him, how can we help but finish the race?

At Bethel Church, we probably don't look like the fully toned athletes that we've seen winning Olympic glory, but we are running our race, nonetheless.

Come and join us on our Marathon. Or come and say hello at the Village Fete.







EAST HANNINGFIELD PLAYING FIELD & VIL-LAGE HALL PROJECT 1972-1986 by Alan Dixon

I was privileged to have been involved with this project from the beginning to the end, as a member, then Chairman of East Hanningfield Parish Council; as Chairman of East Hanningfield Community Centre Appeal Committee from its inception; and subsequently, member of the later land management committee.

It is my intention in this brief article therefore, to present a factually correct account of the project from its inception to its completion, since it represents a very considerable achievement for a small community such as East Hanningfield, which has not been accurately recorded hitherto.

The East Hanningfield Community Centre Appeal Committee (EHCCAC) was created by East Hanningfield Parish Council (EHPC) in May, 1972, and was answerable to the Parish Council. There having been no previous initiative in the village for this purpose, it was tasked with raising money to purchase land should such a piece of land become available, in order to replace the rented playing field and to provide a site for a village hall.

In order to create a small float of working cash, the six all male members of the new committee, two of whom had only arrived in the village during the previous year, raffled a bottle of Scotch whisky amongst themselves, but as the saying goes, out of small acorns great oaks may grow!


A programme of events was devised, which by reason of its wide entertainment value would attract the general public at large, and this strategy was an instant success. However, the annual Christmas draw just involved all the village households, whilst the mid summer wine bottling party was very popular with a specific clientele, and themed supper dances were also successful. Using Mildenhall Round Table's team and equipment, the new annual East Hanning-

field Go Cart Grand Prix was immediately popular in September, 1972, and it was followed in March of 1975 by the first annual Chelmsford Model Railway Show, which was even more successful, with both events attracting visitors in their thousands. However, none of these activities would have been possible without the small army of people of all ages and both sexes, from all parts of the community, some of whom did not even live in East Hanningfield, who turned out 'on the day' each to his or her allotted post as part of the team, in order to make the event happen.

Sadly, one failure has to be recorded in order to complete the fund raising picture, inasmuch as the concert featuring the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, which was promoted by the Committee at the Odeon Cinema in Chelmsford, made a loss.



parent that this building would be as costly to adapt and less appropriate for the task than entirely new build, and it was sold. An acceptable quotation having been obtained for the construction of a more suitable new building, Parish Council pursued the matter of financing the project. In addition to the capital raised by EHCCAC, grants were obtained from Chelmsford Borough Council, Essex County Council, and once again EHPC, the latter being funded by a 20 year loan from the Public Works Loan Board.

At this point, since its fund raising activities as a registered charity were exclusive to itself and for its sole benefit, East Hanningfield Playgroup Association offered a contribution of £2,500 conditionally against the provision of suitable facilities.

A contract was placed in 1985 on a 'shoe string' budget, to construct a four bay building using second hand portal frames. However, there still remained a shortfall on the £100,000 project, but the final balance was secured by means of an interest-free loan over 5 years from the Sports Council for England's eastern region. Access to the site remained a problem however, but the splendid gift by a parishioner of a considerable tonnage of valuable crushed concrete enabled a satisfactory roadway and car parking area to be created, without which, use of the new building would have been impractical in January, 1986, when it was opened. Prior to the opening, in order to save cost, interior decoration of the hall was carried our by a very small group of ladies from the village. Also, to enable the new building to offer as wide a range of facilities as possible from the outset, a just affordable minimum of furnishing and sports equipment was purchased from Essex County Supplies.

In conclusion, it must be said that the fact the playing field and village hall have continued to be a success is the legacy of, and a fitting tribute to all those people, sadly, many of whom are now dead, who participated in the project, no matter how large or small their contribution, since without their unfailing support, the project would have been impossible to achieve.





Thank you to all the entrants: you all did very well. Also, thank you to our local School for participating again this year. Lastly, thank you to the judges.



PARISH COUNCIL

At the request of a resident we return to the unpleasant subject of dog mess. I think we all know that it is an offence, in both senses of the word, for dog faeces to be left in public

places. It is also dangerous because you can slip on a deposit if you are unlucky enough to tread in it and faeces carry a multitude of pathogens which remain in the environment when the poop has dispersed. The darker evenings make it tricky to avoid getting the stuff on your shoes when walking around the village. So, please clear up after your dog and put the waste in one of the many dog bins we have here. This applies to grassed as well as paved areas.



On a related matter, some dog owners seem to think that the signs prohibiting dogs from the fenced play area on Hanna's Field do not apply to them. However placid your dog might be with your children, it might not react so well to strange children, but more important, some children are terrified of dogs and will not use the play area if there is a dog there. Please respect the ban and do not take your dog in there.

Did you know that you can take a bus from East Hanningfield straight to Broomfield Hospital and then on to Great Dunmow? If you know someone who has missed a hospital appointment whilst driving around the car park looking for a space, you will appreciate the value of this service. It seems that Service 1 from East Hanning-field turns into Service 11 in Chelmsford and then carries on to Broomfield Hospital terminating at Great Dunmow Tesco. A few years ago, PC was approached by the Land Registry to voluntarily register any land it owns. This was thought a good idea by

PC and Hanna's Field Charity in order to prevent encroachment, which is a particular risk for public open space. Processes in real life are never as simple as the publicity would suggest, and various problems were one by one resolved so that Hanna's Field and its access are now registered.

Having noticed some die back on one of the trees at the south end of the Tye, I asked the arboriculturist at Chelmsford Council to inspect it. Unfortunately she advised that the tree in question and another should be removed, there being a danger that they might fall over. It is a requirement that trees that are removed from the conservation area should be replaced within two years, so you can be assured that the gaps will be filled. The Pyracantha on the Tye will also be cut back severely as it has spread well beyond the area that it was intended to occupy and has been colonised by a vigorous bramble.

If your property has a boundary which is skirted by a road, pavement or footpath, please could you check that there is nothing growing out which will impede the progress of passers-by? In particular, brambles seem to grow for most of the year, and pop out of hedges when you think you have everything under control. This is the time of year for hedge cutting, as mentioned by Penny on page 29, and what you need to remember is that they grow from the point to which you have cut them back, so if you cut your hedge to the edge of the footpath it will soon grow across it. You will probably remember that I have mentioned this subject before, but that is because it does generate complaints from residents.


When the traffic calming was installed in the village, the PC, and probably most residents, were surprised that the 30mph speed limit did not extend down Old Church Road as far as the junction with Pan Lane. A 40mph speed limit presently runs from that junction to the Geffrey Close junction. Since that time PC has been receiving complaints from residents of Old Church Road about speed problems there and has been pressing the County Council to reduce the

limit to 30mph. This repeated request was thought to have fallen on deaf ears, but a recent review of such requests by the County Council has resulted in that one being proposed for action. There has to be a consultation for such changes, and PC has already responded in support.

You might be wondering what happened about the proposed closure of the Payne Place and Catherine Close play areas. PC invited the Chelmsford Council officers to a meeting which also included Colin Warren as Chairman of Hanna's Field Charity. Negotiations are going to be protracted, but PC knows the strength of feeling of residents and users of the play areas and is doing all it can to retain this provision for the youngest children.

The role of Parish Clerk is wide and varied. I recently attended an event which included a briefing on blocked sewers. It seems that the manufacturers of tampons, baby & hand wipes and other similar items are misleading us when they say their products are flushable. Yes, they do flush away, but then they block the drain somewhere down the line. It seems the only manufactured article that should be flushed down the loo is toilet tissue. Blocked sewers should be reported on 08457 145 145. If the blockage is beyond your property Anglian Water will clear it, but if it is on your property you will have to pay an independent drain clearing company to do it, so it is worth remembering how not to block it in the first place!

Last Winter when we had a covering of snow on the ground, a few residents took it upon themselves to spread some of the grit on to pavements from the salt bins we have around the village. Thank you for doing that. If anyone should decide to do the same this Winter, please note that I am advised



garden centres. unlikely that the bins will be refilled before the Spring, so please snow deeper than 1cm, so it has to be cleared first, and it is by the County Council who supply the grit that it is ineffective on use sparingly. If you need grit for your garden/driveway, please do pavements and roads. You can buy bags of grit at do-it-yourself, not use the grit in the bins, which is provided specifically for use on







MESSAGE FROM ASH

It's an exciting time for the village store and the post office, as you are all already aware we have just completed the shop Refurbishment with added facilities of Lottery and Off-Licence.

Ever since I took over from Tom Wright in 2007 I have been considering ways to improve the Village store not just from business point of view, but for it to serve its purpose as a Community store & post office and to make it viable and sustainable for the future. Along with Hanna's Field Charity we developed a plan few years ago with the help of Paul Garner to extend the shop along with the Village Hall to have a Cafeteria & extended Village store, but unfortunately we could not go ahead with the plan mainly due to financial reasons. Therefore I went with a second option of refitting the village store to make use of the small space that's available, after a lot of planning and effort over a year we have now completed the shop make-over.

I would like to thank everyone who helped make this possible: ECC Big Society Fund for their match-funding towards the refurbishment; Hanna's Field Charity for their contribution towards the replacement chiller; Members of Hanna's Field Charity and East Hanningfield Parish Council for their co-operation; my colleagues Terry Tricker & Jane Brunt for their work and, most of all, the Village residents who keep this shop going.

I would like to point out that although we have a Lottery and Offlicence in the premises, our main focus will be on essential goods and post office services & I welcome any feedback from customers

Also, I would like to point out that we will be extending our opening hours over the weekends. Starting from 1st of December the Village store will be open until 6pm on Saturdays and 1pm on Sundays.

The Charity has had a busy summer with the refurbishment of the small hall. The small hall is now well insulated and lit with efficient low energy lighting. The doors and windows in the kitchen and the small hall have been replaced with new double glazed units. This refurbishment work has cost £22,000 funded by grants from Essex County Council (£6,000), Essex Community Foundation (£3,000), Tom Amos Charity (£3,000), East Hanningfield Parish Council (£4,670) and the balance by our own fundraising efforts. We intend to replace the room divider between the small and large halls and refit and redecorate the kitchen early in the New Year which will complete this phase of the refurbishment.

The two major fundraising events for the Charity are the Art Show and the Fete which has been chaired for the last 5 years by Jackie Feehan. Jackie has now passed the baton to Jenny Ash who will be the new fete committee Chairman. A big thank you to Jackie for her successful chairmanship and good luck to Jenny for the future.

The major item of expenditure for the future is the replacement of the main hall roof which after 25 years is reaching the end of its natural life. We have recently assisted with the refurbishment of the village shop and are actively seeking funding for improvements to facilities on the field including the sports courts, football pitches, mountain bike track, outdoor fitness track and sports wall. Thank you to everyone who responded to our survey on the future of the sports courts.

We are also liaising with the Parish Council over the future of the toddlers' playgrounds in Catherine Close and Paine Place offering our support for their long term retention in the village.

We have reviewed the Hall, meeting room, sports field and sports court hiring rates and new rates which incorporate a 3% rise will apply from January 2013.

The Hanna's Field Charity Committee is always looking for new members to join the committee and assist in the running of the Village Hall & sports facilities. If you would like to find out more about the Charity please contact me or any member of the committee.

The Charity's AGM will take place in April 2013 when a new committee will be elected. Villagers are particularly welcome to both come to the AGM and also to stand for election to the committee.

Preparing for winter – a few tips:


- Have your heating system serviced and your chimney swept

And, if you see something suspicious or a crime in progress call 999. Call new short code 101for non urgent incidents. You can also give information anonymously to Crimestoppers on



HEDGES, PLANTS AND OTHER CREATURES

Now, coming up to midwinter, is the time to reshape your hedges, no springtime when habitat for creatures to grow and multiply is so needed on our crowded island. When a hedge is bare of leaves, as most of our native tree/hedge plants are now, its shape can be seen. Look for nesting small mammals in bundles of leaves. Show them to your children & grandchildren, the real magic, and leave them be.

How does it need to be shaped? Always best to shape it like a tree wide at the bottom to a point(ish) at the top. You could always get artistic and weave your living hedge as it grows.

When the branches are bare it also enables one to see how to help to increase the density of the hedge for cover and food for creatures planting English honeysuckles (surely one of the sweetest smells to waft up you nostrils on an early summers day) and/or other climbers

When reshaping hedges keep in mind it is the ultimate growth of a hedge that your pruning is interacting with - you know approximately how much your hedge grows in a year. Hedges do not have to look like a block and let your "weeds" (Anglo-Saxon word for smal herbaceous medicinal plant) grow at the bottom so that you can harvest them along with what the rest of the hedge can give you: the more plants the more butterflies and others.

Nettles harvested in spring are a specific herbal tea for hayfever. Hawthorn, flowers and leaves in spring and berries in autumn, is restorative to the heart being used for high blood and also stagnation of the stomach in traditional medicine. Rosehips are also good for the heart, as long as there is no material damage to the heart, works more on the emotional heart.

Also if there is a demand - I have been medically trained - an honours degree - I would sit and talk with people about their health & nutrition & plants.






