### **PARISH COUNCIL**

The group of volunteers who carry out Community Speedwatch in the village is due for retraining, so if you are interested in joining the team this would be a good time to put yourself forward. Please contact Tony Lees on 400338 for more information.

PC has received the report analysing the results of the Housing Survey that was inserted in the last edition of the News. The results are anonymous, and neither I nor any members of PC will ever see the returned forms. Twenty one of the forms returned said that they were in need of housing, but only eighteen of those gave details, so the results have been calculated using the information given by the eighteen. In total 44 people were in need of housing, this being made up of couples, individuals, lone parent families and two parent families. Three households stated that they would prefer open market housing and one of those seemed to be in a financial position to achieve that. Five households stated they would prefer shared ownership, but their levels of savings and income indicate that only two of them would be able to do so. Eight households said that they would prefer to rent from local authority or housing association and their income levels suggest that this would be the appropriate choice. Two of the forms were concerned about the longer term.

The Housing Enabler's report concludes, "Fifteen forms were received indicating a need for affordable housing. Following general planning guidance this would lead to a recommendation of seven units. At this stage it is recommended that three one bedroom units, two two bedroom units and two three bedroom units be considered. There is some indication that income and savings levels could support shared ownership tenure in one or two units but the majority be rented.". At the time of going to press PC was yet to consider the report.

In the last News I made reference to the City Council's Equipped Play Review, which included the proposal to close the play areas at

Catherine Close and Payne Place. I received some very useful information from residents about their use of the play areas and how much they are valued, and I was able to forward this information to the relevant councillors and officers. City Cllr. Richard Poulter was present at the PC meeting when the matter was discussed and residents attended to express their views, and he undertook to support the opposition against the plans for the East Hanningfield play areas. Some parents were able to organise a petition prior to the Review being debated at the City Council, which I am sure made a favourable impression. I am supposed to be hearing shortly from a City Council officer who will be looking at the future of equipped play in the village, and you can be assured that I will be able to convey to him the views of local parents.

PC has decided not to attempt to hold an Autumn Village Tidy, but suggested there might be a few more people who would like to adot parts of the village to keep tidy, so if that it you, please let me know and I'll provide you with a litter picker, and some sacks.

The East Hanningfield Village Design Statement Association has now been formed and has appointed its officers: Chairman, Cliff Foster; Secretary, David Lewis; Treasurer, Martin Harcourt Williams. You will be hearing from them shortly as they consult on various aspects of planning in the parish. If you are interested in becoming involved, they would be very pleased to hear from you. Please keep an eye open for posters announcing their meetings. The next is due to take place at the end of this month. You will be able to follow their activities on their dedicated website, which is linked from PC's website.

In the meantime you might like to give some thought to what you think enhances the appearance of the village and parish and what detracts from it. For example, some Essex villages are now having three storey houses built, would that be appropriate for us? Would the village have the same character if several householders decided to install brick walls and wrought iron electric gates?

PC Meetings continue of the FOURTH Thursday of the month. The Agenda appears on the noticeboards three days beforehand. The Meetings are open to members of the public, so you can come along and listen, and ask a question, if you have one, or make a statement during Public Question Time. If you have a matter which you think requires consideration by the Council please get it to me in writing a week before the meeting so that it can go on the Agenda as an item of correspondence.

#### **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH**

A stranger phones saying your computer is running slow, at risk, or has a virus & he can mend it for you. Just give him remote PC access and your bank details! Or maybe you are told your computer is vulnerable and you need to download software to rectify the situation. The caller tells you to type the URL of a seemingly legitimate website but this will allow the scammers to take over control of your computer. Some scammers even claim to be from Microsoft or other providers. Not true, these companies do not phone you with this type of problem unless you contact them first. If you are unsure or cannot verify if a cold call is legitimate then just HANG UP— it could cost you £100'S.

Received a "Distress" email purportedly from someone you know who has found themselves in a difficult situation, usually abroad, and is in need of money? It is almost certain to be a scam. A similar scam doing the rounds is

where the email appears to be from a trusted source, but has the subject headings and an attachment also called "**Private Message**". If you click on the attachment it will hack into your email contacts list & it to all your contacts and might leave your computer vulnerable to a virus. Just delete both these types of emails immediately.

**Suspect Fraud?** To report a fraud or check out possible fraud, use police website: <a href="http://www.actionfraud.police.uk">http://www.actionfraud.police.uk</a>. If you suspect a tel no is linked to a scam or fraud try Googling the number (with code and spaces) to see if it's already been reported.



#### BETHEL CHURCH—RUN THE GOOD RACE

What can be said that hasn't already been said about our fantastic medal haul at the London 2012 Olympic games? I'm sure like me, you've been yelling at the TV screen, willing our athletes over the line.

I also loved hearing the stories behind many of the Olympians who overcame great difficulties even to compete, let alone stand on the podium.

One of my fond Olympic memories was several years ago during the Barcelona Olympics, the world saw one of the greatest moments in Olympic history. Derek Redmond, a young man from Britain, had dreamed all his life of winning a gold medal in the 400 meter race. He had worked hard to get to the Olympics and his dream was within his reach. He was in the semi-finals and was running the race of his life. He could see the finish line just ahead as he rounded the final turn. Suddenly, he felt a sharp pain in the back of his leg and he fell to the track with a torn muscle in his right leg.

As the medical attendants ran toward him, Derek struggled to his feet. He started to hop toward the finish line on one foot in an attempt to finish the race. Suddenly, a large man came out of the stands, pushed aside a security guard and ran to Derek's side. It was Jim Redmond, Derek's father. "You don't have to do this," he told his son. "Yes, I do," said Derek. "Well, then," said his father, "we're going to finish this together."

And they did. They stayed in Derek's lane all the way to the end. At first, the crowd watched in silence. Then they rose to their feet and cheered, and wept.

Derek Redmond didn't win the gold medal, but he walked away with the incredible memory of a loving father who, when he saw his son in pain, left his seat in the stands to help him finish the race. The Christian life is often referred to as a race. The Christian race begins when we receive Jesus as our Saviour. It continues as we daily put our trust in him and step out to be his person and to do his will. We live day by day on the basis of his amazing grace. The Christian life is enabled and empowered by the indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit. But the Spirit doesn't do it for us - we are the ones who have to step out with confidence, trusting him as we run the race. There is effort in the Christian life. We depend on what God has done for us in Christ our Saviour.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame. Hebrews 12:1-2

The Bible teaches us that life is like a race that has been set before us. We may struggle and face many obstacles, but we have a great crowd of witnesses who encourage us on. We have a Heavenly Father who loves us and will help us when the pain is too great. We have a Saviour, who left his place in heaven and came to earth to show us how to run the race. If we will keep our eyes on him, how can we help but finish the race?

At Bethel Church, we probably don't look like the fully toned athletes that we've seen winning Olympic glory, but we are running our race, nonetheless.

Come and join us on our Marathon. Or come and say hello at the Village Fete.



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### EAST HANNINGFIELD PLAYING FIELD & VIL-LAGE HALL PROJECT 1972-1986 by Alan Dixon

I was privileged to have been involved with this project from the beginning to the end, as a member, then Chairman of East Hanningfield Parish Council; as Chairman of East Hanningfield Community Centre Appeal Committee from its inception; and subsequently, member of the later land management committee.

It is my intention in this brief article therefore, to present a factually correct account of the project from its inception to its completion, since it represents a very considerable achievement for a small community such as East Hanningfield, which has not been accurately recorded hitherto.

The East Hanningfield Community Centre Appeal Committee (EHCCAC) was created by East Hanningfield Parish Council (EHPC) in May, 1972, and was answerable to the Parish Council. There having been no previous initiative in the village for this purpose, it was tasked with raising money to purchase land should such a piece of land become available, in order to replace the rented playing field and to provide a site for a village hall.

In order to create a small float of working cash, the six all male members of the new committee, two of whom had only arrived in the village during the previous year, raffled a bottle of Scotch whisky amongst themselves, but as the saying goes, out of small acorns great oaks may grow!


A programme of events was devised, which by reason of its wide entertainment value would attract the general public at large, and this strategy was an instant success. However, the annual Christmas draw just involved all the village households, whilst the mid summer wine bottling party was very popular with a specific clientele, and themed supper dances were also successful. Using Mildenhall Round Table's team and equipment, the new annual East Hanning-

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field Go Cart Grand Prix was immediately popular in September, 1972, and it was followed in March of 1975 by the first annual Chelmsford Model Railway Show, which was even more successful, with both events attracting visitors in their thousands. However, none of these activities would have been possible without the small army of people of all ages and both sexes, from all parts of the community, some of whom did not even live in East Hanningfield, who turned out 'on the day' each to his or her allotted post as part of the team, in order to make the event happen.

Sadly, one failure has to be recorded in order to complete the fund raising picture, inasmuch as the concert featuring the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, which was promoted by the Committee at the Odeon Cinema in Chelmsford, made a loss.

When a piece of land ultimately became available in 1978, although EHCCAC had already raised a sufficient capital to complete the purchase outright from The Writtle Brewery Company and Mecca Limited, EHPC decided that it would be best practice to spread the purchase price of £7,000 over future generations of users of the land, and a 20 year loan was arranged with the Public Works Loan Board to complete the purchase in March 1979. This enabled part of the capital raised by EHCCAC to that time together with a small grant from Chelmsford Borough Council, to be used for levelling, sub soil drainage and seeding of the land, in order that, once acquired, it could be brought into public use in the shortest possible time. No other organisation contributed either to the purchase price or to the cost of these improvements. Planning permission was then obtained for change of use of the land from agricultural to recreational, and arrangements were made with the electricity supply utility to place underground, the overhead supply cables which crossed the land.

EHCCAC continued with fund raising activity specifically to raise capital towards the cost of a hall to be placed on the newly acquired field. Meanwhile, and with a view to providing a hall facility in the shortest space of time, a dismantled industrial unit was purchased. However, as the committee developed the concept, it became ap-

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Email: admin@contracttilers.co.uk Website: www.contracttilers.co.uk parent that this building would be as costly to adapt and less appropriate for the task than entirely new build, and it was sold. An acceptable quotation having been obtained for the construction of a more suitable new building, Parish Council pursued the matter of financing the project. In addition to the capital raised by EHCCAC, grants were obtained from Chelmsford Borough Council, Essex County Council, and once again EHPC, the latter being funded by a 20 year loan from the Public Works Loan Board.

At this point, since its fund raising activities as a registered charity were exclusive to itself and for its sole benefit, East Hanningfield Playgroup Association offered a contribution of £2,500 conditionally against the provision of suitable facilities.

A contract was placed in 1985 on a 'shoe string' budget, to construct a four bay building using second hand portal frames. However, there still remained a shortfall on the £100,000 project, but the final balance was secured by means of an interest-free loan over 5 years from the Sports Council for England's eastern region. Access to the site remained a problem however, but the splendid gift by a parishioner of a considerable tonnage of valuable crushed concrete enabled a satisfactory roadway and car parking area to be created, without which, use of the new building would have been impractical in January, 1986, when it was opened. Prior to the opening, in order to save cost, interior decoration of the hall was carried our by a very small group of ladies from the village. Also, to enable the new building to offer as wide a range of facilities as possible from the outset, a just affordable minimum of furnishing and sports equipment was purchased from Essex County Supplies.

In conclusion, it must be said that the fact the playing field and village hall have continued to be a success is the legacy of, and a fitting tribute to all those people, sadly, many of whom are now dead, who participated in the project, no matter how large or small their contribution, since without their unfailing support, the project would have been impossible to achieve.
