August, excluding 4th. June and from 3rd to 17th. September. This service is free of charge but you must be a member of The Friends of Hylands House Bus Group. Membership is free: to join phone 477750 (Chelmsford Community Transport). You must also phone that number in advance if you wish to use the bus with a wheelchair.

CITY COUNCILLOR'S MESSAGE

Firstly my daily attendance at University College Hospital in London since before Christmas and the result of the treatment has not left me best placed to embrace all our local concerns. The kindness and genuine support of all our friends has however been wonderful; thank you very much.

One forceful lesson from this has been the vital necessity of good public transport. I would make some points about our own bus service which like the American Constitution seem to me self evident:

- However good a service may be if no one knows that it exists it will not be used.
- If it is not used it will almost certainly be cancelled.
- If a service differs in practise from the schedule in the time table then potential passengers will have an acute sense of unreliability and usage will become a last resort as opposed to a first choice.
- If we the travelling public accept gross inadequacies as a kind of norm then our service will become a downward spiral.
- The County Council is the transport authority. Ever since I have been a councillor I have pressed for improvements to our bus service. The better it gets the more it will be used and the spiral will be upward. We need a service into the late evening, Chelms ford is a city with a night time economy and we do not need young people in our villages with no means of safe transport to and from the night life.
- A service exists direct from East Hanningfield to Broomfield Hospital 'not a lot of people know that'!
- We need functioning indicator boards in villages, forests of them in the City centre is dramatic overkill.

Please become pro active and perhaps we can achieve a service we all deserve. Best wishes



The Electoral Roll is renewed every six years and this year sees the next renewal. It must be completed in good time for the Annual Parish Church Meetings as it carries entitlement to vote in the Church annual elections. Current Roll members are being sent new application forms and these need to be completed and returned promptly by all who desire to be included on the new Roll and wish to have their say in the elections, or indeed stand for election (see below). Our Electoral Roll Officer is Gil Gordon — tel. 400298.

The Annual Elections on 23rd April are expected to offer several opportunities for new blood on the Parish Church Council - one in the form of a new churchwarden as Sandra Robinson will be standing down after completing three years' service (but continuing with some of her existing responsibilities we are glad to report), one in the form of a new Deanery Representative, and one at least as a straightforward PCC member. Please contact the churchwardens if you wish to think about standing for any of these positions.

Church Bells continue out of action whilst consideration is given to what can be done – and how and by whom. Our church architect is co-ordinating the necessary investigations with church bells specialists. One obvious problem is that those who designed the belfry space 125 years ago do not seem to have made any realistic provision for the carrying out of major repairs. We have felt it wise to defer the first instalment of the 2012 Quinquennial Survey repairs on the church building until this belfry problem has been resolved.

New facilities for the church building are still under consideration and a meeting of Diocesan experts, our architect, and a CCC Planning Department representative, took place in December to try and confirm what the realistic options were. The truth is that the particular shape and size of our building does not easily lend itself to unob trusive and financially viable alterations. The experts had to agree that it was a difficult one, but left us with one or two ideas which we hope to work on when Rev'd Pam returns in the Spring.

Spring Cleaning is good to think about at this time of year as it means winter should be behind us quite soon now. So we would like to invite you to help us brush away the cobwebs of winter in All Saints' Church and join in the usual spring orgy of cleaning on Saturday, 16th March - anytime from say 9.30am until around noon, with refreshments as may be required to keep us going. Feel free to drop in when you can, and just for as long as you can.



HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY

The Charity's **AGM** will take place at 7.30pm on Wednesday 10th April 2013, in the first floor meeting room at the Village Hall, when a new committee will be elected. Villagers are particularly welcome both to attend the meeting and to seek election as trustees. The Charity's Committee is always looking for new members to join and assist in the running of the Village Hall and sports facilities. If you would like to find out more about the Charity please contact me or any member of the committee.

Once again we are reviewing a number of large expenditure projects and establishing priorities for the maintenance and development of facilities at the Village Hall and around the sports field. In the last year we have completed the refurbishment of the small hall and kitchen with the exception of the dividing doors which we plan to replace this autumn.

Major expenditure projects that remain outstanding include:

- · Replacing the hall roof which is 25 years old and starting to leak
- Creating a secure outside play space for the preschool
- Extending the entrance lobby and village shop
- Extending the main car park with a "green" overflow car park
- Rebuilding the mountain bike mounds
- Ploughing, levelling and reseeding the football pitches
- Resurfacing the sports courts
- Extending the sports wall
- Completing a trim trail around the field to include skate board ramps
- Creating a Community Suite above the small hall
- Install CCTV

As you can see the list is long and does not include many smaller day to day maintenance items. We are very aware that as we add facilities their on-going maintenance becomes a considerable burden on the Charity. These projects can only proceed if the funds are available. We rely upon grants from a number of different sources to fund each project. These sources include both local and national fun-

ders from the Parish Council to the National Lottery not forgetting our own fundraising activities including the Book Sales & Fete.

The **Annual Art Exhibition and Sale** will take place on Saturday, 27th July. We are looking for more artists to exhibit along with helpers to set up the exhibition. If you would like to exhibit or help please contact Wendy Thomas on 01245 400797.



We will be celebrating Red Nose Day Friday 15th March by going Red: wearing red clothing, please bring along red food for the food table, and playing a few games.





Pre-school numbers have been increasing steadily over the past few terms and so from January 2013 we are now open on Friday mornings in addition to our other four mornings. This Friday ses-



COVER PHOTOGRAPH

These flowers are of the Indian horse chestnut and appear about six weeks later than the more common horse chestnut (the one that produces the prickly covered conkers). They thus provide a display when other flowering trees have finished and are useful to pollinating insects by bridging the gap between spring and summer flowering trees and shrubs.

I have been trying to find out whether they are susceptible to the same diseases as conker trees, but failed.

The grit would be provided, but it needs to be kept somewhere dry once the bag is opened, as if it gets damp it clumps and won't spread.


The cloudbursts during the earlier part of this year have identified inadequacies in the local surface water drainage systems. This being, usually, the driest part of the country in recent years awareness of the need for keeping ditches and gullies clear seems to have been forgotten. As a blocked ditch on your property will usually cause a flood on your neighbour's property upstream, it is in the interests of good neighbourliness to keep them "scoured". If you are aware of a blockage in a gulley under a road you can report it to Essex County Council on their website. You can also see what other highways problems have been reported, although I have noticed that it can take up to six weeks for reports to appear as it is not updated very often.

If this edition of the News has reached you later than the usual

publication date of 1st. June, it is because a major planning application was expected, and it was thought important enough to hold, not the front page, but a few pages inside! This application is for an anaerobic digester facility at Highlands Farm.




Ploughing, levelling and reseeding the football pitches Resurfacing the sports courts

There has been concern that these persons are operating without the relevant certificates and in some cases accessed people's back gardens and sheds and taking property without the



Their full report and quotation for repairs to the fractured bell wheels are due very shortly. They did say that they would knock 10% off their quotation if we could find a volunteer to go up and down the ladder bearing parts and tools as needed by the experts working in the belfry. Now there's a challenge!

The Feasibility Study for new facilities in the church has been progressed further since our last report, and is now focussed on an internal solution, integrated with a much needed new heating system. It is hoped to have a further meeting with the architect and the Diocesan authorities with a view to proceeding to the last stage of the Study. This is to provide a detailed costing of works which have been approved in principle. The PCC intend to press on to a conclusion.



If you ring for an ambulance in East Hanningfield you may well find that the first person coming to assist you is actually a member of your own community. Trained and dispatched by the East of England Ambulance Service, Community First Responders (CFR's) have been active in our area for over 10 years and last year attended 302 calls, just short of 40 in East Hanningfield alone. From heart attacks and strokes to respiratory and cardiac arrest, if your call is deemed to be immediately life threatening, the CFR's will be dispatched alongside an ambulance or rapid response car. It has been proven time and again that early medical intervention is the best way to increase the chance of a successful outcome in the most serious medical situations. The CFR scheme is a vital service to the area and it has made a real difference to the lives of countless local people.

Could you join us? We are always looking for volunteers who can give as little as one morning a month to help spread the load of the 24/7 cover we often provide. More details can be found on our website http://www.first-responders.org.uk/.


Sunday services - These continue as usual with the help of volunteer clergy living in our area, to whom we are most grateful. They bring with them a wide range of experience over the years and pro-

vide us with much food for thought each week. This "in between" time is not being wasted, and we warmly welcome all to come and benefit.

Harvest Craft morning for children – Saturday 28th September in church. Time to be confirmed.

Harvest Thanksgiving – An All Age service on Sunday 6th October at 10am

Remembrance Sunday – Sunday 10th November, commencing at 10.50am with the Act of Remembrance around the War Memorial, and then continuing inside the church as usual.

Churchyard – Looking a great deal better as a result of two kind volunteers with mowers, but it would be a big help to find someone with a strimmer for the areas where mowers cannot go. An hour or two a month during the growing season could work wonders for us. Church Bells – Still silent, but the Bell Hangers' report now received suggests that some short term works could put the bells back into ringing order for the time being at a cost of around £7,000 plus. However, after 128 years of use, the bells and belfry fitments are greatly in need of a thorough overhaul, and in the long run it would probably be more cost effective to do this work at the same time, with a total estimated cost of around £22,000 plus. The PCC will be considering their options in the coming months as the way forward for All Saints' Church becomes clearer, following consultations with the Diocese.

Ride & Stride – This annual sponsored cycling/walking event, organised by Friends of Essex Churches to assist churches like ours where repairs to the fabric are very costly, is on Saturday 14th September, and for once it does not clash with the Village Fete! 





PARISH COUNCIL

The Government has aimed to address concerns that too often local buildings and land that are of great value to the community, such as a village hall or local pub, go up for sale and are purchased by a private bidder before the community has the opportunity to put together funding and take it over themselves. The Community Right to Bid gives communities the power to submit assets of community value to be kept on a list by the local authority.

If any of these buildings or land are put up for sale, a six week window of opportunity is triggered during which the community group may express an interest to purchase the asset. If they do express an interest, a further four and a half month window of opportunity is given so that the group may have time to find funding and put together a bid to purchase the asset on the open market.

So, the PC would like to hear from you as to what property you would consider a community asset.

If you filled in a slip at the Village Fete to volunteer for the **Community Speedwatch Team**, please could you get in touch? The box for slips disappeared during the tidying up after the Fete and hasn't been seen since. Also, please get in touch if you didn't volunteer then, but are interested, because there will be a training session soon to refresh present members and initiate new ones.



Chelmsford City Council now offers small WEEE (Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment) kerbside collections. This new service, which started in September, allows householders to recycle their small WEEE using the green recycling box. Place all small WEEE items in a carrier bag, either next to or on top of your green box by 7am on your green box collection day. Many electrical items such as mobile phones and handheld computers contain valuable plastics and metals. Recycling them means that they

can be used again, and they are not costing us money by taking up precious landfill space.

There is now agreement in principle that the Catherine Close play area will be transferred to the Parish Council. PC will of course arrange for regular inspections of the equipment and surrounds once it has become a local responsibility, but it would be helpful if residents who use the playground, or rather the adults who go with them, could report to PC should there be any problems. If you would be interested in setting up a group to do this, maybe a Friends of Catherine Close Play Area, please get in touch.

If you volunteered to take part in the Salt Bag Scheme and you haven't heard from me since, please send me an email so that I can forward the joining details to you. At the moment there are bags to spare, so if you haven't volunteered yet you can still do so for this winter. In case you haven't come across this before, I ought to explain that the County Council, through PC provides bags of road salt to volunteers who undertake to keep an area of road and or pavement clear in snowy weather. If you are worried about liability, in case someone slips on the pavement you have cleared, that is covered in the joining information, but, basically, this should not put you off as the County Council has legal advice on this.

You have probably noticed that some of our worst potholes have been filled. Thank you to everyone who individually reported these to the County Council. Although they will tell you that there is no need to report a hole that they already know about, I am sure sheer numbers of reports make a difference. If you have not made a report before, please give it a try. Go to www.essex.gov.uk, scroll down the page and click on a blue box marked "REPORT IT". A new page will open giving you five options. Click on the top one called "View, track and report a pothole or highway problem". The next page that opens up is where you fill in the form. You can use this method to report all kinds of highway problems, not just potholes, and there is a facility for uploading a photo of the problem.

I received notice of the County Council's review of bus services too late for it to be included in the last News. This consultation lasts until 9th. December so you have a few days left to respond. The review includes the provision of financial support for local services. You might not be aware of this, but some services are subsidised by the County Council because of the social service they provide. The outcome of this review could be that some services lose their subsidy and as a result stop running. The consultation, plus all accompanying literature and documentation, including a list of the bus services paid for by ECC, can be found at www.essex.gov.uk/ busreview. Copies are also be available through libraries, by calling 0845 603 7631 or by emailing passenger.transportliaison@essex.gov.uk/.

Two other consultations which might interest you are those concerning the airspace of London City and Southend airports. My understanding of the map associated with the City consultation is that we

are in the 4-7,000ft airspace, and the map for the Southend consultation shows us in a 2,500-3,500ft zone. The London city consultation runs until 21st January and can be found at

www.londonairspaceconsultation.co.uk/. The Southend airport consultation, which lasts until 19th. December is about the airport attempting to regain control of the surrounding airspace. I can forward an electronic version of the consultation document on request.

Parish Council Meetings continue on the FOURTH Thursday of the month, (only emphasised because some people in the past have confused it with the last Thursday of the month and missed it). As with most rules there is an exception: December's Meeting will be on the 12th in order not to coincide with Christmas festivities. If you have a matter of concern that you would like the Council to consider at a Meeting, please make sure it reaches me in writing a week beforehand so that it can be included in the Agenda. The Agenda will appear on the noticeboards and the website at least three clear days before each meeting.







One of the playgrounds has now been grassed over by the City Council and the responsibility for the other is being negotiated between Chelmsford City Council, the Parish Council and the Charity. (See PC article Page 4).

The bottle recycling facility located on the village hall car park is due to be removed by the City Council as all households should be using their green boxes to recycle their household waste bottles. The

Charity spends funds each year on clearing litter from the field, the chase & car park. We plan to install additional rubbish bins around the hall & field. Please use them or if the bins are full take your litter home with you.

We will be reviewing the Hall, meeting room, sports field and sports court hiring rates and new rates which incorporate a cost of living rise which will apply from January 2014.

The Hanna's Field Charity Committee is always looking for new members to join the committee and assist in the running of the village hall and sports facilities. If you would like to find out more about the Charity please contact me or any member of the committee.


The Charity's AGM will take place in April 2014 when a new committee will be elected. Villagers are particularly welcome to both come to the AGM and also to stand for election to the committee.





Back in Spring, an appeal was made to anyone interested in exploring the possibility of setting up a youth facility in the village. Six months down the line, we want to update you on where things stand.

We are hugely thankful to both Hanna's Field Charity and the Parish Council for their support as we explore this possibility. **However, we now need** *your* **help**. Do you know of a venue that could be suitable? Somewhere which could be set up as a coffee shop on a semi-permanent basis? Perhaps you own an outbuilding which is going spare? Or perhaps you know of a portacabin that's going free?

If you do know of anything which could serve such a purpose, we'd love to hear about it. And if you are interested in getting involved, we'd love to have you on board!



Another event held every year, but by choice, is the Village Tidy or Spring Clean. This year the chosen date is **Saturday, 10th. May.** Please make an appearance at the Village Hall car park at 9am to collect a litter-picker, some gloves, and a sack. If you are going to pick up litter along road sides you can also borrow a hi-vis vest. Volunteers have usually returned their filled sacks to the car park by 10.30am so there is still plenty of time to do all the other usual activities set aside for Saturdays.

If you see large or heavy items around the village or parish, please don't try to bring them to the car park. Make a note of where they are and they will be picked up later in a trailer.

If you see fly tipping around the parish at other times, there are mechanisms for reporting it so that it will be picked up by the City Council. You can go to their website www.chelmsford.gov.uk/ report-issue and click on "Fly Tipping", or you can phone Recycling

and Waste on 615800. I recently reported some dumped rubbish in Pan Lane and it was gone within 24 hours.

In case you missed the information in a previous issue of the News about how to report a highways problem, such as a pothole, blocked drain, overhanging vegetation and so on, here it is again. Go to www.essex.gov.uk, scroll down the page and click on a blue box marked "REPORT IT". A new page will open giving you five options. Click on the top one called "View, track and report a pothole or highway problem". The next page that opens up is where you fill in the form. There is a facility to upload photographs of the problem being reported, which I am sure helps the highways staff to gauge the severity of the problem. For those technophobes amongst you who would rather telephone, the Highways number is **0845 603 7631** and the County Council's general enquiries number is 430430, but remember to ask for a report number, which won't necessarily be given unless requested, unlike the website reports which automatically receive a report reference number.

PC agreed the budget and set the Precept for the 2014-15 year at the December Meeting. Although the increase was only 1.53%, due to the reductions in the tax base and the Local Council Tax Support from the government the D Band council tax rate is expected to rise by 3.9%, from £61.44 to £63.84. The Budget can be seen appended to the end of the December Minutes.

The next two Parish Council Meetings are on Thursday, 27th. March and 24th. April. The Meeting on 22nd May will be the Annual Meeting of the Council when the Chairman is elected and roles and responsibilities allocated.

HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY

I have a confession: I cheat when writing these articles for the newsletter. I look back at the article I submitted the year before and update it. This time I checked out my articles for the previous two years and regret that I will not be saying anything revolutionary or startling in this edition. I am not sure whether it is sad or not that I keep repeating myself and hope that I do not bore you with the repetition. The Charity has achieved a great deal over a number of years, however I do think that the current committee, who have been in place for a number of years, are running out of steam. It is time for new village volunteers to raise their heads above the parapet and take a more active role in contributing to community life.

The Charity's **AGM** will take place at **7.30pm on Wednesday 23rd April**, in the first floor meeting room at the Village Hall, when a new committee will be elected. Villagers are particularly welcome both to attend the meeting and to seek election as trustees.

We are once again reviewing a number of large expenditure projects and establishing priorities for the maintenance and development of facilities at the village hall and around the sports field. During the February half term break the creation of a fenced outdoor area for the preschool should have been completed along with the installation of new insulated and sound proofed folding doors between the two halls. The former is weather dependent as is the work on the ditch which runs alongside the chase. Let's hope the weather dries up soon. The flooding on the field and along the chase will hopefully be reduced with the clearing of the ditch but we are hampered by the weather and the ground conditions; a little bit chicken and egg! We have also applied for permission to work on some of the trees that are the subject of Tree Preservation Orders and have to go through a formal approval process which takes time.

Major outstanding expenditure projects include:

Replacing the hall roof which is over 25 years old and leaking Extending the main car park with a "green" overflow car park Rebuilding the mountain bike mounds

Ploughing, levelling and reseeding the football pitches Resurfacing the sports courts

Extending the sports wall

Completing a trim trail and dog walking path around the field to include skate board ramps and exercise equipment.

Extending the entrance lobby and village shop Creating a Community Suite above the small hall Install CCTV

As you can see the list is long and does not include the many smaller day to day maintenance issues

Planning has already started for the **Village Fete** on **Saturday 13th September**. A new Fete Committee is being formed following an initial meeting on 19th February. If you would like to help with the fete please contact me.

The Hanna's Field Charity Committee is always looking for new members to assist in the running of the Village Hall and sports facilities. 


FROM REV'D SUSAN







BETHEL CHURCH—Wings Like Eagles

Watching The Sochi Winter Olympics has been fascinating. Most of the events are certainly not for the faint hearted. Britain, over the years has seen modest success in terms of our medal haul, but that hasn't stopped many of our competitors from giving it their all.

For me, the Winter Games have become synonymous with Eddie 'The Eagle' Edwards. The British ski jumper was mocked for his performances at the 1988 Winter Olympics in Calgary, but he was a fearless and dedicated athlete who sacrificed a lot to make it to the Games.

For some, he was a hero who sacrificed a lot to live the dream: an athlete who competed with a smile on his face, and deservedly reaped the rewards of his unexpected fame while he could. For others, Edwards was a laughing stock who belittled both the sport of ski jumping and the 1988 Winter Olympics, and represented everything that was bad in a nation that seemed to adore sporting losers. Either way, the story behind Edwards' rise to stardom is still fascinating all these years later; and love him or pity him, you cannot deny Edwards his place in Winter Olympics history.

Eddie Edwards had very little hope of winning an Olympic medal, yet he displayed enormous courage and strength to even achieve the right to participate.

Finding courage and strength comes easier for some than others. The Old Testament prophet Isaiah said this:

Do you not know? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding no one can fathom. He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak.

Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall;but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary,

they will walk and not be faint. Isaiah 40:28-31

Where is your strength? We live in a world that prides itself in all its accomplishments. We live in a world that prides itself in being able to do anything it sets its mind to do, a world that has put men on the moon and skiers flying 50mph through the air from a ski slope.

Isaiah's message is very counter intuitive to our normal thinking. He says, Man, at his strongest, is weak. He is helpless. We are inherently weak. The text, of course, points to youths and to their physical strength. And yet, even though they may be physically strong, they are yet weak, as compared to God.

The wonderful message here is, that those who look to the Lord will have their strength renewed. He is the One we should turn to.

But this physical picture mainly points to a spiritual picture, the spiritual picture is our disharmony with God, because of our disobedience - and how he offers a way back to him through the person and work of his son, Jesus.

Jesus Christ himself gives this promise to his disciples. "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." When you are weary and heavy laden, don't just wallow in that weariness,


EAST HANNINGFIELD SCHOOL



They also noted that the nails were extremely sharp and that many members went home with new soles on their boots but punctured fingers.





Amongst all the other items the most popular is probably the Village Diary, which for the last few editions of EH News has been reproduced in the centre pages, but the most up-to-date version will always be on the website.

Negotiations between PC and the City Council concerning the proposed transfer of the Catherine Close play area to PC have proved more complicated than anticipated. We overcome one difficulty only to find that another has popped up, seemingly out of nowhere, which has to be tackled. The proposed transfer was advertised in the Chronicle, to see if there would be any objections, and as far as I am aware none were forthcoming, so that part of the process has passed without incident. Hopefully, I shall be able to announce that it has all finally gone through in the next EH News.

You might have heard of Section 106 monies or the Community Infrastructure Levy, or even "the roof tax". These are payments by a developer to the local authority to cover infrastructure such as roads and so on. A small proportion comes to PC and so far it has been solely for spending on open space/recreation projects. The first of it will be used shortly as a major contribution to the cost of resurfacing the path to the school back gate. Other items identified for future spending are levelling and reseeding the football pitches, extending the sports wall, upgrading the sports courts, reinforcing the grass beside the car park so that it can safely be used as overflow parking and relaying the Tye path.

PC is presently investigating what would be a suitable construction for a replacement path on the Tye. As the cost will be high whatever type of path is chosen, there will probably be an experimental length at the point where it is most needed, which is in front of the church where it was under water several times over the winter.

Although there has not been an article from the Village Design Group this time, they are still active and working on the results of the questionnaire. At the time of writing the online questionnaire was still active, but not for much longer, so if you haven't already done so, and you are interested in the future of the parish you had better fill it in quickly. You can get to it from the home page of PC's website.

Forthcoming PC Meetings are on 26th. June, 31st. July & 28th. August at 8pm in the Village Hall, and the Agenda will be published at least three clear days beforehand on the noticeboards and the website. They are always open to the public.



FROM REV'D SUSAN

In the Spring edition of East Hanningfield News I explained that in the period up to Easter 2014 we would be asking the congregation and others that know All Saints' as their church, to help with some reflection and discussions about the future of our village church.

I would like to thank the very many people who contributed their views on what, for them, are the most important aspects of church going into the future. Our Parochial Church Council used these to inform their conclusions on the best way forward for us and I would like to share with you the main points that were presented to our annual church meeting which took place on 29 April.

Links with other parishes—You may be aware that my appointment as Priest-in-Charge at All Saints' is for a relatively short period and that I expect to be moving on in mid 2015. Due to constraints on available clergy there is little chance that, after this date, All Saints' will have its own vicar, but I hope it will have its own local leadership team including a Focal Minister (who will be licensed by the diocese but will be unlikely to be ordained).

Our consultations demonstrated an aspiration for All Saints' to continue as a single entity i.e. not in close partnership with other parishes, although we will need to work closely with other parishes in our area and may well be under the oversight of another nearby church. It is therefore important for us to decide what our church requires as a local leadership team and whether we have the resources and skills to form such a team and to sustain it in the future. We are considering this as a matter of priority.

Pastoral and community support including the school—Our consultations revealed the importance that contributors place on maintaining good connections with the school and pre-school; fulfilling a pastoral role in reaching out to elderly people and the sick or bereaved; working with Hanna's Field charity and with the Bethel

church; and continuing to make All Saints' a welcoming place to worship. We plan to review how we currently meet these requirements by December 2014, we will set out how we would expect each 'role' could be carried out in the future – particularly when we have no dedicated priest-in-charge.

Patterns of worship—By Advent 2014 we plan to have reviewed the current liturgical texts and consider re-ordering our current Sunday worship to provide a mix of traditional liturgy with some more modern approaches to worship, perhaps including a change of time on some Sundays to earlier or later in the day. It is unlikely going forward that there will continue to be a service of Holy Communion every Sunday.

Church Bells—We plan to apply for grants & fundraise to repair & refurbish the existing bells and continue with the recorded bells currently in use until we have the original bells ringing once again. Our grateful thanks go to Colin Warren for his ingenuity, technical skills and generosity in providing us with the temporary arrangements.

Building changes i.e. toilet, kitchen, heating—We have decided that, until the future of our church is more certain, the results of the feasibility study we have carried out are not pursued at this stage but we will review this decision annually. However should the heating system fail at any point in the future, our decision does not preclude this being dealt with as an essential repair or replacement.

The future is unknown to us at present and you will see from all of the above that we have more work to do to determine our way forward. We continue to value your views as we consider further the future of our church building and understand what God is calling us to be as a community of believers. With love and prayers

Inevitably, during the intervening years, inflation has been steadily undermining that improvement, and of course there are always those natural losses over time which need replacing. So we have to remind ourselves again now that "The Responsibility is STILL Ours"!


The Annual Spring Clean of the church was a great occasion and our grateful thanks to all those who responded to the invitation to come and join in. The results were quite outstanding.



I was fortunate to attend a course organised by Neighbourhood watch called Heartstart. It was run by First Responders and a paramedic was also in attendance.

It was one of those things on my "to do list" so when Geoff from the Neighbourhood Watch team came up with the idea I had to go. (a couple of hours on an otherwise boring Wednesday evening and right on the doorstep) it was a no brainer!

I went with my 18 yr old daughter and we both found it incredibly informative. The responders went through a series of scenarios and after each one were enacted on each other with the responders encouraging and advising us to make the right responses which helped us to remember.

At the end we received a certificate, a card with a checklist to carry with us and a booklet setting out the life support skills we had learnt. I now feel that if ever I am unlucky enough to find someone collapsed or unconscious that they will be pleased I have done this course and now could potentially buy them some time until a paramedic could arrive rather than standing there feeling guilty not knowing where to start.

The First responders do not charge for these courses but are grateful for any donations. So if like me it's on your to do list, watch out for the next course, bring a donation and do it!

You never know you might help to save someone's life or at least give then a chance.

STRAIGHT DOWN THE MIDDLE

I came across this 'Temporary Rules' from Richmond Golf Club, which was published in 1940 during WWII.

Players are asked to collect Bomb and Shrapnel splinters to save these causing damage to Mowing Machines.

In Competitions, during gunfire or while bombs are falling, players must take cover without penalty for ceasing play.

Shrapnel and/or bomb splinters on the Fairways, or in Bunkers

within a club's length of a ball, may be moved without penalty, and no penalty shall be incurred if a ball is thereby caused to move accidentally.

A ball moved by enemy action may be replaced, or if lost or destroyed, a ball may be dropped not nearer the hole without penalty.

A ball lying in a crater may be lifted and dropped not nearer the hole, preserving the line to the hole, without penalty.

A player whose stroke is affected by the simultaneous explosion of a bomb, may play another ball from the same place Penalty one stroke.

I do enjoy a round of golf, although I have to confess, I'm not very good at it. But I imagine playing golf at Richmond Golf Club in the 1940s would have been even more challenging.

It's a bit like life. We put up with things because that's the way things are. Yet, when reading the Bible, it becomes clear that this life we are given is also very temporal. In the book of James, life is described as a vapor.

So how should this temporal life change the way we live it?

With an eternal perspective, the fading glory of this life need not be a source of discouragement. If we place our eternal destiny into God's hands by trusting the Lord Jesus as our saviour, we can certainly trust him through the difficulties of our earthly sojourn. The same Apostle Peter, who said our bodies are like falling flowers and withering grass, also wrote that we are but pilgrims passing through this life (I Peter 2:11).

Our real home is in heaven where Jesus has 'a place prepared for us'. If we approach life with the view that every day is a gift from God rather than an entitlement, the length of our sojourn won't be an issue, and we will be able to cope with the odd pieces of shrapnel that come our way too.



EAST HANNINGFIELD SCHOOL



Chairman's report to the 2014 AGM

This year's AGM falls on St George's day which has resulted in a number of apologies for non attendance, however, I am pleased to report on another successful year for the Charity. During the last year we finished the refurbishment of the small hall with the installation of the fully insulated dividing doors between the small and large halls resulting in a bright warm environment for our principal weekday hirer of the small hall – Preschool. In addition we have authorised and overseen the creation of a secure safe playground at the rear of the hall with the bulk of the fundraising being achieved by the Preschool.

The workload of the Charity has again been borne by very few for the gain of the many villagers and organisations who use the facilities at the Village Hall and sports field. No officers or committee members receive any remuneration for their hard work; they are all volunteers and all should be thanked for their efforts on behalf of the village. It was very sad that during the year Iris Evan's lost her battle with cancer. We are in discussion with her family over a fitting permanent memorial to Iris. Her massive contribution to the Charity is very sadly

missed.

It is good that the Village Shop and Post Office remains in the village. If we are to keep them here it is essential that we all use the facility and support Ash.

The Annual Art Show continued as a major fund raising event exhibiting works from many local artists. The Village Fete, a joint venture with All Saints Church, was again successful. We are continuing this year without a fete chairman running the event by committee. It was good that the fete was also supported by several of our local businesses and we are very grateful for their sponsorship. We have continued to run quarterly Book & Coffee Sales on Saturday mornings in the upstairs committee room. These regular events have proved to be popular and successful and we have added more shelving and storage in the upstairs loft area to expand the number of books we are able to store and display.

We are considering the priorities for developing and maintaining the facilities at the Hall and field. There are a number of projects which we would like to undertake and they are all dependent on our successful application for grants to fund each project.

These projects include:

Replacing the hall roof which is 25 years old and leaking Extending the main car park with a "green" overflow car park Extending the entrance lobby and village shop Rebuilding the mountain bike mounds
Ploughing, levelling and reseeding the football pitches
Resurfacing the sports courts
Extending the sports wall

Completing a trim trail around the field to include skate board ramps
Creating a Community Suite above the small hall

Installing CCTV





Residents at that end of the village will also be pleased to learn that plans are being drawn up for a footway to take pedestrians off the road in the area in front of the Old Forge, but I have not been given any idea of timescales, so no need to make plans for a grand opening yet awhile!

I was recently asked by one of our younger residents what I was doing, so I shall tell you all. I was in the company of a contractor who was to quote for resurfacing the path to the school back gate and we were measuring up. It is hoped that PC can fund the works from Section 106 contributions (S106 contributions are paid developers to support local open space facilities). The Village Hall car park was also being costed for repairs, and the path in front of the Church and Scarles Croft was being looked at for a new construction solution. It was under water several times last winter and needs more than just a bit of resurfacing.

There is soon to be a dial-up bus service to Broomfield Hospital. At the time of writing details were still to be announced, but it is expected that you will need to book it the day before. Please see the Chelmsford Community Transport article on p.13.

Still on health matters, there is currently a consultation on the future of the drop-in health facility at Sainbury. The proposal is to close it not because it isn't being used, which it is, but because it has not reduced the numbers of visits to A & E at Broomfield Hospital. You can read all about it and comment at www.midessexccg.nhs.uk/public-consultations/immediate-care. There are three topics in the consultation: 1. The closure of the walk-in service at North Chelmsford Healthcare Centre in March 2015. (This does NOT include the GP Practice at the site.); 2. The development of an urgent care centre at Broomfield Hospital with a pilot service starting in 2015: & 3. The overall vision of a clearer and effective immediate care service for mid Essex over the next 2-5 years, developing the potential of NHS 111 and improving the understanding of all the options available to the public. If you need

a paper copy of the questionnaire, please telephone 01245 459 459.

CITY COUNCILLOR

Mike's passing is a huge loss, not only to Julia and his family, but also to the whole village. He was an outstanding councillor at both parish and city level and a personal friend. We had an arrangement between us as joint ward councillors where Mike primarily looked after the interests of East and West Hanningfield and I looked after the interests of Bicknacre and Woodham Ferrers. Pending a by-election I will fulfil both functions.



The main issue at the moment is the application for a gypsy and traveller site in Old Church Road. This will come before the planning committee, very probably on 16th September with an officer's recommendation for refusal. This could have been dealt with and refused by officers under delegated powers. However I am not satisfied that the grounds for refusal are sufficient. There is a risk that the applicant could overcome the proposed reasons for refusal and submit a new application. The grounds for refusal relate to effect on the countryside, lack of ecological survey, harm to protected trees and unacceptable living conditions for its occupants by virtue of its proximity to the pumping station. In my view further reasons need to be added relating to the impact on neighbouring properties and residents and lack of services such as buses, shops, GP surgery and schools.

At the hearing of the application members of the public can speak for up to two minutes giving planning reasons for or against the application. The Parish Council has five minutes and I have an unlimited time. The hearing takes place at 7p.m. in the Council chamber at the civic centre in Chelmsford.

The other application in East Hanningfield road at Howe Green has been refused





A Final Appeal!

By the time you read this News I will no longer be living in the village and therefore can no longer be the East Hanning-field NhW team coordinator. This is therefore this is my last contribution to the Village newsletter. It may, I am afraid, also signal the end of a NhW team in the village.



I volunteered to take over as the NhW

coordinator from Edward Poulter in October 2006. That was nearly 8 years ago. The face of crime has changed over this period. The village may seem a low crime area but there are still on average around nine burglaries a year reported and this seems to be increasing. This is mainly break-ins to take valuables and or keys to steal cars but sometimes garages or sheds are targeted. Intelligence suggests this is mainly external criminals and evidence indicates certain roads are more likely to be targeted than others.

There is an increasing level of cold-caller robbery by deception and scams generally and these have happened in our village, aimed at older residents. The new communication technology (computers, internet and smart phones etc) which is such an essential part of our everyday life also provides criminals with ingenious ways of removing money from the unsuspecting through various forms of website deception or fraud and there are people in the village that have fallen victim.

Essentially the role of NhW in all this remains unchanged. It is about working with police and the community to tackle all crime and providing information on crime prevention. More efficient ways of passing information on crimes alerts and suspicious activity are helping. NhW is no longer written or verbal messages passed along a chain

— email is faster and easier. But NhW is still fundamentally about community minded people keeping a look out for their neighbours and passing information on providing and feedback to the police. Unfortunately budget constraints have resulted in a reduced police presence in rural areas like ours and so perhaps NhW is more important than ever to local communities in helping the police fight crime and in the dissemination of crime prevention information.

As well as passing information via email to as many residents as possible, and passing back information to the police, the NhW team meets 4 times a year to share information with Bicknacre and Rettendon NhW and usually an officer from South Woodham police. It also provides regular updates in this Newsletter; maintains the NhW site on the Parish Council website and supplies/maintains NhW signs around the village.

Unfortunately the NhW network that has been built up over the last few years may fail. I have been unable to find volunteers to join the team or someone to interface with police for emailed messages. Without help I'm afraid the local NhW network will fold and I have agreed to continue to provide the email contact with the police for 3 months until help is found but really this a last appeal to keep a NhW presence in our village. Once lost I think it unlikely we could get the organisation going again in the future and a great shame. It just needs a few like minded people to take a step forward and get involved to prevent this happening!





PARISH COUNCIL

The four year term of the present Parish Council comes to an end in May. All Councillors, including those who have joined since the last election, will stand down and will have to stand for election if they wish to continue. As one of the Councillors has indicated that he will not be standing for re-election in May, this would be a good time for anyone who thinks they might be interested in joining the Parish Council to start taking an interest and to follow the meetings either by coming along or by reading the Minutes on PC's website.

A few months ago, a concerned parent asked me about the possibility of the speed limit in Ashley Green and Coulde Dennis being reduced from the present 30mph to 20mph. There is a process that PC can follow with the Highways Authority to achieve this, but it needs evidence of residents' support. If residents of any of the adopted side roads in the parish could either write to PC in support of reducing the speed limit in their particular road or collect a petition of names and addresses of those in favour, that would be the support needed for PC to go ahead with the request. If you do this, please state in which road or roads you want the change.

The transfer of the Catherine Close play area from the City Council is progressing. In the Summer PC arranged for a RoSPA inspection of the equipment to be done. This identified that there were several repairs that needed to be done. The City Council was informed of these and had completed them by the end of October, leaving the way clear for the transfer to go ahead. PC is to pay £1 for the play area, which must be kept as a public open space in perpetuity. As this is legally a purchase there will be the usual legal fees etc associated with buying property.


According to the most recent Superfast Essex quarterly newsletter, by October 2014 10,000 homes and businesses in Essex had been connected to superfast broadband as a result of the project. The intention being that 85% of homes should be connected. Phase 2

has the target of achieving 95% coverage. A visit from a member of the team to the September PC meeting, gave us to be optimistic that East Hanningfield would be in that second phase. The network is such that it might be that not all areas of the parish will receive it at the same time because the feed will be coming from different directions. You can find the most up to date information at www.superfastessex.org.

The Autumn News recorded the sad news of the death of Mike Harris. The vacancy on the PC that ensued was filled by co-option at PC's October Meeting. The newest Parish Councillor is Karen Saynor who lives in Bicknacre Road. In the last 40 years there have been only four other female councillors. They were Libby Brooks, Shirley Tilby, Penny Waters and Janice Williamson. The vacant City Council seat was filled by election and an introduction to the new City Councillor, Matt Flack, follows on page 7.

The path to the School's back gate is to be resurfaced. Confirmation of the date of the work is awaited from the contractor who will also be carrying out repairs to the Village Hall car park. Depending on how wet and how cold the next


sary to wait until the Spring. Funding for the path is coming from \$106 monies. This is money paid by a developer, to the City Council which is then passed on to PC, for improvements to local open space provision. It seems there is more due to the Parish but a developer is contesting the need to pay because, supposedly, so many councils sit on such funds and do not use them. PC has a list of projects awaiting the funding, so that argument does not apply here.

At the time of writing PC had been informed that the applicant for the gypsy site in Sandon Parish had appealed to the Planning Inspectorate against refusal of planning permission and against enforcement action to remove the existing mobile home. There is still some time for the applicant for the proposed gypsy site in Old Church Road to appeal, so it is a matter of wait and see with that one. PC objected to the proposed 24 large houses at the Morelands industrial estate on the grounds that local housing surveys and the Parish Plan and Village Design surveys showed that the vast majority of local need and preference was for housing that was more affordable. PC is not opposed in principal to the development of this plot for housing, as properly planned, it could be an improvement on the present contaminated site.

PC now has a Facebook page. You can reach it through the home page of the website, or you might already be receiving postings via "friends". The reason for moving into this "social medium" is so that news can be sent out quickly. The website contains a lot of information, and will continue to be used for PC's documents, but you have to go in to look for it.


HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY

Some of you may recall the NhW article in the autumn EH News was an appeal from the then NhW Area Coordinator Geoff Dickman who had been in that post since 2007 and the point of

contact for forwarding on police and NhW information to residents. When he left in August there was no one willing to pick up this important task or coordinate activities and it looked as though our local area NhW would cease.

Thanks to several people who came forward in response to Geoff's appeal, a new NhW team has formed. This group feels that although the village is a relatively low crime area we can't assume it will stay this way and therefore NhW can offer a valuable service by keeping people informed about crime prevention and aware of what's happing around them.

To this end we continue to work with the police and community, reporting local incidents and feedback to the police, looking after NhW area road signs & providing crime prevention information to residents via email, the Parish Council NhW website & this News.

As part of this strategy new NhW volunteer David Rackham attended the Chelmsford Group Neighbourhood Watch meeting in October at the Great Baddow Millennium Centre where Essex Police District Commander, Alan Cook, provided an overview on changes in the way Essex police will in future communicate with the community at grass roots level using a new email messaging system. East Hanningfield NhW will receive these.

More details about the team will be circulated after the next East Hanningfield NhW meeting in December but, in the meantime, one of the volunteers, Malcolm Hyett, who lives in the village, has agreed to act as post-man for current police email messages and has started forwarding them to people on the email network (there are over 80 people in the village who currently receive local alerts and crime information messages in this way).

Apart from some recent, expensive vandalism at the Village Hall (about £750 worth) there have been no reported crimes but here is some food for thought:

There's a 20% increase in home burglaries during the darker months, according to Aviva. Halifax Home Insurance says the average cost of a winter burglary weighs in at £1,746. Two key things you can do:

- upstairs lights operating at different times on auto timers);
- photograph and mark with postcode and house number/name valuable items. A number of people in the village who have been burgled were fortunate enough to later recover their belongings from the police but its easier if items are photographed or marked (NhW has a marking kit).

There's plenty more you can do to reduce the risk. The Metropolitan Police's "Operation Bumblebee" website is packed with useful advice including a Virtual House Tour that highlights vulnerable areas of your home, as well as dedicated sections on windows, doors, lighting, gardens, alarms.

If you are interested in helping the local NhW team (did you know that if you are a member of a NhW some insurers will offer a saving on your house insurance?) or would simply like to keep up to date with local police NhW alerts and crime prevention information please speak to either Malcolm


