### PARISH COUNCIL

The wet Winter has reminded us why the ancients took so much trouble to dig so many ditches around the parish: they would have been dug by hand after all. It has also shown us how pipes can be a poor substitute for the original open ditch. The precursor of the Parish Council, the Vestry, used to have the power to order landowners to "scour" their ditches, but all that can be done now is to appeal to everyone to check their ditches allow a free flow of water. There are several roadside ditches around the village which have been neglected and are filling in, and a couple I could name where someone has dumped what looks like builders' rubble. The result is that water runs along the road instead of in the ditch, and this leads to the breaking up of the road edge and surface.

Every year the Parish Council is required to organise a meeting for all electors of the Parish. Its official title is the Annual Parish Meeting, but is often called a village meeting or assembly. Its purpose is to give parish residents the opportunity to talk on any matters relevant to the parish. In East Hanningfield it is taken as an opportunity to bring representatives from all the various groups in the parish together so we can all hear what they have been doing and matters of joint concern can be discussed in an informal atmosphere. All electors are welcome. This year the electors' assembly will be held on **Wednesday**, **28th. May**, **at 7.30pm** in the first floor meeting room in the Village Hall.



Another event held every year, but by choice, is the Village Tidy or Spring Clean. This year the chosen date is **Saturday, 10th. May.** Please make an appearance at the Village Hall car park at 9am to collect a litter-picker, some gloves, and a sack. If you are going to pick up litter along road sides you can also borrow a hi-vis vest. Volunteers have usually returned their filled sacks to the car park by 10.30am so there is still plenty of time to do all the other usual activities set aside for Saturdays.

If you see large or heavy items around the village or parish, please don't try to bring them to the car park. Make a note of where they are and they will be picked up later in a trailer.

If you see fly tipping around the parish at other times, there are mechanisms for reporting it so that it will be picked up by the City Council. You can go to their website <a href="www.chelmsford.gov.uk/">www.chelmsford.gov.uk/</a> report-issue and click on "Fly Tipping", or you can phone Recycling

and Waste on 615800. I recently reported some dumped rubbish in Pan Lane and it was gone within 24 hours.

In case you missed the information in a previous issue of the News about how to report a highways problem, such as a pothole, blocked drain, overhanging vegetation and so on, here it is again. Go to www.essex.gov.uk, scroll down the page and click on a blue box marked "REPORT IT". A new page will open giving you five options. Click on the top one called "View, track and report a pothole or highway problem". The next page that opens up is where you fill in the form. There is a facility to upload photographs of the problem being reported, which I am sure helps the highways staff to gauge the severity of the problem. For those technophobes amongst you who would rather telephone, the Highways number is **0845 603 7631** and the County Council's general enquiries number is 430430, but remember to ask for a report number, which won't necessarily be given unless requested, unlike the website reports which automatically receive a report reference number.

PC agreed the budget and set the Precept for the 2014-15 year at the December Meeting. Although the increase was only 1.53%, due to the reductions in the tax base and the Local Council Tax Support from the government the D Band council tax rate is expected to rise by 3.9%, from £61.44 to £63.84. The Budget can be seen appended to the end of the December Minutes.

The next two Parish Council Meetings are on Thursday, 27th. March and 24th. April. The Meeting on 22nd May will be the Annual Meeting of the Council when the Chairman is elected and roles and responsibilities allocated.

### HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY

I have a confession: I cheat when writing these articles for the newsletter. I look back at the article I submitted the year before and update it. This time I checked out my articles for the previous two years and regret that I will not be saying anything revolutionary or startling in this edition. I am not sure whether it is sad or not that I keep repeating myself and hope that I do not bore you with the repetition. The Charity has achieved a great deal over a number of years, however I do think that the current committee, who have been in place for a number of years, are running out of steam. It is time for new village volunteers to raise their heads above the parapet and take a more active role in contributing to community life.

The Charity's **AGM** will take place at **7.30pm on Wednesday 23rd April**, in the first floor meeting room at the Village Hall, when a new committee will be elected. Villagers are particularly welcome both to attend the meeting and to seek election as trustees.

We are once again reviewing a number of large expenditure projects and establishing priorities for the maintenance and development of facilities at the village hall and around the sports field. During the February half term break the creation of a fenced outdoor area for the preschool should have been completed along with the installation of new insulated and sound proofed folding doors between the two halls. The former is weather dependent as is the work on the ditch which runs alongside the chase. Let's hope the weather dries up soon. The flooding on the field and along the chase will hopefully be reduced with the clearing of the ditch but we are hampered by the weather and the ground conditions; a little bit chicken and egg! We have also applied for permission to work on some of the trees that are the subject of Tree Preservation Orders and have to go through a formal approval process which takes time.

Major outstanding expenditure projects include:

Replacing the hall roof which is over 25 years old and leaking Extending the main car park with a "green" overflow car park Rebuilding the mountain bike mounds

Ploughing, levelling and reseeding the football pitches

Resurfacing the sports courts

Extending the sports wall

Completing a trim trail and dog walking path around the field to include skate board ramps and exercise equipment.

Extending the entrance lobby and village shop Creating a Community Suite above the small hall Install CCTV

As you can see the list is long and does not include the many smaller day to day maintenance issues

Planning has already started for the **Village Fete** on **Saturday 13<sup>th</sup> September**. A new Fete Committee is being formed following an initial meeting on 19<sup>th</sup> February. If you would like to help with the fete please contact me.

I don't think All Saints Church (building) should be closed, but in keeping it open we should need to understand what we want our Church to be and what we understand God is calling us to be as a church (community of believers).



As the long nights of winter start to give way to the bright skies of spring we are

trying to open our hearts and minds to what the future of All Saints might look like. We have asked members of the congregation and others that know All Saints as their church to reflect on their best experience of church and to begin to spell out what they understand as the most important aspects of church for them into the future. If you pop into All Saints Church on a Sunday during Lent, March and early April, you'll find a whole array of Easter wishes from people around the village. We will also have the display available at the Book Stall on Saturday 15 March (see village diary for details). Please add your own. We will be reflecting and praying during Lent for God to guide us in some serious decisions about the future of the Church:

- Should we invest in a toilet and kitchen point; a new heating system; and repaired & refurbished bells?
- What is the right pattern of worship for our current community? weekly or less frequent communion?; more open worship; timing of services?; school church club?
- How can we best support one another? visiting elderly folk;
   building links with local organisations; and school?
- What are the real issues facing residents of East Hanningfield that the church could help with?
- We will need to share our vicar with other communities. Which ones and why would they want to share with us?

These issues will be discussed at our annual meeting on 29 April. So, if you feel All Saints is your Church building and/or your church community and you want to have a say, please talk to us. With love and prayers

### ...AND FROM THE CHUCHWARDEN

Quinquennial Survey of Church Building – the PCC are hoping that the priority work recommended in the Report can be carried out this year. It is almost entirely work related to keeping the rain out, so we are in no doubt about the timing. It will be a scaffolding and cherry picker job with an estimated cost including VAT of around £12,000 – which goes to show the proverbial wisdom of putting money aside for a rainy day. But as the Revd Susan's letter makes clear, we are not in business just to preserve a building. It's people who count, and we are trying to get our heads round what our priorities should be if we are to have a worthwhile presence in the village in the future. Currently there are too few people with too many responsibilities on behalf of too few users, putting a big question mark over our ongoing viability.

**Spring Clean of Church Building –** Annual 'open day' for sweeping away the cobwebs will be on **Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> March from 10am** until around lunchtime, with a break for refreshments. We offer hard but rewarding work in a cheerful atmosphere. No previous experience of the inside of a church required - but be warned that we shall have a bunch of experts with a critical feminine eye in church immediately following our work. Yes, it's our......

...Mothering Sunday Service on 30th March at 10am which will be an All Age service replacing the usual Holy Communion Service. The earlier start will ensure that all who have special Mothering Day lunch events to get to afterwards should have plenty of time to do so. Traditional posies for Mum (including Mum's Mum of course) will be handed out to children for presentation as usual.

Our Annual Parish Church meeting on Tuesday 29th April at 8pm- We would welcome more people to come to this - see Rev'd Susan's letter for why. I would just add that, in line with normal practice, I should be standing down as Churchwarden, having completed 6 years in the post. This I would like to do, not least as age begins to tell - but I am painfully aware that this would leave not one but two vacancies to be filled, as I have had no colleague for the past year. However, in view of the current Consultations process described by Rev'd Susan, it seems appropriate to leave the matter open until nearer the time. There

is clearly a very demanding year ahead for All Saints' Church, leading on in 2015 to the end of Rev'd Susan's time with us, and the start of new links with other parishes. The question remains - just how viable are we in these exceptional circumstances?

### **BETHEL CHURCH—Wings Like Eagles**

Watching The Sochi Winter Olympics has been fascinating. Most of the events are certainly not for the faint hearted. Britain, over the years has seen modest success in terms of our medal haul, but that hasn't stopped many of our competitors from giving it their all.

For me, the Winter Games have become synonymous with Eddie 'The Eagle' Edwards. The British ski jumper was mocked for his performances at the 1988 Winter Olympics in Calgary, but he was a fearless and dedicated athlete who sacrificed a lot to make it to the Games.

For some, he was a hero who sacrificed a lot to live the dream: an athlete who competed with a smile on his face, and deservedly reaped the rewards of his unexpected fame while he could. For others, Edwards was a laughing stock who belittled both the sport of ski jumping and the 1988 Winter Olympics, and represented everything that was bad in a nation that seemed to adore sporting losers. Either way, the story behind Edwards' rise to stardom is still fascinating all these years later; and love him or pity him, you cannot deny Edwards his place in Winter Olympics history.

Eddie Edwards had very little hope of winning an Olympic medal, yet he displayed enormous courage and strength to even achieve the right to participate.

Finding courage and strength comes easier for some than others. The Old Testament prophet Isaiah said this:

Do you not know? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding no one can fathom. He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak.

Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall; but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary,

### they will walk and not be faint. Isaiah 40:28-31

Where is your strength? We live in a world that prides itself in all its accomplishments. We live in a world that prides itself in being able to do anything it sets its mind to do, a world that has put men on the moon and skiers flying 50mph through the air from a ski slope.

Isaiah's message is very counter intuitive to our normal thinking. He says, Man, at his strongest, is weak. He is helpless. We are inherently weak. The text, of course, points to youths and to their physical strength. And yet, even though they may be physically strong, they are yet weak, as compared to God.

The wonderful message here is, that those who look to the Lord will have their strength renewed. He is the One we should turn to.

But this physical picture mainly points to a spiritual picture, the spiritual picture is our disharmony with God, because of our disobedience - and how he offers a way back to him through the person and work of his son, Jesus.

Jesus Christ himself gives this promise to his disciples. "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." When you are weary and heavy laden, don't just wallow in that weariness, but go to Christ, and he will give you rest. That's the way that God works in our lives. He makes us to sense our weakness and he puts it in our hearts even to go to him. He will give us rest.

Come and join others who are learning to 'soar like eagles' under the teaching of the Bible. We would love to see you.

### **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH**

By the time you read this, spring should be in the air. It will be time for all but the hardiest of us to bring our bicycles out and take to the road. Our neighbourhood police have taken



the opportunity to remind us of the need to consider security. Bicycle theft, they say, has doubled since the mid 1990's, probably due to the proliferation of more expensive models and one is stolen every minute in the UK; less than 5% ever get returned. Their advice is timely, so here are some suggestions as to what you should do -

- 1. Always lock your cycle, wherever you leave it.
- 2. Use a good quality lock, preferably two -, say D-Lock + chain.
- 3. Lock it to an immovable object, while making sure it is legal and inoffensive.
- Make sure such object cannot be cut, broken, removed or lifted over.
- 5. Use the cycle facilities offered at railway stations and other public places.
- 6. With the lock(s), catch as much as possible, including the wheels.
- 7. Remember that saddles are sometimes stolen.
- 8. Lock cycles even when at home, preferably to a secure ground or wall anchor.
- 9. Store out of public view.

**Marking your bicycle –** Neighbourhood watch carry a police marking kit provided by our Police, for use by us.

- 1. Mark your cycle frame with your postcode, twice, with one location hidden.
- 2. Keep a record of the frame number, and photograph your cycle, including markings.

- 3. Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) is available, at a small cost, and should be considered. This way, Police have facility to reunite property with its owner. (NB RFID is not a GPS tracking system)
- View, consider and use the facilities offered by the 'Immobilise' web site

Of course you may have more ideas on how to fool the thief; if so, use them. That way, we can start to clean up the plague of bicycle theft, - and much besides.


