

PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council has asked me to remind residents that now is the time to cut back your hedge from footpaths and pavements, before growth starts again in the spring. Remember, growth starts from the point to which you have cut it, so if it is over the path when you have finished cutting it will only get worse when the buds burst.

This is also the traditional time for ditch "scouring", to ensure that surface water flows away. Our predecessors had to dig out ditches without the benefit of machinery, so they didn't do it without good reason. If you have a ditch on your property think what the effect of back-up might be having on your neighbours up stream.

As mentioned in the last News, the results of the Traffic Calming Survey were presented to PC at the September Meeting. The clearest outcome was that the opposition to speed humps won the day, so PC will not be following up this means of controlling traffic. There was also much concern about speed and volume in roads other than the Tye. Old Church Road has recently been added to the roads covered by Speed Watch and their results confirm the complaints in the survey responses.

An electronic traffic census was recently carried out on Ashley Green. It showed that the little speeding there was occurred in the small hours. Perhaps there is link to the cat fatalities in this area. If the perception is that traffic is travelling too quickly along Ashley Green, perhaps the speed limit should be reduced to 20mph, as some residents have already suggested.

Further thought needs to be given to traffic problems in the village before a proposal is taken to Highways.

The seats on the Tye had been scheduled for treatment during September, but

in the meantime one had been painted turquoise. Because this would need stripping there was only time to treat the one at the northern end of the Tye. The Parish Council has asked me to say that the enthusiasm of the person who painted the bench was misplaced, the colour is not to everyone's taste but has to be reversed at everyone's expense. It is scheduled for stripping in January.

Another activity to take place in January, or possibly December, is the rescheduled replacement of the broken posts and rails along the Tye.

I was recently told a touching tale of why Hanna's Field is so called: that it was named after a little girl whose parents donated it to the village. This story is as accurate as the one told to newcomers that there is a church under the reservoir. The truth is the playing fields were achieved by a great deal of hard work by local people fundraising over several years and the Parish Council raising a loan to purchase it. The name derives from the supposed Saxon Hanna whose people settled in the area which is now the Hanningfields. Although urban or, in this case, rural myths can be fun, it would be unjust to forget all the effort put into providing our recreation ground with its facilities by East Hanningfield residents past and present.



If you would like to read about the beginnings of Hanna's Field there is an account of the subject in the Autumn 2012 edition of the News which can be found on PC's website. A study of the East Hanningfield landscape including name origins can also be found on the website under Study Resources.

In the last issue I reported that a purchaser had been found for the paddocks behind the pumping station and numbered houses in Old Church Road. I have been informed that he did not proceed with the purchase because on investigation he found that he would be unable to develop the land as he had hoped. At the time of writing the land is for sale again and can be found on the internet.

On another planning matter, it looked as though the planning application for land between Old Church Road and Back Lane would be refused, so the agent was offering to negotiate. This News will have to go to print before any further information is likely to become available. The 43 comments from residents have demonstrated that local people have a strong understanding of the issues.


I know that the forthcoming demise of bus services 1 & 3 is causing considerable concern for residents. As the County Council is carrying out an impact assessment all your letters and emails will have filled them in as to precisely what is needed to replace them.

PC receives repeated complaints about parking on the Abbeyfields sight splay. A sight splay is a piece of land beside a junction which is purposefully kept clear so that drivers of vehicles coming out of the junction have sight of on-coming traffic. If an opaque object is stationed on the sight splay, the sight line is obstructed, which is a safety hazard. Also it is safer for pedestrians to walk on the verge rather than in the road, and lastly, parking on the grass in wet weather creates ruts which make it difficult to maintain and walk on.

For the most part, Parish Council Meetings are held on the fourth (not

the last) Thursday of each month, but in December this can, inconveniently, be too close to the Christmas holiday period and the associated celebrations, so we meet earlier in the month and this year the Meeting will be on Thursday 14th. returning to the normal formula for January. As usual, the Agenda will appear on PC's website and noticeboards by the end of the previous weekend.

All Parish Council Meetings are public meetings and you are welcome to come along to watch and listen. A special time, Public Question Time, is set aside early on in each Meeting for members of the public to ask questions or bring matters of concern to the attention of the Council. If you have an issue that requires PC to

make a decision then it has to be on the Agenda, so I will need it in writing a week before the Meeting date to ensure it is included. Local Government is complicated with some issues being the responsibility of all levels and other matters being the sole responsibility of one, so a quick call to establish whether PC can become involved in your issue as an actor or just a lobbyist might be worthwhile.

If you have never taken a look and are wondering why PC has a Facebook page and a website, I'll try to give a brief outline of the differences. The website contains all the official documents, plus some historical information

about the parish (suitable for school projects) and is generally an archive about the parish. The Facebook page displays more ephemeral information, but is being used for recent albums of pictures such as the Annual Fete and Art Exhibition photographs.

I hope you enjoy all the Christmas Cover Competition entries in this issue. Every entry will be displayed, including those that couldn't be squeezed into this News, on PC's Facebook page.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Crime update - Other than more fly-tipping in Pan Lane, and report of a vehicle driving through fields and fences in an apparent attempt to burgle farm buildings, NhW are not aware of any recent local incidents.

The continued fly-tipping is shameful but, if we give the police something to go on, they say they will definitely prosecute culprits because of the scale of fly-tipping across the county. So, if you see someone, or a vehicle acting suspiciously, record the details - if it's in progress call the police (999) or, if its already happened report it to police on 101 or on the Essex police crime report website (a photo of vehicle/registration no. is ideal). If you employ a contractor to take away rubbish make sure they dispose of it legally – you could be held responsible if it isn't.

A reminder - unless it's an emergency or you need to speak to an officer about a crime, the police say it's easier and quicker to use the Police website "Do it on-line" to report a crime (https://www.essex.police.uk/do-it-online/) rather than waiting for police to answer your 101 call.

Many house burglaries occur between dusk and when you get home. See how easy it is to spot the empty house in your road at this time of year. A house in darkness in a line of houses with lights on and signs of occupancy is easy to spot. A burglar will spot it too. Create the illusion of occupancy to help protect your house. Simple things like lights on timers and a radio or TV simulator for the evenings. You can fit doorbells that you can monitor and answer via your mobile phone. Lock tools away in a secure shed or garage so a burglar can't use them & use a shed alarm. These can also be remotely monitored.

The chances of you being a victim of burglary are small and are reduced further with a little thought. If you need advice contact your local Crime Prevention Officers (Crime Prevention Tactical Advisors) by email: CrimePreventionTacticalAdvisors@essex.pnn.police.uk, or by using the police non-emergency number 101. NhW have a marker kit which may aid recovery of stolen items should you be burgled. Photograph and record the details of jewellery and small items. Make a note of any serial number. The Police recommend you use the free public register website to register details of valuables at www.immobilise.com.

Scams and Fraud—There have been reports of cold callers trying to sell burglar alarms to elderly folk. If you are considering fitting a burglar alarm look for accredited companies at www.nsi.org.uk or www.ssaib.org or choose a Trading Standards "Buy with Confidence" accredited compa-

ny. These companies are vetted by Trading Standards; ring 0345 404 0506 or look at www.buywithconfidence.gov.uk.

The police are warning of false information concerning solar panel battery storage systems being spread by cold callers in this area. Rogue companies seek to sell systems that cannot be verified and some offer no energy advantage. If you going to invest in additional solar panel equipment systems a good source of consumer information is The Renewable Energy Consumer Code website (https://www.recc.org.uk).

Fraudsters have been contacting the elderly & vulnerable claiming to be from HM Revenue & Customs. Victims are told there are arrest warrants, outstanding debts or unpaid taxes in their name. The fraudsters ask victims for cash or iTunes gift cards as payment. The methods used include calls, texts & voicemails. HMRC never text to tell you about a tax rebate or penalty & never ask for payment in this way. Telephone numbers & text messages can be spoofed so never trust the number on your caller display. If you get a suspicious cold call, end it immediately.

When TalkTalk was hit by a cyber-attack in October 2015, nearly 157,000 of their customers' details, including bank account numbers, were stolen. Some customers are still being scammed as a result of stolen data which appears to be unrelated to the original crime (source BBC). In a sophisticated scam, some UK TalkTalk customers after reporting a problem have received a phone call from people purporting to be TalkTalk employees. They say they are investigating the problem and ask to take control of the PC for IT checks, and then say the person's router has a virus. The fraudsters download their own software onto the PC to support the next stage of the scam. The person is told they will receive a new router and £200 in compensation. The person is asked to check their bank account to ensure the £200 had been received. The scammers provide a fake bank log-in screen for the victim to enter their bank account codes. One person lost £5,000.

In the first six months of 2017, the Consumer organisation Which says over £100m was lost to bank transfer scams involving 19,000 victims. Nearly three quarters of that was never returned to the victim & in many cases the sums involved are life changing. In 2016 Which made a "super-complaint" to the Payment Systems Regulator (PSR), calling on it and banks to do more to protect people from being tricked into transferring money to a fraudster. The PSR responded last month (Nov) agreeing that scams involving bank transfers are a serious problem, and one that's growing. The regulator has told banks that they need to

do more to protect their customers. It said banks need to improve the way they respond to bank transfer scams, and do more to identify fraudulent payments. From 1 January 2018, people who've been victims of a bank transfer scam will only need to deal with their bank when making a complaint, not the fraudster's bank as well. The PSR is also consulting on a reimbursement scheme for people who are tricked into transferring money when their bank failed to do enough to protect them. Although little consolation for past victims, it is some progress at last.

NhW are still seeking a contact for the Coulde Dennis estate, & another for Abbey Fields. Duties are receiving/passing local crime alerts (mainly by email), & an informal quarterly meeting with other EH NhW contacts.

There are about 110 residents receiving local NhW email alerts (the emails are "blind" copied so names & email addresses are not shared). Contact me if you would like to be included or know more.

We are also still looking for a couple of more volunteers for Community Speed Watch (four are now trained/operating & 2 are awaiting training). If you are interested please contact me. Some residents have complained about speeding in Ashley Green. NhW asked Essex Police/Community Speed Watch to arrange for a traffic survey of vehicle speeds there. A 6-day traffic survey took place over 7th -12th October:

Total recorded vehicles: 4,618: Average daily speed 85%ile: 26.8mph Average daily volume (based on 6 days): 770 vehicles.

Although the perception is that vehicles go too fast in Coulde Dennis & Ashley Green, the survey suggests most are obeying the 30mph limit.

Lastly, Roger Hirst was elected Essex P&CC (Police & Crime Commissioner) in May 2016. On 1st October he became the country's first Police, Fire & Crime Commissioner (PF&CC), responsible for setting the strategy & budget of the fire service as well as the police in Essex. He said "It is a great opportunity for Essex and means the public can really benefit from a better coordinated approach between the two services". Given Essex police manning cutbacks due to budget constraints let's hope he can find more money for our hard pressed police service.

CITY COUNCILLOR

It is common knowledge that last year an agreement was reached between East Hanningfield Action Group, a developer and the Parish Council. This met with the approval of the City Council and planning consent was granted to build on land between Back Lane and Old Church Road. This was for twenty homes, ten of which were affordable. This was regarded as a successful conclusion to protracted negotiations.



A fresh application has now been made by someone close to the original applicant and through the same planning agent. This application is on the same site but for an increase in the number of houses to twenty six of which ten only are affordable. The Parish Council and the East Hanningfield Action Group regard this new application as a breach of good faith and are extremely annoyed. Understandably they refuse to negotiate further with the applicant or his agent and will contest this application. I support this view. The planning application is currently with the city council for determination. If officers recommend refusal the ap-

plication will be refused. If they recommend approval then I have arranged for it to come before the planning committee for determination when I will argue for a refusal

I am very willing to visit residents and local businesses to discuss any problem. Just send me an e-mail or give me a ring.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

The news that Regal Busways has gone into Administration and will cease trading at the year end is very serious and worrying news. At the time of writing this article the announcement was only made a few days ago but I would like to assure readers that officers at Essex County Council are doing all they can to seek options including sourcing an alternative

provider. The link into Chelmsford is important and this is recognised. I will keep behind this issue and hopefully in the coming weeks we can announce some positive developments.

When the clocks go back we see every year an increase in road accidents and in particular pedestrian related incidents. It is so important that walkers and cyclists make every effort to ensure they can be seen and car drivers look out for pedestrians and cyclists. Over the past three years we have had over 1000 pedestrian related accidents in our County - we all have a role to play in making our roads safer!

At this time of year we have to be ready for a cold spell and at a briefing recently I was reassured to hear we are ready! We have a fleet of 62 grit-

ting lorries and two mini gritters ready to salt 2000 miles of roads across Essex and a stock level of salt exceeding 15k tonnes. The crews are on standby from now on and are supported by eight weather stations around the county providing detailed forecast information. In the event of a cold snap the Essex website will give you the latest Highway information.

It has been another eventful year and next year will be full of challenges for all of us, meanwhile to everyone, have a Happy Christmas and a great New Year

Hi hope you all had an enjoyable summer and are gearing up for the festive season. It does seem to get going earlier and earlier. HFC has been busy fundraising again with the Annual Art Exhibition. It was the largest show we have ever held with 715 works needing to be hung on walls and stands, plus lots of work on tables for rummaging through. It looked great and was of a good standard. The artists were pleased with our efforts and how their work looked. We were pleased with how much we sold and how this added to our grand total of \pounds 2,400

The best bit is how wonderful it was to have so many lovely people in our village that came to help over the 4 days of preparation and the exhibition. A real team of people helped number work, hang it and get all the stands down from the loft. Then they had to man the doors and serve cups of tea. It is a big undertaking and it was all done by volunteers. Thank you so much for making this village a good place to live.

With the final cheques for the summer Fete having been banked we were able to confirm the profit share between Hanna's Field Charity and All Saints Church. The final profit was £5,110.17, a splendid result. The cheque to All Saints Church was presented by Colin Warren to Cannon Christine at the Art Exhibition.

As always the hall is a busy place in the evenings but has space for activities in the day time. Preschool is active daily in the small hall but there is still a comfortable upstairs room and the large sports hall for hire. Perhaps a game of badminton could be just what you are looking for. Our bookings secretary Jessica Crow says that the Hall is increasingly busy and it's essential, if you are thinking of booking it for an event or party, to BOOK EARLY to avoid disappointment.

We are presently looking to extend the car park onto the field area to provide an all weather overflow area for cars. This will help at very busy times. As always, we hope that careful driving and use of the side path will help keep our children safe from harm. We are also hoping shortly to change the sports storage container for a newer one as the existing one is in a sorry state.

You may have noticed that the children's play area has had some work done as a result of last ROSPA inspection. As part of this, a set of stepping posts were added to connect the "Burma" Chain Bridge with the Chain & Balance Beams Walk which we hope the children are enjoying. It is hoped we can add another piece of equipment to the play area. So, with the help of school, we intend to organise a survey so that the children can give us an idea of what they would like best. For example it could be a climbing frame, a longer slide or some sort of roundabout. Please encourage your children to get involved so we can get what they would most prefer. Once again, all thanks to volunteers taking time to get things done.

There are still plenty of jobs to be done such as the paths around the hall and Post Office but everything takes time and money. The 'to do' list is, just as in our homes, constantly getting longer. One very good piece of news is that St Peter's Way footbridge at the west end of the Playing Field was replaced in November. HFC are grateful for help from the Parish Council in getting this done by CCC.

A number of people have asked about the deterioration in the paint surface of the Hall's south, and now west, facing steel wall cladding. The cladding finish only has a 30 year life guarantee and the Charity is in the process of getting panel manufacturer's paint recommendations and quotes for repainting the panels.

By the time this Newsletter is issued our November quarterly book sale and coffee morning will have happened. We have set the following dates for book sales in 2018: 17th. February , 21st. April, 30th. June (Fete), November 24th. All are held in the upstairs meeting room & library loft on these Saturday mornings from 10.00am until 12.30. Signs will be around the village to let you know they are happening. It is a very social event.

Lastly there are lots of activities going on at the Hall as well as different sports equipment available both for indoor and outdoor pursuits. The activities and times are displayed at the Hall and on the Charity's website .- If you want to hire the Hall facilities including the Meeting Room, there are preferential rates for residents. Just get in touch with Jess, the caretaker.

Please note the Hall facilities will be closed over the Christmas holiday period from Sunday 24th. December to Monday 1st. January inclusive.

We would also just like to say how delightful it was to hear that Ash and Arifa have had their twin daughters and that all went well. We wish

them all the best and we are sure that the whole

village shares with us in this.



The dear Christ enters in.



It's almost Christmas time again and as in previous years we plan gathering with our families, perhaps with a mixture of anticipation and dread - I leave you to provide the proportions in which those emotions occur!

Magazines and newspapers kindly provide Survival Guides for the busy family Christmas and I offer you below some of their more polite advice.



FIREWORKS

Early November was a very distressing time for many of the horses around the village due to fireworks being let off for several days and not just on the 5^{Th.} If you are living in the country you need to be aware of the distress this can cause to animals together with the danger of rogue fireworks landing in a barn and even setting alight hay or straw.

People living in the countryside should be aware of THE ANMAL WEL-FARE ACT 2006 in which it states that it is an offence to cause unnecessary suffering to any captive or domestic animal. Fireworks must not be set off near livestock. The offence carries a fine of up to £20,000 and/or a prison term of up to 6 months.

The Act is enforced by local councils, animal health officers and the police.

Perhaps residents should be aware of this next year and preferably go to a display.

BETHEL CHURCH—JOY TO THE WORLD

On Thursday 14 December around 6.00pm, please look out for a group of carol singers from Bethel Church and All Saints Church. We will be singing our little hearts out, trying to bring some early Christmas joy.

One of the songs we are likely to sing is Issac Watts' 1719 classic, "Joy to the World." Now the interesting thing about this song is, the only stanza that is related to Christmas and the birth of Jesus, is the first one that announces "the Lord is come." There is no mention of Mary and Joseph, the angels, the Shepherds, the manger, or the Wise Men. Yet, it is one of our most beloved Christmas carols because it really captures the essence of Christmas, which is joy.

Watts was right when he titled his carol "Joy to the World", for Christmas is not just joy to the UK, it is not a national joy. It is not joy to the Caucasian, it is not a racial joy. It is not joy to the West, it is not a cultural joy. It is not joy to the rich, it is not financial joy. It is not joy to the educated, it is not intellectual joy. It is not joy to the happy, it is not emotional joy. It is not joy to the healthy, it is not physical joy. It is joy to the world. It is universal joy.

Even the angel in Luke's gospel chapter 2 and verse10 said, "I bring you good tidings of great joy." The word for good tidings is the Greek word that gives us the word evangelism, which means, "to bring good news." We have a clue as to what this good news is all about in v.11.

There is something unique in v.11 that you do not want to miss. Nowhere else in all of the Bible will you find the three words Saviour, Christ, and Lord together in one verse. This is the only time in all of Scripture where these three words are brought together. Those words, along with the word "Babe" in v.12, reveal to us why Christmas truly is a time of joy to the world.

But let's face it; Christmas can be a stressful time for a lot of people. For some it is a time of intense loneliness or crushing grief. Even at its best, Christmas means parties to plan, gifts to buy, elaborate meals to cook, long trips to take, or out-of-town guests to host. Instead of bringing JOY, Christmas can bring frustration.

That's why it's good to pause and draw breath; and to reflect on the joy

that came on that very first Christmas. The joy that really matters. The everlasting joy that comes from knowing God.

We would love for you to join us at any or all of our upcoming Christmas events listed in the Village Diary on Page 17.

We will also be starting a 'Christianity Explored' course in the new year. This will be on Tuesday evening around 7.00pm for 8 weeks. It is an opportunity for anyone interesting in finding out more about the Christian faith. Visit www.christianityexplored.org for more details.

So, on behalf of all the folk at Bethel, can I wish you all a very happy, joy-filled Christmas.


Children can entertain themselves in a safe and fun environment with a selection of toys for all ages including baby area and arts and crafts table.

The Pre-school children had a visit from Canon Christine Horton the Minster from All Saints Church who came to pre-school and talked to the children about Harvest which the children enjoyed.



I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very happy and healthy Christmas and New Year!


