




PARISH COUNCIL

In the last News I mentioned the Parish Council election on 2nd. May. As there were only six candidates for the seven seats, there was no poll and all were elected unopposed. This leaves us with a vacant seat. So, if there is anyone out there who was too shy to stand for election but thinks they might be interested in joining the Council, please get in touch.

In May, PC holds its Annual Meeting when the Chairman is elected, Vice Chairman appointed and other roles distributed. At this year's AM

John Bedding was elected for a second year as Chairman and Les Draper as Vice Chairman.

Another Meeting held in May is the Annual Electors' Meeting, which is the one where different groups tell us what they have been doing over the past year and what they hope to be doing next. It is also an opportunity for any local elector to raise matters of local concern. As usual PC presented its Annual Report and Accounts to the Meeting, copies of which should be available in the Village Hall lobby and it can be read online at PC's website.

Also available on the website is the Annual Return which is the pack of documents prepared for the external audit. It is on the Accounts page under Publications. If you are interested in the history of the parish you might like to look at some recent additions to the website. More editions of East Hanningfield News have been digitised so that you can now read the first 36, which cover the period 1974-1986, and minutes of the Annual Parish Meetings 1975-85 have also been digitised as they are deteriorating due to having been typed on thin paper and pasted into the minute book with glue that stains. It is hoped to preserve more of the old minutes in this way, but it is a time consuming exercise. These particular minutes are interesting as they cover much of the period when efforts were underway to build a community centre, which developed into the Village Hall we have today.

The decision to extend the period for the Housing Needs Survey paid off, as an additional 34 forms were received. All but three of the responders used the online form, which demonstrates that we need to use this form of communication in future surveys. The Survey identified a need for 25 housing units. Unfortunately 4 responders did not give enough information for the type of accommodation they require to be ascertained. Of the remaining 21, it looks as though 3 could afford open market housing if it became available. There were 4 who would qualify for shared ownership housing of varying sizes, 1-4 bedrooms, and the remaining 14 would require 1-3 bedroom units. This feedback gives PC the information needed to respond to planning applications with definite affordable housing requirements and to put in motion the beginnings of another scheme of affordable housing for local people.

This year's Village Tidy had the added interest of being accompanied by Storm Hannah. The volunteers were a determined crowd and managed to hold on to their rubbish sacks when the wind tried to carry them away. So much so that a trailer load of rubbish was collected & taken to the recycling centre. Thanks to everyone who came to help.





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If you hold an older person's bus pass or a disability based bus pass and use it for Park and Ride you will be interested to know that Essex County Council are currently consulting on proposed changes to the use of the passes with Park and Ride. You can find out about it and complete a questionnaire at www.essex.gov.uk/park-and-ride-fares-consultation.

There will be three Play in the Park sessions at the Village Hall and playing fields during the Summer break, all on Tuesdays, 6th. August 1.30-3.30pm and 13th. and 27th. August 10am-12noon. Please see www.chelmsford.gov.uk/leisure-centres/who/kids-activities/play-in-the-park/?p=8 for details of other venues and their times. There are a few rules to remember: under sixes must be supervised by an adult parent or guardian for the whole session. One adult can supervise a maximum of three children per session. Under eights must be dropped off and picked

up by an adult. The adult will need to set up a password with staff on arrival and provide the same password when collecting the child. Over

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eights can come and go without an adult, but they must provide any relevant medical information and emergency contact details when they register. Lastly, please bring a drink and wear sunscreen and/or a hat.

Reports of drivers not taking due care in Back Lane have reached PC. Perhaps the drivers are not used to driving where there are no pavements, so don't realise that there could be a family out for a walk or someone walking their dogs in the middle of the road around the next bend. Not all residents are sprightly enough to jump out of the way when a speeding vehicle comes careering towards them, so if you have been treating Back Lane as a race track, please slow down before someone gets seriously hurt.

I've been asked to repeat the plea for dog walkers to pick up their dog's poo and put it in one of the many dog bins provided around the village (not in the litter bins please). A supply of free dog bags is available in the shop and Village Hall entrance, and some helpful person has tied some to the fence at the courts on the playing field, so they are even available when the building is closed. Also, picking up the poo and then not putting the bag in the bin is not good enough. I recently found a couple of bags of poo on the ground inside the fenced area at Hanna's Hoppet, the children's play area between Catherine & Filliol Closes. Reminder: dog



bins can be identified by their lid and picture on the front, and you can be fined for leaving dog poo on the ground in any open space in Chelmsford (which includes East Hanningfield) with public access.

For many years, PC has supported the re-development of the Morelands Industrial Site. For those of you unfamiliar with the site, it is in a small area of the parish that is on the west side of the A130, and it is reached from the Southend Road, then South Hanningfield Road (roughly opposite the Bell) and turning right immediately after going under the A130. Those of you who knew Mike Harris when he was our

borough councillor will know that he made great efforts to persuade the planners that, although it is in the green belt, it needed to be developed in order to bring to an end the unsuitable activities at the site. At one point, a retirement village was proposed, which PC supported, but it came to nothing, which was a shame because amongst other facilities it would have provided a doctor's surgery which could have been used by all residents of the parish. More recently a development of executive type houses was envisaged, and although supported, also came to nothing. The problem is that the ground is so polluted, it will need to be cleaned up before any building can start, and the development overall needs to be able to cover the cost.

The latest proposal, which has been submitted as an outline planning application, 19/00384/OUT, is for a residential development of up to 92 dwellings, plus some public open space. The houses would be a mix of 2, 3 and 4 bedroom houses plus one 5 bedroom house. The site is not what would normally be called "sustainable", so PC has proposed some ameliorating measures to help future residents access nearby amenities without resorting to the private car. PC has been informed by the neighbours that they support the proposal. The plans, which are extensive, can be found on the planning pages of the City Council's website. Go to https://publicaccess.chelmsford.gov.uk/online-applications/search.do and type in the reference number.

In addition to cleaning up a polluted site, this development would bring a substantial payment of Community Infrastructure Levy to the parish. Parish Council's received 15% of the Levy, and 25% if they have a Neighbourhood Plan. PC is currently considering whether the preparation of a Neighbourhood Plan would be viable.

Please note that that due to a legal requirement the first PC Meeting after the election had to be brought forward to the third Thursday of the month, so the following two Meetings were also brought forward to maintain regularity, which means the dates of PC Meetings are 20th. June, 18th. July and back to normal for 22nd. August. Meetings begin at 8pm, and take place in the first floor meeting room at the Village Hall. Please use the door by the car park extension, as the door between the main Hall and annexe is kept locked. The Agenda is always posted on the PC's website three clear days before each Meeting, so on Sunday at the latest.

If you have a matter that you would like to draw to the attention of the Council you can do so during Public Question Time, or put it in writing and send it to me a week before the Meeting.

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CITY COUNCILLORS

The result of the local election was a great disappointment and a surprise. Talking to residents on the doorstep there was little interest in local issues but comments related to Brexit and why it had not been implemented as voted for in the Referendum.

The results were:

Dobson	Conservative	833
Goldfinch	Lib Dem	373
Poulter	Conservative	927
Sant	Lib Dem	321

The impact of the change of control at Chelmsford is yet to be felt but there is a strong possibility that the new administration will seek to change or restart the Local Plan. This could have huge implications for the distribution of new homes. The cost to local taxpayers has been estimated at between £1.5m and £3m pounds. In the meantime Chelmsford, without a current plan, would be at the mercy of individual developers seeking building permission on their own sites.

I would like to express my gratitude to all those residents who voted for Sue Dobson and myself. It is a great honour to represent you all. Sue and I are here to represent your interests to the best of our ability, irrespective of your political views. We look forward to hearing from you. Sue is a new councillor although she has previously been Clerk to Sandon Parish Council. She lives in Sandon and is married to Keith. They have two adult children, both of whom live locally. She is Chairman of Danbury Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group. She is very involved with equestrian matters including bridleways and believes that the rural area in which we live should be protected from inappropriate development. It is my belief that she will be an excellent councillor.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

At County we have just started a new year with the appointment of Cllr John Jowers as our Chairman. We also approved appointments to outside bodies and various committees. My own role is to Chair the Place Scrutiny Committee which I also did last year and I am pleased to have held on to this as we have done some good work on Air Quality, Cladding and the contract with Ringway Jacobs. This year we be following up recommendations submitted to the Cabinet on all these items and holding them to account.

There have been a number of announcements recently which hopefully will be a benefit to residents. Some £663k of funding has been awarded to us to help promote our coastline as a high quality visitor destination. The Essex coastline is some 350 miles long consisting of award winning beaches, traditional piers, mudflats, saltmarshes and remote creeks - many of which have havens for local wildlife. Next year we will be celebrating in Harwich the 400th anniversary of the Mayflower landing. This will turn our coast into an international visitor destination and of course have positive benefits to the local economy.

Additionally we have made available £500k to the Police to help deal with the County Lines Drugs issue and a £1m to help tackle Mental Health problems including personnel from our Armed Forces and a further £400k to help tackle the pavement improvement programme.

I can see already it is going to be a busy year!

HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY Village Hall & Playing Fields

I am sure you are looking forward to Summer and warmer weather! Easter gave us a taste for it but then the weather changed for the May Day weekend! Hopefully by Whitsun it will have improved!

At the end of April, we had our A.G.M, which was well attended. I gave a report looking back over our achievements as follows:

The first (with Parish Council funding) was to provide a solid pathway down the chase between the school fence and the post & rail barrier which was erected mainly to keep children safe on their way into school. We also replaced the uneven and cracked concrete slabs around the hall with tarmac surfaces. In early May the old unsafe storage container on the playing field was removed and replaced with a smaller second-hand container. At the end of May work started on the new 'green' all-weather overflow car park. When completed the weather was very dry, so a team of us watered the area morning and evening to get the grass growing, until we had some natural downpours! Although we allowed cars to drive through this new area to park on the field at the Fete, at the end of June, we then kept it closed until September to let the grass become more established. Unfortunately, we had to close it again later when heavy rain caused a drainage problem at the entrance. Remedial work has now been carried out which we think has sorted out the problem to allow us to open it up permanently. At the end of July, during the heatwave, painting was carried out on the Hall's steel wall cladding. There was a quantity of paint left over so additional coats were also applied to the two most exposed walls. New Goal Posts were purchased towards the end of the year to enable us to continue to offer our facilities for Football.

Our two main fund raising events last year, the Fete in June (profits shared with All Saints' Church) and the Art Show in September, together with the regular Book Sales where we also share the profits with All Saints' Church, helped to raise much needed funds to allow us to carry out improvements to your Village Hall and playing field facilities.

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For the upcoming year we will need to look at our priority list of what we would like to be able to achieve for your Village Hall and playing fields with monies hopefully raised in 2019 at the Fete, Art Show and Book sales.

Overall, a very busy year which did mean there was a lot of extra work for the Charity and, in particular, Mike Plumridge and David Bell who oversee the work.

We are always more than happy to welcome any new people onto the committee. We meet six times a year for our general meetings (plus those we have for fund raising).

Arrangements with All Saints' Church and other village organisations for the **Village Fete** on **Saturday 6th July** are well in hand. This is a great community event and we hope to see you there. But, **all the extra help we can get on both the Friday** (preparation) **and Saturday** (setting-up in morning, manning stalls and clear-up in the afternoon) is most welcome. Last year we did have a good turn out of helpers and we were able to clear up very quickly after the event, which was just great!

The same applies to the **Art Show** which this year is on **Sat 21st/Sun 22nd September**, where again many hands will make light work!

EAST HANNINGFIELD NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Local Crime Update: If you receive our local NhW e-mail alerts you will already know that over the period since the Spring Newsletter there have been a number of incidents around the village. A house break-in was reported (Could Dennis estate) as well as a garden shed broken into with equipment stolen at a house on The Tye. There was an attempted break-in to an outbuilding at a property in the Old Church Road/Pan Lane area (involving serious damage). In Pan Lane also, was a fly tipping incident (large amount of domestic refuse dumped in access drive). In another incident, a quad bike was found on a farm field (it had been stolen but happily the police returned it to its owner). In fact, this rate of activity is pretty average for our village - we provide updates here mainly to remind residents that crime is about and to avoid being a victim by taking precautions. Despite the lighter evenings, always remember to leave some lights on if out late. With holiday season approaching, make doubly sure your home is secure before leaving and don't make it obvious you are away - it's good practice to inform a neighbour and ask them to keep an eye out for you whilst away and to let them have a contact number (especially if you leave a house alarm activated).

Cold Callers: A number of residents in April complained about Cold Callers selling household items with one particularly abusive young man causing distress. Door step sales (this includes Charity collectors unfortunately) are often used by criminals to perform distraction burglaries, especially with the elderly, or are employed by people selling items which are overpriced or poor quality (often the person will have a hard luck story to get your sympathy) - don't be taken in! NhW advice is to not let any cold caller into your house and we have distributed No-Cold-Caller stickers to residents to attach to the inside of window/door glazing. They may not deter people from knocking at your door but at least you can end the conversation by politely pointing out the sticker. If you do decide to talk to the person, ask them for identification and if you decide to buy something on the doorstep then understand your address is likely to be passed on to other cold caller sales organisations.

Scams and Fraud Update: Statistics show we are unfortunately more

likely to be the victim of a fraud or a scam these days than a burglary...

-Parking Scam: Essex Trading Standards say people are receiving convincing looking emails entitled "Parking Charge Reminder". They claim you have parked on one of UKPC's client's private land. The bottom of the email asks victims to click on "payment options and photos" for more information - a link that is likely to contain



malware. If you receive one of these emails, delete it, do not download the attachment. Think about it, how would UKPC even get your email address to let you know about this.

- **-WhatsApp:**Action Fraud say "WhatsApp" have announced a vulnerability that could have allowed users' phones to be compromised. The company has reportedly said that a small number of accounts have been affected and has told its users to update their apps using standard updates from their app store as a precaution. The National Cyber Security Centre always recommends that you protect your device by installing updates as soon as they become available.
- -Precautions for Scams and Fraud: If you experience a scam, report it on the website: www.actionfraud.police.uk/report-a-fraud/how-to-report-a-fraud. Don't assume an email or text message is authentic, even if someone knows your basic details (such as your name or address). Remember criminals can spoof email addresses to appear as companies you know and trust, even banks. Don't click on the links or attachments in suspicious emails and never respond to messages that ask for your personal or financial details. For more information on how to stay secure online visit www.cyberaware.gov.uk.

Knives and Young People: With the increase in knife crime nationally, the National NhW organisation has produced an information sheet for parents about Knives and Young People for circulation. If you receive our email alerts then you should have received this information as an attachment in April, but if you don't have email and would like a copy then contact me.

Community Speed Watch: You may have noticed the more frequent speed watch checks in the village as the weather improves and lighter evening/mornings are here. The aim, as always, is to deter speeding through our village making it safer for everyone.

Community Speedwatch (CSW) is a national initiative where active members of local communities, with the support of the Police, use speed detection devices to monitor speeds of vehicles. Vehicles exceeding the speed limit are referred to the Police with the aim of educating drivers to change their behaviour and reduce their speeds. CSW has an important role to play in developing safer communities through the adoption of speedwatch schemes. As part of this we still have a few "30 mph" self-adhesive A3 signs for brown wheelie bins. Use the NhW email address below If you would like one.

NhW Alerts: About 120 residents receive our local emailed local crime alerts - contact NhW email address below if you would like to receive these. It's a two-way process and you can provide feedback or suggestions.

NhW Team/Meetings: There are eight NhW team members who between us cover the village. We are still looking for a point-of-contact for Coulde Dennis estate and Abbey Fields. Involvement just means receiving/passing local crime alerts (mainly email), and a quarterly meeting. Our next NhW team meeting is 19th June, 8pm in the Bethel Church meeting room. Contact NhW email address below if you would like more information or would like to come along (or talk to us at the Village Fete on 6 July!).

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

loved one goes. Then some friends who had come to stay for the weekend came, and I showed them to a bedroom. A few minutes later the cat appeared at the bottom of the stairs. She had been inside a bag with a flap top, under the bed! I was so relieved and grateful, but was then filled with the other things we all feel, not to let go, not to let her out of my sight again, but of course you have too. I did pray that day even though she was only a cat, and God knew at least it was very meaningful to me & I had some relief. Such is life with all its ups & downs.



I suppose the disciples felt much the same when Jesus died in such terrible circumstances. Do not forget this story and the ones following it, as they are very human. They show the disbelief as we might experience it, and the shock, but also joy as I felt, when Jesus was resurrected and appeared to them as flesh and blood, indeed he told them to touch him and watch him eat.

So go forth with cheer and have a good summer. Do have a look at our services in the middle pages of the East Hanningfield News, and we hope to see you along the way. The church continues to look lovely in the spring sunshine, enhanced with lots of wild flowers. Come and see us, it is your church and thanks to your support and also that of the Parish Council, we get lots of compliments from visitors. Remember that we are always there if you need us.

BETHEL CHURCH

The village fete is nearly upon us, we at Bethel love being a small part of the day. The team from the village work tremendously hard all year round to make the event a success. So, a huge thank you goes to a special group of people.

Thankfully we didn't poison anybody last year, so this year, we will once again, be flipping burgers. Please come and say hello.

But please also look out for the **Bethel Information Tent**. There you will be able to chat with our team that are serving the community, namely: Street Pastors, School Pastors, The Food Bank, One Challenge, and our homeless charity - Above Us Only Sky?

Street Pastors

Established in 2008, Chelmsford Street Pastors are now a familiar sight on the Chelmsford weekend nightlife scene. They are acknowledged as a force for good, not only by pubbers and clubbers, but also by the police, CCTV authorities and pub/club owners. Local authorities have commented that since the scheme started there has been a significant drop in the level of anti-social behaviour on Friday and Saturday evenings in Chelmsford.

School Pastors

The School Pastor team is made up of volunteers from Bethel and other local churches, who have committed themselves to the service of young people in South Woodham Ferrers, offering a reassuring and friendly presence to students who may not feel able to speak openly to teachers or parents. Their main priority is to build relationships with all users of the school and to 'Help, Listen and Care' for all in a non-judgmental way.

Chelmsford and Maldon Foodbanks

We don't think anyone in our community should have to face going hungry. That's why the foodbank provide three days' nutritionally balanced emergency food and support to local people who are referred to them in crisis. The Chelmsford and Maldon foodbanks are part of a nationwide network of foodbanks, supported by The Trussell Trust, working to combat poverty and hunger across the UK.

Above Us Only Sky?

A Christian charity whose purpose is to provide immediate and long-term support for the homeless in the UK, primarily in London and Essex. Their vision is to provide every homeless person in the UK with a military-style, all-weather sleeping bag, capable of keeping them warm whatever the conditions may be. However, the sleeping bag is just the start; they also aim to build loving relationships with the homeless and helpless, to meet not just their physical but also their spiritual needs, to show them God's love and to treat them with respect and dignity. This means talking to them, listening to them, comforting them, praying with them and providing for them in a variety of ways.

More recently, working with the insight of the Street Pastors, AUOS? have made evening trips, seeking to help those who are sleeping rough on the streets of Chelmsford.

One Challenge

Is an inter-denominational, international, Christian faith mission sending agency. OC empowers local church ministry in more than 100 countries around the world. They believe that whole nations can be reached for Christ. OC is involved in Missions Mobilization, Church Planting & Growth, Education, Holistic Ministry, Leadership Development, Member Care, Partnering & Bridge Building, Research, Sports Ministries, as well as Business for Transformation.
