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due to the virus.

As many of the entries as possible have been included in the following pages & all will appear in an album on PC's Facebook page. All children's names appear with parental consent, so if a picture has no name attached it is because the parent or guardian chose that option.

PARISH COUNCIL

There has been interest taken, on Facebook, in the future of the telephone box on the Tye. At the moment, BT has no plan to remove it or take it out of use, and, as it is a listed building, there would have to be a consultation should BT wish to change its use. In order to be forearmed should such a consultation arise, PC has two questions for you. Firstly, what is the level of use? If you have used the telephone recently or can foresee that you might need to use it, please let me know. Secondly, if the kiosk was left as an empty shell, what use could be made of it?

Another matter concerning the Tye, is the evidence in the form of hoof prints that horses have been ridden on the grass. Please, don't ride on the grass. It damages the turf and it is against the byelaws. Byelaw 4 says "A person shall not except in pursuance of a lawful agreement with the Council, or otherwise in the exercise of any lawful right or privilege bring or cause to be brought on to the ground any beast of draught or burden or any cattle, sheep, goats, or pigs or any horse, donkey or pony other than an unshod pony on a leading rein." You cannot have failed to notice the problems with one of the weeping willows standing on the Tye. First, a large branch was brought down by Storm Ciara on 2nd. September. PC was in the process of getting authorisation from the City planning department to carry out pruning works on both trees, which they need from time to time anyway, when another branch came down, in early October. It became apparent that the structure of the tree was not strong enough for the abundant growth that had occurred this year. Another application has been



made to the City Council for a more extensive pruning of both trees to cut back to strong, stable branches which should be able to hold up the weight of expected growth. PC had originally wanted to pollard both trees, which would have cut back to main branches but a tree officer at the City Council advised that this would not be acceptable. We now wait to see if the City planners have been

persuaded that PC's safety concerns over-ride their planning considerations. Should PC be successful, the trees will look close-cut for a while.

Still on the subject of plant growth, here is still time to trim your hedge. In fact, now is the time to do it. Along with speeding & dog poo, this is one of the subjects that PC gets contacted about most. If you have a hedge with a pavement on the other side, please go out there and walk along the path. Could you walk hand in hand with a child along the path? Could you ride a wheel chair or buggy along the path? If hedge growth now necessitates stepping into the road, it will be even worse when growth starts in spring. Please cut it back to your boundary to a height which allows people to walk past without ducking or diving.

Also, there will be leaf litter at the base of the hedge, spreading across the path. Most of this will have dropped from your hedge, so please clear it away so that we retain the full width of the pavement. Hedges are valuable habitats for wildlife, and add greatly to the rural aspect of the village so we wouldn't want to lose them, but, unfortunately, they





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don't manage themselves and need regular care.

Having held face-to-face meetings in the small hall in July and August, because the meeting room was too small for social distancing, PC was set to continue, but In September Preschool was given sole use of the small hall, so that they could have control over its cleanliness. PC then decided to hold meetings in the sports hall, which meant changing the meeting day to Wednesdays, as Thursdays were regularly booked. As it got closer to the date of the September meeting it became apparent that the sports hall would be unsuitable, what with the acoustics etc. and the thought of going into the winter having meetings with the windows open! Meetings were therefore moved on to Zoom. There were many teething problems, but we seem to have ironed those out and are now able to hold virtual meetings without much problem. Information about how members of the public can attend these meetings is included on the Agenda which appear on the noticeboards and website.

With the new lockdown starting on 5th. November, owners of play-grounds were given the option, by the government, to leave them open or close them. The East Hanningfield play areas have remained open, and the responsibility is with carers to ensure that children stay safe when using the equipment. Social distancing still applies, and applies to the carers as well as the children! There have been reports of huddles of adults at the Hanna's Field play area, so everyone is reminded that even though you are outside you should be standing 2m apart unless you are with a member of your own household.

What is permitted during various levels of Covid restrictions and lock-downs has been very confusing. Information to help residents keep abreast of these changes is regularly being posted on PC's Facebook page. So, for example, during the first lockdown Essex country parks and recycling centres were closed, during the second lockdown they were not, and this information was posted as soon as it was conveyed to PC.

Also, regularly appearing on the Facebook page are the Fraud Alerts from Essex Police. The ingenuity of fraudsters seems endless, and the Alerts always have something new to warn us about.

At the end of August and through most of September, my broadband was disconnected due to a fault at the exchange in Church Road. Using a phone to keep connected wasn't quite as smooth as might be expected, so PC communications were rather clunky during those weeks. There must have been other residents who were also deprived of connection during that time and they have my sympathy!

The December Meeting, when the budget is agreed and Precept set, will take place on Wednesday 16th. PC has been informed by the City Council's finance department that the tax base for 2021-2 is expected to be 488.97 which is lower than this year's figure of 496.09. This means that to maintain the same level of income from the Precept, the parish council tax to individual properties would have to increase. I shall let you know how PC manages this situation in the next News.



It is expected that in 2021 Meetings will return to the fourth Thursday of the month, and for at least the earlier months will continue "virtually" via Zoom. The regulations allowing such meetings will run out on 7th. May, if not extended, so there is the option to continue for the rest of the council year.

The Agenda for all Meetings are posted on PC's website three clear days beforehand, and these include how to join the virtual meetings.

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CITY COUNCILLOR

The coronavirus continues and anything I write here will be out of date by the time it is read. I just express the hope that all residents and their families are safe and well and that all of us will be able to meet our loved ones and families over Christmas.

December 3rd is the date when the City Council will be considering the masterplan for the proposed development of housing north of South Woodham Ferrers. The developers are seeking to increase the number of housing from 1000 to about 1500. This will be highly controversial particularly with the inevitable increase in traffic. I shall oppose it.

Residents will also be aware of two separate proposals for solar farms. The smaller of the two is to provide electricity to Essex and Suffolk's water plant at the reservoir. This is a 12 hectare site on land between the old and new A130 at Canon Barns Lane. It is a 10 MW facility. A planning application is likely early in 2021. It will have an estimated lifetime of 30 years. I do not know of the plan for reinstatement after that time.

The other proposal is for a much larger site of 100 hectares on land on both sides of the new A130 and will be in part on green belt land. This is for a 50 MW facility by a company known as Low Carbon and will connect to the National Grid. No overhead power lines will be constructed in either application. This application is for a 40 year term and the developers promise to reinstate the land at the end of the term to agricultural land. To ensure this they will offer a financial bond which they will top up from time to time. This application will not be ready for a planning application for about 12 months.

I would welcome residents views on both these applications. I can see both advantages and disadvantages with both proposals.

The virus at the moment prevents me meeting with residents but I am available to respond by email and phone. My wife and I wish all residents and their families a very healthy Christmas and 2021.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

The virus continues to dominate all our lives and at the time of writing this article it does seem that the number of cases in Essex has levelled off. Like everyone I hope by December the 2nd we will be able to move back to Tier 1 and although the rule of 6 will apply it will enable a degree of normality to return.

As a Council we have been administering the Government's financial packages and linking them into our schemes. These include the Job Retention Scheme, Business Rate Relief, Loan Schemes and various grants. The recovery of our economy in the months ahead is a top priority of the council and we are working closely with partners to do all we can to support business.

Our Children's Team did a fantastic job over the recent half term organising over 30 Activity Camps across Essex enabling over 3,500 children to partake in physical activities and a free lunch. So successful has the scheme been that going forward we will be building on this and continuing the programme in future school holidays - we will also help and support associated organisations to tackle holiday hunger! Innovation is to be welcomed and I have to say the Laptop scheme, again being run by our Children's Services has been and is a great success. We have distributed some 160 reconditioned laptops to col-

leges across the county with a further 200 in the pipeline. With more tuition being done online this will help those disadvantaged children who lack the technology at home. Because of COVID we are unable to accept unwanted laptops from the public and business but we are hoping to launch a campaign in December - watch this space everyone,

I wish you all a safe and Happy Christmas and the hope we can celebrate with our families.



HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY

Looking back at my report for this time last year, this year's Winter report is going to be very different!

Since the Autumn News I am pleased to report though that we have now completed the new lighting system in the Main Sports Hall and hope that this has proved to be a great improvement to those that have been able to play badminton or undertake other activities in that Hall within the restrictions up until the current lockdown. I know this will be greatly appreciated once everything can start again properly next year.

We had hoped to hold our postponed AGM from April 2020 in the Autumn, but again with the lockdown restrictions our plans were thwarted, but on Wednesday 11th November we were able to have a very short Zoom meeting to carry out all the official legal requirements for presenting our approved accounts to The Charity Commission.

We also completed most of the refurbishments to the Play Area and were able to open this again with parents having to ensure the health and safety of their children using all the equipment. Unfortunately, the two replacement swings have yet to be received to complete the refurbishment, they are apparently still awaiting shipment from France! Since the start of lockdown back in March is has been obvious however that the Sports and Playing Fields have been a great asset to many people in the Village, playing sports for the children, walking and groups meeting up on the field for picnics and parties in the safety of the open air when the restrictions were lifted in July. A couple of ideas have been mooted by a number of residents, one to provide additional bench seating on the fields, (which could have a commemorative plaque added), and for picnic tables to be provided. These items do not come cheap – a bench seat bought and installed would be approx. £1,000 each. These would need to be made from recyclable materials rather than wood as this would just be a target for damage. We will add these to our list of improvements to the Village Hall and Field facilities for the future

The HFC Committee would like to acknowledge the commitment and enthusiasm of Serene Brown as the Supervisor of East Hanningfield Preschool over the last 10 years. Serene was the Trustee representative for Preschool & attended our regular meetings. We worked togeth-

er to help make improvements & also to ensure that all requirements for Ofsted were adhered to within the timescales set. We will certainly miss her knowledge & enthusiasm & wish her well for the future.

EAST HANNINGFIELD NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Local Crime Update: The NhW article usually begins with a roundup of local crime (since the last News), not perhaps because we hope someone out there has some new information now but because crime is always around and it's a reminder to be vigilant. Having said that, it has been been fairly quiet - the only things NhW are aware of over this period are a break-in overnight Sunday 27th September (an outbuilding at the back of a house in Old Church Road with lawnmowers and power tools stolen) and a Ford transit van SJ65URG stolen from Industrial Estate in Old Church Road sometime on Monday 19th October. The outbuilding break-in seems to be part of a trend of night time theft from sheds and garages in rural areas so it may pay readers to consider adding PIR operated lights, an alarm and more secure locks? EHNW has a property marking kit which you can borrow.

During November residents reported suspicious cold callers in village (someone asking if a vehicle on their drive was for sale or in one case, a boat). Be wary of any one cold calling and making an unsolicited offer. If threatening behaviour is used take caller's description & car reg. and report to police. If you have information about any crimes contact Essex Police or Crimestoppers, contact details on Page 15.

Scams and Fraud: People have been scammed out of £1.4 billion since the start of the first Covid 19 lockdown (The Times, 14.11.20) as fraudsters have taken advantage of situation with phoney emails, text messages and phone calls claiming to be HMRC, Banks, NHS Test & Trace, BT, Microsoft etc, many exploiting fears about COVID-19 and especially preying on older and vulnerable people. Hacking and extorsion attempts rose from 132 in March to 1058 in April according to Action Fraud. At present fraud in one form or another accounts for more than a third of all crime and the reality is that if you are unfortunate enough to fall a victim to fraud the likelihood is that you won't be able to recover the loss unless you can show your bank was negligent, so it pays to be doubly careful.

NhW continue to send alerts to residents about latest scams and frauds to watch out for. Some examples of scam emails purporting to be from organisations in this period include following emails: BT ("your server has a sync error – click on link to recover lost emails"); Microsoft ("your email account is about to be closed – click on link"); Royal Mail

("we tried to deliver a parcel today, click on link to reschedule delivery"). All look at first glance genuine and are designed to get you to provide personal or financial data or to insert a virus on your machine. The golden rule is never click on the links or attachments in any emails without first verifying it's from a bona-fide person or organisation. It is always safer to go to the website independently if you need to give personal information.

If someone has been targeted by a scam it can be reported to Action Fraud (see opposite). For advice and information on how to check if something might be a scam, visit: www.citizensadvice.org.uk/consumer/scams/check-if-something-might-be-a-scam/. The "NhW contacts" page opposite has other useful contacts - keep it handy.

Winter Evenings: Nothing tells a burglar a house is empty better than there are no lights on! Help protect yourself by leaving lights on (with timers or daylight sensors to come on when it gets dark if you like).

NhW Team/Meetings: Our next NhW team meeting is Wed 9th December by Zoom - don't let that put you off though. We are still looking for a point-of-contact for Coulde Dennis estate and Abbey Fields. Contact NhW email address below if you would like more information. Involvement just means receiving/passing local crime alerts (mainly email), and a quarterly meeting.

NhW Alerts: About 130 residents continue to receive our local emailed local crime alerts - contact NhW email address below if you would like to receive these. It's a two-way process and you can provide feedback or suggestions.

Community Speed Watch (CSW volunteers operate under the EH NhW umbrella) At the Covid 19 lock-down in March all county-wide CSW teams were stood down. Although some had just restarted when the new lock down was announced they have now stopped again. We do need a couple of new recruits for when we restart so contact undersigned if interested in joining.

Dear Friends,

I hope you are coping in the current times and I do feel for you in the varying circumstances you are all in. It is not easy. We have continued services as best we can and I think we have had some good times and innovative approaches, particularly at Harvest and All Souls, (when we think of those who have passed on). For the next few weeks we shall be doing services by Zoom at 10am, with hymns and music, readings and prayers. Do contact me if you would like to join us from your home. After that who knows, though I have included in this magazine our hopes for Christmas Services, I am not sure what will happen. Despite lockdown, if you should want to come into church for a moment of quiet prayer or to light a candle for someone, do let me or Gil Gordon know, and this can be arranged and is allowed. We have had two weddings with reduced numbers and they have been very lovely and intimate, and at the time of writing we have one for December 19th amidst the Christmas decorations. There are some good and happy things going on.

I am sure that we can still enjoy Christmas with reduced family numbers in perhaps a different way, and I hope we will be looking around for anyone alone this Christmas, that we might be able to help. Christmas is a message of hope for us all, the love of God sent to us amidst the pain and difficulty of the days, then and now. There are lots of stories apart from the Nativity, that remind us of Love coming to us at this time of year.

'The Star Money,' is the ultimate tale of generosity, collected by the Grimm Brothers. An orphaned, poor little girl who has nothing in the world but a crust of bread and the tattered clothes she is wearing goes walking through the country. Although her life is hard, she still strives to be kind. She encounters others who are in as great a need as herself, and gives each of them something of hers. First the bread, then pieces of her clothing, until she is left naked and cold in the forest. Then she looks at the sky, and the stars fall down upon her and clothe her in fine

linen and turn into coins which she collects. Her selflessness was rewarded, and she ends up in a much better situation than at the beginning of the story! Christmas is a time of giving, and it's always the thought which counts. There are lots of lovely stories and folk tales and perhaps this Christmas you should research and read some to yourself and others – to your children as something of a change. Some also remind us, like this one, that there are others having hard times too, have faith and hope and know that you will get through it.

Something we have planned on the horizon is a Scarecrow competition for the New Year. Together with the school and community we intend to launch the idea of making scarecrows and putting them out in front of the house during the week of half term (week beginning 15th February), where people can go and look at them and decide their favourites which will win a prize. It is the time of the year for planting and seeding when we want scarecrows to scare away the birds, to stop them eating the new seed in the fields. EAST HANNINGFIELD FETE





We have also replaced Sara with two members of staff sharing the Senco Supervisor role. In addition, we have taken on a Business Administrator and three other new members of staff. We wish everyone well as they take up their new roles.

This term we are concentrating on all the different celebrations during November and December, culminating of course with Christmas. Unfortunately, due to Covid-19 restrictions, we are not able to put on a show for parents but we will try to hold a party at the end of term for all the children.

Hearing aids need cleaning regularly and retubing every 4-6 months, we have a friendly team on hand who are able to assist with essential retubing, cleaning and general hearing aid maintenance. If your hearing aids are due maintenance, if the tubing is brittle, cracked, blocked, or damaged please get in touch to book an appointment. If you unable to come to see us in person, it is possible for someone else to bring the hearing aids to the appointment on your behalf. If you are housebound, shielding, or immobile, please ask about our doorstep service. We are running clinics at the following locations across Essex. Due to social distancing measures, all appointments must be booked in advance and we cannot accept walk in's.

- Hearing Help Essex Resource Centre, Moulsham Street, Chelms ford (all Mid, West, and South Essex NHS Patients)
- St Michael's Hospital, Braintree (Mid-Essex Patients)
- Plantation Hall, Heybridge (Mid-Essex Patients)

We also provide an Information, Advice, and Guidance Service to people across Essex living with hearing loss, and this service is currently being delivered from their Resource Centre in central Chelmsford, in person, or by phone, video call, text message, or email.

As usual our service remains completely free of charge, but as a small charity working hard to support Essex residents living with hearing loss, all donations are appreciated.
