PARISH COUNCIL

PC has received notice that there will be road works at the Tye end of Old Church Road from 6th. to 10th December, and delays are to be expected. In addition, PC has also been informed that the remaining footway construction going south from the Tye will be taking place in December, but with no firm date as yet.

This is the same area where traffic census equipment was installed recently. The purpose of this was to establish whether the perception that traffic races away from the Tye junction, in excess of the speed limit, is in fact correct. It was also thought useful to have the vehicle numbers counted before the forthcoming development at South Woodham begins, because it is suspected that the additional 1,200 homes there will create additional traffic through the village. If you are curious to know what the development will look like you can see all the plans on the City Council's website planning pages. The reference is 21/01961/OUT.

A development a bit closer to home is the proposed housing area at Morelands industrial estate on the small area of the parish on the far side of the A130. There was recently an application for reserved matters, which adds detail to the existing outline planning permission for 92 dwellings. You also can view this application on the City Council's website, and the reference is 21/01621/REM.

Still on the subject of housing development, following a successful application for 20 homes on the greenfield site between Back Lane and Old Church Road, and then an application won on appeal for 26 homes on the site, another application has been submitted for 28 homes on the site. The reference for this application is 21/01850/OUT.

You might remember that, in the previous News, it was mentioned that the City Council had decided to stop sending notification letters to neighbours of sites subject to planning applications. The PC is aware that the yellow A4 notices that are pinned up nearby are not always conspicuous, and sometimes are not where they are likely to be seen by all neighbours going about their normal business. PC has therefore decided that weekly notices will be posted on the website, Facebook page and noticeboards, and hopes that this publicity will be enough to

ensure that everyone becomes aware of proposed development that might have an impact on them. If you have access to the internet you can set up alerts from the City Council about planning applications for an area that interests you. Go to www.chelmsford.gov.uk/planning-and-building-control/view-or-comment-on-planning-applictions/ and click on *How to get alerts for future applications*. PC has asked me to advise you that it is best to receive the alerts direct from City Council if you can, as they will send you the information immediately, whereas there will be a time delay before the PC notices come out, and in planning time is tight.

Still on the subject of planning, the decisions concerning two of the applications for solar farms in the parish are expected by the end of this year, with the third being the following month.

By the time of the next News it will be spring, and some birds will already be nesting, so it will be too late to remind hedge owners to cut back their overgrowing hedges. The rampant growth of many shrubs this year was caused by the longer than usual growing season and an abundance of sun and rain at just the right times, or the wrong times depending on how you look at it, and demonstrated that hedges need to be cut back further than the line where you want them to be when buds burst.

On the subject of hedges I have received the following from a resident.

"how about a mention for the man in the village who single handedly and with only a pair of clippers and hand shears, trimmed the length of hedging in Old Church Road, all the way from Back Lane up to the first house before Bethel Church. This obviously made the pavement much more accessible and he was hard at work most days to achieve it."

Clearly all of us who walk along Old Church Road should be grateful to him, but wouldn't it be nice if the owners of the hedge kept it in good order, as they are supposed to.

On a purely administrative matter, the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2021 received a clear audit report, meaning there were no matters giving cause for concern that relevant legislation and regulatory requirements had not been met. The annual return and internal and external auditors' reports are available for viewing on PC's website under *Publications/Audited Accounts*.

CITY COUNCILLOR

The murder of Sir David Amess serves as a reminder of the vulnerability of our elected Members of Parliament as they go about their daily business representing their constituents. I am pleased that our own MP John Whittingdale is continuing with his surgeries. It is so important that residents can meet their elected representatives.

Outline planning consent was granted two years ago for up to 92 dwellings on Morelands Industrial Estate under planning reference 19/00384/OUT. Further details of the proposed layout, scale, appearance and landscaping are now available, as the applicant has made a reserved matters application under reference 21/01621/REM. Details of both applications can be found on the council website.

The saga of the development in Old Church Road continues. Consent was granted on appeal under reference APPW1525/W/18/3217969 against the refusal by the city council to erect 26 dwellings. The owner has now made a fresh application for 28 dwellings on the same site. I believe this to be an overdevelopment and a failure to take into account the more recent provisions relating to affordable housing. I will oppose this application as I did previous applications and the appeal.

The three applications for solar farms remain to be determined. I expect all of them to be resolved before the Spring issue of this newsletter. In the meantime the application for the solar farm on the A414 coming up Danbury hill has been granted.

I shall continue to visit local residents and businesses to discuss problems. Just send me an email or give me a ring to make arrangements.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

The tragic death of Sir David Ames's raised many security issues but I am pleased our MP has publicly stated he will continue to hold face to face surgeries - any dilution of this would have been a blow to our democracy.. I am sure we all agree on this.

COVID sadly does not go away and at Chelmsford City Council we have gone back to virtual meetings following the increase in cases. It is so important we take up the jabs that are due to us. Remember, you are eligible for the booster six months after the second dose and if you haven't received your invitation by then, please contact the national booking service online or call 119.

COP26 is another issue that has been dominating the news lately and will for the foreseeable future. At Essex we have the Climate Change Commission Report which will be going through Cabinet shortly and this will be backed up by officer proposals for consideration. It will be no surprise that Transport is a major contributor to Essex's emissions. We have busy ports and airports which are supported by HGVs and contributing substantial emissions - it is going to be quite a challenge!

The LED street light replacement programme is going well. More than 10k in residential roads have now been upgraded with Chelmsford leading the way. It is estimated they save some 60% energy use

and thousands of tons of carbon

emissions.

The Gritter crews are all ready to keep our key roads safe this winter. Take care everyone and my best wishes for a Happy Christmas.

Compared to last year's Winter Newsletter, hopefully this year we can be more positive of a better Christmas Season than we experienced last year with the lockdown, that sadly stopped lots of plans for many people.

As reported in the Autumn Newsletter, after an uncertain year when things could not be planned in advance, we did decide once restrictions were lifted on July 19th to look at holding an Art Exhibition again and after contacting our list of artists, we received very good feedback that there was indeed a lot of interest. We then started planning in earnest and arranged it for the weekend of 9/10th October with the Preview Evening on Friday 8th. We did however restrict the number of entries to try and comply with the space/distancing rules of Covid-19. We are very pleased to report that this was again another very successful event with a profit of £2,343 which we had already agreed to share equally with All Saints Church, this time, in lieu of not being able to hold a Village Fete this year, which we usually share the profit from, with them. This event does however take a lot of planning and organisation and again we have to say a 'Big Thank You Sincerely' to every one of you who came to help with a wide variety of tasks over the days before, the event and the final clear up. We certainly could not have done it without you all.

Congratulations must next go to the East Hanningfield Fete Committee, who although were unable to plan a Village Fete because of the lockdown, they then planned to hold a Quiet Firework Display on 30th October, linked to Halloween. A very successful event which you can read all about, in their report, in this newsletter.

At the Art Show we also opened up the loft area for the Sale of Second hand books and we are planning next to hold a **Christmas Booksale** on **Saturday 11**th **December**. Because of another hall booking in the morning, we are looking to hold this in the afternoon from **2.00** – **4.30pm**. We do try to ensure we are offering books that have been looked after and in good condition, and especially with the Children's

book section there could be some present ideas to consider. We will also have a Café in the Small Hall offering mulled wine/cider, coffee/tea/hot chocolate and festive fare of sausage rolls, mince pies, cookies and cakes. EAST HANNINGFIELD NEIGHBOURHOOD-WATCH

Local Crime: We usually begin with a roundup of local crime but there is little to report- the burglary at a house in Bicknacre Road 4 Nov and more fly tipping (one in Pan Lane and two in Back Lane). The house burglary is the first reported in the village for quite a long time. Police believe the reduction in burglaries generally over the lock-down period is due to people working from home but this is likely to change as more people return to their work places. The burglary in Bicknacre Road occurred between 6pm & 7.30pm in the evening. They took a black ruck-sack along with jewellery, other valuables, and a small safe.

A reminder there are six ways of reporting crime- these are all covered in the separate "**NhW contacts**" page 20, which has useful numbers/ email addresses to retain.

Cyber Crime: One area where crime that has definitely not declined during the lock down is cyber crime in all its many forms! Fraudsters continue to find more victims and there has been an explosion of "phishing" scams with the "bait" arriving in the form of phoney emails, text messages, or phone calls, and even links on social media to dodgy investment websites. With a phone call, the fraudsters often use number "spoofing" to make their caller ID mimic the number of a real company such as a bank, or an agency such as NHS or HMRC to make you think caller is genuine. These criminal set-ups can be so slick and professional that it's very easy to be caught out so if in any doubt at all ignore the message, or if it's a call, just hang up. Call the organisation later, if you have a concern it could be genuine, using a trusted number (wait long enough to ensure the caller isn't still on the line) and then check the facts (most likely it will have been a scammer!).

For advice and information on how to check if something might be a scam, the "**NhW contacts**" page in this issue of the News has useful contacts.

NhW Alerts: About 130 residents receive local emailed local crime alerts - contact NhW email address below if you would like to receive these. It's a two-way process and you can provide feedback or suggestions.

Community Speed Watch: (CSW) volunteers operate under the EH NhW umbrella. - CSW is part of the overall police strategy to deter

speeding, the main cause of road accidents/fatalities. Essex traffic police support CSW teams and provide the radar gun/calibrate it etc and process the CSW team's vehicle speed log sent to them after each speed check. The Speed Watch team restarted in early September and since then there have been speed checks in Old Church Road, The Tye and the Common at different times. Since re-starting, speeds seem to be gradually increasing – the last speed check on The Tye logged 10 drivers exceeding the 30 mph speed limit.

Tree – Check paws for needles and make sure tree is steady and any lights, enticing decorations or seasonal plants are out of the way.


