PARISH COUNCIL

After two years without one, due to Covid restrictions, PC has decided to restart the Village Tidy. This is the Saturday morning, when lots of volunteers join together to clear the litter from the village and surrounding roads. If you would like to join in, please be at the Village Hall car park at **9am** on **14th. May** to collect a sack, picker, gloves and hi-vis vest. If you have your own, or have borrowed some from PC, please bring them along with you.

We have also had an extended break from arranging the Annual Parish Meeting, which is a meeting for all electors in the Parish. We usually have reports from local groups at the APM, and after a two year break there will be a lot of catching up to do. Please make a note of the date: **Wednesday, 11th. May**. The Meeting will start at **7.30pm** and is expected to take place in the first floor meeting room at the Village Hall, unless Covid rules prevent.

The village seems to have had more than its fair share of roadworks/ closures lately. The footway works just south of the Tye should be finished on 4th. March, but more is to come. Old Barn Lane is to be closed from its junction with South Hanningfield Road to its junction with Tileworks Lane for 22 days from 9th. March for duct installation by Interoute. Creephedge Lane will be closed on 23rd. March from 9.30am until 3.30pm for pole testing. You can see all planned roadworks at https://one.network

As part of a Countywide review of the Essex bus network, Passenger Transport at the County Council would like to get your views on how the local bus network could be improved. An online public survey has been launched to get the views of bus users and non-users on the bus network. To comment on the bus network in the Chelmsford area please go to https://consultations.essex.gov.uk/iptu/bus-network-reviews-chelmsford. Other districts in the county have their own surveys: just change the name at the end of the url.

Back In November there was a planning application which would have increased the amount of housing to be built on the plot between Back Lane and

Old Church Road to 28. PC has been informed that the planning application has been withdrawn, but the existing permission for 26 units (houses and flats) still stands.

Aware that the expected new housing at South Woodham Ferrers could well cause an increase in traffic through the village, PC requested a traffic count to be taken roughly half way between the Tye/ Old Church Road junction and the southern village gate. The intention being to establish the amount of traffic before the arrival of the housing so that a comparison can be made once it has been built. PC also wanted to establish whether the perception when standing at this point, that traffic is speeding, is an illusion or accurate.

The count took place from 16th to 22nd October inclusive. Over the seven day period 15,654 northbound vehicles were logged and 14,496 southbound. A large part of the difference between the two is explained by the Friday afternoon northbound peak from 15:00 to 17:00 when over 450 vehicles an hour were recorded. Weekday peaks were between 07:45 & 08:00 and 17:15 & 17:30 in both directions, but you probably already new that!

The suspicion that vehicles travel faster when there is less traffic is borne out by the figures. Fifty percent or more vehicles were travelling at 36mph or above, northbound between 19:00 and 05:00, and between 16:00 and 08:00 southbound. The proportions of vehicles exceeding the 30mph speed limit were 74.4% northbound and 84.6% southbound over the seven days. The peak average northbound daytime speed was 41.6mph at 08:30 on Sunday 17th. October, whilst the peak average southbound speed was 40.9mph at 07:45 on Saturday 16th. October (based on 15min averages between 07:00 and 19:00). The highest average speeds happened in the early hours of the Monday morning, 03:00 & 04:00 northbound and 00:00 & 04:00 southbound. No daytime (07:00-19:00) average speeds reached 36mph, and none of the 24 hourly averages northbound, but of the 24 hourly averages southbound only Wednesday and Thursday were below 36mph. Over the whole period 74.4% of northbound vehicles and 84.6% of southbound vehicles exceeded the 30mph speed limit.

Still on the subject of numbers, when you receive your council tax bill for 2022-3 you should see that the amount allocated to PC has not ris-

en. This is because PC was able to take advantage of the higher tax base, to keep the same amount asked from households the same as last year while actually receiving £567 more. If you are interested and would like to find out how PC spends your money, you can see the budget calculations which are appended to the Minutes of the December PC Meeting, on PC's website under 'Publications'.

Unfortunately, it has not been possible to book a visit by the City Council's Play in the Park team during the Easter holiday. The City Council has continued the arrangement, which began during the pandemic, that visits to sites will be full days instead of mornings or afternoons. This began because the team was disinfecting all the equipment during the lunch break and therefore didn't have time to pack up and move to another site. It has meant that not all parishes that wanted to participate could be accommodated. We have had better luck with the summer break and are also on a list to take advantage of any cancellations that might occur.

I often say this, but if you have a hedge with a footway beside it, please go and check that the path is walkable and the hedge is not forcing pedestrians into the road. It is easiest to cut back vegetation before bud burst, when the cuttings don't take up so much space in your brown bin.

Although there has been much lobbying of government to legalise remote meetings for local government, as yet HMG hasn't found the time, so for the foreseeable future PC will be holding face to face meetings or not at all. The Meeting dates for 2022 have been agreed, and all but December's will be on the **fourth Thursday** of each month, at 8pm in the first floor meeting room at the Village Hall. As the internal door will be locked please enter through the door at the northern end of the building beside the overflow car park.

As with the Minutes the Agenda can be found on PC's website under 'Publications', and appear there three clear days before the Meeting.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

As from the 1st of April the running of the Recycle Centres will change. They are currently managed by Veolia, but the contract has ceased, and a decision has been made to bring the contract in house. All the staff are being transferred and you should see no change. However, having said that the Council has had to purchase new skips, bins, compactors, and other equipment so there may be a few hiccups. Let me know if you experience any problems and I will certainly take it up.

At a recent police briefing it was disturbing to hear household burglaries are creeping up having dropped during lockdown. Please make sure your home is as secure as possible and the garden shed is locked or has some sort of alarm fitted. The encouraging news from the police is that recruitment is going well, and numbers are getting back to 2010 levels. I am due to meet up with the Chelmsford Chief Inspector shortly and will be taking up our concerns. One issue is the lack of incident data from the police and communication to parish councils

I am getting an abnormal number of complaints of streetlights not working - I guess this is something to do with the time of year. In the first instance please use the "Report it Tool" on the Council's website and if this is a problem let me know and I will deal with it. Each lamp post has a number - please include the location and number when reporting.

The Council is slowly returning to face-to-face meetings and some sort of normality. This is to be welcomed and can only improve communications.

CITY COUNCILLOR

Arguments for and against solar farms are finely balanced. There is a need for increased electricity from renewable sources and also a need to protect the countryside and local residents from visual intrusion and loss of valuable farmland. The City Council faces this choice, not just in East Hanningfield but also in a vast project at Boreham/Great Leighs/Terling. This is a major infrastructure project which can only be determined by Government although the City Council is a consultee.


Locally a new scheme has been approved either side of the A414 coming up Danbury hill from the direction of Chelmsford. A large scheme has been refused mainly on green belt grounds alongside the old A130 in East Hanningfield. A smaller scheme designed to provide electricity to the water works has recently been approved.

The third East Hanningfield proposal and the most controversial is an application for a solar farm at Hill Farm alongside Pan Lane. This is on rising ground and will be visible from some distance. There will also be an impact on local properties. The Parish Council has made well argued objections which I support. I am in regular contact with planning officers and am strongly opposed to this third application in the village. If necessary, I will arrange for it to be determined by the planning committee at Chelmsford. This will give local residents the opportunity to present their views direct to planning committee members. I am not expecting a determination of this proposal before April.

I am willing to call on local residents and businesses. Just send me an email or give me a ring to make arrangements. Keep safe.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Local Crime: There seems to have been little to report since the spate of burglary/intruder incidents in November in Bicknacre Road/ Highfields Mead areas. All the same, whilst the dark evenings are here houses are more vulnerable and simple security measures around your house, plus steps to make your house look occupied when you are away, are a wise precaution.

There are, as we go to press, 5 or more cases of graffiti on the walls of residents' houses in Coulde Dennis & at the Village Hall taking the form of a black spray painted "CM3' tag. The same graffiti but more extensive also appeared on the roof of the Youth Shelter on Hanna's Field

Graffiti whether on public or private property if it is done without the owner's permission is a criminal act under the Criminal Damage Act 1971 and offenders can be punished with an unlimited fine. Whilst graffiti is widespread in parts of some towns it can make neighbourhoods appear dirty and run down and removing it is expensive. Thanks to a public-spirited offer by Ken Hart and Hanna's Field Charity at the Hall, the graffiti has been removed quickly as it has no place in our village or anywhere in the parish. A report has been provided to Essex Police.

There has been another case of small scale but annoying fly tipping in Pan Lane since the December issue News. You may have noticed in the news that the government has announced plans to tackle what the head of the Environment Agency has called the "new narcotics" of flytipping and waste crime. There were 1.13 million fly-tipping incidents in England in 2020-21, a rise of 16% on the previous 12 months so, as we have seen here in the parish, it is a growing problem. The cost has been estimated to be a £1bn a year for local councils. The government says its reforms will address flaws in the Environment Agency's Carrier, Broker and Dealer registration scheme (CBD). If you want someone to come to your house and pick up an old sofa or rubbish, they are supposed to be registered on the CBD database, and you should be able to go online to check they are legal. You are liable yourself to prosecution if you use a carrier who subsequently fly-tips your refuse so it pays to be aware of the law.

A reminder there are a number of ways of reporting crime depending on circumstances - these are:

Cyber Crime: The government was at odds with the UK statistics authority for claiming in February crime had fallen by 14%. The Office for National Statistics (ONS) confirmed that whilst some crime fell during the pandemic it has been more than offset by increases in fraud and cyber crime as there has been an explosion of "phishing" scams and fraud. These criminal set-ups are often slick and professional and it's very easy to be caught out so if in any doubt at all ignore the message, or the email link/attachment, or if it's a call, just hang up. If you think you may have been a victim of fraud or cyber crime you should report this to:

RECENT SCAM ALERTS:

PayPal: two fake emails circulating using the company's branding and its typical email layout, in the PayPal domain to make them seem more legitimate, and advising your account has been frozen or that there is a security concern with the account. Recipient is asked to click on a fake PayPal link to give personal and account details to the scammer.

British Gas. A phishing email purporting to be from



British Gas, stating that customers' bills are overdue and need paying. It attempts to extort the recipient's account details by urging them to click through to fake websites.

Eon Energy. A phishing email purporting to be from Eon saying person is due an energy bill refund and asks the recipient to provide personal and bank account details to the scammer.

Nat West Bank. This time, text message stating that 'a new device has been registered', aiming to send recipients through to a website that has nothing to do with the bank.

Santander. A fake text message suggesting new direct debits have been set up and attempts to trick people into clicking links potentially loaded with spyware. It's attempting to panic you into following its own URL link.

NhW Organisation & Email Alerts: About 130 residents receive local emailed local crime alerts - contact NhW email address below if you would like to receive these. It's a two-way process and you can provide feedback or suggestions. NhW team members meet quarterly by zoom or face to face. The next meeting is Wednesday 20 April - contact NhW email address below if you would like to join us (we'd like to hear from anyone interested in joining us from Coulde Dennis estate).

NHW's property marking kit is available on loan for anyone interested.

Community Speed Watch: (CSW) volunteers operate under the EH NhW umbrella. - CSW is part of the overall police strategy to deter speeding, the main cause of road accidents/fatalities.

HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY-VILLAGE HALL & PLAYING FIELDS

So far into 2022 we have been lucky to have had a mild start to the year. Hopefully with the easing of restrictions we can look forward to a better year ahead. We are the planning the Charity's **Annual General Meeting** on **Wednesday 27th April.** This is an opportunity for the public to find out about how the Charity is run and to raise any issues. Look out for the publicity nearer the time.

The last Book Sale in December was a joint event with the Playgroup displaying a lot of second-hand toys for sale, unfortunately it was not very well attended overall, perhaps on reflection too close to Christmas, with people shopping for other things. Our next scheduled **Book Sale and Coffee Morning** will be on **Saturday 5th March** 10am to 12.30pm, with plenty of new pre-loved books to choose from.

We have finally managed to be able to put more granite chippings on the Overflow Car Park to help the surface during wet weather (the chippings apparently come from Norway and were delayed in getting to UK). Fingers crossed this will provide a better all-weather surface.

We hope that the locking of the Sports Courts has been appreciated by those who genuinely want to use them safely in this enclosed area, with people taking responsibility for their individual keys and unlocking and re-locking when finished, although already one of the padlocks has gone walk about! Many thanks to both David Bell and Mike Plumridge for all their hard work to make this area safe and distributing keys to people that requested them.

Sadly, there has been some damage with 'Graffiti' on a number of houses on the Coulde Dennis estate and also the end wall of the Village Hall and Youth Shelter on the field. If anyone has any CCTV evidence of this, they can pass onto us, this would be very helpful as it has been reported to the police, and they would be able to prosecute if evidence was given. We are very grateful to the villager Ken Hart (Cleaning Driveways) who has successfully removed this now from the houses in Coulde Dennis and from the Village Hall, very many thanks. The roof of the Youth Shelter though has had to be re-painted, which Ken has also done for us, well done. We have been lucky in recent

years with not too much vandalism, but we can never be complacent, and we all need to be vigilant to keep this a lovely village to live in.

With the easing of restrictions, we have been able to start planning future fund-raising events which you will see explained under the separate report for the **Village Fete** in July and **Fireworks** in the Autumn. We hope as well to be able to hold the annual **Art Exhibition & Sale** in October. We are delighted to confirm that Bond Residential Estate Agents have agreed again to provide boards advertising these events. Just so good to be able to feel more confident in planning events again, things we took for granted prior to 2020!

And finally, we have the **Queen's Platinum Jubilee** in June – do you think we should hold our own celebration in the Village? 22 years ago, for the New Year of the Millennium, villagers organised a special event where the Hall was offered F.O.C. and a number of people (not HFC) organised for families/friends (including children) to have their own table (8/10 people) and provide their own food and drinks (eliminating the requirement of a Licence) one person then hired DJ equipment and provided the music, (the cost of this was then shared with those who attended by making a charge per table booked). It was a great success with everyone then taking responsibility for clearing up the next morning. A similar event could be possible if there are enough people out there to get together and organise. This could be a late afternoon/evening event planned for outside but also using the small hall and kitchen, (with the backup of the large hall if weather is bad) the HFC BBQ's could also be used for people to cook their own meat etc. and

either live or recorded music organised for the event. If there are enough people who would like to get together and organise such an occasion, please contact me to express your interest in taking this forward. (Unfortunately, this is not an event that HFC can take on organising themselves with their commitment to fund raising events already planned).

BETHEL CHURCH—Making a Splash

During the construction of the building of Bethel Church (nearly 20 years ago), we wanted to include a baptistry pool, but the cost was too prohibitive. So, for many years we hired the school swimming pool and had many baptisms there.

But of course, these last couple of years have been somewhat disruptive, so we came up with an ingenious solution for two of our young men who wanted to be baptised.

One of these was Paul, who owns a Skip Hire company. He suggested that he could line a skip to make it water-tight... this was the outcome.



Whilst this might appear a bit unconventional, the occasion was very sincere. These young men made a public declaration of their faith. For anyone looking on, it might have looked a little strange. So why baptism? What is the significance, meaning and purpose of baptism?

In order to understand the reason for being water baptised, it is important to carefully consider what the Bible says about it: Jesus himself was baptised. He was not a sinner, yet he humbled himself in obedience to identify with us and give us an example to follow. Mark 1:9

An act of obedience

Water baptism is an act of faith and obedience to the commands of Christ. Matthew 28:19-20

A public declaration

Baptism declares that you are a follower of Jesus Christ. It is a public confession of your faith in, and commitment to, Jesus Christ. It is the next step after salvation through repentance and faith and is an important foundation for Christian life. Mark 16:16

A move from death to life

Baptism is a symbol of Christ's burial and resurrection. Our entrance into the water during baptism identifies us with Christ's death on the cross, His burial in the tomb and His resurrection from the dead. Colossians 2:12-14

A brand-new life

It is a symbol of your new life as a Christian. We bury the "old life" and we rise to walk in a "new life". Baptism is like a wedding ring, it is the outward symbol of the commitment you made in your heart, a commitment that has to be followed through and lived out on a daily basis. So, in the end the skip acted as a great visual metaphor. An old life being dumped and new-life emerging. We pray for Paul and Joseph that this is an unforgettable moment in their Christian walk.
