PARISH COUNCIL

In the last News, I referred to PC, along with West Hanningfield PC, investigating the possibility of seeking a judicial review into the granting of planning permission for the proposed solar farm north of Pan Lane. The outcome of this was that it was decided that it would be better use of both PC's resources to prepare for the Appeal into the proposed solar farm which would straddle the A130, application no. 22/00026/ REFUSE. If you are interested in following this Appeal, the Reference is APP/W1525/W/22/3300222. It will be determined by a hearing, which will take place at 10am on 6th. December at the City Centre, Duke Street, Chelmsford. PC is working in consultation with West Hanningfield PC and City Cllr. Richard Poulter in order to present a united front at that Appeal, but not to waste the valuable time slots saying the same thing. Unlike council meetings at City Centre, I have been told that the hearing will not be available over the internet, so it requires attendance in person if you want to listen to all the evidence presented to the hearing

Although, we were promised training in the use of the Village Hall defibrillator in the Autumn, our local First Responders were instructed by the East of England Ambulance Service not to hold any further public engagement sessions such as the training due to the significant rise in Covid19 infections. As soon as they have been given the go ahead, they will be in touch to arrange a date. I have not forgotten who is on

the list to attend the training, but if there is anyone who hasn't already registered interest but now would like to take part, please let me know.

By the time of the next News, spring will have sprung, buds will be bursting and birds will be nesting, or at least thinking about it, so it will be too late to start making arrangements for your hedges to be cut back, so, if you haven't done it already, please check that your hedges are not swiping people in the face or forcing them into the road, and then take the appropriate action.

During the time of national mourning for Her Late Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, very many residents took advantage of the presence of the books of condolence in the village, to leave their messages of thanks, appreciation and regret. Following the state funeral, the pages were taken to City Centre to be bound with pages from other communities within the City, so they will be a permanent record of the gratitude felt by so many for a long life of service.

PC would like to encourage residents to take advantage of the warm winter Sunday after-

noons in the Meeting Room at the Village Hall (at 2pm). PC and Hanna's Field Charity moved quickly to arrange the dates and HFC must have been one of the first community groups to apply for the grant funding that was available. HFC applied because parish councils could only apply for 50% of the costs, whereas the Charity was able to apply for the full cost of heating and cleaning etc and received it! PC's contribution is to cover the cost of refreshments. There has been an offer of a lift to anyone who can't get to the Village Hall under their own steam, so please don't feel you can't get there. Get in touch!

As well as keeping homes war, another casualty of the cost of living crisis has been pet ownership. PC can't feed you pets for you but hopes that it is being helpful to pet owners by providing dog bags free of charge in the shop and Village Hall. In East Hanningfield, at least, not being able to afford the bags is not an excuse for not picking up after your dog.

Anyone who has been in the Hall Meeting Room in recent weeks will have noticed the arrival of a wide screen television. The purpose of this expenditure by PC was to bring meetings up to date, so that plans and other documents can be seen clearly by everyone in the room. Previously, PC had used a projector, but it was getting dimmer and approaching end of life, so the screen is a replacement for that and also an improvement on it. Its presence in the room will

be an asset for use for meetings and training by any VH meeting room hirer.

PC has asked me to mention again the need for volunteers to come forward to get the Neighbourhood Plan process moving again. There is some useful information about this on the Rural Community Council of Essex's website: www.essexrcc.org.uk/our-work/community-led-planning It also explains the differences between Parish

Plans, Village Design Statements and Neighbecorations by Sophia bourhood Plans. Having a Neighbourhood Plan reinforces local responses to planning applications, as once adopted it becomes part of the citywide Local Plan.

I usually say that PC Meetings take place on the fourth Thursday of the month, but there will be some instances in 2023 when the date will have to be moved. One of the reasons for this is having to hold a meeting within a given number of days of an election, and there will be Parish and City elections in early May. Also, there are times when not enough councillors are available on a given date, so please keep an eye open for the notices in the noticeboards around the village, and on Facebook and PC's website.

The December Meeting will not be on the fourth Thursday either! That being a bit too near Christmas for convenience. It will be on the third Thursday, 15th. December, and will be the Budget Meeting when the Precept will be agreed for the year 2023-24. The Precept is the instruc-

tion that PC gives to the council tax collecting authority as to how much tax to collect on PC's behalf. Meetings usually begin at 8pm and take place in the nice, warm first floor Meeting Room at the V. Hall. If you would like to attend please use the entrance facing the overflow car park, as the connecting door inside the Hall is usually locked. The Agenda is posted on the website three clear days before each Meeting.

One of the first acts of our new King Charles was to knight our MP who becomes the Rt. Hon. Sir John Whittingdale O.B.E. M.P. Many congratulations Sir John.

Tuesday December 6th is the date that the appeal will take place into the refusal by the City

Council to grant permission for a large solar farm on land East and West of the A130 North and South of Cannons Barn Road East Hanningfield. The planning reference is 21/00394/FUL. The hearing will take place in the Civic Centre Chelmsford in the Crompton room on the first floor starting at 10.a.m. It is expected to last one day. Any resident can attend and speak. Comments on the original application will be part of the papers seen by the Inspector so do not need to be re-

peated. The main, but not the only, issue is whether there are exceptional reasons to grant permission for development in the green belt. I will be in attendance to oppose the appeal. The decision should be known early in the New Year

My wife and I wish all residents a Very Happy Christmas and a healthy 2023. I am very happy to call on residents and local businesses to discuss any council related problem. Just send me an email or give me a call to make arrangements.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

Good news from Essex Police. They now have 3686 Officers and by next April they will have a further 64 making a grand total of 3750 Officers - the highest number ever! Let's hope we see the benefit in rural policing and traffic issues.

I recently attended the Essex Climate Conference at County Hall and was impressed at all the initiatives ongoing to help reduce carbon emissions. The event was attended by representatives from environmental groups, businesses, local government, and various charities and was particularly relevant just preceding the COP27 conference in Egypt.

Among the many initiatives ongoing include a huge amount of work to make our schools energy efficient and a good example of this is the new school St Luke's in Runwell which has just opened. We are committed to planting 375k trees over the next five years and at last zero waste to landfill by 2030. The benefits of LED lighting can be seen everywhere, and this programme continues - out of 130k replacements we have now completed 50k. Priority on this has and will continue to be where the greatest saving can be made.

Transport of course remains a big talking point and the number of cars on the road. There are currently 814k cars registered in Essex of which 14,100 are electric but this is changing all the time as the sup-

ply situation improves. Interestingly the Ford Motor Company reckon by 2026 one third of their global production will be electric.

Overall, it was a very informative conference as to what is going on, full details can be found on the ECC website.

May I take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy Christmas.

What a lovely long hot Summer we had this year, but with all of us wishing for some rain, come 31st October we got our wish and it has virtually not stopped since!!! Oh dear! Be careful what you wish for! At the beginning of October, we held the Annual Art Show Exhibition, which was again another great success achieving a profit of £2,840.00, which will go towards making further improvements to our facilities at the Village Hall. We always have a 'Wish List' of things to be done! Once again, we thank everyone who came to help us put this event on, we are always so grateful for whatever help people can give us, we could not do this without such a great band of volunteers. The Book Sales over the 2 days also raised £120.00, which we passed to All Saints Church, who in turn donated it to the Red Cross Ukraine Appeal, as they have with previous Book Sale proceeds over this year, Well Done!

The next fund-raising event was the Halloween/ Low Noise Firework event at the end of October, another great success raising approx. £2,400. Well done! Please read the separate report, about the event, further on in the Newsletter.

In early November we learned about a fund being managed by the Essex Association of Local Councils (EALC) on behalf of Essex County Council which we could apply to for a grant to offer 'Community Winter

Warmth' in our facilities. We were very pleased to learn, 2 weeks later, that our application was approved for funds to be able to hold a 'Warm Hub' session once a week for 2 hours on a Sunday afternoon, for anyone who is possibly on their own, isolated, or perhaps new in the area and just wanting a warm place to meet with others, for some free refreshments in a warm venue, to sit and have a chat, make new friends, or browse through the library of second hand books, to either borrow or purchased, if you so wish. We are also happy to try and offer any activities that

perhaps people might wish to do, learning to knit perhaps to make warm blankets for free. We also have a TV available for children to watch films. We are open to any suggestions people can give us. Why don't you come along to see if this might suit you. It is for 2 hours from 2 – 4pm every Sunday, except Christmas Day and New Year's Day until the end of March 2023. We are all very aware of the large rise in fuel bills this Winter, keeping warm is becoming increasingly expensive, and how this can be a huge worry for people. We already have a willing band of volunteers to come and run this each week, just

to oversee the making of refreshments etc. At the time of going to print we have already held 2 sessions. Even if you just want to come along and look for books, from our many on display, we would love to see you. We are a community and want to help and support people in any way we can over the long cold winter months. (See separate notice in this Newsletter)

The Hanna's Field Charity Committee are also very aware that our own heating costs are going to rocket, so we are in the process of looking closely at what we can do to ensure we are preparing for the

future and will be considering Solar Power to help, but this does come at a very large cost in the initial outlay. Obviously not something we can take on lightly. There is no 'Magic Money Tree ', unfortunately. The Pre-School, being one of our main hirers and run for 5 days a week, we do of course have to ensure they are able to have sufficient heat to keep them warm, plus for all the other various hirers of our facilities. The Rural Community Council of Essex are already warning that some Village Halls will not be able to survive with escalating costs predicted – we do not want this to happen in our Village!

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH & COMMUNITY SPEED-WATCH

Local Crime Round Up: Since the last News these are the only crime incidents EH NhW have been made aware of in the parish:

- Unit broken into on Old Church Road Industrial Estate and equipment/tools stolen.
- * Seven bags of rubbish dumped in Back Lane verge (between Windmill Cottage and Huntingdon's Farm) some time over 14/15 Nov.

Winter Evenings:

FACT: November sees the highest number of claims from burglaries, with one every four minutes, according to police, due to clocks going back combined with shorter daylight.

Nothing tells a burglar a house is empty better than the one in a row with no lights on!

Help protect yourself by leaving lights on (with timers or daylight sensors to come on when it gets dark if you like) to give the illusion your property is occupied.

Don't leave valuables on view (presents in view around a Christmas tree are an invitation to the burglar).

A reminder there are a number of ways of reporting crime depending on circumstances - these are:

Cyber Crime: Fraud and cyber crime scams and "phishing" attempts continue to plague all our lives, whether its on-line, unsolicited phone calls or through mobile phone text messages.

In the year to June, there were an estimated 3.8 million incidents of fraud or attempted fraud against individuals in England and Wales, up 12% in five years.

Fraud now accounts for 41% of all crimes against individuals. About 6.6% of all people over 16 were victims of fraud or attempted fraud. The government's most recent estimate put the cost of fraud to individuals at £4.8 billion in 2015-16, with the cost to businesses far higher. A report this week by the National Audit Office on the Home Office's efforts to combat fraud makes sobering reading. It found that, while the

number of frauds recorded by the police has risen by 50% over the past five years, the number of cases resulting in a charge or summons has fallen from 6,402 in the year to March 2017 to just 4,816 in the year to last March. Less than 1% of police personnel were involved in conducting fraud investigations in the year ending March 2020. Either police forces are not taking fraud seriously enough, or they lack the resources (The Times, November 2022)

NhW Organisation & Email Alerts: About 130 residents receive local emailed local crime alerts - contact NhW email address below if you would like to receive these. It's a two-way process and you can provide feedback or suggestions. Lastly, we have a property marking kit available to loan out for anyone interested.

EH Community Speed Watch: (CSW) Volunteers operate under the EH NhW umbrella. - CSW is part of the overall police strategy to deter speeding, the main cause of road accidents/fatalities. There have been speed checks in Old Church Road, The Tye and the Common at regular times over this period. CSW speed checks are sometimes accompanied by Traffic Police officers (who will stop and book drivers at roadside if exceeding the speed limit during a CSW speed check).

Since the last News, Essex Police and Essex Highways approved, a CSW speed check location for the section of road between the Vita Bella mini roundabout and the 30mph speed limit sign coming into the village from Bicknacre. Despite the traffic calming pinch point here, residents complain some drivers still manage to exceed the limit in this short section of road.



Christmas is a time of joy and celebration of Jesus birth in the stable in Bethlehem, when he was worshipped by angels, shepherds and Kings alike. He is still worshipped by people from every walk of life, whatever circumstance they find themselves in or their social status, whether rich

or poor, including our late Queen Elizabeth 11. So I'll leave you with some of her own words spoken at two of her Christmas broadcast. In 2011 she said "Although we are capable of great acts of kindness, history teaches us that we sometimes need saving from ourselves - from our recklessness or our greed. God sent into the world a unique person - neither a philosopher nor a general (important as they are) - but a saviour, [Jesus] with the power to forgive. Forgiveness lies at the heart of the Christian faith. It can heal broken families it can restore friendships and it can reconcile divided communities. It is in forgiveness that we feel the power of God's love."

More personally and poignantly in 2002 she said "I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a a new beginning. I know the only way to live my life is to try and do what is right, to take the long view, to give my best in all that the day brings and to put my trust in God I draw strength from the message of hope in the Christian Gospel.

May the Lord richly bless you this Christmas, and throughout the coming year.




