

## PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

At the May election six of the prior Parish Councillors volunteered to stand for re-election. As this was less than the allowed seven councillors they were all elected without the requirement for a ballot. This means we still have a vacancy for a councillor. If anyone is interested in volunteering please contact the Parish Council Clerk, Lucy White on email <a href="mailto:clerk@easthanningfield-pc.gov.uk">clerk@easthanningfield-pc.gov.uk</a>. There will be no need for an election, the prospective councillor will be co-opted and can serve until the next election in 2026.

A regular agenda item at the monthly Parish Council meeting is the list of local planning applications. The Local Planning Authority, Chelmsford City Council, is required to consult affected Parish Councils for comments on all planning applications in their areas. They do not have to agree with the comments but they do need to consider them

Although we are notified of applications involving existing homes most often we will choose not to comment. We recognise that most home improvements are straight forward and we should not inhibit the process.

We will comment if an application affects the Conservation Zone, a nearby listed building, is outside the Village settlement boundary or has a significant impact on neighbours. We will always comment on major developments which could impact a large part of the Parish.

We were very active in opposing the 3 large solar farms which have now been approved to be built in our Parish and will continue to be vigilant during their construction.

We are also very concerned with the large housing expansion to the North of South Woodham Ferrers. We believe there has been too little consideration of the traffic impact both from heavy trucks during the construction and general traffic afterwards due to the population increase. Rat running through East Hanningfield between SWF and

Chelmsford will inevitably increase. As will East to West traffic due to drivers trying to avoid the congested main road through SWF.

There are several major residential and industrial planning proposals alongside both sides of the A12 between the Howe Green and Boreham junctions. We will carefully monitor these for any potential impacts on our residents.

The significant development pressure on our area is due to the Metropolitan Green Belt. Development in this area is more restricted. The Green Belt in the Chelmsford area is broadly everything to the west of the old A130 and then north up to the A1060 Chelmsford – Bishops Stortford road. This totals one third of the Chelmsford City planning area.

There is a need for us to develop a Neighbourhood Plan for our parish. This is a development of the Village Plan completed some 13 years ago. The Plan would define what residents consider would be a good development, what would be bad and why. To avoid any possibility of political influence the Parish Council cannot directly develop this plan. The preparation needs to be done by a separate group of residents. The Parish Council would of course help. If any resident or group of residents are interested in this task they can get more information through Google and then should contact me malcolm.thomas@easthanningfield-pc.gov.uk

A significant benefit to the Parish is that it would give us a stronger voice in the planning process and also the potential for obtaining a greater share of any "Community Infrastructure Levy" funds.

Although I have spent a lot of time in this letter talking about planning matters in our meetings, we spend a lot more time discussing the more immediate problems the residents are facing and what we can do to help.

Pot holes are a concern to all of us. They are dangerous and can cause significant damage. We report the worst to Essex Highways and to our City Councillor, Ian Grundy. Cllr. Ian Grundy is also the City Council's

representative to Essex Highways so will probably write more about this issue elsewhere in this newsletter.

Speeding traffic through the village continues to be a problem and we support the Community Speed Watch and their speed checks. The number of traffic accidents on our roads, particularly Bicknacre Road and Pan Lane are far too high. The PC will be purchasing both 30 mph and Accident Black Spot signs.

We are anxious that we avoid accidents to pedestrians. Overgrown hedges are a problem at this time of the year. They grow quickly across adjacent footpaths and force pedestrians into the road or onto the grass.

The property owner has a responsibility to keep the hedges under control. We understand that it may be difficult to stay on top of the problem and we do need to be sensitive to nesting birds. But I am asking you to look at your hedges and take action if there is a risk. In the winter it is time to take more drastic action and cut the hedge back sufficiently to allow for next years growth.

Sometimes owners ignore their responsibilities. We do write to them but, in future, if no action is taken after our request we will get their hedge cut using a tractor mounted flail and then bill the owner the cost.

# **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH**

**Local Crime**: Sometimes residents contact EH NhW about an incident but often we only learn about a crime through the police reports we are copied which may be a week or more after the event. If we know about a crime or suspicious activity we can, through the NhW network with victim's permission, ask for witnesses and in the process also provide a timely warning for other residents if relevant.

Since the last EH News magazine it seems to have been comparatively quiet – no fly-tippling to report and just following police reports:

21st July: Old Church Road (white Ford Transit Van broken into and battery stolen).

27<sup>th</sup> July: Bicknacre Road (property garage broken into and power tools, chainsaw and golf clubs stolen).

23rd August: Pease Place (vehicle taken from driveway).

From Essex police crime statistics for Chelmsford (which includes East Hanningfield), reported overall crime increased from July 2021 to July 2022 with increases in burglaries, shop lifting, bicycle and vehicle theft, and carrying weapons (but drug and public order offences decreased!).

Neighbourliness equals Crime Prevention: As this News magazine is delivered, we will be approaching the end of the "holiday season" but there will still be houses left unattended by owners and so more vulnerable to burglary. As well as the usual efforts to make the house look occupied whilst away (leave a light on, ask a neighbour to park on drive etc), a reminder neighbours can help each other by keeping an eye on their house when they are away, taking their bins out/put bins away and taking in deliveries/parcels.

**John Chadwick:** Sad to a report, a long-term EH resident (from1971), John Chadwick, died on 12th May. John was quite a character and a member of the EH NhW, acting as its treasurer for most of the period from when the group was first formed in the late 80's. A memorial service was held at All Saints on 7th June when we learnt much more about his life - he trained in Paris at a hotel school from 16 – 20 years old, then whilst doing his national service, he met his wife Susan, in Chelmsford. He was a keen Rugby player in Paris, played cricket and enjoyed skiing. He and Susan ran a Hotel in Kent for 10 years, then

moved back to Essex where they ran a Banquet Catering business, until 1995 when both retired. Those of us in the village knowing him in his later years never realised the very full and energetic life he had led.

**NhW Organisation & Email Alerts:** Over 130 residents receive local emailed local crime alerts - contact NhW email address below if you would like to receive these.

**Community Speed Watch**: (CSW) volunteers operate under the EH NhW umbrella. CSW is part of the overall police strategy to deter speeding, the main cause of road accidents/fatalities. Random 30 mph CSW checks continue in Old Church Rd, The Tye, Bicknacre Rd and the Common.

Essex traffic police receive the EH Speed Watch schedule for East Hanningfield and from time to time join us. As opposed to the local CSW (which sends the speed log after a speed check to traffic police) these traffic officers will stop a driver exceeding the speed limit and give them a speeding ticket.

**20s Plenty Campaign**: Reducing speed limits from 30mph to 20mph can cut pollution by 30pc and reduce the chance of a severe or fatal injury in the event of a collision by a staggering 60%. Most of the UK's larger cities have adopted 20mph for their residential streets and Wales is about to implement a 20mph national default for residential roads. We believe that communities can decide that "20's Plenty Where People Live" and Essex should be doing this in residential areas to reduce noise, pollution and allow cyclists and pedestrians to feel safer.

Appeal for CSW Volunteers: With some team members taking a break over the summer it has been difficult to maintain a regular speed check schedule, highlighting the need for a few more volunteers to share the load. We would love to hear from anyone interested in helping – training and a hi-vis jacket come free with the job! Contact the NhW email address if you are interested in either CSW or NhW.

## **ALL SAINTS' CHURCH**

As I'm writing this at the beginning of August, it's cold and wet and definitely feels more like autumn than the summer. What a contrast to last year when I wrote "We are just at the tail end of a heatwave, and it still hadn't rained so everywhere was parched". It has been guite a wake up call perhaps re global warming, with much of the world suffering from extraordinarily high temperatures causing horrendous wild fires; other places have suffered terrible flooding; and the weather is proving a nightmare for many of our farmers, with the dry weather earlier in the summer having an adverse effect on their crops, and now with this prolonged wet and windy weather causing crop damage and being too wet to harvest them. It would be easy to find ourselves feeling rather pessimistic, but we have plenty of things to be grateful for as well. As Christians with our faith in God's unconditional love and care for all humanity there is always hope - as it reminds us in Matthews gospel that "The sun shines on the bad and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous alike."

As we move into the autumn, as a church it is a time for remembering and for being grateful for what we have, compared to many people living on the breadline in this nation, and in abstract poverty, malnutrition and little if any healthcare elsewhere in the world. On October 8th we are holding our Harvest Festival, and this year our harvest gifts and donations will be going to local food banks. You are always very welcome to join us, whether you generally come to church or not.

Also, during October at our yearly All Souls Day service we will be giving thanks for all those who have now passed from this life into the next. During this service we will read out a list of names of those we hold in great affection. If you would like to join us for that service there will be the list at the back of church, for you to add your loved ones if you would like to, and you will also have the opportunity to light a candle in memory of them as well.

Remembrance Day service will be on November 12th. Full details are in the diary section of the magazine.

During our regular services we always pray for the village, for our organisations, businesses and also for those people and situations we know of in a time of quiet to lift them up to God. We also pray for every street and those who live in the village each year. In September we will be praying for East Hanningfield Road and Scarles Croft; in October Filliol Close and The Chase; and finally in November we will pray for those who live in Geoffrey Close, The Common and The Tve.



We believe that God knows us inside out, and perhaps better than we know ourselves, and he knows our situations. Therefore when we pray we don't always have to tell him what we want, but like any loving father we can approach him and ask for his help and guidance. He doesn't always answer how we might expect or hope for, but he will always answer our prayers in the way that's best for us. Prayer is simply talking to God, as we would talk to a friend or loving relative - we don't have to use special words or phrases. All we have to do is to tell him how it is for us; and to remember to say thank you to him for the good things we have in our lives as well.

# **BETHEL CHURCH**Safely Home

As I started to write an article for the Village news, we received the sad news that our dear friend Joyce Dorman had died. So, I would like to pay tribute to her instead.

Joyce lived in East Hanningfield most of her adult life with her husband, Derek. She loved the village and was a wellknown and well-loved character.

But how she became a member of Bethel Church



was quite remarkable. Over 30 years ago, the ladies at the church were meeting together for their Tuesday prayer group. One of ladies, who became a lifelong friend, said that they should knock on a door with the number 11. So, they walked out in faith, with a certain amount of trepidation, round the corner to 11 Ashley Green.

There they were greeted with a warm smile from Joyce. After introducing themselves, they invited Joyce and Derek to Bethel Church – and they took up the invitation.

After a few months, they both came to faith in Christ and were both baptised in the school swimming pool one Sunday afternoon.

Soon after, Derek had a major stroke that left him requiring a wheelchair for mobility and died a few years later with related complications. His cheeky smile is still imprinted in our memories of him.

Joyce became a hard worker at Bethel Church, and an integral part of the Café Bar and fund raising for a homeless charity that was close to her heart.

The last two years of her life, Joyce struggled with her health. The last year she was house bound, but there was an extraordinary show of love and support from her Church family and village friends, particularly her next-door neighbour, Jenny, who gave up so much of her time to tend to Joyce's needs.

This is when community really came together. The people of East Hanningfield gave Joyce as much comfort as they could.

She loved her church family and was thrilled every time one of us visited her. Her love for Christ and the hope of salvation was always there, right to the end.

On Sunday, we paid tribute to her and reminded ourselves of the promises that God gives us:

"For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, an eternal house in heaven, not built by human hands".

2 Corinthians 5:1

When the perishable puts on the imperishable, and the mortal puts on immortality, then shall come to pass the saying that is written:

"Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?" 1 Corinthians 15:54-55

Joyce was much loved and will be much missed, but we take great heart in knowing that she is 'safely home'.
