#### PARISH COUNCIL

#### **Volunteers**

Not everyone knows that all the Parish Councillors are volunteers. The only benefit we get is knowing we are doing something important for the Parish.

I mention this because at this time of the year the Parish Council would like to say a big THANK YOU to the numerous volunteers who support organisations and events which help to make the Village and Parish a better place to live.

As an example.

You will read elsewhere in this newsletter a report from the Hanna's Field Charity. They are too modest to mention how important they are to the daily life of the village. They manage and maintain the Village Hall, the sports field, the children's play area on the sports field and the car park. There is no government grant to fund this. Without the volunteers running it and raising funds there would be no location for village events, no village shop and no convenient place to drop of children for school.

There are three large fund-raising events each year. The Summer Fete, The Art Fair and the Firework Display plus several Book Sales. These events were enjoyed by many residents and together raised about £8,000.

This impressive sum was helped by the generous sponsorship of local firms who donated money or goods.

Organisation of these events requires a significant commitment of time and effort. But the events could not take place without numerous volunteers giving a few hours of their time doing such things as setting up stalls, erecting display stands, selling raffle tickets or rattling buckets.

#### Thank You all. To borrow a slogan "Every Little Helps."

If you tempted to help in 2024 just pass on your email or telephone number to an existing volunteer or just come along with them.

#### **Parish Council Update**

In the last newsletter I mentioned the need to keep our hedges cut to avoid restricting the footpaths. Many thanks to the residents who acted and if you have not yet done so the winter months are the time to do it. The Parish Council has arranged for the more troublesome hedges to be cut by a contractor.

I also mentioned that the PC intended to fund both 30 mph and Dangerous Bend signs. We were advised that displaying Dangerous Bend signs was not allowed. We have had to resort to requesting action from Essex Highways. Let us hope they do something.

We have approached the farmer regarding the hedge restricting visibility on the Pan Lane bend and he very quickly lowered the height. It is still a dangerous bend but at least you can see oncoming vehicles sooner.

We have replaced the deteriorating Village Gates originally installed by Essex Highways but then abandoned.

This winter we will also resurface the footpath from All Saint's Church to the entrance to Gard and Sons timber yard.

#### **Planning**

As a reminder of why the Parish Council planning reviews are important.

This time last year the Parish Council became aware of a proposal to site a huge 15 metre high 5G mobile phone mast plus equipment cabinets at the junction of Old Church Rd and The Tye. The presumption should be that no planning approval would be required

unless the local authority specifically insists that it is necessary. If the land involved is owned by Highways no landlord approval would be required.

The consultation period for this mast was conveniently timed, by the applicant, to be over the Christmas break.

The mast would have ruined the iconic view of the southern end of The Tye Conservation Zone.

The Parish Council with the help of a few volunteers quickly printed fliers and distributed them to every house adjoining The Tye. This resulted in numerous letters of objection. The PC also wrote to the Company involved and the Planning Department.

By January the application was withdrawn.

The potential for another 5G mast has not gone away but the organisations involved know that we are vigilant.

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#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR**

It's been a very sad few weeks following the fatal accident in Stock Hill on the 3rd of November at which a local boy aged 15 was killed and another critically injured. The incident is in the hands of the Police, and we must await more details in due course. It does act as a reminder to us all on driver behaviour and the importance of keeping highway furniture in good order.

The Army & Navy upgrade grinds on. We have secured some £69m from the Department of Transport which will be supporting the £81m project to build the junction along with an extension of the two park & ride sites. The next step is to secure planning permission followed by construction start in the spring of 2025 & completion in 2028.

Devolution is taking up a lot of our time at currently. We are in discussion with the Government to go for what they call Level 2, which will be a combined authority together with Southend and Thurrock. All 12 authorities in the County plus business are supporting the move which will give us far greater control on Jobs, Skills, and Transport. You may well hear more on this as an announcement is due in the Autumn Statement on the 22nd of November.

At a recent Police briefing it was good to hear there has been a downward trend in all crime levels. We now have 3755 Police Officers including Community Support Officers and Specials - the largest the force has been in its 183-year history! It was a very encouraging report and good to hear they fully recognise the importance of a strong relationship with councils and voluntary groups. Apart from all the usual issues, stalking and harassment plus drugs remain key issues.

A very 'Big Thank You' to our Vice Chair – David Bell for providing and fitting the new British Sign Language boards both inside the Small Hall, the Pre-school Play area and the main Play area on the field. These have all been very well received by both parents and children alike in the village. Well done!

We previously advised we had received the ROSPA report on the Play Equipment and areas that needed repair, but also that some equipment may need replacement. Requests have also been received about additional new equipment. These items are very costly, (we have already been researching into this with some play equipment providers). There would need to be a completely separate fund-raising drive for this to happen. Are there any parents out there who could come up with some ideas of how this could be achieved? We would welcome any ideas and input with suitable suggestions. There may be grants available, which of course, we will pursue (usually match funded), but these are always very oversubscribed, so we would have to keep everything crossed to be successful!

We always have a list of improvement work on the horizon, again funds permitting – one of these being the completion of the improvements in the foyer, earlier this year after fitting the new double-glazed windows/doors (addressing heat loss), with some replacement flooring/mats and some fold up style seating.

In November 2022, we seriously started to look into ways we could address the ever-increasing fuel costs forecast. Our costs could double when our fixed rate electricity contract finishes in early 2024. We held an initial meeting of the Executive Committee, together with non-committee resident Scott Mattheson, who was able to share with us the extensive research he had already carried out on Solar Panels and their installation. This information was invaluable for us starting to understand how we could go about this and getting some true idea of costs/savings involved. A sub-committee was formed with Mike Plumridge, Malcolm Edwards, Malcolm Thomas (Parish Council) and Scott Mattheson who have had many meetings over this year to finally get to the point of establishing the full cost involved with such a large project. Certainly not something for the faint hearted!!

Looking at our available reserves, sources of possible funding, and then how we could possibly move this project on with installation, was again not easy or straightforward. One of the problems we did find out was that, although we are a charity, we would be expected to pay V.A.T. on this work (unlike private households) which would put 20% onto the whole cost. We do hope however that the Autumn Budget (22<sup>nd</sup> November) – will address this problem, so again we are keeping everything crossed but certainly we cannot be complacent of the outcome.

However, thankfully with success from some of the grants we have applied for, and generous help from the Parish Council, we have been able to place our order, to proceed with this work, using a local business, Solar Green. They are planning to be able to carry out some of the work over the two-week shutdown period of the Hall at Christmas/New year, which will give the least disruption to all our hirers.

Whilst speaking of our hirers – long term regulars, like the Pre-School, Dog Training, Football and Taekwondo, we have gained some new group's – Pilates, Yoga and possibly a new Zumba class starting.

I would personally like to thank all the members of the HFC Committee for their continued unfailing commitment to giving their time voluntarily, to ensure that we can continue to run and improve this invaluable asset that we have in our village. Some members are retired, (or partially!) but equally some are working parents who understand the importance of being a part of keeping this community facility going for the future.

Should anyone feel, they could add their drive or expertise, to help keep a vibrant committee going for the future, please do not hesitate to make contact. (We meet 6 times a year – every two months on a Tuesday evening).

Thank you to everyone who took the time to come, many dressed in amazing costumes, to our third Village Fireworks and Halloween fun event on Sunday 29th October.

Thankfully, the weather dried up late afternoon avoiding what might have been a washout if the rain had continued. The lighting was magical, the food, hot chocolate and bar even better than last year, and the fireworks, everybody agreed, were wonderful. Numbers attending this year were down on last year, but it didn't seem to make any difference to the atmosphere and there was lots of positive feedback after the event which was very pleasing. The profit this year was just £1000 and significantly down on last year.

As you may imagine, it is expensive and takes a lot of hard work and planning to put this event together. We must pay for the first aiders. insurance, hired lighting and public address system, and of course the fireworks display itself. We debated the decision to keep the event free for the village once again this year (entrance by pre-paid ticket is an alternative method of funding the event) but the Committee want to keep this Fireworks and Halloween a "free event" for people in the village if we can. The overall purpose of this event is to bring the community together but also to raise funds for the Village Hall and All Saints Church. This means donations from people attending the event, as well as the sponsorship we get, must cover costs and still allow us to make a reasonable profit, one that reflects all the effort from committee and volunteers and contributions from companies providing financial help and services. The committee therefore will meet in January to take stock of how we did this year and decide whether to organise another Fireworks and Halloween fund raiser in October 2024. 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#### EAST HANNINGFIELD NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

**Local Crime**: November seems to have been comparatively quiet, just small-scale fly-tipping (a garden strimmer dumped in Back Lane ditch), but September and October saw more incidents:

September: Number plates stolen from a Mini (Highfields Mead).

**October**: Bicycle stolen (Southend Road); Range Rover stolen (The Tye); two Lawn Mowers stolen from outbuilding (Old Church Road);

These were reported to NhW by police. If residents contact EH NhW to let us know about an incident, we will, with victim's permission, appeal for witnesses through the NhW network. This process makes other residents aware of the crime that is about.

**Crime Prevention:** Winter is here and daylight hours fewer. Burglars love this time of year when a house with no lights on is a sure sign no one's at home! As well as the usual efforts to make the house look occupied whilst you're away, lights on after dark etc, ask a neighbour to keep an eye on the house and take in that parcel left on your doorstep.

**Nitrous Oxide (N2O):** From time-to-time NhW has been contacted about small metal N2O (laughing gas) capsules left lying around the village, sometimes in carrier bag type volumes. As of 8<sup>th</sup> November, it has been illegal to possess N2O for the purpose of getting high. It is classified as a Class C drug under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971 and it is now a criminal offence to possess N2O without a legitimate reason. Serious users face up to two years in prison while those convicted of supplying face up to 14 years.

Which cars are more likely to be stolen? Car theft is still on the rise in the UK, with figures from AA showing a 25% increase since 2022. Some vehicles are more of a target than others. According to WHICH? Range Rovers are sought after (47% increase since 2021) and can be sold on quickly to foreign buyers. Some models like Fords can be broken down pretty much overnight and sold on for parts the next morning. Ford Fiesta thefts have risen sharply since 2022, according to the DVLA, because Ford indicated they'll stop Fiesta production soon, which will increase the price of parts. And while the precious metals in catalytic converters aren't fetching as much as they once did, thieves are now turning to other high-value parts on vehicles (such as the steering wheels in BMWs!). Insurers say vehicle thefts are most likely to happen when drivers are tucked up in bed (36% of claims take place between midnight and 7am) so take care your pride and joy is

locked up and secure at night, and if its keyless entry put keys in a faraday cage to prevent remote cloning of unlock code.

#### When and how to contact the Police:

Essex police are offering more ways of reporting non-emergency crime and anti-social behaviour through their digital 101 service on their website. You can also use it to contact your local policing team, tell them about something you have seen or heard, or request information. A Live Chat service is also available where you can send direct messages to a digital 101 operator Monday to Friday between 10am-9pm. They still have the 24-hour 101 service which you can call if you feel you need to speak to someone or don't have access to the internet. **Always call 999** if a serious offence is in progress or has just been committed, if someone is in immediate danger, if property is in danger of being damaged, or if a serious disruption to the public is likely.

**NhW Email Alerts:** Over 130 EH residents receive emailed local crime alerts - contact NhW email address below if you would like to receive these.

#### EH Community Speed Watch (CSW):

Random 30 mph CSW checks continue in Old Church Road, The Tye, Bicknacre Road and the Common. CSW is part of the overall police strategy to deter speeding, the main cause of road accidents/fatalities, and EH volunteers operate under the NhW umbrella. Registrations of vehicles exceeding speed limit are forwarded to Essex police and owners receive a warning. Essex traffic police receive the East Hanningfield Speed Watch schedule and from time to time join the local CSW team on speed watch. These officers stop drivers who are exceeding the speed limit and give them a speeding ticket on the spot, so be warned.

#### **Appeal for CSW Volunteers:**

We are still looking for few more volunteers to join us and share the load (currently there are 8 of us - 3 ladies and 5 gents). A couple more volunteers would make all the difference so we would love to hear from anyone interested in fresh air and helping. ## A REFLECTION THIS FOR THIS TIME OF YEAR FROM ALL SAINTS' CHURCH

What's the difference between Advent & Christmas? Why is Christmas called Advent? What is Advent and why do we mark it with chocolate filled calendars?

Advent gets its name from the Latin word for arrival. It serves as a countdown to Christmas when we honour the birth of Jesus Christ. During the darkest days of winter, it is a season of candlelight, reflection and expectation ~ a chance to get ready for Christmas. This year Advent begins on December 3rd and ends on December 24th. Each of the four Sundays in that period represent LOVE, JOY, HOPE and PEACE. In All Saints we light a candle for each of these in our Advent wreath. A fifth candle, white in colour, known as the Christ candle sits unlit in the centre, waiting to be lit on Christmas Eve. Traditionally evergreen branches represent the continuous life of Christ as they do not die and the circular shape symbolises the eternity of God since a circle has no ending.

#### When did this tradition begin?

Johann Wickern a German Lutheran pastor ran a mission in Hamburg for the rescue of orphaned and neglected boys. In 1838 he began using a candlelit evergreen wreath to help them countdown the days to Christmas. It is believed this was the beginning of the tradition, but nowadays most families have Advent calendars in their homes instead.

So what about those chocolate filled calendars? In 1908 another German man, a printer, produced the first commercial Advent calendar. When he was a child, his industrious mother had made for him a calendar with cardboard doors and sweets inside. He adapted the idea and it began very popular, but World War II shortages and Nazi Germany caused production to cease. After the war another German printer used his contacts to introduce Advent calendars to the

United States and in 1953 President Eisenhower's three grandchildren joined an appeal for sales of calendars that had been imported from Germany to raise funds for the National Epilepsy League.

So enjoy your countdown to Christmas, if you are fortunate perhaps

by eating chocolate, but do remember you are very welcome to come to your village church to sing traditional carols and join in celebrating this very special time. Details of the times are on our website, just Google

have many exciting plans for the year, which we look forward to sharing with you as the year progresses.


