PARISH COUNCIL

The subject of this report is the work undertaken by the Parish Council to keep the Village looking attractive and staying safe for our residents.

This winter, the Parish Council, the same as last year, will take a more proactive approach to cutting the Village hedges which have been neglected by the land owner or Essex Highways and have become a danger to residents using the footpaths.

The Parish Council are not taking responsibility for all the hedges in the Parish or the Village. In the first instance it is the responsibility of the landowner. The majority of residents do this and the PC thanks them for being considerate.

If a tractor mounted agricultural flail is an option for your hedge please let our clerk Lucy White know and she will put you in contact with our contractor. Although this would be at your expense it would most likely be the most economical and efficient solution to this annual task.

After our successful initiative in hedge cutting, next year, starting in the spring, the Parish Council will extend its grass cutting program. The PC already cuts the grass on The Tye and Hanna's Field. Next year we will extend this to the small grass amenity areas in the Could Dennis Estate, Ashley Green and Highfield Mead. The reduced grass cutting program conducted by Chelmsford City have left these areas looking very untidy. They are, for most of the year, unusable by residents and in some areas have encouraged litter or fly tipping.

Essex County Highways will still retain responsibility for grass cutting on the verges alongside the Parish's roads and lanes.

Old or overgrown trees are another problem. This year the PC has had a professional risk assessment made on all trees we are directly responsible for. This resulted in some tree surgery to remove risky branches. Again if you have a tree on you land which overhangs public space or a neighbour it is worth looking critically at it and if worried get professional advice. There are good tree surgeons in the area who can help.

Most of the footpaths in the Village are the responsibility of Essex Highways. The path along The Tye is an exception as it is on private

land. It has now got to the point of being in many areas a trip hazard and is rapidly deteriorating.

The PC is presently reviewing quotes for the relaying of the footpath asphalt from the Church to opposite the Folly Bistro. It is hoped to do this early in the new year. The length continuing past the Old Forge will have to wait until the construction of the new house is finished.

Several residents have expressed a wish for a Village Sign. A survey conducted a few years ago identified this a feature that appealed to many residents. Most of our neighbouring villages, including South and West Hanningfield, Rettendon and Bicknacre already have a Village Sign. East Hanningfield is an exception and the PC has decided to correct this short fall

We are proud of our village and take pride in the village's appearance. There are now very few road signs clearly saying where we are. Satellite Navigation does not tell you where you are driving through or the name of the place you have arrived at. Few people now use a map. A Village Sign may seem old fashioned but modern technology makes it even more relevant. It is an indicator of our identity and civic pride. We hope to have it erected on The Tye in the first half of next year.

I will finish by, on behalf of the whole Parish Council, wishing you, your family and friends a very enjoyable Christmas holiday period and a

safe, healthy and happy New Year.



And here we are in Autumn, with the beautiful colours all around us and the inevitable fall of many leaves, to be picked up and disposed of either in the brown bins, or if you are lucky enough to have the capacity in your garden for a composting area to let them rot down for compost, although this does take 2/3 years to actually happen, then that is good. Clearing from pathways though is important, as when they are wet, they become quite dangerously slippery along with the terrible state of some of the paths in the village with lifting of some of the tarmac from the roots of the trees, especially causing both elderly and parents/children needing to walk on the roadway to avoid.

Following another successful Art Show at the beginning of October, both Wendy and I would like to say a huge 'Thank You' to all of the volunteers that come to do a variety of tasks, without your help we could never put this event on, we are so very grateful. The profit from this year's Art Show is just over £2,250, which is very similar to last year.

The profit from this event, along with the Village Fete in July, will, this year, go towards some new play equipment for the playing fields, although we will need a lot more with fundraising and hopefully through possible grants to actually be able to achieve this. We are looking for a small number of people (especially those with young children) to

come forward to join a small 'Working Party' to start working towards this goal. Unfortunately, as we have said before, there is no magical money pot from Local Government for these play areas.

Following on from the production and installation of all the benches around the field area, our Vice Chair – David Bell has again been very productive (with help) and we now have two table/benches installed on the field, one by the shop/main entrance and one by the play area. Thanks also to Dan Crow for the help with installation with the pavers and cementing them in. Another great asset which is already being put to good regular use.

In September, we acquired a substantial amount of catering grade white crockery with a gold rim and cutlery etc which can either be used for functions held in the hall or which can be hired by anyone wishing to use them for an external event. This was all generously donated by the Chadwick family, who had lived in the Village for many years, in the past they had run a Catering Business, but following the sale of their property, this all needed a new home.

We continue to try and keep up with the maintenance of the buildings and surrounding areas. New signs in the parking bays have been installed on the surrounding posts to try and keep the 'Disabled Bays' and the 'Shop Bays clear for the customers they are intended for, so please respect these areas. Recently during the October half term, redecoration of the Small Hall and the Kitchen has taken place with a new colour in the kitchen that gives a much warmer feeling and ambi-

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NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Local Crime News: It's been a quiet period again with very little actual local crime reported.

One item of note was a vehicle in Ashley Green which had its number plates stolen. On the face of it, number plate theft may seem like a fairly petty crime resulting in the inconvenience of having to replace the plates. The true motive and consequences of theft however is significantly more serious. If you want to buy a set of number plates from a legitimate supplier, you'll have to present the vehicle registration document and prove who you are, so criminals resort to stealing number plates from a car on the street or in a quiet corner of a car park. They use stolen plates to mask another vehicle's registration, allowing them to carry out illegal activities without being identified. The most common of these is fuel theft at garages-the thieves fill up and drive away without paying. Aside from that, criminals also using stolen number plates to help them avoid congestion charges and toll road fees, commit speeding offenses and carry out burglaries without fear of their vehicle being identified.

Is it Happening Often? Yes, the AA say more than 25,000 thousand vehicles a year at last check with the police.

What should you do if your number plates are stolen?
REPORT IT TO THE POLICE, IMMEDIATELY and get a Crime Report Reference Number. By doing this you can ensure you are not incriminated for any criminal activity carried out using your number plates. It's also recommended you let the DVLA know (especially if it's a personalised registration) and tell your insurer your vehicle has been cloned in case it's involved in an accident.

Can you stop it happening? Not really - consider using security screws which can be turned easily using a screwdriver to fit them but can't be undone using normal tools.

A Christmas Time Message? Over the winter dark evenings we unfortunately see a national spike in break-ins and thefts in homes. However, you can make small changes to lessen the risk:

- Avoid telling the world on social media you're off to the Maldives over Christmas.
- Ask neighbours to keep an eye on your property you're while away.
- When you're out/away leave lights on timer switches so it looks like you're home.
- Make sure windows, doors and skylight windows are locked
- Check exterior flood lights and sensors are working.
- Don't leave the presents on show.

When & how to contact the Police: With this news magazine you may find a yellow card to hold onto with useful Police contact information (NhW Chelmsford area had a quantity printed but area distribution is limited however I'm trying to get some more).

The police contacts are unchanged: Use the digital 101 service to contact the local policing team about something you have seen or heard, or request information. A Live Chat service is available to send messages direct to a digital 101 operator. A 24-hour 101 call service is still there if you need to speak to someone or don't have internet access. Always call 999 if a serious offence is in progress or has just been committed, if someone is in immediate danger or harm, if property is in danger of being damaged, or if serious disruption to the public is likely.

East Hanningfield NhW and Email Alerts: Over 130 EH residents have registered to receive local emailed local crime alerts, but it needs someone to coordinate and feed information into the network and provide feedback to the police. Some people may remember in the last newsmagazine that I said with other personal and village hall commitments I had been unable to keep up with this role and it had become necessary for me to ask if there is anyone else in the village interested in helping with this? Contact me as shown below if you are and I will happily explain more.

Community Speed-Watch Volunteers: We are always looking out for a few more volunteers to join us and share the load. A short training session, bright yellow jacket and insurance come free with the job! Contact us through the NhW email address if interested.



BETHEL CHURCH — Out with the old. In with the new.

If you drove past the church in October, and saw a large skip on the driveway, you might have thought we were doing some building work, or having a big clear-out.

Well in fact, the skip was fully lined-out and became a baptistry pool! We had the great pleasure in baptising three young men, Adam, William, and Ray.

Whilst this might appear a bit unconventional, the occasion was very sincere. These young men made a public declaration of their faith. For anyone looking on, it might have looked a little strange. So why baptism? What is the significance, meaning and purpose of baptism?



When they entered the waters of baptism, they were proclaiming the gospel message. That Jesus died for their sins, was buried, and rose again. By being baptised, they were identifying themselves with Him.

If the meaning of baptism could be summarised in one word, it would be identification. Baptism in Christian faith speaks primarily of personal, public identification with Jesus Christ.

In Romans 6:3-4, the Apostle Paul puts the matter this way: "Don't you know that all of us who were baptised into Christ were baptised into his death? We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life."

So, in the end the skip acted as a great visual metaphor. An old life

being dumped and new-life emerging. We pray for Adam, William, and Ray, that this is an unforgettable moment in their Christian walk.

If you would like to know more about the Christian faith, we hold a course called 'Christianity Explored'. There are 6 sessions, set over 6-weeks, where people can come and listen and discuss the key points of the faith, like, who is Jesus, and what was the reason that he came?




