

PARISH COUNCIL

The Tye Path: The resurfacing of the footpath along The Tye has now been completed. Hopefully by the time you read this report the ground level will have been raised up to the new footpath level and the damage to the grass repaired. Grass seeding will take place in April and The Tye should be back to normal by the summer.

The path is a great improvement for pushchairs, wheelchairs and couples walking together.

We are now reviewing quotations to continue the new wider foot path, south, past The Old Forge. This will link up with road to Rettendon Road and across to Old Church Road. Hopefully this will be completed before the year end.

The Parish Council would like to extend the path, north, to link with Bicknacre Road. This would avoid residents having to cut though the Vita Bell car park but this requires discussions about rights of way and land ownership.

Village Sign: Our plan to install a Village Sign was mentioned in the last newsletter. The sign has now been ordered and hopefully we can instal it in on The Tye before the grass seeding mentioned earlier. The sign will be located on the widest part of The Tye between Rough Hill House and The Limes. This is a central location providing both a focal point for the Village and clearly visible to people passing though.

The Folly Bistro (previously the Windmill): The Three Compasses in West Hanningfield has recently closed. West Hanningfield Parish Council and residents are attempting to have it declared an Asset of Community Value then potentially raising sufficient funds to purchase the property and reopen.

There are successful examples of this. A recent local example is the Chequers Inn in Roxwell. The Village, aided by a £250,000 government grant and local fundraising have purchased the pub, made significant improvements and are about to recruit a landlord to run it.

The landlords of the Folly Bistro, which has been closed for several years, have announced that it will open in spring. We hope it will return to being a popular and successful country pub and restaurant under private ownership.

But we cannot predict the future so it makes sense to start now in applying to have the Folly Bistro listed an Asset of Community Value and not wait until it is too late. We will start the process later this year.

The listing is only of benefit if the business is closed or put up for sale.

In this case the listing gives the community six months to complete a business case and potentially raise the funds to purchase the property at the market price. There is no obligation for the Village to make any offer and there is no obligation for the owner to accept. **But it does buy 6 months time to think and act.** West Hanningfield did not have this 6 months.

Housing Development: I wrote in last Autumn's newsletter of the already ambitious new annual home targets of Chelmsford City and the new government's plans to increase the targets even higher.

This will necessitate a change to Chelmsford's Local plan which lays out the medium term development targets and locations. I forecast in the Autumn that the most likely outcome was not a major change to the plan but rather a speedier implementation. More homes, sooner, but in same location.

Two relatively small estates were proposed for East Hanningfield. One adjacent to Highfields Mead and one adjacent to Abbey Fields.

It seems my forecast is already happening as the first stage of the consultation program for the Highfields Mead site has already been announced.

The Parish Council will review these as they progress and comment as necessary to the planning activity to try and minimise the impact on the Village.

Annual Precept: This is the time of year when we set next year's budget or precept for the Parish Council. This year the PC has agreed an increase of slightly less than 3%. This compares to Chelmsford City's increase of 5%.

Our total precept for the year will be approximately £43,000 or about £80 per home.

To put this in perspective this almost the same as the cost of The Tye path. The Tye path was paid for partly by community funds received from the new homes built on the Moorlands Industrial estate and partly reserves saved from previous years.

Village Tidy/Litter Picking: The annual Village Tidy will be held on Saturday 5 April. Please go to the Village Hall Car Park at 9.30am to collect your picking tongs and bags.

Please volunteer: many hands make light work. The litter picking does make a massive difference. There is no one else that will do it.

It is a very rewarding but can be a frustrating task. At the end you are really pleased with your work. Next day the pristine verges have freshly discarded cans or bottles. All you can do is console yourself with how bad it would have looked if all those black bags of litter, collected over the years, were still there.

A highly visible litter picking effort does help in advertising what an antisocial activity dropping litter is.

Annual Village Meeting: The Annual Village Meeting will be on Tuesday May 6 at 6.45 pm in the Village Hall.

There you will meet your Parish Councillors and hopefully also councillors from Chelmsford City and Essex County.

The PC will report on our achievements in last year and our hopes for the next. There will also be reports from other village organisations including Hannas Field Charity.

There will be an opportunity for questions and answers or more informal conversations over a cup of tea or coffee.

CITY & COUNTY COUNCILS—SUE DOBSON

First of all, many thanks to all those who voted for me as Essex County Councillor back in December and enabled me to continue Ian Grundy's good work. I am now settling in and taking time to find out how I can get things done. Because Ian was unwell for some time, I am aware that there may be several things outstanding, and I am now going through past records to try and pick up on those. Please bear with me whilst I do this – although if there is something urgent do let me know and I'll look into it. This role, coupled with my City Councillor role, means that whatever the query, I should be able to look into it whether it is a City issue or a County issue.

It appears that I have become an ECC Councillor at an historic time in that no doubt most residents are aware of this Government's desire to completely reorganise Local Government and do away with the present three-tier system – County, District/Borough and Parish and form Essex into perhaps 4 combined authorities with an elected Mayor for Essex. ECC have responded positively to it on the basis that as the Government intends to do this, it was felt better to be involved right from the start so we can have the opportunity to do what is best for the county rather than have it imposed on us at a later date.

At the time of writing, we have just heard that our expression of interest has been accepted by the Government and work is already under way to prepare our plans. It is likely that a Mayor will be elected in May 2026 with 'shadow' authorities being formed and elected in 2027. We have also had confirmation that the ECC elections due in May this year will be postponed for one year until May 2026. I will update residents as and when I have any further information.

Meanwhile, business carries on as usual and on 13th February at 10.00 am ECC will hold a Full Council meeting where the final budget will be presented and the Council Tax figures established. Similarly, Chelmsford will approve its final budget for the forthcoming year at its Full Council meeting on Wednesday 19th February at 7.00pm. Residents are welcome to attend both meetings and both will be available to view on Youtube via the respective websites.

Highways issues still dominate the enquiries I receive and if there is an

issue, do please email me and I will see what I can get done as a priority – I can't promise to do everything but I will certainly try my best! An important issue at the moment within the City area is the Local Plan Review consultation, and this commenced on 4th February and will run for six weeks until 4pm on Tuesday 18th March 2025. This is the final draft of the Plan before it is submitted for examination by a Planning Inspector. The Council adopted its Local Plan in May 2020 and the Plan needs to be reviewed every 5 years to make sure it remains up to date and meets the changing needs for development growth to 2041. Residents are encouraged to respond; details are on the website and these include FAQ's, a newsletter, a PDF of the exhibition boards and details of face-to-face and staffed exhibitions. Remember also that if you would like to continue receiving collections of garden waste (brown bins) after 4th March 2025 you need to subscribe to the service now which will cost £60 per annum for one bin and £30 per annum for a second one. Subscribe at www.chelmsford.gov.uk under the tab 'garden waste collections'. I am aiming to get round to see all of the parish councils as soon as I can and hopefully attend the Annual Parish Meetings where time allows as this gives all residents the opportunity to ask me to look into issues for them.

HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY- Village Hall & Playing fields

Hi folks. Already 2 months into the new year. I hope so far it has been a good one for you.

Hanna's Field Charity continues to maintain and improve the Hall and fields for the whole village to enjoy. There has been a lot of unseen activity on various health safety measures in the hall and on keeping the field in condition.

Outside, the carpark mound has been coppiced, a regular necessity, to ensure healthy, manageable trees and shrubs. The field hedges and Chase hedge have been cut back and the ditch will br cleaned out at Easter. David Bell has been busy making and installing new picnic benches for you all to enjoy in better weather.

There are a host of different groups in the Hall. These range from short mat bowls, Tae Kwan-Do, Badminton, Pickleball, Pilates and Yoga. Plus Preschool, WI and Football. Details on noticeboards and the website.

We are delighted to have a new hirer group (S.E.N.) on Sunday mornings. This has meant a considerable crush of cars on some Sundays when it coincides with football matches. Both hirers have been extremely positive about finding solutions. If folks can double up on transport that would be most appreciated.

We have an ongoing problem with rambler groups that park, ramble off without any consideration for regular legitimate car park users. The result is havoc at school collection time, or when people try to access the shop. We are trying to find an acceptable way forward with ramblers by offering car parking/toilets for a small fee and at limited times. The car park is essentially a resource for Hall, Shop and School users. Ramblers wanting to park must first please contact us through the Hall booking secretary to discuss.

In December our litter hero, Chris Evans, had a serious accident. Result was that he has been unable to do his weekly litter pick/bin emptying. We did managed to find a little cover for this unexpected shortfall. Facebook comments and photos about bins needing to be emptied are not particularly helpful. The belief that the village elves, by magic, make things happen and problems disappear, without any work from anyone, is unfortunately an illusion. HFC are just a tiny group of unpaid villagers trying to improve things for the village. Contributing some actual effort, rather than comments, would be so much more constructive



(see Parish Council re. April Litter pick). On the subject of rubbish, it is obvious that bins generally around the village are being used inappropriately. They are for the odd crisp packet or chocolate wrapper whilst out and about. Not for the overspill from black bins to take up all the available limited space. Please think of others!

We remain ever hopeful that some of you will come forward to be part of a 'think tank' for developing the play area. The equipment for play and safety surfacing is extremely expensive. Nothing can move forward without an interested group of people trying to find the best scheme and to help with fundraising. Thank you to the couple of people who have shown some interest and we hope to be able to get back to you with some sort of plan when a few more people show interest. It is all in your hands. HFC cannot do this on its own.



Local Crime News: You just can't leave anything around these days it seems. Thieves stole a dumper truck loaded with 30 concrete curb edging from the contractors working on our new path along The Tye overnight on Thursday 9 January. Fortunately, it was recovered from Stock the following day (the advantage of a tracker having been fitted).

Fly Tipping again: Essex district councils have joined together to support a new Essex County Council campaign to tackle fly tipping aptly called SCRAP.



It comes as incidents of fly tipping continue almost monthly around the village. The most recent was a double mattress left in a ditch in Back Lane sometime during the first week of February. In 2024 Chelmsford City Council received 2,024 reports of fly tipping across the district so it's a county wide problem. Around 60% of fly-tips were household waste.

Unfortunately, illegal waste operators target everyone from householders to big businesses, with offers of cheap waste disposal. But legally, **YOUR waste is YOUR responsibility** regardless of who you get to

take it away it. So next time you have something to get rid of, that can't be reused/recycled, remember to follow the S.C.R.A.P. code:

- SUSPECT all waste carriers
- CHECK if they are registered before selecting one
- REFUSE suspicious offers
- ASK what will happen next
- PAPERWORK is YOUR proof

The campaign will provide information on what fly tipping is, what the impacts are, and how to dispose of household waste responsibly. Since 2005 householders have been required by law to check that anyone removing waste from their property is authorised to do so with the correct waste carrier licence. All waste carriers are registered through the Environment Agency. If using a waste carrier, ask if they are registered and make a note of their waste carrier number. If they are not registered, refuse their service. You can check to see if a waste carrier is legally licensed through the Environment Agency's Website Environment Agency's website. telephone the Environment Agency on 03708 506506 and request an instant Waste Carrier Validation Check.

A waste carrier registration is normally needed for the following categories:

- all building and allied trades
- landscape gardeners, tree fellers and surgeons
- house clearers
- retail establishments
- scrap metal dealers.

Here are some tips to follow: Check where the carrier is proposing to take your waste and record the registration number of vehicle removing waste. Pay by cheque, card or bank transfer as payments can be traced if the waste is fly tipped. If they insist on cash refuse their service. Request a waste transfer note and a receipt for their service and keep it as proof to cover yourself against a fine in case materials end up fly tipped.

When & how to contact the Police: If you did not receive one with your last E.H. News, you might find a yellow card to keep, which has

useful Police contact information (we didn't have enough to supply a card to every household with the December E.H.News magazine!). The police contacts on the card are unchanged: Use the digital 101 service it to contact the local policing team about something you have seen or heard, or request information. A Live Chat service is available to send messages direct to a digital 101 operator. A 24-hour 101 call service is still there if you need to speak to someone or don't have internet access.

Always call 999 if a serious offence is in progress or has just been committed, if someone is in immediate danger or harm, if property is in danger of being damaged, or if a serious disruption to the public is likely.

E.H. COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH (CSW)

The CSW volunteers continue with regular 30 mph CSW checks in the village (at police approved sites in Old Church Road, The Tye, Bicknacre Road and the Common). Speeding is the main cause of road accidents/fatalities but it's also antisocial. Collisions, deaths and injuries caused by driving too fast are largely avoidable if speed limits are complied with, so we are doing our best to make that happen.



Our local roads are set to become still busier with increasing through traffic as a result of housing developments at South Woodham and the business area north of Howe Green and A12 etc..

Over the last 9 months CSW have logged additional vehicle/speed data as part of the regular speed watch records (number of vehicles and percentage exceeding the 30mph limit). This covered 14 sets of village speed checks across the 5 approved locations in the village and with 3 speed checks completed at each location providing a reasonable view of where speeding is worst.

The survey results and conclusions have been provided to Parish Council as part of understanding the bigger picture for speeding in the village and effectiveness of traffic calming on some roads. Comments from residents during CSW tends to the view that overall there is too much speeding through the village (most people are pleased there are checks). Some voiced a concern about volume of traffic along the Tye and



the difficulty of crossing the Tye at the pinch point at the end of the Village Hall Chase, especially at school start/finish times.

CSW Volunteers: We are always looking out for few more volunteers to join us and share the load. A short training session, bright yellow jacket and insurance come free with the job!

If you have seen the photograph in the first floor meeting room at the Village Hall, which shows the members of the Committee who organised the celebrations for the Jubilee of King George V and Queen May, you might have



wondered what form those celebrations took. Well, continue reading!

CHELMSFORD CHRONICLE 26 APRIL 1935

EAST HANNINGFIELD SILVER JUBILEE

On May 6th the service in St. Paul's Cathedral will be heard in the Parish Church by means of wireless.

The Annual Meeting of the vestry and Church Council was held in the Rectory Room on Tuesday, the Rector, Canon Ost, presiding. Appointments made:- Rector's warden, Mr. F. Linnett; deputy, Mr. T. Rayner; people's warden, Mr. James Cox, deputy, Mr. A. Holden; sidesmen, Messrs. T. Rayner, D. Ost, C. Strowger, Sayers and G. Amos; Parochial Church Council, the wardens, sidesmen, Mr. Ost, Mrs. Hamlet, Mrs. Wade, Mrs. Tucker, Mrs. Strowger, Mrs. Linnett, Mrs. Amos, Mrs. Holden and Mr. J. Tucker; Ruridecanal Conference, Messrs. T. Rayner, F. Linnett and Holden.

CHELMSFORD CHRONICLE FRIDAY 10 MAY 1935

EAST HANNINGFIELD

The village was en Fete. After a short service conducted by the Rector (Canon Ost) a move was made to the sports field, where a good programme was gone through, including races for children and adults. A

tug of war between members of the British Legion and the Village Youths was a great attraction. A splendid tea was provided for everyone. The children were presented with fancy caps and balloons, and they then paraded for judging, presenting a pretty spectacle. After the sports they each received a souvenir booklet and a Caddy spoon emblazoned with a portrait of the King and Queen in colours. There were later a bonfire and fireworks and then dancing in the Institute Hall. All the older people were given tea or tobacco. The committees made the day a huge success. The following telegram was sent to their Majesties: "The head mistress, staff and scholars of East Hanningfield Rural School, Chelmsford, send hearty congratulations and loyal greetings to their Majesties King George and Queen Mary on the occasion of their Silver Jubilee." The following reply was received from the King: "The King and Queen warmly thank all at East Hanningfield Rural School for their kind Jubilee greetings."

CHELMSFORD CHRONICLE FRIDAY 17 MAY 1935

EAST HANNINGFIELD

A CONCERT in the W.I. Hall on Tuesday was arranged by Canon Ost in aid of the hospital. An excellent programme was given by the Magnet Concert Party.

INFANTS WELFARE CENTRE. A Jubilee tea took place on Wednesday in the W.I. Hall, 51 children being present. Each received a Jubilee beaker and chocolate. Recitations by Mrs. Howard were heartily applauded.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE.- Mrs. Castle presided. Miss Aust, from the County Agricultural College, gave an instructive demonstration on jam and jelly making. The entertainment arranged by Mrs. N. Rayner and Mrs. Tucker, was given by members of the Great Baddow W.I., who admirably performed a sketch. Mrs. Hawkes won the cup competition.






The week commencing the 3rd February was Children's Mental Health Week. The theme was 'Know yourself, grow yourself'. The children thought about what things make them
