## PARISH COUNCIL

This newsletter reports on the recent work of the Parish Council to improve the Village.

#### Tye Footpath.

This is now complete and provides a smoother and wider path from the Folly Bistro to Old Church Road. Two people can now walk side by side and pushing or using a wheelchair is much easier. The damage to the grass has now been repaired but will need some more grass seed this Autumn. It is unfortunate that when we wanted it dry we had continuous rain and when we wanted it wet we had continuous dry!

#### Village Sign

The Village Sign has now been installed and is an attractive addition to the Tye. We will be adding a polished concrete base to add to its appearance and protect it from mowing machines.

#### **Telephone Box**

The telephone box is an integral part of the appearance of the Tye but has been declared redundant by OpenReach. It has been purchased by the Parish Council for a token sum and has now received some essential maintenance. We have shot blasted away the years of accumulated paint and grime and given it a new coat of that iconic red paint. The scratched and cloudy plastic glazing has been removed and replaced with toughened glass. Next we will add shelves and the volunteers who run the book sale in the Village Hall will stock it with paper backs which will be free to borrow.

#### **Hoppit Play Area**

We have two play areas in the village. One in Hannas Field run by the Hall charity the second is in the Coulde Dennis estate. This is maintained by the Parish Council after Chelmsford Borough Council (as it

was then) expressed a wish to close it to save money. The Hoppit Play Area as it is called is focussed on infants and toddlers whilst Hannas Field caters for the slightly older.

If you are new to the Village you may not know of the Hoppit Play area as it is well hidden in the centre of the estate. You can find it at the end of Catherine Close or Fillioll Close.

You are encouraged to use it. "Use it or Lose it".

The Parish are in the middle of some improvements to the play equipment and layout of the Hoppit play area. With the help of a grant from Essex County Council we are adding a new spinner or roundabout which will be at ground level so accessible to children of all abilities, even in a wheelchair.

We will be also undertaking some essential maintenance of the existing play equipment and making some safety improvements.

The old safety matting will be removed and a new poured safety surface poured over the asphalt and concrete circles around the play areas.

Most of the railings will be removed to open the area up so that we have room to add some picnic tables so that the whole family can enjoy the space not just the child.

The play area has had vandalism in the past. This is normally youths who are bored. The best defence is for local residents to frequent the area and make it clear that they will be identified and reported.

The Parish Council has already taken responsibility for mowing the grass areas of the estate. Together with making the Hoppit play area into a local park perhaps we can begin to generate enough civic pride to discourage the all too frequent fly tipping of rubbish by residents. This is just vandalism by adults who should know better.

#### **Other News**

You will read an account of the Village Fete elsewhere in this news let-

ter. The Parish Council would like to thank the organisers who made this happen. After last year's atrocious weather they showed amazing fortitude and optimism. Congratulations.

The small army of volunteers on the day demonstrated that "Many hands make light Work" is absolutely true. Thanks to all of you.

## HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY Village Hall & Playing Fields

It does not seem possible to be writing the Autumn copy already, but sadly this is true!

The first item is about our successful Village Fete on 5<sup>th</sup> of July, raising over £3,500 profit which is shared between All Saints Church and Hanna's Field Charity.

Our very sincere thanks also have to go to our sponsors for the event, D Chennells Ltd and J Gard & Sons Ltd plus many other local businesses, donating prizes for the Big Raffle. Without this help we could not put on the full programme of events on the day, to then raise funds for our various projects of improvement and maintenance. An extensive amount of hard work goes into the planning of this event and without the volunteers giving up their time before and on the day, it could not take place. So, a very big pat on the back to all who came to help, it is so very much appreciated. Thank you also to everyone who came along to enjoy the event, without you it would be a dead duck! Thankfully this year the weather was much kinder to us, not a lot of sun and quite windy but it did stay dry! Our prayers were answered!

For Hanna's Field Charity, the fundraising money received will go towards the replacement of some of the play equipment on the field. We will also be seeking to apply for any Grants that may be available (often these require match-funding) so it will be a fairly slow process to gradually replace both the rubber safety matting (which costs as much as the items) and new pieces of equipment. As we have tried to make people aware before there is no magic tree of money available from City Councils or Government, as many people do assume.

During the Whitsun week at the end of May the Hall cladding was repainted (a very expensive specialist paint product which has to be applied in the right weather conditions) and following on from this the Storage container on the field was also painted, (using the remaining paint from the cladding) some extra work on some rusted areas with special treatment and then applying a rubberised paint to the roof, which should give us many years of protection from the elements. Also, during August, we had our annual electrical / PAT testing undertaken (which is a good time when the bookings are quieter with the summer break).

One of the benches was again uplifted from it concrete base, just mindless vandalism! This has now been relocated to a new position on the field.

A new sign was recently installed on the Village Hall (the original hav-



ing lasted many years) plus a new Car Park sign in the Chase to show this is 'Private Parking' for the Village Hall, Post Office/Shop and use for the School/Pre-School for drop off and collection, together with a new sign on the gate of the Children's Play area on the field (advising who is responsible for these facilities).

The next fundraising event with be the Annual Art Show which will take place on Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> and Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> October (see the separate advert) with the Preview evening on Friday 3rd, which is by Invitation. We will soon be making contact with those in the village who have helped to make up our merry band of volunteers, again we could not possibly run this event without their invaluable help. The 'Books for Sale' in our Loft Library will also be available for purchase over this weekend.

We hope you have all enjoyed using the field over the summer months, utilising the lines marked out and the five-a-side goal posts that we put out for the youngsters to use.



Not looking forward to the nights starting to pull in yet, but inevitable! Wishing you all a good Autumn, and look forward to hopefully see you at the Annual Art Show.

### **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH**

#### Reminder - When & How You Can Contact the Police:

- Call the digital 101 (24 hour fee service) for Chelmsford local policing team to report non-emergencies or about something you have seen or heard, or to request information.

- Contacting police via online live chat (also via the police website) to send messages direct to an operator.

#### **EH COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH (CSW):**

Most people in the village will have seen us from time-to-time monitoring motorists' speed through the village. We operate regular CSW checks at police approved sites in Old Church Road, The Tye, Bicknacre Road and the Common, sometimes supported by traffic police. There were 79 serious Essex road casualties recorded in June (compared with 81 in May) and it's a well-established fact that collisions, deaths and injuries caused by driving too fast are largely avoidable if speed limits are complied with (for pedestrian and cyclists especially, speeding is also perceived as antisocial). The regular village speed checks act as a deterrent for motorists passing through our village, encouraging them to stick to our 30mph speed limits.

There are currently nine public spirited residents who give up their time rain or shine to keep this effort going (three teams of 3) but we would gladly welcome a bit more help. A short training session, hi-vis

jacket, a bodycam and insurance come with the job! Contact us through the email address below if interested.

**Is "20 Plenty"?** If you were at the Village Fete in July, you may have been one of 100 people who were asked the question:

"To improved road safety, would you support the introduction of a 20mph speed limit in all or some of the village".

The response was overwhelming in favour (99% wanted a 20mph limit in some or all the village). This was a very quick survey by a CSW member in response to a question from Essex SERP (Safer Essex Roads Partnership) seeking to understand whether there are communities which would like/are pushing for a 20mph speed limit **on residential roads and areas where people live, work, and play** to understand the level of support across Essex for this approach. Although limited and not a survey of all the residents in the parish our snapshot survey tends to indicate a wide support from residents. The survey results were sent to SERP and copied to the Parish Council for information (SERP are a collaboration between Essex County Council, Essex Police, Essex Fire & Rescue, and National Highways).

The SERP (which does not implement speed limits) is simply seeking to understand the level of community support for lower limits in residential areas/communities.

This limited survey does not mean that anything will happen here, however the "20's Plenty for Us" campaign slowly gathers momentum. Wales implemented a national 20mph speed limit on roads with street lighting in September 2023 and Scotland aims to have 20mph as the default limit across all councils by the end of 2025. In England, more than 60 local authorities are committed to 20mph in areas where people live, work, or play and 22 out of 32 London boroughs have so far either implemented or committed to 20mph as the norm.

As someone pointed out to me, if the main route through the village (at most half mile long) had a 20mph rather 30mph limit the journey time would only be increased by 30 seconds (but it may have saved a cyclist or pedestrian's life)...food for thought!

#### THE GIFT OF LOVE

In the last few months, I've seen a lot of love shown to others. I've watched the sparkle in the eyes of wedding couples as they talk about how they met and fell in love. I've listened to families remembering what they loved about the person they will soon lay to rest. I've seen the love and concern of those devoted to the sick and lonely. I've experienced the love and commitment that went into our village fete, where I fell in love with an old enamel jug, which I now use as a vase for the flowers I love to receive, or can't resist buying for myself!

I like the framework that the author of the book 'The Five Love Languages' suggests we employ to show our love. He helps us understand that sometimes we express love through words of affirmation, acts of service, spending quality time with someone, through physical touch, or by giving gifts like flowers.

The well-known Bible passage from 1 Corinthians chapter 13, verses 4 -7, also explains how to recognise someone loving and caring for our well-being. It tells us that love is demonstrated through patience, kindness, and the absence of jealousy, arrogance, rudeness, or pride. True love is much more than being good friends, affectionate partners, or the deep bond sometimes experienced in families. The love described in this passage is of a higher level, as it explains the love that God has for us (agape love).

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or ar rogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. <sup>7</sup>It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

We are born with the innate ability to love as God loves us. We can all love in ways that nurture and build loving, selfless, and beautiful relationships that thrive, especially during difficult and challenging times. The devastating house fires that have affected families in the village have stirred in this community an outpouring of generosity and love as modelled and revealed to us by Jesus.

May God's love guide us, forgive us and continue to help us build loving and compassionate communities. God's love is expressed through us ... we are vessels of God's love; we are the flowers fed and watered by God that colour each other's lives.

## BETHEL CHURCH

#### 380 years in the making.

Not one, but six of our folk celebrated significant birth-days this year. These were birthdays that were accompanied with a zero, when you move into another decade of your life.

Here's a breakdown: A 40-year-old, a 50-year-old, two 60-year-olds, an 80-year-old and a 90-year-old. 380 years in total! So, we had a big church picnic in the summer to enjoy their special days.



One of the things our birthday boys and girls will agree on, is that the world is certainly a different place to the one they entered. Even the 'baby' at 40, can say that in four decades, she has been part of world that has undergone significant transformations, particularly in technology, social dynamics, and global interconnectedness.
