#### RULES OF THE SOCIETY Available from the Hon. Secretary or can be viewed on our website

#### SHOW REGULATIONS

- 1 Only members will be entitled to exhibit at the Shows, except where otherwise stated in the Schedule. They should be amateurs and, if they employ paid labour, it should not be for more than two days a week.
- 2 All entries should reach the Show Secretary by 8.00pm, at the latest, on the Thursday prior to the show.
- 3 Entries should be submitted directly to the Show Secretary either by email or phone. Junior entries can also be submitted to the Junior Exhibitors coordinator. Full contact details will appear in the newsletter(s) preceding the show. When placing entries provide your name plus the classes you wish to enter. (Eg classes 18, 24, 31 etc). The Show Secretary will acknowledge receipt of entries within 24hrs.
- 4 Entry fee for Adults is 20p per class, unless otherwise stated. Junior Exhibitors entries are free. All entry fees to be paid when collecting show cards on the morning of the show.
- 5 Unless otherwise stated, all specimens exhibited in competition for prizes must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor, and must have been in his or her possession for at least two months, unless some other period is specified in the schedule. Any prize obtained contrary to this regulation will be forfeited. In order to be satisfied that the conditions governing competitive exhibits are fulfilled, the Committee reserves the right to visit, by permission before or after a Show, gardens from which plants, flowers, fruit or vegetables have been entered for competition.
- 6 Exhibits must be staged between 8.00am and 10.45am on the day of the Show.
- 7 Exhibitors should supply vases, plates, etc., as required. A limited number of vases are available.
- 8 The preparation of exhibits on the Show tables is not permitted, except in classes for collections of fruit or vegetables and flower arrangement classes.
- 9 Exhibits, wherever possible, should be named. Judges will take this into account in close competition, and especially where, as for Dahlias and Chrysanthemums, most named cultivars are officially classified.
- 10 Judging will commence at 11.00am and only persons authorised by the Show Secretary may remain in the hall while judging is in progress.
- 11 Shows will open at 2.00pm. Presentation of trophies will commence at approximately 4.00pm. The show will be closed to the public from 4.30pm.
- 12 No exhibit should be removed before the end of Prize Giving. All exhibits, personal property, etc., shall be at the risk of the exhibitors, and the Society will not be liable for compensation for loss or damage however caused.
- 13 A 'plate' is the specified number of fruits or vegetables consisting of one cultivar only.

- 14 No household can enter more than one exhibit in any class, except for homecraft, photography, flower arrangement and the junior exhibitors sections, in which each member of the household may exhibit one item. Entries must be the unaided work of the exhibitor.
- 15 Exhibits will in general be judged according to the rules in the R.H.S. handbook. In the event of insufficient competition or indifferent produce in any class, the judges may withhold an award or awards. The decisions of the judges as to the respective merits of the exhibits shall be final. A protest on any other matter shall be made in writing and shall be delivered to the Show Secretary within one hour of the opening of the Show accompanied with a deposit of 50p which will be returned if the objection is upheld.
- 16 Flower Arrangements are judged in accordance with the statement that: 'An **EXHIBIT** is composed of natural plant material, with or without accessories, contained within a space as specified in a Show Schedule'.

Entries must be the unaided work of the competitor; exhibits may be arranged at home if desired. Disqualification will take place for the following reasons:

- 1 Failure to comply with any specific requirements of a class as stated in the schedule, i.e. the measurement or components.
- 2 Inclusion of any fresh plant material that does not have its roots or the cut ends of its stem in water or water retaining material
- 3 Inclusion of artificial plant material, unless specifically allowed by the Show Schedule.

#### HINTS FOR EXHIBITORS

#### General

- Read the Schedule carefully and make sure that you understand exactly what is required in the various classes.
- Take note of the 'Show Regulations' in the Schedule about times for the staging of exhibits, provision of vases, closing dates for entries, etc.
- Allow yourself plenty of time when staging exhibits.

#### Flowers

- Blooms are best cut in the early morning, put straight into a bucket of deep water in a cool place and, if possible, cut at least 12 hours before they are intended for exhibition.
- Always try to show a fully developed flower, remembering it is better to show one that has not quite reached its best, rather than one which has just passed its best, is beginning to fade, and shows the centre disk.
- Select blooms for freshness and uniformity, not only in size but also in colour.
- Practise staging at home, try setting up five blooms in a vase with three blooms at the back fairly high up, and the two at the front with slightly shorter stems, try to aim at a well-balanced effect overall, and with the blooms set slightly apart.
- Some flowers are not good at taking up water when cut, and it is advisable to crush or scrape the ends of all 'woody' stems so that a good supply of water is assured.
- If foliage is attached it should be lower than the blooms. Packing (paper, oasis or moss) may be used but must not show above the rim of the vase.

#### Vegetables (also see table on P24)

- One cultivar per plate.
- Vegetables should be clean, fresh, tender and without blemish or coarseness. Root vegetables should be exhibited with about 3" of top.
- They should be uniform in size, form and colour.
- Size is meritorious if accompanied by quality (but only in those circumstances) as the production of large specimens of good quality requires more skill than the production of small specimens.
- Asparagus should have long, straight, thick, plump, bright stems with wellclosed scales.
- Beans Long, straight, fresh, plump, brittle pods, with little outward sign of seeds, with about 1" of stem.
- Beetroot Of the long type, evenly tapered; of the globe type, spherical with small taproots.
- Brussels Sprouts Fresh, solid, tightly closed sprouts.
- Cabbages Medium sized, shapely, fresh, tender hearts, with surrounding leaves perfect.
- Carrots Roots of one variety, medium size, tender, good shape, and free from side roots, skins and colour clear and bright, without pest damage.

- Courgettes Well matched fruits, length between 4" and 6", preferably with flower attached.
- Cucumbers Fresh, young, green, tender, straight fruits, with short necks and noses, and with flowers still adhering.
- Leeks Solid, thick, even, well blanched, with clean, spotless skins and no tendency to bulbing. Foliage (flags) clean and no sign of damage.
- Marrows Young, tender, shapely fruits of any colour but well matched. Not more than 15" length or, if round, 22" circumference.
- Onions Large, firm, thin necked bulbs, necks tied with raffia. At Autumn Shows the bulbs must be well ripened.
- Peas for shelling Large, fresh pods of a deep green, with bloom intact, free from rust, and well filled with tender seeds.
- Potatoes Good shape, medium-sized, clean, clear skinned tubers, eyes few and shallow.
- Standard Tomatoes Medium-sized, round, ripe but firm, richly coloured fruits, with calyces attached. Cherry tomatoes should be under 1 inch diameter.
- Shallots Round, solid, well-ripened bulbs, with thin necks. Shallots for pickling should not exceed 30mm but for other purposes large uniform bulbs are preferred.

Fruit (also see table on P25)

- One cultivar per plate.
- Dessert apples should be about 2<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" in diameter but a slightly larger size is permitted for varieties like Charles Ross. For all other fruits, the larger the size, consistent with quality and condition, the better.
- All fruits except apples and pears should be ripe. Apples and pears need not be. None may be over-ripe.
- Fruit must be free from blemish. Stalks must not be broken or missing, and no part of the spur system should be exhibited with the stalk.
- No scab or other disease or insect damage should be present nor should fruit be bruised by weather or carelessness. Fruit should not be polished but all the natural bloom should be preserved.
- Each dish should exhibit a dish of perfect fruits of one variety. Each fruit a replica of the others in size, shape, colour, etc. The fruits should be arranged to the best advantage. Apples should be shown with the eye uppermost.
- Don't put in 'the big one'. It will certainly spoil an otherwise good dish.

#### Homecraft

• Preserves Classes **44**- **46** (Spring Show) and **64** and **66** (Autumn Show) Jars must be of a plain design with no patterns or brand markings. **Do not** reuse a manufacturer's lid. New lids can be obtained at Garson's Farm, Esher or Lakeland. Entries should be labelled with type eg. Seville Orange, Raspberry etc and date made (day, month and year) Chutneys, pickles and relish should have been made at least 2 months in advance of entry. Fill jars completely. Covers for preserves and pickles should be as follows.

- Jams, jellies and marmalade can be covered with either a wax disc and cellophane or a twist off lid.
- Lemon curd should be covered with a wax disc and cellophane.
- Chutney, pickles and relish should be covered with a twist off metal lid which must be plastic lined.
- All exhibits including plate should be put in a plastic bag. These are available from the show secretary's table.
- Clothing and craft items should be exhibited new and unused.
- Items in this section must be the sole work of the exhibitor and not previously shown at an EGS show.

#### **Flower Arrangement**

#### 1. Preparation

- Research and plan your design well in advance; making an outline sketch is helpful.
- Obtain and condition your plant material at least one day ahead of the show. The plant material should be in perfect condition i.e. no wilted/damaged leaves.
- If using floral foam, soak the foam by placing on top of a bowl of water and remove as soon as it has sunk below the water level. Fit securely into container.
- Use container(s) appropriate to and in proportion to the overall design.
- When staging an exhibit, ensure your display area is left dry, clean and tidy: a waterproof sheet and a towel are useful.

#### 2. <u>Design</u>

- Select colours and plant materials that enhance your planned design and interpret the class title.
- If using an accessory, make sure it is in scale with other components. It should contribute to the interpretation of the class title without being eye-catching.
- Use only natural plant material no artificial flowers or foliage.
- Create depth and interest by placing larger and more dominant plant material nearer to the centre of the design.
- Use a variety of shapes and textures to achieve more interesting exhibits.
- Aim to create an exhibit which incorporates the principles of design these are:

balance, proportion, scale, rhythm, contrast, dominance and harmony.

#### 3. Presentation

- Unless used decoratively, ensure that mechanics (wires, foam etc) are hidden.
- Avoid over-filling or under-filling the specified space allowed.
- If a class states 'title to be displayed', write the title on something appropriate to the design.
- Be aware that judges look for artistic merit, interpretation, practical merit, harmony and creativity/originality.

- Read Show Regulation No. 16 and note particularly the three reasons for disqualification of an entry.
- Be aware that an exhibit (Still Life being an exception) will lose marks if plant material does not predominate.
- Finally, check that your exhibit conforms to ALL the requirements of the Show Schedule.

#### Important Note – Daffodil Classes

The RHS classification for daffodils (narcissi) is used in the Schedule - There is no distinction between 'daffodils' and 'narcissi'. All single-stemmed blooms are put in Divisions depending mainly on relative sizes of the outer ring of petals (perianth) and the trumpet or cup. There are also separate Divisions for double blooms, cluster blooms, etc. The diagrams below show the main Divisions most likely to be in flower during Spring Show time and are included for reference and ease of classification.



DIVISION 1 TRUMPET DAFFODIL CULTIVARS One flower to a stem; corona ("trumpet") as long as, or longer than the perianth segments ("petals")



**DIVISION 2 LARGE-CUPPED DAFFODIL CULTIVARS** One flower to a stem; corona ("cup") more than one third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments ("petals")



DIVISION 4 DOUBLE DAFFODIL CULTIVARS One or more flowers to a stem, with doubling of the perianth segments or the corona or both.



#### DIVISION 6 CYCLAMINEUS DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

Characteristics of N. cyclamineus clearly evident: one flower to a stem; perianth segments significantly reflexed; flower at an acute angle to the stem, with a very short pedicel ("neck")

Note: Narcissi/daffodil foliage may be included in classes 1 to 15.

- 15 One container of growing daffodils (any division)

#### **SECTION 2 (BULBS and FLOWERS)**

- 16 Cut blooms grown from any bulb, corm, tuber or rhizome, one or more kind, 5 stems, (excluding daffodils)
- 17 One stem cut Hyacinth (no foliage)
- 18 One pot flowering Hyacinths, 3 stems, any size pot
- 19 One flowering Cyclamen, any size pot
- 20 Five single Hellebore flowers floated in shallow dish (not more than 8" diameter)
- 21 Five double Hellebore flowers floated in shallow dish (not more than 8" diameter)
- 22 Three Camellia flowers floated in shallow dish (not more than 10" diameter)
- 23 One vase of flowering shrubs in bloom, 1 or more kinds, 3 stems
- 24 One vase any spring flower not included in classes 1 to 18, 1 kind, 5 stems (excluding shrubs)
- 25 One vase of mixed garden flowers, arrangement for frontal effect, not to exceed 15" width (excluding shrubs)
- 26 Spring garden flowers mixed, 4 kinds, 10 stems (excluding daffodils and shrubs)
- 27 One vase of foliage, no more than 4 kinds
- 28 One flowering Polyanthus (pot not to exceed 5<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" diameter)
- 29 One flowering Primula (pot not to exceed 51/2" diameter)
- 30 One flowering pot plant (pot not to exceed 9"diameter), any type other than those in classes 19, 28 or 29
- 31 One foliage pot plant, any size pot

- 32 One container mixed bulbs and/or plants 33 Pansies or Violas six blooms, 1 or more kinds, shown on a board or card not exceeding 9" x 12"
- 34 Rhubarb, three sticks (sic)

- Advanced classes are restricted to members of The Epsom Garden Society who have achieved at least six 1st prizes at Intermediate level.
- Intermediate classes are restricted to members who have achieved at least four 1st prizes at Novice level.
- Novice classes are restricted to members who have not yet won at least four 1st prizes in that class. Juniors may have the option to enter this class if desired.
- Once a member qualifies for a higher class, that member may move up to the next level..
- Open classes are open to members of the Society at any level of expertise.

- 10 Sweet Peas, two vases, distinct cultivar in each, six stems in each. Sweet Pea foliage allowed
- 11 Sweet Peas, vase of six mixed stems. Sweet Pea foliage allowed
- 12 Clematis 3 stems, 1 vase, 1 or more cultivars
- 13 Hardy Herbaceous Flowers (excluding shrubs), one vase, three kinds, 5 stems. Overall table space not to exceed 18" square
- 14 Hardy Dianthus, six stems, one or more kinds, one vase (excluding Sweet Williams)

#### **Recipes**

#### SAUSAGE ROLL

250g Pastry Note: if bought pastry is used this must be noted on entry

250g Sausagemeat
1 teaspoon mixed herbs
1 teaspoon tomato puree
Salt & Pepper
Flour for dusting
A little milk
1 egg beaten

#### Method:

- Combine sausagemeat, herbs, tomato puree and seasoning in a bowl.
- Roll out pastry on a floured surface into a rectangle measuring 40 x 20 cms. Cut into two strips.
- Divide sausagemeat into two, dust with flour and form into rolls the length of the pastry.
- Lay a sausagemeat roll on each pastry strip.
- Brush the pastry edges with a little milk, fold pastry over and press long sides firmly together, crimping edges.
- Brush pastry with beaten egg, then cut each roll into two.
- Place on a greased baking sheet and bake at 220C (GM7) for 15 minutes.
- Reduce heat to 180C (GM4) and cook for a further 15 minutes.

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
