DID YOU KNOW?

One of the great English poets, William Wordsworth was born at Cockermouth, Cumberland on 7th April 1770 and that in 1843 at the grand age of 74 he was appointed Poet Laureate. The title "Poet Laureate" comes from the laurels with which the ancient Greeks traditionally crowned their most celebrated poets.

On the same date as our Show Spring Show this year, Zebra Crossings were first introduced in 1949 (being the same year your Chairman was born!) by the then Parliamentary secretary to the Ministry of Transport, James Callaghan, who came up with "zebra" as a name for the crossing as he thought it would be easily understood and remembered, particularly by children. The flashing beacons were added some four years later in 1953.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH BANANA GINGER PARKIN Makes 12 squares. Store in a covered container for up to two months

INGREDIENTS

200g /7oz plain flour 2 tsp bicarbonate of soda 2 tsp ground ginger 150g /5oz oatmeal 4 tbs dark muscovado sugar 75g / 3oz margarine 5 oz golden syrup 3 ripe bananas mashed 75 /3oz icing sugar Stem ginger to decorate

METHOD

Pre-heat oven to 160c/Gas 3 Grease and line an 18x28cm / 7"x11" cake tin

Sift togther the flour, bicarbonate of soda and ginger, then stir in the oatmeal. Melt the sugar, margarine and syrup into the flour mixture. Beat in the egg and mashed bananas.

Spoon into the tin and bake for about 1 hour, or until firm to the touch. Allow to cool in the tin and then turn out and cut into even-sized squares.

Sift the icing sugar into a bowl and stir in just enough water to make a smooth, runny icing. Drizzle over each square an ttop with pieces of stem ginger. **ENJOY!**

Next month on **May 2nd** we welcome Roger Hance, finally making it to the Club after having to cancel his talk and presentation in 2020 due to the pandemic. He will be telling us all about "Wild flowers of the British Countryside" which should be both informative and interesting.
