Friends of Loxley Cemetery introduction from our Chair, Mike Ford

Over the last twenty years many people complained about the state of what was once a most beautiful and picturesque part of the Loxley Valley and the final resting place of a good number of Sheffield people. Loxley Chapel and Cemetery date back to the late 18th Century and is still open for burials in existing plots. The voluntary group, 'Friends of Loxley Cemetery' was formed to save and regenerate the abandoned, overgrown, and sadly inaccessible cemetery.

Neglected cemetery heartache for visitors

Following our formation in the autumn of 2019, the Friends (FoLC), like the rest of the country (and world), had a difficult period. Our hopes and plans to launch a series of Action Days from Spring 2020 had to be abandoned due to the Covid 19 pandemic & the restrictions that were introduced over the year. Another impact of the pandemic was that the Committee were unable to meet and things looked bleak. However, matters were 'kick-started' by one of our members who asked if he could make a start in the Spring of 2021 as part of his desire to keep fit. Soon, other volunteers joined him, working on site on a weekly basis. Finally, when the Management Committee were allowed to meet we agreed to support and manage official Action Days from the 3 August 2021. The rest is as they say history - we are making great strides. Dismay over 'blocked' graves

Sheffield Great Flood of 1864

For instance, at least 22 victims of the Sheffield Great Flood of 1864 are buried at Loxley, including several families:

From Malin Bridge,

- 7 members of the Armitage family
- 3 members of the Hudson family
- 4 members of the Bates family
- 4 members of the Chapman family of Little Matlock
- and 2 Dentons of Old Wheel



War Commission Graves

Loxley Cemetery also holds a number of War Graves Commission graves:

3 from WWI and 12 from WWII, including an Air Raid Warden killed in the Blitz.
