A snapshot of the Wood family as they were on 31 March 1901, taken from the Census of that year.

John Wood was 43 and head of his household; he was born in Bradfield in 1857/8 and was working as a Carter. He lived with his wife, Hannah, aged 44, who had also been born in Bradfield in 1857. At this time the Census states that they were living in the Registration District of Wortley. They had seven children living with them, three boys and four girls – John Thomas Wood aged 19, Charlotte Wood aged 18, Percy Wood aged 15, Kate Wood aged 13, Ethel Wood aged 7, Cyril Wood aged 4 and Laura Wood who was 1 year old. They were all born in Ecclesfield, Yorkshire (West Riding) of England.

From the Loxley Congregational Chapel Burial Register Dorcas Wood, their daughter aged 6, was buried on 14 September 1907. She had been baptised at Wadsley Church on 30 October 1901. Frank Wood, their son aged 17 months, was buried on 5 November 1899, so neither were included on the Census of 1901.
