MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR MICK DREWRY

It is around now that I would be writing my Chair's Report for our first Annual General Meeting, which was due in September.

Because of the pandemic and Government restrictions we won't be having an AGM any time soon so I will use this opportunity of a contribution *'From the Chair'* in this, our first newsletter, to update you on what the Friends of Loxley Cemetery have achieved during these challenging times.

The work of the Management Committee is going on in the background despite little in the way of visible activities, due to the circumstances

It was in September 2019 that interested parties called a public meeting at the Wisewood Inn with a view to setting up a 'Friends' group following meetings with the owner, Mr. Ali, and an agreement granting permission for a Friends group to work on the site.

This breakthrough, something never achieved with the previous owners, gave the green light for people to come together and work for the improvements we all want to see.

A Constitution was agreed and a Management Committee of volunteers was appointed to set the ball rolling. Over this first year the Committee have established firm foundations.

Our finances are diligently looked after by our Treasurer, Mike Ford, who has also made other significant contributions to the Group, such as sourcing public liability Insurance for which Mr. Ali agreed to cover the cost.

INDIAN MUTINY VETERAN INTERRED.

SALUTED BY OLD COMRADES.

Yesterday the grave closed over the remains of one of the small band of Indian Mutiny Veterans in Sheffield, Mr. England Higgins, who passed away at his residence at 42, Hawthorn road, Hillsbro', on Saturday at the age of 81. The funeral took place at Loxley chapel.

Mr. and Mrs. W. Higgins and Miss Higgins were the chief mourners, and besides a number of other relatives and friends, the following members of the Sheffield and Hallamshire Vetdrans Association accompanied their dead comrade to his last rest, namely:--Messrs. J. C. Bye, R.M., hon. secretary; G. S. Grayson, hon. assistant secretary; R. Sheffield, 13th Hussars; P. Kelly, 5th Foot; J. Jackson, 32nd Foot; G. Birks, 53rd. Foot; T. Maskery, 7th Hussars; A. Hudson, Rifle Brigade; and J. Taylor, 60th Rifles.

On arrival at Loxley the coffin, which was draped with the Union Jack, was proceeded to the chapel by the veterans; and after an impressive service, conducted by the Rev. A. McKittrick of the Hillsbro' Gospel Mission, it was bourne to the grave between two lines of old soldiers, who saluted the honoured remains. Our Secretary, Linda Brownlow, has done a professional job in the recording of the work of the Management Committee (minutes of meetings, calling notices, agendas, etc) and has also fulfilled the role of Membership Secretary, establishing a database of all paid-up members.

There has been a proposal that the role of Membership Secretary becomes a separate job so it is likely that this change will be made soon.

Other aspects of the FoLC's work have also found their champions. Trisha Childs has taken on the role of Publicity Officer also establishing a central 'Cloud' information base where the Committee can upload photos, articles, documents, etc. for use in publicity, like this newsletter. Trisha was also responsible for the display stand at the Sheffield Heritage Fair last January; our first public event that was a great success, raising funds, recruiting members and putting the FoLC on the local history circuit.

Every member of the Committee contributed to the two-day event and of course our very own Ron Clayton co-organized the event itself.

The SHF event certainly helped raise our profile and marked a pivotal moment that would, under normal circumstances, have seen the launch of a programme of activity days at the cemetery that would have by now shown great improvements. The first 'Action Day' was arranged for early March but had to be cancelled at the eleventh hour. Then came the lockdown.

Jane Pratt has acted as community ambassador for the Group having meetings with Loxley Primary School. Lynda Barnett and Sue Fisher complete the list of members of the Management Committee, all of whom have contributed immensely to the establishment of a group that will achieve its aims and objectives once circumstances allow.

I thank each and every one of them for their contributions.

With the passing of those years the task now in hand is far greater than what it would have been had the owners the sense and forethought to support my mother and her cohorts.

However, the knowledge of what has gone before, and my personal connection, drives my motivation to succeed in achieving their aims and objectives, which are now ours.
