# Petworth House and Park Pat Herod

Wednesday 6th July 09:30 at Osterley Park or opposite Osterley Underground Cost £20

Petworth has been a family home for 800 years. The estate was a royal gift from the widow of Henry I to her brother Jocelin de Louvain who married into the renowned Percy family.

It was intended for occasional use only but in the late 1500's it became their permanent home after Elizabeth 1st grew suspicious of their allegiance to Mary, Queen of Scots and confined the family to the south of England. The Percys' "house arrest" started the expansion of the medieval building but it was another 100 years before it was completely transformed.

The state rooms and North Gallery house the finest collection of art and sculpture in the National Trust and outdoors is a woodland pleasure ground and a 700 acre deer park landscaped by Capability Brown with views of the South Downs National Park.

Petworth was given to the national Trust in 1947 in the face of heavy death duties. The current Lord and lady Egremont continue to live in part of the house. The servants hall has a coffee shop serving coffee and treats; the Audit Room serves light lunches and afternoon teas with homemade cakes.

#### **SPIRIT OF PLACE - OSTERLEY** Margaret Friday

For this one-hundredth issue of the Friends Newsletter we are featuring two views intended to inspire the spirit of the main buildings at Osterley as photographed by John Stacey. Other smaller scenes of Osterley are spread around the newsletter. The cover displays a view of the house from the Middle Lake with a tree framing the aspect. We see Adam's grand entrance to the house with the colonnade and flight of steps just as can be seen at Palladio's Villa Rotunda at Vicenza. Our picture reveals just one of the four towers thought to have been a part of the original Elizabethan house built by Sir Thomas Gresham. Some of the designs for it may have been made by Hendrik Van Passchen of Antwerp who designed the Royal Exchange for Gresham and also worked for the Cecil and Bacon families in England. Gresham's daughter Anne married Nathaniel Bacon.

A drawing at Syon from Moses Glover's survey of Isleworth shows a house at Osterley with seven towers. In Norden's words Gresham built "a fair and stately mansion beseeming a prince". There is a drawing of the south front of the house by Robert Adam when hired by Francis Child showing features like the original front door which now graces the entrance to the stables. Once Adam began to work dramatic changes took place. Adam removed almost all of the East side of the house leaving just the towers and a small room making way for the grand entrance staircase and the colonnade. The room along the east front had originally contained the Fairfax library purchased by the third Francis Child. It included at least 10 Caxton's! It was later housed in the new library on the north side of the house with views of the semi-circular garden house by Robert Adam and the old Stable Block. Richard Wheeler, National Trust Historic Garden historian, believes that Robert Adam designed not just the house but also the gardens at Osterley. He says Adam planned the house to be viewed at a 45 degree angle from the extensive grounds as we see in the early paintings by Devis. Copies of these paintings are in the South Corridor.

The restoration of the almost circular laurel walk would allow visitors to view



the house from the park seeing it as a three dimensional building rather than the flat single sided look we often see today. Take a walk along the path at the back of the great meadow also known as the bluebell walk to see the house as Adam wished it to be viewed.

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# STABLE BLOCK WITH CLOCK TOWER AND<br/>MARIGOLDSMargaret Friday

Our central picture by John Stacey displays several important parts of Osterley. First, the Stable Block is the oldest building on site constructed by Sir Thomas Gresham and changed to be made even grander for the visit of Elizabeth I in 1573. Giles Worsley in his article on the Osterley Stables in Aspects of Osterley, says Osterley stables "stands out among its peers as architecturally impressive stables are by no means common in Elizabethan houses." He goes on to say that " Osterley is after all the sort of house that sets trends rather than following them". Above the stables is the impressive turret clock another unusual exception. The clock movement is signed on the snail wheel 1714 RI Street London. It is described as a fine and interesting 8 day, English, hour striking turret clock. Richard Street was an important London clock maker becoming a Warden of the Worshipful Company of Clockmakers in 1714 just after completing the only turret clock he made at Osterley Park. By this time he had made clocks for Sir Isaac Newton and the Old Royal Naval Observatory at Greenwich. Street worked in Fleet Street so was likely to have been known by Francis Child, founder of Child's Bank at the sign of the marigold. Francis Child died in 1713 but may have commissioned the clock as may his son Robert who inherited Osterley on his fathers' death. Just two years later Richard Street took on the care of the Great Clock in St. Paul's Cathedral. As all the city companies set the timepieces from the chimes and clock faces of St. Paul's this was an exceedingly important job. Our clock originally had clock faces on two sides so it could be viewed from the grounds or the house or the back of the stable block or the garden where this picture was taken.

This picture displays fine growing marigolds which are so much a part of the Osterley story. Blanchard and Child ran their goldsmithing business at the sign of the marigold becoming - when street numbers

were introduced - 1 Fleet Street! Marigold becoming are found throughout the interior of Osterley beginning with the giant marigolds under the portico and continuing in ceilings, furniture, mirrors and even the door handles in the house. #### London Visits Margaret Friday PARKSTEAD HOUSE

Holybourne Avenue, Roehampton SW15 4JD Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup>July Price £10 (Banqueting House trip now in October) The House was designed in the 1760s for

William, Earl of Bessborough by William Chambers. This house is not usually open to the public but we will have a private tour which may help us to get a better idea the 18th century designs at Osterley. There are five rooms in the house which were part of Chambers' plan, the dining room, drawing room, hall, library and bedroom and they have many original features.

The entrance overlooking the park bears a close resemblance to the entrance overlooking the great meadow at Osterley.

Chambers involvement at Osterley continues to be questioned today at Osterley. The fireplaces in the Long Gallery are thought to be by Chambers. Roehampton is on the 72 bus route from Hammersmith. **Meet at the house at 1:15 for our 1:30 tour.** 



#### Stoneleigh Abbey Margaret Friday Tuesday 16th August 09:30 at Osterley Park or opposite Osterley Underground Cost £30

Today we visit Stoneleigh Abbey in Warwickshire for the first time. It was the family home of Margaret, Countess of Jersey. She grew up at Stoneleigh Abbey - her parents were William Henry Leigh and Caroline Grosvenor. In 1848 they entertained Queen Victoria and Prince Albert for two days at Stoneleigh. A year later their daughter Margaret was born. In 1872 she married the 7th Earl of Jersey. So much of the decoration at Osterley is reflected at Stoneleigh that it is easy to see why Osterley became Margaret's favourite and the party house where she entertained her friends. Stoneleigh Abbey suffered a fire in 1960 but most of the furniture was rescued by family and staff. The house and Repton landscape have been fully restored. The house is now owned by a private trust so not a National Trust house. Our guide knows we are particularly interested in Margaret, Countess of Jersey. Tea and cakes at £2.50 can be prebooked , no other on site catering.
