Blenheim Palace is a monumental country house in Woodstock, Oxfordshire, England. The palace is notable as the birthplace and ancestral home of Sir Winston Churchill. It is the principal residence of the Dukes of Marlborough, and the only non-royal, non-episcopal country house in England to hold the title of palace. The palace, one of England's largest houses, was built between 1705 and 1722, and designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1987. Designed in the rare, and short-lived, English Baroque style, architectural appreciation of the palace is as divided today as it was in the 1720s. It is unique in its combined use as a family home, mausoleum and national monument.

Kenilworth Castle and Elizabethan Garden 28th May 2020 9am (£32)



From medieval fortress to Elizabethan palace, Kenilworth Castle has been at the centre of England's affairs for much of its 900 year history. Today, you can scale the heights of the tower built to woo Queen Elizabeth I and marvel at the mighty Norman keep. Explore the exhibition in the Gatehouse, and imagine the majesty of the Great Hall playing host to medieval monarchs and early Tudor kings.

Wilton House 17th June 2020 9am (£36)

Wilton House is an English country house at Wilton near Salisbury in Wiltshire. It has been the country seat of the Earls of Pembroke for over 400 years. As a home to the 18th Earl and Countess of Pembroke, it provides a fascinating insight into British history. The first recorded building on the site of Wilton House was a priory founded by King Egbert c.871. Through the munificence of King Alfred, the priory was granted lands and manors until it became wealthy and powerful.

#### Burgh House New End Square, NW3 1LT 26th March 2020 2pm (£5)

A Queen Anne house built in brick by a rich man to show off his wealth. The Camden Art and Local History Museum is

here and at the moment two John Constable portraits of a local Dr. Evans and his daughter are on display. Our guide will tell us about the history collection as well as the house. Rudyard Kipling's daughter lived here in the 1930s and his last visit was to see her here in Hampstead. Our tour begins at **2pm** but the house is open from noon if you would like to have lunch in the cafe first. There are gardens still surrounding the house. The garden terrace is by Gertrude Jekyll. The local community saved this house from demolition and it re-opened, fully restored in 2006. A **£5** contribution is requested for this visit.



Watermen and Lightermen Hall 16 - 18 St Mary at Hill, EC3R 8EF

> 11th May 2020 1.45pm (£18)

Meet at the Hall at **1.45pm** for a 2pm tour led by Carol, the Assistant Clerk. She, clad in her official gown, will tell us the story of the fine eighteenth century building and the Watermen and Lightermen who still train here today as part of The Maritime and Coast Guard Agency. They were first mentioned in 1514. This is not a livery company of the city but it was essential in providing transport for city for centuries so has become a respected part of the City of London. Our tour will be followed by tea in the hall. Afterwards we may visit the unusual church around the corner which has two names. The price is **£18**.

#### **Carlo Dolci** Featured artist at Osterley

In this newsletter we review the painting of Saint Agatha by Carlo Dolci originally purchased by Robert Child (1674-1721) and hung in the Lincoln's Inn House until moved to Osterley by Robert Child, (1739-1782) his nephew in the 1760s and displayed in the Breakfast Room. It was sold off but repurchased via Jim Tickle's generous donation in his will which left his assets to the National Trust at Osterley. The Art Fund also helped in the purchase at auction in 2018. The painting is now on display in the Entrance Hall. The first Robert Child in this story was the son of Francis Child (1642-1713). Sir Francis was the goldsmith founder of Child's Bank and Lord Mayor of London in 1698.

We believe it was Francis who purchased the two Rubens portraits of the Duke of Buckingham when he was in Europe working on the treaty of Ryswick in 1697. The Van Dyke Charles I on horseback featured along with the Rubens Duke of Buckingham on Horseback on the staircase at Lincoln's Inn. They were hanging at either end of the Long Gallery at Osterley. The Apotheosis of the Duke of Buckingham was on the ceiling above the grand staircase created by Adam to show off the Rubens. These three paintings were lost in a fire in Jersey in 1950. A modern copy of Apotheosis of the Duke of Buckingham adorns the ceiling at Osterley today. We believe Robert

Child I had been educated at Westminster College and Oxford University. He travelled around Europe as did every aristocratic young man in order to finish his education. He was of course, not an aristocrat as his wealth came through his father being "in trade". Robert had his portrait painted by the influential Swedish artist Michael Dahl (1656- 1743) posed in front of the Coliseum in 1712. We show a black and white print as the original was also destroyed in the Jersey fire.



Robert was an active member of The Society of the Virtuosi of St. Luke, a dining club whose members were artists, collectors and wealthy connoisseurs with an interest in the arts. Michael Dahl, who settled in England in 1688, was also a member. Child purchased sculptures in Europe which he later sold to Dahl.

We believe that Robert Child may have purchased the Dolci in 1705 when the large collection of paintings owned by Florentine collector Cavaliere Carlo Lorenzo Ughi were being sold. Some of these were acquired by Consul Smith the merchant-patron who introduced many British collectors to Carlo Dolci, Sebastiano Ricci and Rosalba Carriera. Smith left his collection to King George III. The baroque subject matter, designed to inspire a return to Catholicism after the Reformation and the rise of Protestantism was unlikely to have been of interest to Robert Child but according to Charles McCorquordale in his book *The Baroque Artists of Italy* "Carlo Dolci was the most famous Florentine artist of his day." This idea alone would have put his paintings at the top of Child's collection list.

Carlo Dolci (1616-1686) was a very religious man. John Chu author of *Money and Martyrdom* reveals he was known as Carlino because of his small stature and retiring manner. He was inspired by Fra Angelico - the Dominican who painted scenes on the walls of the San Marco convent in Florence. Dolci's vision of purity is evident in his style of precise painting. Germain Bazin in *Baroque and Rococo Art* remarked that Carlo "took refuge in archaism that appeared to disregard the march of time." McCorquordale regards his work as "the exact antithesis of baroque extravagance in his technique." He also notes that his "paranoid concern with detail made him a portraitist of distinction...to include still life detail of great beauty in many of his works." See the portrait of Sir Thomas Baines, an English collector painted by Dolci from 1665.

Saint Agatha lived in Sicily in the time of the Emperor Decius (249-251AD) when Christianity was banned. Agatha had made a vow of chastity but the governor wished to marry her. When she continued to refuse him she was arrested for being a Christian and placed in a brothel where she was raped and tortured. Her breasts were removed with pincers. The painting shows her trying to staunch the flow of blood just as Saint Peter comes to her aid and heals her. The look on her tear-stained face shows the wonder of her healing and the grace with which she awaits her execution. Sir Robert certainly purchased her as Saint Agatha but by 1782 when Robert, his nephew, died she was listed in the inventory as Saint Veronica. Veronica had seen Christ carrying the cross and saw blood running down his face from the crown of thorns. She took the fine scarf she was wearing and used it to soak up the blood from Christ's brow. This cloth became a holy relic, so paintings of Saint Veronica were also popular. Perhaps Robert Child II preferred this title as he had a wife and a young daughter who might be troubled by the gruesome details surrounding Saint Agatha's sainthood. The Anglican Church does recognise Agatha as a Saint.

Another famous pair of paintings by Dolci are David with the head of Goliath and Salome with the head of John the Baptist. Both of these were painted for the Florentine Rinuccini family. The David was regarded as a masterpiece of the time.

Filippo Baldinucci, friend and biographer of Carlino says that the purity of his soul was reflected in the clarity of his colours and the meticulousness of his technique. To quote his spiritual advisor, "should you want to see Carlino's conscience - delicate, accurate and diligent as it was - you need only observe the works from his brush."

Judith Hook in her book *The Baroque in England* tells us that collectors were considered to be members of the English aristocracy.

"There was, however, another small group of men who were just as lavish in their patronage: parvenus, self-made men who had made good either in trade, civil service or profits of war and were anxious to demonstrate that they could employ their wealth to create a luxurious environment to rival their social superiors." The Child family could certainly be counted amongst their number. We have Robert Child's handwritten list of the artists who had painted the pictures he owned.

Bainbrigg Buckeridge dedicated his translation of Roger de Piles' Art of Painting to Sir Robert Child

in 1706 stating that "no gentleman in England" has a collection "in greater Perfection than yourself, who possess something of several of the best Masters and every Day in your own House (the Ornament of the finest square in Europe) you behold some of the wonders that the hands of Veronese, Guido, Poussin, Maratt, and other excellent artists have produced." Have a closer look at our Carlino Dolci for the painting is indeed so fine that you cannot see a single brush stroke.

Sir Robert Child was exceptional in that he invited visitors to the house in Lincoln's Inn to view his fine and growing collection of painting and sculpture and fine pieces of furniture and porcelain through carefully acquiring pieces which he loved including the pristine Saint Agatha (see front cover image).
