Chairman's Letter

Ian Conacher

I write these notes in early May, after a cold damp April. The hopes of a mild Winter leading to an early Spring, raised by the early showing of snowdrops and daffodils, have not been borne out by the return to cold conditions over the past few weeks.

However, one benefit of the wet Spring has been the rise in the level of the garden lake, which suffered badly during the last year's hot dry Summer. The water level was, at my last visit, still some few inches below the overflow; let us hope that this year we shall have a pattern of rainfall which will maintain levels through the Summer.

Since re-opening on 1st April, the House has been busy, particularly at weekends, when the public have been moved to take cover from the bleak April showers and the rough winds which "shook the darling buds of May" over the Spring Bank Holiday. Coming back to the House afresh after the winter break, the changes made by the Trust in re-decoration and conservation over the past few years are seen as a whole. In particular, the Long Gallery, with its new paint scheme, new pictures, and newly upholstered chairs and settees, contrasts markedly with its rather shabby appearance in the early '90s..

One of the joys of the new season for volunteers at the property is meeting one's colleagues after the break, and also coming again in contact with visitors. The social benefits of volunteering are immeasurable; it gives one an impetus to get "out of the rut", to make new friends, and meet stimulating and rewarding challenges.

One problem is that as it is now seven years since the Trust first called for volunteers at Osterley, a proportion of the original team are no longer able to give their time and energies to serve at the Property. More help is urgently needed so that the remaining "willing horses" are not unmercifully flogged!

I heartily commend to you the joys of Volunteering, either as "Room Stewards" or as "Mobility Volunteers", driving the Shuttle Buggy or assisting with the loan of Battery Cars. Those with green fingers may wish to consider joining the teams growing flowers in the Walled Garden and arranging these for the displays in the House, which draw many compliments from visitors - contact Sally Rogers at the House if you wish to learn more!

1997-8 - A Year of Consolidation.

The "Friends" financial year ended on 31st March with a substantial balance carried over for the new season. After the expenditure of £2,000 for the purchase of the

stands for the jars in the Long Gallery at the end of 1996-7, no further large targets were identified as needing our finance. Some smaller items, such as the sponsorship of the Welcome and Education leaflets, were discussed and approved during the year, and the bills for these have been settled in the last few weeks. The "A" board for the Battery car operation has been repainted at the "Friends" cost with revised wording.

Also agreed at the end of the year were the provision of tables dedicated to conservation work in the House, and the purchase of picnic tables to be placed adjacent to the new Car Park. These are being well used by visitors who wish to picnic close to their cars before visiting the House.

Living in the Caribbean

Last November I took 6 months off from my job at Osterley Park as Visitor Services to spend the winter living and working in St. Maarten, a small island in the Caribbean, north of Antigua. I had some friends over there already; my best friend and her family had been sailing round the Caribbean for the past six years. They spent the winters in St. Maarten working. When the hurricane season came in June they sailed south to islands like Grenada and Tobago and relaxed for the summer. There was a whole sailing community made up of yachts from all over the world who would do the same thing. So when I arrived in November, many of the boats were just arriving back from the South.

The sailing community over there was very close, very friendly and everyone knew each other. I found this quite strange at first, having lived in London where you don't even know your neighbours. If a stranger walked into the bar then everyone there wanted to know who they were. Consequently, it did not take me long to meet people and make friends. The bar was "The Soggy Dollar". It was the main meeting point of the area, not only because sailors like a drink but because it was also right next to the dingy dock, so you had to go through it to get home. Of course this usually meant that you got back home later than you planned. In fact it was almost impossible to avoid it. There was always someone you knew there.

I lived with some friends on a 50-foot yacht that unfortunately had seen better days. It had no electricity, running water or even a toilet. What it did have was lots of rust, a few holes and cockroaches that were getting bigger by the day and refused to die no matter what we tried. It was very basic but it was free, which was great because accommodation over there was really expensive. It had previously been lived on by a couple who had stripped it of everything they could sell and had tried to sink it to cover their tracks. Luckily for us, they chose a spot that was too shallow. When we got it, it was a mess, but with a lot of work we made it into home. It became home to quite a few of us. Because of its size it could sleep about eight, and there were always people coming and going. Living on "Drifting Clouds" was very sociable. With no television we had to entertain ourselves, which meant a lot of barbecues and parties and people stopping by all the time for a chat.

All we had to cook on was a one ring gas stove, so to make life easier we often ate out. The local Caribbean cuisine often involved barbecues of ribs and chicken, although I preferred the fresh fish like snapper, swordfish, tuna and even shark. The only trouble with eating in the local Caribbean restaurants or Rum Shacks was that they were so slow! They think nothing of making you wait an hour for your food; you get it when they are ready to serve you. This is the way of life over there and you come to expect it. It is not just in the restaurants. Things happen when they happen, and sometimes they don't happen at all.

I worked on a 120 foot motor yacht called "Our Toy" - only a multi-millionaire could regard it as a toy. It was work \$15 million, and no expense was spared in its decoration. There was a Renoir in the master bedroom and a Jacuzzi on the top deck. I was paid \$80 a day as a deck hand to help maintain the boat. I worked from 8 to 5, cleaning and scrubbing, sanding and painting. It was hard work, especially in the mid-day sun, but the money was good. The owners would fly down from America once a month to use the boat, the rest of the time it was docked. So I would work for about three weeks and then have a week off.

On our days off we would often travel to other islands near by, like Anguilla, St. Barts and Tintimar. They were a lot less spoilt with fewer tourists. Then we really did feel like we were on holiday, we would go sight seeing, swimming or simply lounging on the beach working on our tans. We would often go snorkelling, which I loved. I was always amazed by the colours of the fish and the coral. I also managed to do quite a lot of sailing while I was there, including taking part in the Heineken Regatta.

Living in the Caribbean was great fun. There was always something to do or see, there were lots of parties and new experiences to be had. It was particularly nice to live in the sun. However, after five months I was ready to come home. Living in paradise is not as easy as you might think. After a while even the sun gets too much, and I longed for the basics in life like a shower and a toilet. I had a great time living in the Caribbean, many are surprised I wanted to come home, but I can honestly say I am glad to be back.

Spring Plant Fair - 17th May.

This was a well attended event, with the stable-yard filled with stalls set up by the "Friends", by Ealing N.T.A., by volunteers from the Region, and by commercial growers.

Unfortunately, possibly because of difficult growing conditions caused by the cold April, donations from members of plants for sale at this event were down on last year. Our thanks are due to those who did provide us with some stock, and to the Estate Gardeners whose contribution combined with members' offerings to make an attractive show.

Thanks to this, a total of £117 was raised during the day - including £40 received for
