






Christmas Carols in the Stableyard at Osterley

CHAIRMAN'S NOTES

Since May, the personal problems to which I referred in the last Newsletter have multiplied. My wife, Andrey, has been in poor health all summer, colminating in a fortnight's stay in the West Middlesex Hospital for tests. Her condition was stabilised to the point where she was discharged at the end of last month, but further investigations are still proceeding in order to determine the root cause of her problems.

Inevitably, this has me ant that I have not been able to devote a great deal of time or hought to the business of the "Friends". I am very grateful for all the practical support given to me by the Committee during the programms of Summer Events, and for all the good wishes to Audrey expressed by Committee Members. "Friends", volunteers, and staff at Osterley.

This situation underlines the need to find more members to come forward to serve onthe Committee and take up some of the load which has been borne for fit too long 'by your Chairman. I am receiving ongoing support from existing Committree Members, which is most welcome. However, two members have tendered their resignations; Anne Drakeford has tesigned due to personnal problems, and Meera Khambadkone is unable to continue due to pressure of work. This leaves us with only seven members against an establishment of ten!



SUMMER EVENTS

The Summer of 2002 saw records for quantity and intensity of rainfall equalled or beaten in many parts of the country, causing much anxiety, if not despair, for the organisers of Open Air events. Fortunately, at Osterley, we have escaped the worst disruption.

The GREAT WESTERN PRESERVATION JAZZ BAND, from their Southall Centre, gave a GOLDEN JUBILEE CONCERT in the Pleasure Grounds



behind the Walled Garden, on the Jubilee Bank Holiday, 4th June. This free concert - sponsored by the "Friends" -was attended by a capacity crowd, so that lateconters were asked to wait for spaces variated by those leaving early! Again, we were lucky with the weather.

One added attraction on the day was the array of rhododendron bushes in flower around the arena - slightly past their best, but still very colourful. The "Friends" have arranged a return visit from this Group for the afternoon of next year's Late Spring Bank Holiday, Monday. 26th May. A small admission charge will be made - but the rhododendrons should be at their best!.

Also in the Pleasure Grounds, **BOLLYWOOD BRASS** gave a lively and energetic performance on 22nd June, which was well attended. Many visitors arrived late, and would have wished the show to go on longer! Again, the rain held off, and the audience were able to enjoy picnicking on the grass.

The **COVENT GARDEN MINUET DANCERS** made a welcome return to Ostericy on June 29th, with the ladies in 18th Century hall gowns and the men in velvet breeches, performing in the countyard of the House. With good weather again, the audience was larger than anticipated, and extra chairs had to be brought in. As usual, there were opportunities for "audience participation", which were enthusiastically taken up by the visitors. This event was again sponsored by the "Friends", and we anticipate a useful profit!

July 14th dawned bright and fair for **OSTERLEY DAY**; from 9 o'clock onwards the front lawn and Stable Yard were througed with exhibitors setting up their stalls. Artists were hanging their works on the railings, from the causeway to the stable block, and various groups were setting up displays and stalls.



The "Friends" had their usual "Tombole" and "Bric-a-Brae" stalls, supplemented by a children's "Treasure Hunt", and a separate stall for books, a large number of which had been denated to the Bric-a-Brae appeal.

Committee members and their families, and members of the "Friends" rallied round to assist the setting up and manning of these stalls, as neither Felicity Bernstein nor Audrey were able to devote as much time and energy to these as in past years.

The stallholders were kept very busy: the "Tombola" was so popular that it sold out before the end of the day. The attraction of "A Prize Every Time" for each £1.00 ticket was enhanced by the weather, which caused punters to enter in the twice of winning a can of soft drink! By the end of the day, the stalls had taken over £700, a very substantial contribution to the "Friends" finds. All of this will in due course be spent on projects for the Trust at Osterley.

The "Friends" provided stewards for many of the summer events, including the EVENING OF INDIAN CLASSICAL MUSIC, held in the Entrance Hall of the House on July 20th. This was well attended, as was the children's Open Air Theatre production of THE RELUCTANT DRAGON on 2nd August, which was again blessed with fine weather.

The big Open Air Event of the season was the showing of the film **GREASE** on August 24th. Good fortune continued on the day, as, although a number of neighbouring areas had torrential rainstorms, these missed Osterley!


A new item this year is that we are paying for the expenditure on seeds, plants and other materials for the Volunteer Gardeners growing flowers for display

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE FRIENDS OF OSTERLEY PARK, HELD ON 15 MAY 2002 AT THE OLD BREWHOUSE, OSTERLEY

Prior to the meeting for business, Barry Williams gave a guided walk around the grounds, as the planned speaker, Carol Reeves, was unable to attend.

There were approximately 60 people present.

The Chairman thanked Barry for providing an interesting and informative tour.

1. APOLOGIES

It was reported that Mrs Bernstein, a hardworking member of the Committee, had recently lost her busbard after a long illness, and the best wishes to Mrs Bernstein of those present was recorded.

2. MINUTES OF THE LAST AGM

The Minutes of the AGM held on 2 May 2001 were proposed, seconded and carried as a true and accurate record.

3. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The Chairman's Report had been distributed with the March 2002 Newsletter. The Chairman highlighted some additional items to that report:

- The Friends are continuing their support of the Welcome leaflet for the House at around £1000 per annum
- The circular bench by the willow tree has been provided by the Friends at a cost of approximately £800.
- The Jazz Concert for the Jubilee Weekend in June is to be sponsored by the Friends.
- The Priends will pay for the cost of repairs to the Courtesy Bus, when these are complete.

- An amount of up to £1000 per armum will be made available for seeds, etc to the Volunteer Gardeners.
- Membership of the Friends remains constant. Final reminders for renewal will be sent out soon. All trips, etc, will be restricted to fully paid-up members of the Friends.
- Dudley Foy died in February 2002. He was a founder member of the Friends, and brought battery cars to Osterley, going on to be the National Trust's national representative for battery cars. In March 2002, his widow planted a tree in his memory in the avenue near the ear park.
- Clive Bernstein, husband of Felicity, recently died. Although he was not a member of the Friends, he gave a great deal of support to Felicity and her work on the Committee. He will be sorely missed.
- The Winter Lectures were a success, yet again.
- Trips and tours are going well, although the lirst trip to Wimpole ran at a loss. The 5 day trip to Norfolk is full.
- The Chairman has arranged some half day trips. The first, in April, to
 Temple led by Doris Sherwood, was well attended, and was an
 excellent trip. The second, on 14 May, to Strawberry Hill, led by
 Anna Chalcroft was equally enjoyable. It was agreed to try to
 continue these trips. The Chairman asked those present to consider
 taking responsibility for the organisation of these.
- The Friends would again be organising bric-a-brac and tombola stalls for Osterley Day a meeting for volunteer helpers would be held shortly.
- The Chairman advised the meeting that all this activity had been achieved at some cost; he was trying to delegate some of the workload. The committee is in need of a variety of skills: writing for the Newsletter, speaker secretary for the Winter Lectures, "Box Office" person, etc, etc. It was agreed that the format for the Newsletter will change to A5, so that the envelope filling will be less time consuming.
- Volunteers are sought for Osterley Day, particularly in light of the
 ongoing illness of Audrey Conacher and the recent bereavement of
 Folicity Bernstein. It is hoped that both ladies will be able to be
 present on the day, but that is not definite.

The Chairman's Report was formally adopted by the meeting.

The accounts had been distributed at the beginning of the meeting. The Treasurer expressed thanks to Harold Rogers for examining the accounts in a speedy and efficient manner. He informed the meeting that the Friends' balance is increasing by around £3000 per annum, and there is a need to spend more!

A question was asked concerning the Bank Charge of £5.00. The Treasurer explained that this fee had been incurred as it had been necessary to transfer money between accounts without giving the required notice period. The accounts were formally adopted. A vote of thanks was voiced to Michael Pfeiffer for his immaculate accounts.

ONE COOD TERNS

I was surprised to see a Tern fishing the Garden Lake during the summer. My more knowledgeable friends tell me that these sea birds are now frequently to be found on the nearby Grand Union Canal.

Another sea hird which has moved inland over recent years is the commorant, which I first spotted near Brentford Dock in the seventies. These too are now occasional visitors to Osterley, competing with the resident berons for the fish in the Garden Lake.

AVE ET VALE

CLARE CARLIN has been appointed as Community Education Officer at Osterley. We welcome her to Osterley, and are glad that she will be able to put to use of the equipment donated to the Education Centre during her predecessor's time. She has given us these notes on her experience and objectives:

I was appointed to this post in the middle of July this year. Previously I was a Secondary School English teacher at a comprehensive school in Greenford. I have a Masters degree in museum education and have been doing voluntary education work at several museums over the last two and a half years.

There is already an excellent basis for education at Osterley, which I intend to continue and develop. However, as well as working with schools, cotteges and other formal education groups, I will be making new links with the local community and involving it more actively in its use of the house and grounds. The National Trust is putting a lot of emphasis on attracting new audiences to its properties and part of my job will be to fulfil this aim.

ANTHEA PALMER has been Historic Buildings Advisor at the Regional Headquarters at Hughenden since before the Trust took over direct management of Osterley in 1990. She has since then been responsible for all the changes made to the principal rooms in the House, including the re-decoration of the Library, the Long Gallery, and the Yellow Taffeta Bedroom. She is now leaving the Trust and making a career change, to work in Special Needs Education. We wish her well in this new venture.

A WELCOME RETURN

I was delighted to meet up with Ted Fawcett in the Stableyard on Osterley Day. Many members will know that he was at one time Director of Public Affairs for the Trust; after retirement, he became active as a Gardens Advisor to the Trust, and pursued his interests in garden history, archaeology - and dowsing!



Ted spoke at our Winter Lectures in 1992 on Osterley and in 1993 on Garden Archaeology, and has now offered to speak to us next year on "Dowsing". This

promises to be a fascinating talk - details of time and place in our next issue!

Quite by chance, I came across an article about his prowess in this field in a volume of collected pieces by Duff Hart-Davis, first published in the "Independent". This refers to his work at Avebury, and also to his discovery of Iron Age settlements at Osterley.

Ted contributed an entry to the "Poetry Trail" competition at Osterley this summer, which we print on the next page. "Beltane" was the Neolithic fertility rite, which Ted suggests was celebrated at a stone circle in the Great Meadow at Osterley.
