Park we have mainly Alder and Hazel catkins. With Alder, the female catkins will go on to develop woody cones and Hazels will hopefully produce Hazel nuts in the Autumn which are a great food source. My favourite plant Gorse is showing well and



the daffodils are well in bud with some now in flower.

You may also have noticed that North Tyneside Council have been busy repainting the road markings and repairing/extending

the pedestrian access. This is a great improvement and it is nice to see investment in the Park. **Well done!** 




Another busy month for our volunteers.
