So we all thought that we had finished with the strong winds after the devastation in January but oh no, it doesn't work like that, February threw us two more 'hoolies' with Storm Dudley on the

16th then Storm Eunice on the 18th. The poor Park was hammered again. The teams working on the January

clearance had nearly cleared the felled trees on the Waggonway and then more trees down again!! Many areas still hadn't been reached but the new storms brought even more problems with trees lying on other trees making areas incredibly unsafe for the NT Teams to gain access. A picture of a tree down appeared on the BBC Weather News on the 17th which looked like the Park. So please take care when moving around some areas of the Park. In February the Friends helped NT put the Exhibition Room (opposite the café) back together after the floor has been renewed and the room painted. Pop in and have a look, it is an interesting exhibition



showing the Park History. The Friends have started tidying up the planters outside the café and it is lovely to see the snowdrops planted a few years ago in the Wildlife Garden.







Another big job has been completed when NT organized the clearing of the Dipping Pond in Plantation Wood. The Pond had

become totally choked with rushes. It will take a while to recover but wildlife will soon return. Future maintenance is important keeping on top of the rushes.

Finally, a reminder that the Friends are helping with a litter pick as part of the national Spring Clean on 26th March meeting at 10am at the Centre. Equipment will be provided and all are welcome. Please come along if you can to help keep our



Park such a great place.

NATURE NOTES


