## **NEWSLETTER — MAY 2023**

The dry weather has continued through a lot of May and many areas are looking quite parched. It is becoming quite common now to have these warmer, dry Springs. Regulars to our Friends of

the Rising Sun Facebook page will have seen the results of the event City Nature Challenge, but I wanted just to summarise what was recorded around





the Park. Over the 4 day period, a number of the Friends surveyed and recorded mini-beasts, wildflowers, birds, aquatic life and even bat observations. This year we had the largest number of species at 166 well above the 139 last year. Even with the drier weather the Park is blooming.







The Quarry in the Centre Grounds has had a great display of Bluebells and that smelly favourite, Ramson. The Oxeye Daisies are appearing around Hadrian Pond which is consistently full of a whole range of wildflowers unlike the rest of the Park. The Cow Parsley and the Hawthorn blossom has been

stunning leaving a lovely sweet scent around the Park. Finally, it may be me but I do think there are not as many insects around yet. I think this is sadly a developing trend around the country.

## VOLUNTEERING

The Friends have been busy again. The Community Garden continues to develop and extra



compost bins have been built. The Friends have applied for a grant to develop this area even more so fingers crossed. The long term objective is to make this space accessible to other groups but at present there are access and safety issues. Our Asda Community Champions kindly donated a whole range of plants and the Friends have planted up hanging

baskets and some of

the pots on the café terrace—big thank you to Asda. The Wigloo in the Wildlife Garden is doing really well and is being well watered but also weeded to give a chance of getting well established and not too overgrown. The plants in the Wildlife Garden are getting rather too wild so this





area is earmarked for some attention in June and clearing some of the nettles that are becoming





rather rampant. The plants around the wildlife pond are doing really well.

In an area called the Giants Garden the Friends are rebuilding the 'mud kitchen' which was in a poor condition. This area is used by the Outdoor Learning Team and hopefully, when the kitch-



en is complete, groups can enjoy the space once more. Finally, the Friends monthly litter pick took place on the 29th and even though it was a Bank Holiday, a band of volunteer litter pickers again helped us keep the Park tidy. Thanks again to all those that gave up their time to help. The next Litterpick will be Monday **26th June**, meet at the Centre Café at 10.30am. All equipment will be provided but bring your own gloves if you can. Don't forget, the Volunteers meet every Thursday morning in the Centre Grounds—everyone welcome.
