Happy Easter

If you don't use it, you are likely to lose it!

I had the great pleasure, as I often do, of having Sunday lunch in The Swan yesterday, and was reminded that it is almost a year since it re-opened early in April last year. The day of their opening coincided with a joyful wedding in St James' which made the occasion even more memorable, and both I thought, were good omens for the social and communal life of the village, especially when aligned with the re-opening of the newly refurbished Village Hall not long afterwards, thanks in no small measure, to the generous efforts of so many volunteers from Great Horwood and Singleborough.

It is a delight to see that The Swan has gone from strength to strength in that time, and has become such a wonderful focus for the local community, as has the Village Hall, where the new facilities are much appreciated by those using them, especially the ladies (and the odd gentleman) who drop in for coffee on a Wednesday morning when the Post Office is also there, often before going over to The Swan for a lovely lunch which is lovingly prepared for them by the staff there. Increasingly these days, we hear sad stories of rural communities being on the back foot, with local amenities closing, or being run down to the

bare minimum; and whether it is the local pub, the village hall, the post office, library or, in the case of Winslow, the regular Wednesday market, it is often a case of 'use it or lose it', which is why I try to do so as often as possible in each of these cases. It is a sad fact of life that in these straightened times, it is only the economic viability or profitability of an organisation or enterprise which matters to the 'bean counters' in head office... whether it is The Post Office, a brewery, the local bus or NHS providers, or any other sort of organisation. Social benefit, utility, and cohesion do not feature highly in the balance sheets of most businesses or organisations, but I am glad to say that for the time at least, there is still a nominal (if often unrealistic) desire in the Church of England to ensure that there is a church building in every parish, and the full range of services (baptisms, weddings, funerals etc.) in addition to regular worship and Holy Communion services made available to every community throughout the land. I say 'for the time at least', because many rural parishes are struggling even to pay the running costs of their church buildings, which include rising insurance costs as well as other utilities, and we heard at our

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




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

PREPARATION OF NEW ELECTORAL ROLL

Notice is hereby given under the Church Representation Rules 2022, that a new Church Electoral Roll is being prepared. All persons who wish to have their names entered on the new Roll, whether their names are entered on the present Roll or not, are requested to apply for enrolment not later than:

Sunday the 13th day of April, 2025

The new Roll will come into operation on:

Sunday the 27th day of April, 2025

The new Roll shall be published for not less than 14 days. Under the Church Representation Rules any lay persons are entitled to have their names entered on the roll if they:

- are baptised and aged 16 or over;
- have signed a form of application for enrolment; and either
- are members of the Church of England or of any Church in communion with the Church of England being resident in the parish or (not being resident in the parish) having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the six months prior to the application for enrolment or:
- are members in good standing of a Church (not in communion with the Church of England) which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity declaring themselves also to be members of the Church of England and having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the period of six months prior to enrolment.

Forms of application for enrolment can be obtained from the undersigned. In order to be entitled to attend the annual parochial church meeting and to take part in its proceedings, forms of application for enrolment must be returned by Sunday 13th April 2025. Any error discovered in the roll when published should at once be reported to the undersigned. Dated this day: Friday the 7th day of February, 2025

local deanery synod just a few weeks ago from some parishes in the area which do not know how much longer they can sustain those costs without shutting their church doors for good. Such decisions can only be made by the parishes themselves, for each parish is an independent charity responsible for the upkeep of its building and for funding the ministry which is made available to their local community. The fact that some are having to consider doing this is truly saddening, but it is a realistic likelihood in some communities in coming years, especially now that the Government have decided to stop one of the very few benefits which parochial church councils (PCCs) had in maintaining their historic buildings, by removing the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme from April 2026. This allowed PCCs to claim back the VAT on repairs and refurbishments made to our historic churches, and will add tens of thousands of pounds to the cost of work already planned and budgeted for (see https://www. nationalchurchestrust.org/impact/campaigns/listedplaces-worship-grants-scheme for more information on that, and the appeal against this decision). Once a church building is closed or sold off, it means that baptisms, weddings and funerals can no longer take place in those places of worship, and the things we take for granted and treasure as part of the fabric of village life, those significant life-events which mark the passing of time and in many cases, the passing of generations, will be gone forever, and never, in all likelihood, return. We are nowhere near that position in St James' yet, thanks to the generosity of so many who support our funding events and activities throughout the year, but the ageing and health profile of our congregation means that some of those activities, including our regular church services, can no longer be sustained in future without fresh blood and younger bones, and the adage 'use it or lose it' is just as appropriate to the rural Church as to any other local amenity. With the costs of ministry having to be shared by larger and larger groups of parishes in the future, it means that the frequency and availability of clergy to provide all that we have become used to in the past will be harder to provide in the future, unless our church congregations become larger and hence more viable and intergenerational, and so I invite you, if you are able, to come and experience both the solemnity and the beauty of the coming Easter season in St James', and to experience the resurrection hope and joy which Christ's death and resurrection holds out to all, irrespective of who you are, or where you come from. As we enter the joyful season of Easter later this month, our congregations and church services reflect on the triumph of life over death, and the hope that Jesus' resurrection brings to us all. It is a celebration of renewal, and a reminder of God's boundless love, grace and generosity not only for us as individuals, but for our families, our kinship groups, and our whole

community. It also provides opportunity to rejoice in the beauty of new beginnings, and to come together to celebrate all that we have, and have been blessed with by the sacrificial giving of generations long since gone, with hearts full of gratitude and joy for their foresight and commitment in providing us with such a wonderful building, and honouring their memory by ensuring its future for other generations yet to come. If you haven't been to church before, why not give it a try over Easter, and if you haven't been for a long time, then come and reconnect with God, and with others in that special way which can only be experienced with others as we celebrate the Easter mystery once more. In the meantime, I wish you and all your loved one's true peace, love, and joy this Easter season and in the days to come. Happy Easter!

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
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Winslow Community Bus

FREE with a bus pass, otherwise only £4.50 return. Drop offs at Sainsburys and Broadfields on request.

Winslow Market Service 54abc - runs every Wednesday morning.

This service picks up in the surrounding villages and then into Winslow, (Swanbourne, Mursley, Great Horwood, Whaddon, Nash and The Claydons). Pick up times vary according to village. Bus passes accepted, otherwise £3.00 return.

Buckingham Bus Service – Picking up in Winslow and surrounding villages. 1 hour in town then 1 hour in Tesco, or 2 hours in Tesco. Door to door service. Bus passes accepted, otherwise £4.50 return.

Tuesday 1st April

Winslow & District Community Bus Needs Volunteer Drivers

The Winslow & District Community Bus relies on volunteer drivers to run all our services, excursions and hires.

We are always in need of volunteer drivers, especially at the moment! So, if you have a D1 on your licence, and have some spare time, please consider becoming a driver for your local Community Bus.

All of our scheduled routes start at around 9.00am and finish around 1.30pm. We pay out-of-pocket expenses.

We also run our own outings visiting all kinds of places, including garden centres, stately homes, shopping centres and countryside drives. The use of the bus is also available to local non-profit groups

We offer certificated training to MiDAS standard

MiDAS is the Minibus Driver Awareness Scheme and is administered by the Community Transport Association. The scheme provides a nationally recognised standard for the assessment and training of minibus drivers and has been designed to enhance minibus driving standards and promote the safer operation of minibuses.

WDCB provide free training to "MiDAS" standards for all our drivers. A certificate is awarded after successful completion of the course, which is valid for four years and is recognised UK-wide. Candidates must be aged over 21 and have category 'D1' on their licence. The course is usually completed in a day, the time being divided between classroom and practical work. The latter comprises coaching and assessment of driving skills plus a briefing on the use of the minibus wheelchair lift.

Many members took part in a competition – a design of hands in any medium – and their submissions, which they had been working on leading up to the WI meeting, were judged

on the night by Marie. The entries included paintings and drawings, a knitted hand (brings a whole new meaning to hand-knitting) and a wooden carving. First prize went to Kathy Thompson for her sculpture.

Next month's talk will be from a qualified podiatrist offering help and advice on foot health and explaining why looking after your feet is so important to wellbeing and avoiding future health problems.
