

REVIEW OF NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

At the Parish Council Planning Committee meeting on 13 January 2025, it was resolved that a review of the Neighbourhood Plan should be undertaken with a view to updating its policies.

The Parish Council is the Qualifying Body that will be responsible for submitting the Neighbourhood Plan. However, the Neighbourhood Plan will be an expression of the views of the whole community and to that end we need to set up a Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group that will be responsible for leading the process and developing the plan.

The Parish Council is therefore asking for volunteers to take on this vital role. Steering Group members will have to be ready to devote some time and effort to the process.

Ideally the Steering Group will reflect the character and diversity of the local population so will have people from different parts of the village and from working people and retirees. We need a range of skills, knowledge and experience.

It there are more than a dozen people interested then we would need to select the Committee to ensure we achieve this.

The Steering Group will be run with regard to the Nolan Principles, so would not be able to include anybody who wished to put land forward for consideration as part of the process.

New resolutions from the WI

At our January meeting, members of Great Horwood & Singleborough WI were invited to vote for one of four resolutions that have been short-listed to go forward for further discussion and voting by WI delegates at the national Annual Meeting in 2025. The resolutions ranged from a call to government to commit to provide incontinence services (it is estimated that 14 million people of all ages suffer with bladder problems and the subject is misunderstood and difficult to talk about), to how training bystanders in CPR and defibrillation can help save lives. According to the British Heart Foundation around 30.000 people each year in the UK have cardiac arrests outside of hospital. The other two Resolutions discussed were how to reduce the amount of medical packaging from going to landfill, through encouraging additional collection points for empty packaging and a call on manufacturers to design more environmentally-friendly packaging. to The Repair Revolution, encouraging a circular economy to promote the re-use of clothing.

Our next meeting on 11th February will be a demonstration of creative cake decoration with a seasonal theme. We meet every second Tuesday each month starting at 7.30pm with doors opening at 7.15pm. As well as our monthly meetings with a varied programme of interesting speakers, we organise visits to places of interest and practical craft days. We also enjoy weekly walks on a Monday and Wednesday exploring the beautiful north Buckinghamshire countryside.

RECTORS VOICE

Sunday the 26 January was a bittersweet day for regular attenders of the services in St James' and our other churches as we said goodbye to our associate priest, the Reverend Didier Jaquet who, after a yearlong process of discernment, starting with some designated time set aside for prayer in January 2024, has decided it is time to explore other avenues for ministry, having worked predominantly in rural parishes and small market towns since his ordination. We will miss Didier's warmth and humour, and his informal, relaxed style of worship, as well as the many pastoral relationships he has developed.

Since arriving in the benefice, Didier has had to cope with the Covid pandemic and the lockdowns which followed; and relished the opportunities this afforded by developing a variety of online worship and prayer services, some of which have continued, and will continue to run after his departure. Not long after this, Didier also had to contend with the vacancy caused by the promotion of our then Rector, Andrew Lightbown, to a senior post as a residentiary canon in Newport Cathedral, and together with our then curate, Mark Nelson, managed to keep everything running smoothly in all three parishes of the benefice until my arrival in February 2023.

I knew when I came here that Didier would stay on for another year to see me settled in, but he has actually remained steadfastly at my side for two, for which I am eternally grateful. I will miss him as a friend and a colleague, as will a great many others in the parishes I am sure, but I am excited to hear where God leads him next after another period of discernment.

Didier is one of an increasing number of 'self-supporting ministers' - priests who give their time to parishes voluntarily in the Church of England without financial compensation in order to keep our churches open; and ensure that ministry continues in these cost-constrained times. This is especially true in rural areas

where we can sometimes find it difficult b recruit stipendiary (paid) priests to lead our parishes, so it is with an even greater sense of gratitude that we bid Didier farewell and wish him God's richest blessing as he moves on to pastures new... which I very much hope he will write and tell us about in Focus in the not too distant future!

We owe a great debt to priests like Didier, as well as the many lay (non-ordained) people who continue to keep our parish churches alive in the countryside, not least our lay ministers, churchwardens, and the many people who do so much behind the scenes, including those who help to provide this magazine for the parish every month!

When we think of 'volunteers' we might often think about those working in our charity shops or local hospices, those leading children's and young peoples' activities after school, or perhaps volunteering to help students with their literacy and numeracy skills for a few hours each week or visiting the elderly in their homes. But one little known fact, is that churchwardens and our church school governors make up two of the largest groups of the (not so part-time!) volunteers in the country which, when added to those engaged in worship, ministry, administrative, and many other activities in our churches and church schools, reminds us just how much we owe to all those who give their valuable time, and often their own resources to serve the Church and their communities in myriad ways. So as we say farewell to Didier, let us raise a cheer for all those who serve our communities so selflessly, because without them, many of the things we enjoy and take for granted in village life simply would not happen at all!

PLANNING MATTERS

As you may all be aware, the Parish Council have received notice from Buckinghamshire Council of a Planning Application in the name of Grainge/ Croudace for up to 70 dwellings on the land north of Little Horwood Road and Cherry Leas. The Great Horwood application number is 24/03817/AOP.

There was a Public Meeting of the Planning Committee on the 13th January 2025 which had an attendance of 45 people - a show of hands to object to this application was requested, and all attendees objected.

Can we remind you that if you wish to make a comment on this application to Buckinghamshire Council you can comment online, using the following link

and putting 24/03817/AOP in the keyword box.

Please note that Great Horwood Parish Council will be objecting to this application within the deadline given.

As well as the above application, the Parish Council have received the following applications from Buckinghamshire Council: -

- 1. Planning Application for the development of Home Farm for 15 homes - planning application number 21/00221/APP.
- 2. Planning Application by Abbeymill for 2 homes off Winslow Road - planning application number 24/03754/APP.
- 3. Planning Application for 3 houses on land to the rear of Vine Cottage, Little Horwood Road - planning application number 22/03217/APP.

As well as the expected planning application from Abbeymill for 30 homes on land south of Weston Road, we are also aware that there may be further applications in the pipeline.

The Parish Council have started discussions and have attended meetings with Buckinghamshire Council on the future of the Neighbourhood Plan as it makes progress on the development of the Buckinghamshire Local Plan. This will replace all the District Local Plans including the Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan which is the relevant one for Great Horwood.

The Parish Council is the responsible body for the Neighbourhood Plan (which is based on the views of the whole community) - and are looking to set up a Steering Group made up of volunteers - please see the flyer elsewhere in this edition of Focus for more details of how you can help.

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
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Winslow Community Bus

Aylesbury Market Bus - runs every Friday and Saturday morning -- from Winslow, through Gt Horwood, Little Horwood, Mursley and Swanbourne, arriving in Aylesbury just after 10am and departing 12.15pm. FREE with a bus pass, otherwise only £4.50 return. Drop offs at Sainsburys and Broadfields on request.

Winslow Market Service 54abc - runs every Wednesday morning.

This service picks up in the surrounding villages and then into Winslow, (Swanbourne, Mursley, Great Horwood, Whaddon, Nash and The Claydons). Pick up times vary according to village. Bus passes accepted, otherwise £3.00 return.

Buckingham Bus Service - Picking up in Winslow and surrounding villages. 1 hour in town then 1 hour in Tesco, or 2 hours in Tesco. Door to door service. Bus passes accepted, otherwise £4.50 return.

Winslow & District Community Bus Needs Volunteer Drivers

The Winslow & District Community Bus relies on volunteer drivers to run all our services, excursions and hires

We are always in need of volunteer drivers, especially at the moment! So, if you have a D1 on your licence, and have some spare time, please consider becoming a driver for your local Community Bus.

All of our scheduled routes start at around 9.00am and finish around 1.30pm. We pay out-of-pocket expenses.

We also run our own outings visiting all kinds of places, including garden centres, stately homes, shopping centres and countryside drives. The use of the bus is also available to local non-profit groups

We offer certificated training to MiDAS standard

MiDAS is the Minibus Driver Awareness Scheme and is administered by the Community Transport Association. The scheme provides a nationally recognised standard for the assessment and training of minibus drivers and has been designed to enhance minibus driving standards and promote the safer operation of minibuses.

WDCB provide free training to "MiDAS" standards for all our drivers. A certificate is awarded after successful completion of the course, which is valid for four years and is recognised UK-wide. Candidates must be aged over 21 and have category 'D1' on their licence. The course is usually completed in a day, the time being divided between classroom and practical work. The latter comprises coaching and assessment of driving skills plus a briefing on the use of the minibus wheelchair lift.
