



THE INTELLIGENCE ZONE

Focus have been kind enough to ask me to write a series of articles about our amazing heritage of worldchanging sites. That's a tall-order; so I will limit myself to part of chapter 9 - The Whaddon Web. Chapter 9? I love maps, and the map I have commissioned (reproduced over leaf) of The Intelligence Zone will explain better, for each subject relates to a local place, or places, and each has its chapter in the book. So what do I mean by The Whaddon Web? That's my name for the series of transmitting and receiving sites which the British secret services, MI6, put up to run their communications; and which were managed from Whaddon Hall. Before that MI6's communications had been at Bletchley Park, a couple of miles down the road. However, in September 1939, a few days after Britain declared war on Germany, it was thought that the aerial wires strung across the trees there were too obvious a target for the German Air Force (as well as being a bit amateurish) - so they moved them out to Whaddon. Whaddon was under the management of MI6's director of Communications, a highly amiable old-Etonian from the top drawer by the name of Richard Gambier-Parry - 'Pop', as he was affectionately known by his staff.

Pop's teams put up communications for all sorts of people - spies, saboteurs and governments in exile

to name just some. And they put them up right here; almost in a circle spreading over the hills and centred more or less on Winslow. They were hardly 'secret' in the sense of not being noticeable. Aerial masts can't be that. But they were secure; as you might expect from MI6. Patrolled by armed guards - surrounded by barbed wire and with strictly policed entry; they were part of the extraordinary story of how the secret services communicated with occupied Europe.

This is very, very, local. The magazine you are reading now was produced in one of the huts at Little Horwood used in this radio war. One of the most important of the secret sites – the other end of those exchanges between resistance agents in France and their MI6 controllers – was in this very parish.

The Whaddon Web is but a part of a gripping, exciting, moving, terrifying and often humorous epic. I have spent the last five years researching it, writing it and generally doing my best to do it justice. It is a saga of world-shaking proportions; for it tells of the fall of empires and the crashing of titans; as well as spies, saboteurs and heroes and heroines. And it is all true; all our history – and explains why the Intelligence Zone is one of the most astonishing places on earth; and why we should be proud of the place we live.



Or am I getting too security conscious?



GREAT HORWOOD HISTORY WEBSITE

People who've moved to the village in recent years might not know that, 10 years ago, a group of villagers published a book entitled, 'Great Horwood Past and Present'. It included chapters about most aspects of our village history as well as information on what was then present-day Great Horwood. We sold all the copies of the book and set up a website so people could view the chapters and additional material online. Unfortunately, sole responsibility for that task fell to me and, after the effort of getting all the material onto the website and adding more. I got out of the habit of checking on it regularly. At some point last year, the domain name didn't get renewed, I didn't notice and the whole website vanished. I apologise to all the other book contributors and to anyone who has recently tried to search for information about the history of Great Horwood and Singleborough. Please rest assured

that no one's work has been lost apart from some of mine.

I've bought a new domain name:

www.greathorwoodhistory.co.uk which is the same as the old name apart from the suffix. It's going to take me a while to rebuild the website from scratch and get all the material back online so I've started with information about past coronation celebrations as that might be of most interest to people at the moment.

Past Coronations and Traditional Celebration Arches

As we celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III this month, we'll be following in the footsteps of many generations of Great Horwood and Singleborough residents who gathered together to celebrate the coronations of his predecessors.

The first such event we know anything about was Great Horwood's celebration of King George IV's coronation on 19th July 1821. As part of the festivities, five Great Horwood labourers asserted an ancient right on Coronation Day to cut down a tree from manorial land and erect it in the village as a 'Coronation Pole'. The people of Great Horwood undoubtedly gathered at the pole and their celebrations will have included

dancing around it. After the festivities, the five men failed to return the oak pole to landowner, New College Oxford. They sold the timber and kept the profits for themselves, for which they were convicted of theft and fined.

King Charles III would be glad to know that we're not asserting our right to chop down a tree to celebrate his coronation. However, on a small scale, we will be continuing another tradition by constructing a celebratory arch. In the past, before busy roads and health and

safety rules, towns and villages often constructed large, temporary arches to celebrate coronations and jubilees. Thanks largely to the artistic talents of Alfred Rich, the schoolmaster here from 1892 to 1928, Great Horwood became renowned for the quality and artistry of its arches. The arch pictured below, to celebrate George V's coronation on 22nd June 1911, for example, was 'pronounced by all to be the best in the district'. It spanned the road by The Swan and included around 200 hand-made paper poppies.

In most places, the practice of constructing such arches died out long ago but, in Great Horwood, the tradition became an important part of our heritage and still continues. The last really big one was the huge construction of scaffolding poles and greenery built for Queen Elizabeth II's Silver Jubilee in 1977. One of the smallest was the beautiful, floral one built for the opening of the village recreation ground, Horwood Pece, in 2009. The most recent was built at the entrance of The Green for Queen Elizabeth II's Diamond Jubilee in 2012. Sadly, Her Majesty died before our rescheduled Platinum Jubilee celebrations could take place so we didn't make the arch we'd planned to. On Monday 8th May, we'll be gathering at Great Horwood Cricket Club for an afternoon of mostly free activities and entertainment in celebration of the Coronation of King Charles III and Queen Camilla. One of the activities Great Horwood Rangers, Guides, Brownies and Rainbows have organised is decorating the celebratory arch. We'll bring a garden arch and supplies of red, white and blue tissue paper and paper chains. We hope that everyone (adult

or child) will join us to make paper chains and flowers and decorate the arch during the afternoon. For safety reasons, the arch will be smaller than its predecessors but it will be special because everyone will have helped to make it. (Any contributions of red, white or blue tissue paper will be gratefully received.) There will also be a display of photos of earlier celebratory arches and coronation celebrations.

Readers Write

NOOK PARK

We recently had a conversation with Patrick O'Brien who as you know owns the farm at the bottom of Spring Lane. His family has owned the farm for 70 years and the field to the west of Nook Park belongs to the farm. As Mr O'Brien described prior to purchasing the farm "My father was involved in drainage work in the locality."

Between the field and the park there has been a drainage ditch which dates back 150 years and is a watercourse for the village. This takes the excess rainwater from Willow Road and above through the ditch down to the brook in Spring Lane.

Meaning this is important as without the ditch the field, the houses on sections of Nook Park, Greenways and Spring Lane could be affected by potential flooding.

As Mr O'Brien pointed out "residents of Great Horwood will remember previous development plans (for the fields adjacent to Nook Park) in which extensive drainage works had to be planned for and permission granted."

We had a visit from the flood management department of the council at the beginning of March and they were unhappy with the fact that Joe Burns has now filled in the ditch (below) and made a culvert the full length of the park. He has put a pipe no more than 2 feet in diameter (pictured right) and covered it over with earth right on the border where the hedgerow must be replanted. The flood management officer also said that there has to be a 10-meter gap between a ditch and any new homes. They said the ditch was a watercourse. The council take this seriously as permission has to be sourced from the council to do this and usually they refuse permission to do so.







This ditch is all part of a watercourse system which keeps the village free of flooding. The ditches are maintained and kept debris free as they are easily accessible whereas a culvert is not. Certainly not the full length of the park as this would not be possible to rod to clear any blockage. Mr O'Brien explained "I've been in conversation with the drainage enforcement officer and Mr Burns, apparently without permission has filled in the existing ditch and created a culvert which is against the rules. There is a possibility the ditch as a designated watercourse will have to be reinstated" We eagerly await an order!

We asked Buckinghamshire Council when the High Street in the village is going to be resurfaced and this is the answer we got – so don't hold your breath.

"The Local Area Technician (LAT) are inspecting the road network constantly and also in response to reports received via Fix-my-Street. We monitor areas through our regular monthly, quarterly and annual inspections for further deterioration; any works required will be carried out to keep the condition of the carriageway safe, in line with our Highways Safety Inspection Policy.

Roads or footways for resurfacing are prioritised in conjunction with local Members to ensure that our available annual funding is spread fairly across the entire county. Many of our Members have had difficult choices to make, with numerous roads and footways needing to be prioritised. We take a balanced strategy to determine our future programme, aiming to produce a mix of treatments targeted at both preventative repairs, which offer the best value for money in the longer term, as well as resurfacing work to repair those areas which are not in an acceptable condition."


