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

WALKING THE GREAT GLEN WAY 79 MILES FROM FORT WILLIAM TO INVERNESS

My daughter Elaine and I (see picture page 11) are taking on this Challenge to walk the Great Glen way in 6 days, on the 23rd of September 2023. This is to help raise vital funds for research and support for people affected by Polycystic Kidney Disease (PKD).

Over 70,000 People in the UK live with PKD, one of the most common and life-threatening conditions that can cause kidney failure and affect other organs. Unfortunately, this disease runs in my family.

My family have had to live with this disease for over 50 years. We first knew about it when Elaine was a baby. At the time we didn't know it was hereditary. First Elaine's Grandmother had the disease and was on dialysis but did eventually have a transplant. We then found out my husband (Elaine's dad) had the disease who also ended up having dialysis, but died before a transplant could be given. Through some routine check-ups it was discovered that 2 of my girls have the disease also, Elaine being one of them. Within the next few months unfortunately Elaine will be going onto the transplant list and quite soon will be on dialysis.

1% of all health research funding goes to kidney research and a fraction of that amount goes towards PKD research specifically. There is no cure for PKD, so therefore research is the only way to stop the progression of PKD and transform the lives of those affected today and, in the future.

Through sheer determination, adrenaline and willingness, we are both determined to walk the 79 miles before Elaine is unable to do it with her condition deteriorating, which has come on sooner than we expected.

HEDGEHOGS IN OUR VILLAGE 'THE GARDENER'S FRIEND' (see picture page 11)

Quite distinct from all the kind folk who care for Hedgehogs, there is one group of people for whom Hedgehogs provide direct benefit: gardeners.

By eating innumerable invertebrate 'pests' that might otherwise try a gardener's patience, the Hedgehog is unequivocally an ally for those who tend plants in their gardens and allotments.

For the gardener to profit, however, they need to do a few things to make life better for the spiny one. Leaving a part of the plot to go wild provides potential nesting habitat. Knocking a hog-sized hole in the fence enables unfettered entry and exit. Providing a plank of wood at the steep side of a pond serves as a ladder to help bedraggled Hedgehogs clamber out.

And not using pesticides ensures an ample supply of the invertebrate meals that attract Hedgehogs to the garden in the first place. However, during hot and dry periods these creepy-crawlies become much scarcer in gardens, so Hedgehogs will benefit hugely from a shallow dish of water and supplementary feeding at these times.

Does a Hedgehog need help? A Hedgehog may need help if it appears: Lethargic, Sunbathing (hedgehogs don't sunbathe), Allowing flies to settle on it, Screaming, Limping or circling, Abandoned.

If the sighting is during the day – it could be a warning sign that all is not well. However, there are some exceptions, nest disturbance, females nest building in preparation for young to be born or feeding while young are asleep being some. Those Hedgehogs will generally be moving quickly, appear well and will only be out for short periods of time.

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

Black Propaganda & the British resistance movement (Gawcott, Potsgrove, Milton Bryan and Coleshill)

In the early part of the Second World War, the British The intention of 'Black' Propaganda is to push its audience in a certain direction without them realising it. To do this, it mixes facts with liberal dollops of half-truths and lies. Often it gives the impression that it was created by those it aims to discredit. The man in charge of British Black Propaganda in World War Two was Sefton Delmer. Delmer was very well known during the 1930s. He worked in Germany for the Daily Express, the newspaper which had, at that time, the biggest circulation in the world. He had been born in Germany, of Australian parents, and German was his first language. He reported on Hitler's rise to power; meeting the Nazi leader on several occasions. Hitler, seeking to influence Britain, liked to deal with Delmer as he spoke native German, understanding every nuance. He used him to gauge popular feeling in Britain - asking him for example: "Does Britain want the German royal family (deposed after the First World War) restored?" Delmer even flew on Hitler's private plane. He filmed one of the trips, from Tempelhoff Airport, in 1932. It's on YouTube. Hitler is accompanied by his propaganda Minister, Joseph Goebbels.

Delmer was, however, on the side of the angels. During the war, he used his considerable talents to broadcast from England against the Nazis. Joseph Goebbels was the man Delmer was up against. It was he who had elevated Hitler to the status of a god dedicating 'Party Days' and shrines to him and much more. Goebbels, could fool most of the people some of the time; some of them all of the time. He reckoned that after an hour of speaking to an audience; "I can make them climb trees if I feel like it". Quite apart from which, Goebbels had direct control of every newspaper and radio station throughout occupied Europe. If anyone didn't toe the party line,

they went to a concentration camp for 're-education' via starvation, the whip and often the bullet. It is a sign of the desperate military state that the British were in that we had to explore all avenues to fight Germany; whose land army the country had no hope of defeating. So when he came to England, Sefton Delmer, under MI6, set up 'black' broadcasting. The headquarters of the operation was at Wavendon Towers, now in Milton Keynes (and where I come in, for this was where the Milton Keynes Development Corporation, for which I was the IT manager, had its first head office); from there, and the later recording facility at Milton Bryan, recordings were sent (on vinyl) to be broadcast from Potsgrove (near Watling Street) or Gawcott (near Buckingham). These sites were serious affairs. Gawcott had around 20 aerials, though all are long gone. The shows they transmitted, purporting to be broadcast from Europe, provided first class light entertainment; featuring, for instance, the music of Glenn Miller - they even had a forces' sweetheart. They had a huge following in the German armed forces; indeed they were the favourite radio stations of the German submarine (U-boat) crews. Many Germans recognised them for what they were - British propaganda - but listened to them anyway because they were so good. A spin-off was that they gave British intelligence an almost supernatural aura in the eyes of the German navy; for they would report, for example, the destinations of German naval patrols, the fact that so-and-so's wife had just had a baby back in Germany (odd that, as her husband had been at sea for a year), even the scores of the latest intership football match. (The recording and broadcasting of black propaganda was only part of the story. A further large organisation, based at Woburn Abbey and surrounding villages, was dedicated to forgery.) But Sefton Delmer didn't have an easy time in his fight against Joseph Goebbels. Goebbels even claimed that when the sun shone it was 'Fuhrer weather'. If you can persuade your listeners that the sun shines out of your leader's ...eyes, you're a good propagandist. And, of course, Goebbels was backed by naked force. To try and make the followers of a deluded and brutal religion question their beliefs is not only virtually impossible but dangerous and mostly pointless: which is why most visitors to Germany raised their arm in the Hitler salute. This part of the Whaddon Web was, perhaps, the least effective. Nor, I think, was that something for Delmer to be ashamed of. Racist evil was the very lifeblood of the Nazi regime. Forget reasoning, forget lying: only brute force could drive out these devils. Only then could Page 10 Focus September 2023

their slaves be freed. The trick was not to become a devil oneself in the process. In this – and it was no small victory – Delmer, and the western powers, succeeded. If they didn't achieve a great deal in winning the war (although they did help in the surrender of the Italian navy), these transmitters came into their own towards the end of the conflict. American broadcasting technology was the best in the world and Whaddon set up the most powerful site of them all using American aerials. It gave this site the codename 'Aspidistra' (after a popular song 'the biggest aspidistra in the world') in Crowborough, in Sussex. Originally Aspidistra was to have been built near Whaddon; but there wasn't any space to be found;

and anyway there was so many aerials locally that the authorities thought that adding new and even bigger ones were an open invitation to the German Air Force (the Luftwaffe) to take a (rather belated) interest. Erected at the second attempt (the original aerials went to the bottom to a German torpedo in their passage across the Atlantic), Aspidistra was used, among other things, to swamp the air waves over Germany with fake instructions. So powerful was this transmitter that German attempts to jam it didn't work; they merely blocked out their own radio stations. German night-fighter controllers could only listen helplessly as their pilots were routed away from the Allied bomber swarms.

Another part of the Whaddon Web dealt with guerrilla clandestine home defence; warfare. When it became apparent that Hitler meant to invade Britain after Dunkirk - that, as Churchill put it - 'the man was going to try' - every aspect of home defence was urgently upgraded. Anything which could help the army (who had left most of their weapons in France) was worthy of serious consideration. It was therefore decided to create a stay-behind resistance force, that would slow down advancing enemy troops and grant the regular army time to mount a counter-attack. In one of his most stirring speeches, Winston Churchill said: "We will fight them on the beaches, we will fight them in the fields. We will never surrender." These were the men (and it was an all-male force) who would 'fight them in the fields'. The force that was to do so was raised under Churchill's direct orders; their main base was at Coleshill, near Swindon. The person who was initially in charge of them was Peter Fleming, the traveller, author and brother of James Bond's creator, lan Fleming. Unconventional warfare - or dirty tricks if you prefer - owed a lot to the Fleming brothers.



Personnel of the Home Guard and local volunteers were formed into top secret patrols throughout the entire country and trained to a high standard of efficiency in the use of explosives, booby traps, time-fuses, mines, and unarmed combat. These resistance fighters, who went by the name of Auxiliary Units, were trained at Coleshill. In all, some five thousand recruits studied there. They would operate from specially prepared underground bases set up country-wide. To this day the original model still exists at Coleshill. It has a vertical entrance shaft with an anti-blast wall at the bottom, a kitchen area, an 'Elsan' toilet cubicle, and space for six bunks (the remnants of which still survive). The idea was to pop up from shelters like this, kill and destroy and get away quickly. Not surprisingly, those who best knew their local landscape were highly suited for this work. Farmers and land-owners were often chosen as Patrol Leaders and asked to select recruits from their own workers to staff their patrols. They knew who were the most enterprising, industrious and brave; preferring, of course, single men and those without dependants.

Hides were built all over - and under - the country. One officer (Norman Field) who showed off his unit to Field-Marshall Montgomery tells how he took him to the brink of Charing Hill, where they sat on a fake sheep trough. The bottom of the trough slid sideways to give access to an underground Observation Post from which the outside world was viewed through rabbit holes in a steep bank. There was just sufficient space for two persons. Charing Hill is in a position to view the convergence of two very major routes to London. It is the hub of a wheel: an ideal place for enemy dumps and depots to be set up. Other members of Field's team had already raided Montgomery's Headquarters, removing secret papers from his safe and leaving explosives instead. Nobody was spotted getting in or out; but Peter Fleming got a dressing down from Monty for showing up deficiencies in his security set-up and blowing up his flower bed. If the Germans had over-run southern England, gone-to-ground units would have appeared at night from such lairs to sabotage their supply lines. They were armed with various types of fuses, igniters and detonators. The sabotage manual the trainees were issued with listed many of them; and how to use them. Plastic Explosive, invented at Woolwich, 'the finest general purpose explosive in the world' was in short supply but "as it was really Churchill's idea to set us up, we got plastic explosives before the regular army." Many of the weapons that the staybehinds would use were made by 'Winston Churchill's toyshop' - at Whitchurch. north of Aylesbury (to which I devote a chapter in The Intelligence Zone). The Time Pencil which 'looks rather like a propelling pencil', was primed by inserting a fuse into the 'spring snout' of the pencil. 'Once it has been taken out the enemy has no way of telling the delay period.' A chapter which described how to calculate the precise amount of gelignite required to destroy a particular target ended, 'If in doubt, double the calculated charge!'



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Whaddon's part in all of this was to provide radios and radio operators to the groups. Their job would be to talk with their headquarters on the British held side of the frontline, who would order, agree and co-ordinate their actions. Possibly, if they lived that long and the RAF still had any planes, they might even be resupplied. Thus, the stay-at-homes in Folkestone would, perhaps, report the arrival of a new division of Panzer tanks and report it to their HQ. The anticipated marshalling yard for tanks between Folkestone and Ashford was in the area allocated to 21 year old Sergeant Peter Boulden, a farmer. He and some of his eight man patrol would rise from their hidden bunker to kill as many Germans and blow up as many vehicles as they could.



As one recruit said: "Barbed wire, with training, was not difficult to crawl through. The barbed wire was simply propped up with foot-long forked sticks so that you could crawl underneath." France, the Russia, Poland As Ukraine, and all the other Nazi conquered lands, the civilians would bear the reprisals.

When fighting in the open - and it would inevitably come to that as the teams were flushed out - the Auxiliaries would use the Sticky Bomb - a device that when thrown would stick to armour and burn through it. This was another weapon from Churchill's Toyshop at Whitchurch. Initially it had been slowed down by red tape. When Churchill was made aware of this he got cross and wrote a note which read: 'Sticky Bomb. Make one million. WSC.' As Churchill later wrote: 'We had the picture in mind that devoted soldiers or civilians would run up close to a tank and even thrust the bomb on it, even though the explosion cost them their lives ...many would have done it.' This, it must be stressed, was not funny 'Dad's Army' stuff. It was to be the last ditch attempt by the last free country - Britain - to oppose the Nazis and their monstrous, murderous, racist, creed. The Auxiliaries would fight to keep freedom alive, with their lives if that was what it took.



Luckily, in Britain, it never came to that. In Europe it did (millions of sticky bombs and other devices were shipped from Whitchurch to arm partisans in Russia and the Ukraine).

In the next extract I will talk about how resistance saboteurs in Europe were supported from a network of communication sites in the hills above Bicester.

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




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The Great Train Robbery
