

Rectors Thoughts

As we step into September, the golden hues of autumn begin to creep into our days. The leaves, once vibrant green, begin taking on their autumnal hues, and there is a sense of calm and rhythm with everything returning to normal after the busy pace of August, which for many clergy, is a month like any other, and sometimes even busier with summer weddings and other events such as village fayres, fêtes, and dog shows which fill up the July and August calendars.

For many, September marks a time of new beginnings. Children return to school with sharpened pencils and fresh uniforms, some perhaps with nervous excitement as they start lessons in a completely new school. Older brothers and sisters may be preparing to leave for university, saying farewell to their families and friends as they embark on this new and momentous stage in their life, or embarking into the world of work, with all the potentialities that affords them for new friendships, relationships, and a monthly paycheque for the first time ever perhaps.

Most adults, certainly of working age, are settling back into their work routine after well-earned holidays, and in church too we begin to shift our focus.

September brings the resumption of our 'normal' activities, so it is a spiritual "new term" for us too of sorts. This all makes September a good time to try something new or reconnect if you've been away over the summer or even to come and try church out for the first time. In this month's Focus you will find

news of the many activities coming up in the next few months as the evenings begin to draw in, the TV becomes boring as broadcasters stretch out their budgets with repeats until Christmas, and we prepare for winter by moving seamlessly from Remembrance Day to Advent, Christmas, and the New Year once more with much planning and preparation taking place for these as we speak!

As we embrace this season of change, may we find time to reflect, give thanks, and support one another for all that we have been given, whether it's in the crunch of leaves underfoot, the smell of a freshly picked apple, the red, gold and russet colours of autumn foliage, or the comfort of familiar hymns and prayers as we thank God for the abundance of the harvest. Having worked all summer, I will be taking some time off in September and October, though back for the many special occasions these months bring. Good evening ladies and gentlemen, madam President and welcome to this years AGM. Thank you Darren (Sid) for arranging tonight and our thanks to the Cricket Club for the use of their Clubhouse. I'm delighted to report that overall the Club had another exciting year, increasing the number of junior age groups playing, as well as picking up some silverware.

Focussing on last season's Junior team performance's: All of our junior teams delivered some good results and have highlighted areas for improvement.

The u18's had a very good season....more about that later.

With the expert guidance of their manager, all the players worked hard and improved throughout the season culminating with a win. The team spirit is great and they are looking forward to this coming season.

It's good to see the junior section growing and looking towards the forthcoming season, which will soon be upon us, I'm delighted to confirm that we have the following 6 age groups partaking U8's, 9's, 10's, 12's, 13's and U18's.

Now focussing on the senior section of the Club.

The highlight of the season was the reserves winning the League Cup, beating the league champions Grid City 3:2. This was a great performance and my respect to all involved.

In the league, the reserves finished 7th out of 13. It's fair to say that when all players are available for selection, this team can beat all other teams in their league.

We continue to benefit from a small but dedicated team of volunteers, who carry out the vital behind the scenes work of attending committee meetings, complying with league requirements, cleaning the clubhouse, general maintenance and grass cutting....without whom, the Club would not be able to operate.

My sincere thanks to all those individuals, but a special mention this year for the junior u18's manager Martin (Waggy) Waggott and his son Dylan, who between them, managed to raise a team, purchase the kit, fund other costs and managed the team through to a League Cup semi final spot and 3rd place in the league.

Great effort.

With this in mind, I was very pleased to announce that Waggy had won this years Clubman of the Year trophy at the recent end of season awards presentation.

In conclusion, as a Club, we continue to punch above our weight on the pitch and have a loyal bunch of behind the scenes supporters. However we are looking for and would welcome anyone from the growing local community, who would like to support the club, in whatever capacity, to step forward and be welcomed with open arms. Without these behind the scenes volunteers this Club would not exist

sustainable craft," said Fiona. "I use recycled fabrics and garments and 'used' leaves are composted."

Fiona runs a wide range of eco-printing workshops, often combining the technique with bookbinding, lampshade making, silk scarves and stationery items. Every attendee had a go to design a print on paper which they could take home, and the results were excellent.

Members also enjoyed a morning exploring Rousham Gardens in Oxfordshire, which is one of Monty Don's favourite gardens in the world, and afterwards lunch at a cafe. Designed by William Kent who was a painter, stage designer and architect who spent time in Italy, Kent was one of the pioneers of what was known as the 'New English Style of Landscape'. The gardens are delightful with doors opening into different vistas and designs with statues, ponds and follies to discover. In Monty Don's 'Around the World in Eighty gardens' he said, "Kent is the great genius of eighteenth-century garden design and Rousham is his masterpiece".

In August we held our annual picnic at the cricket club which was very enjoyable sitting outside in the sunshine. Our guest speaker for our September meeting is Andy Harding, talking about the Danube Delta.

Great Horwood & Singleborough WI meet every second Tuesday each month in the Village Hall, with doors opening at 7.15pm for a 7.30pm start. Our group also offers twice weekly walks in the unspoilt Buckinghamshire countryside throughout the year.

Winslow Market Service 54abc - runs every Wednesday morning.

This service picks up in the surrounding villages and then into Winslow, (Swanbourne, Mursley, Great Horwood, Whaddon, Nash and The Claydons). Pick up times vary according to village. Bus passes accepted, otherwise £3.00 return.

The Winslow & District Community Bus relies on volunteer drivers to run all our services, excursions and hires.

We are always in need of volunteer drivers, especially at the moment! So, if you have a D1 on your licence, and have some spare time, please consider becoming a driver for your local Community Bus.

All of our scheduled routes start at around 9.00am and finish around 1.30pm. We pay out-of-pocket expenses.

We also run our own outings visiting all kinds of places, including garden centres, stately homes, shopping centres and countryside drives. The use of the bus is also available to local non-profit groups

We offer certificated training to MiDAS standard

MiDAS is the Minibus Driver Awareness Scheme and is administered by the Community Transport Association. The scheme provides a nationally recognised standard for the assessment and training of minibus drivers and has been designed to enhance minibus driving standards and promote the safer operation of minibuses.

WDCB provide free training to "MiDAS" standards for all our drivers. A certificate is awarded after successful completion of the course, which is valid for four years and is recognised UK-wide. Candidates must be aged over 21 and have category 'D1' on their licence. The course is usually completed in a day, the time being divided between classroom and practical work. The latter comprises coaching and assessment of driving skills plus a briefing on the use of the minibus wheelchair lift.


