

Long March 80th Anniversary Cycle Ride 4th - 8th May 2025

Objective

- 1. To recreate the "Long March" route followed by POWs from Stalag Luft 3 in Poland to Stalag Luft 3A in Luckenwalde in Germany, finishing at the Neue Wacke Memorial in Berlin on 8th May 2025, the 80th Anniversary of VE Day.
- 2. To raise money for various relevant charities, including the RBL, RAFA and RAF BF, Zagan Museum of StalagLuft III.
- 3. To raise awareness of The Long March and The Great Escape.

Participants

Relatives and friends of former POWs and their families.

Background

The "Long March" refers to a series of forced marches during the final stages of the Second World War in Europe. From a total of 257,000 western Allied prisoners of war held in German military prison camps, over 80,000 POWs were forced to march westward across Poland, Czechoslovakia, and Germany in extreme winter conditions, over about four months between January and April 1945. January and February 1945 were among the coldest winter months of the 20th century in Europe, with blizzards and temperatures as low as -25 °C (-13 °F), and even until the middle of March, temperatures were well below 0 °C (32 °F). Most of the POWs were ill-prepared for the evacuation, having suffered years of poor rations and wearing clothing ill-suited to the appalling winter conditions. As the Soviet Army was advancing on the Eastern Front, German authorities decided to evacuate POW camps, to delay liberation of the prisoners. At the same time, hundreds of thousands of German civilian refugees, most of them women and children, as well as civilians of other nationalities, were also making their way westward on foot.

On 19 July 1944, Adolf Hitler issued an order from his headquarters, Wolfsschanze, 150 km (93 mi) west of Stalag Luft VI, "concerning preparations for the defence of the Reich". It put the German civilian population on total war footing and issued instructions for preparations or evacuations of "foreign labour" (slave labour) and civilians away from the advancing

Soviet Army in the east. Item 6(a) called for "preparations for moving prisoners of war to the rear". This prolonged the war for hundreds of thousands of Allied personnel, as well as causing them severe hardship, starvation, injuries and/or death.

REMEMBERING AND HONOURING THE LESSONS OF THE PAST SO THAT WE MIGHT HAVE A BETTER FUTURE.

May will see many people commemorating VE Day on May the 8th with tea parties, barbeques, and many other celebrations even if the government did not agree to grant a bank holiday for the occasion. I always think that Britain shows itself at its best at such times, for it is important to learn from the past so that we do not make the same mistakes in future.

VE Day marks the end of the war in Europe on May the 8th May 1945, but let us not forget that World War II did not end in its entirety until August 15th 1945, when Emperor Hirohito finally ordered Japanese troops to lay down their arms following the detonation of atomic bombs over Hiroshima and Nagasaki on the 6th and 9th of August 1945. It was a great many more months before all of those imprisoned in the Far East were able to come home after the 'forgotten war', and I still have vivid memories of the nights when my father would be summoned in the middle of the night by the noise of a neighbour's screaming, and a fervent knocking on the wall between our two houses to help our neighbour's wife assuage the night terrors he suffered intermittently as a result of the terrible things he had seen and experienced as a Japanese prisoner of war for the rest of his life.

We do well amidst the celebrations to remember the price paid by so many at that time, some of whom, including two of my late grandmother's brothers, still lay where they fell in countless Foreign and Commonwealth war cemeteries around the world, and the many war graves situated at the bottom of the Arctic, Atlantic, and Pacific oceans, the Mediterranean, Baltic, and North seas; and the many waters which surround these islands. We should remember too, all of those who, like my old neighbour, came home and continue to come home from conflicts today carrying the scars of war in their bodies, minds and spirits; and if we are able, contribute something to charities such as the Royal British Legion, SSAFA (the armed forces charity), and the many others which do so much to assist them with their recovery, and for those helping the victims of war around the world today.

We shall be paying special tribute to those lying in the war graves situated in our benefice on VE Day, and for

the many whose fates and final resting places remain unknown to anyone except God, who was with them when they fell, holds them in his ever-loving care, and watches over them still. It seems to me that we do well to remember the lessons of the past in these troubling times when the post-war consensus which has maintained peace and guaranteed prosperity for so much of the world is being threatened by so many over-privileged, boastful, and regressive leaders in the world today who have forgotten them, and seem doomed to repeat those same failures because of their ignorance, arrogance, pride, and greed. Psalm 34:14 says, 'depart from evil and do good; seek peace, and pursue it', for it is God who will judge between the nations and shall arbitrate for the peoples of the earth'. Until the day when, 'nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore' (Isaiah 2:4b), let us pray sincerely that that day will come sooner rather than later, and that we will have no need to relearn the lessons of the past when so much in today's world seems awry.

In the later stages of the war there were great concerns among POWs over the motives for moving them westward. Many different and conflicting rumours abounded, including suggestions that:

- They were being moved towards concentration camps to be killed, in revenge for Allied commanders' deliberate targeting of civilians in cities such as Dresden.
- POWs would be force-marched until their deaths from exhaustion, a practice that had already been made notorious by the Japanese military (see, for instance: Bataan Death March).
- They would be held hostage to leverage peace deals, including claims that they would be held at a national redoubt in the Alps. This claim was backed up by SS General Gottlob Berger, who was appointed general commander of POW camps during 1944. Berger stated during his trial for war crimes (1948), that Hitler had considered a threat to execute 35,000 POWs, unless the Allies agreed to a peace deal. Similarly, SS chief Heinrich Himmler had made similar plans, centred on the Baltic coastal region and set up a new headquarters in a castle on the Bay of Lübeck.

In terms of casualties, there are varying estimates on the total number with one source suggesting between 2,500 and 3,500 American, British and Commonwealth POWs perished on the marches, whereas a senior YMCA official closely involved with the POW camps put the number of Commonwealth and American POW deaths at 8,348 between September 1944 and May 1945.

4th May - Arrive in Zagan

5th May - Stalag Luft 3 to Bad Muskau - 63km (will pass the barns at Halbau Ilowa and Lipna enroute where the POWs rested. They also stayed in BM)

6th May - Bad Muskau to Lubbenau 93km (Route takes us past Spemburg where the POWs were loaded onto cattle trucks. Lubbenau looks a nice stop near lakes)

7th May- Lubbenau to Luckenwalde 73km - (Location of SL3A where lots of POWs from SL3 were housed prior to liberation)

8th May - Luckenwalde to Berlin (The Neue Wache Memorial) 60km

Our 2025 AGM marked 10 years since the idea of a Men's Shed turned into a reality for Winslow and we remain indebted to our founding Shedders for finding premises, getting the necessary support and for setting the ball rolling. A key member of the team was Dave Saunders who has decided that now is the right time to step down as our Chairman. Although Dave was unable to attend the AGM it did provide a suitable occasion to officially record our gratitude for all that he has done to establish MISW as a valued part of the Winslow community. Tim Elderton steps into Dave's shoes and our Shed Committee is bolstered with the addition of volunteers Neil Udall and Tony Stopp. The next few years will involve us moving, setting up in new premises and, no doubt, getting back up to speed so new energy and fresh ideas will be essential - welcome aboard chaps!

Our Treasurer was able to report healthy balances for the year and some carefully managed reserves to provide confidence as we face an uncertain future but we are not a 'fund-raising' operation - as such. A donation is invited for the jobs that we do and, for community projects, we always try to find the necessary funding ourselves. In a nutshell, we keep busy, people are generous and our overheads are low. I think we surprised ourselves with a simple calculation. We open for 100 sessions per year, average attendance these days is about 15 per session and an average stay is about 3 hours. That adds up to 4,500 hours or, to put it another way, MISW is entirely selfsufficient and provides 4,500 hours of social inclusion opportunity, per year, to men in our community. We are working towards being self-sufficient in our move

Winslow & District Community Bus Needs Volunteer Drivers

The Winslow & District Community Bus relies on volunteer drivers to run all our services, excursions and hires.

We are always in need of volunteer drivers, especially at the moment! So, if you have a D1 on your licence, and have some spare time, please consider becoming a driver for your local Community Bus.

All of our scheduled routes start at around 9.00am and finish around 1.30pm. We pay out-of-pocket expenses.

We also run our own outings visiting all kinds of places, including garden centres, stately homes, shopping centres and countryside drives. The use of the bus is also available to local non-profit groups

We offer certificated training to MiDAS standard

MiDAS is the Minibus Driver Awareness Scheme and is administered by the Community Transport Association. The scheme provides a nationally recognised standard for the assessment and training of minibus drivers and has been designed to enhance minibus driving standards and promote the safer operation of minibuses.

WDCB provide free training to "MiDAS" standards for all our drivers. A certificate is awarded after successful completion of the course, which is valid for four years and is recognised UK-wide. Candidates must be aged over 21 and have category 'D1' on their licence. The course is usually completed in a day, the time being divided between classroom and practical work. The latter comprises coaching and assessment of driving skills plus a briefing on the use of the minibus wheelchair lift.


