Over the last forty years aided and abetted by John Chaplin, John Prime and my husband Peter, I had put together several hundred photos, approximately fifty taped interviews and various documents relating to the village.

This exhibition was a chance for some of the collection to have a wider audience. The displays were ready on time, the weather was good for January but would anyone turn up? We need not have worried – the Keene Hall was buzzing from 10 until 4. Many visitors were natives who had lived most of their lives in the community. Mrs Harry Denis (Daisy), aged 97 enjoyed telling people about life in the 1950s and Joan Payne (nee Lodge) talked about Brook Lane and Pipers Tye while Geoffrey Wilson reminisced about Galleywood School and Sunday School outings with the Rev Roughton. Many other old friends arrived, people who my brother Leslie and I had not seen for years.

It was also wonderful meeting up with people who had either left the village as children or had worked on the farms when young. It was a pleasure explaining to them that their individual history was important and that family 'snaps' were a very valuable source

Many 'new' villagers turned up as well, obviously looking at the community in the past years but also hopefully looking for a role in the present village.

The W.I. by providing excellent food and welcome cups of tea next day I could enabled people to sit and relax, talk, reminisce and recall. A brilliant way to allow people to 'open up' on their memories. My whole family spent the day talking, in fact I was so hoarse the next day I could not speak on the phone. The exhibition was a great success, a tribute to the hard work of so many. We are very lucky in Galleywood to have such a committed group, collecting together a village archive. Many villages have nothing to approach the Galleywood collections. I, for one, am looking forward to seeing new and further exhibitions.
